Juneteenth, also known as Juneteenth National Independence Day, is a holiday that commemorates the emancipation of enslaved African Americans in the United States. The name "Juneteenth" is a combination of June and nineteenth, as it marks the date—June 19, 1865—when Union Army General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas, and announced the enforcement of the Emancipation Proclamation, which had been signed by President Abraham Lincoln two and a half years earlier, on January 1, 1863.

Although the proclamation declared the freedom of enslaved people in the Confederate states, it was not immediately enforced in areas still under Confederate control, including Texas. When General Granger's announcement was made, many enslaved people in Texas were freed, and it marked a significant turning point in the history of emancipation and the fight for equality.

The celebration of Juneteenth became a way for African American communities to mark the end of slavery and to celebrate freedom, resilience, and African American culture. Over time, it has grown into a celebration of African American heritage, pride, and ongoing struggles for civil rights.

Why We Celebrate Juneteenth:

- Freedom: It marks the moment when the last enslaved people in the United States learned of their freedom, signaling the end of an unjust system of slavery.
- Heritage and Culture: Juneteenth has become a day to celebrate African American history, culture, and contributions to American society.
- Reflection and Education: It serves as an opportunity for people to reflect on the past, discuss the history of slavery, and continue to advocate for social justice and racial equality.
- Juneteenth was officially recognized as a federal holiday in the United States in June 2021. Celebrations often include parades, picnics, music, art, and community gatherings.

Shawtown Alumni Association Ground Breaking Ceremony

On Wednesday, May 7, 2025, the Shawtown High School Alumni Association (SHSAA) held a groundbreaking ceremony for our Community Resource Center. This project has been in the works for sometime now and we are finally seeing some physical evidence. The building will be located on the campus of the high school which has since been demolished and graduated its last class in 1968.





An estimated \$200,000 is needed to finish the interior of the building and make it a functional facility. Once completed, the building

will serve the community as a resource for community gatherings and educational programs. As a result, we are currently in a capital campaign to raise those funds. Contributions are being solicited from all who are willing to help. You may donate in your name or in memory or honor of someone. We are a 501 3C organization and therefore donations are tax deductible. We are so excited about the progress we have made and look forward to completing this project with your support. The Shawtown School began around 1915 as a two-room structure built approximately three-tenths of a mile west of its current location. At a time when the state provided little support for the education of African Americans, the Shawtown community took action by purchasing an acre of land and constructing the first school building themselves. Teachers' salaries were either fully funded

or supplemented by local citizens, reflecting the community's deep commitment to education. Mr. H. Suggs served as the school's first principal and also taught classes, playing a vital role in shaping the school's early development.

The school later became part of the Rosenwald initiative, a groundbreaking philanthropic effort led by Julius Rosenwald from 1912 to 1932 that funded the construction of schools for African American students across the rural South. The Shawtown Rosenwald School was one of many institutions that benefitted from this program, which sought to close the educational gap in underserved communities. The school stands today as a lasting symbol of perseverance, community pride, and the transformative power of education.
