On Point Trucking Academy located at 12t N. Willson Ave. Dunn, held their ribbon-cutting ceremony on October 11, 2024. On Point, owned and operated by Musia Hymes, Founder/CEO, is a licensed commercial truck driver training school, fully accredited by the North Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles. This licensing ensures that the Academy meets all state standards, providing students with a certified and credible pathway to obtaining a Commercial Driver License (CDL).

On Point Trucking Academy offers a comprehensive CDL program that runs for 4-6 weeks and includes 160 hours of training. The program is certified by the North Carolina Department of Mother Vehicles, ensuring that students receive top-quality instruction that meets all regulatory standards. Once students complete their certification they are eligible to go to the DMV to test for and obtain a North Carolina CDL, fully prepared to start their careers in the trucking industry. Their goal is to equip students with the skills and knowledge needed to thrive and enter the trucking industry confidently.

The team at On Point Trucking Academy is comprised of a dedicated staff of ten professionals. This team includes Ms. Hymes, founder/CEO, Shannon Lockamy, founder/Directer of Operations, Recruiting Director, Director of Instructors, and five skilled instructors. Each team member brings unique expertise and a shared commitment to delivering an exceptional training experience. The On Point team works to ensure that every aspect of the program is well-supported and focused on student success.



Ms. Hymes stated that she decided to start On Point Trucking Academy right after attending CDL school. "My experience there was less than ideal, and I quickly realized how much room there was for improvement in the quality of CDL training. It was clear to me that I could make a positive impact by creating an academy that truly supports and equips students for success. I began researching and planning to establish my own CDL school with a mission to provide a more supportive, inclusive experience for future drivers." This student-focused approach sets On Point Trucking Academy apart as they are able to provide personalized instruction. On Point is driven by a mission to make trucking more inclusive, with a team that understands the challenges and unique needs of each student. Unlike many programs, we prioritize support, accessibility, and quality, from our small class sizes to our dedicated staff who offer guidance at every step, ensuring students feel confident and prepared to start their careers. On Point is Black-owned, woman-owned business and Ms. Hymes and Ms. Lockamy faced several challenges as women in a male-dominated industry having to overcome stereotypes/misconceptions about women in the industry. This just inspired them to be resilient and innovative. Ms. Hymes shared:

"Earning respect required proving myself, often more than others, and showing that my skills, knowledge, and work ethic are on par with or better than anyone else in the field. Additionally, I've had to navigate some barriers to networking and mentorship opportunities, that are more easily accessible to men. Having such an experience only strengthened my commitment to make trucking an inclusive space. This mission is a part of the inspiration for establishing On Point Trucking Academy—to help create an environment where everyone feels supported and equipped to succeed, regardless of their background."

The official opening date for On Point Trucking Academy was October 14, 2024. The cohort of classes starts soon and will typically be scheduled on a rolling basis allowing new students to join without a long waiting period to begin instruction.





# **Meet the African American Candidates from Harnett County**

I am running for NC House District 53 because I want better schools and better jobs in every corner of North Carolina. I am a proud Harnett County native who comes from a family of educators. Because of them, I understand that a quality public education empowers our children and strengthens our state.

Unfortunately, the Republican-led General Assembly has developed a voucher scheme which defunds our education system and funnels the money into private schools. Rich people can take taxpayer dollars and spend it on their children's private school tuition. These schools can deny enrollment to children for any reason. If a child transfers from a private school to a public school, the private school is allowed to keep the money for that child. Meanwhile, public schools are severely underfunded, facing dire staffing shortages and harming school performance. This scheme is unacceptable.

In many counties, the public school system is one of the largest employers, and county tax bases are largely determined by residents who work in those counties. Increasing teacher pay will increase county tax bases and attract economic development. Furthermore, a school funding increase allows low-performing schools to improve their performance. Educators are doing their best in a grave situation, but the defunding of public education has created more low-performing schools. Residents do not want to stay in areas with low-performing schools, and businesses are not going to expand in areas with low-performing schools.

In the state House I will fight to increase school funding and teacher pay. Residents will then be more likely to stay in rural areas, and businesses will be more likely to expand in rural areas. Vote for me and let's move North Carolina forward!

Kingdom Voices United was founded in 2023 by Minister Lawanda Leggett, a prominent soloist in the Harnett and Cumberland communities, known for singing at funerals and various events. Inspired by her vision to bring together voices from different churches, she partnered with local music leaders Roy Lee Harris, Tony Smith, Elder Greg Mitchell, Pastor Jason Trusell, and Pastor Stanley Douglas to bring this dream to life.

Word spread, and singers from churches across the region began gathering monthly for rehearsals, held at different renues to accommodate members from Harnett and Lee Counties. Under the direction of La'Tonya Anderson and with the musical expertise of EJ Stewart from BK Productions, the choir held its first concert in September 2023 at Dunn Chapel Church in Dunn, NC.

Throughout the year, Kingdom Voices United continued to perform at community events, maintaining a dedicated membership of at least 25 singers. By September 2024, the choir celebrated its second concert at Dunn Chapel Church, drawing a spirit-filled audience and reinforcing their mission to unite and uplift the community through song.

# Celebrating Four Years of Legacy at the Harnett County African American Heritage Center

The event kicked off at 3:00 PM with an air of excitement as attendees mingled, sharing stories and revisiting memories that link generations across time. The Heritage Center, founded to preserve the histories and cultural legacies of African American families in Harnett County and surrounding areas, has become a pillar for the community and an essential resource for historians and genealogists alike.

Families enjoyed refreshments and activities, with local artisans selling handcrafted items inspired by African American heritage. #### **Looking Ahead**

As the celebration concluded, attendees reflected on the journey thus far and the legacy being created for future generations. Plans for expanding the Heritage Center's reach were announced, with initiatives to include more educational programs, workshops, and community archives. The center's dedication to preserving African American history ensures that the stories of the past will continue to inspire and educate for years to come.

# Desi L. Campbell, Recipient of the North Carolina Genealogical Society Outstanding Contribution to North Carolina Genealogy Award

Desi L. Campbell, the executive director of the Harnett County African American Heritage Center in Lillington, NC was nominated and the recipient of the North Carolina Genealogical Society's Outstanding Contribution to North Carolina Genealogy. This is the highest award offered by this organization. It recognizes an individual whose longtime genealogical contributions have greatly enhanced the study of family history in North Carolina and the region.

Campbell's contributions include: He serves as the first officer of the Sandhills Chapter of the Afro-American Historical and Genealogical Society, Inc (AAHGS), which officially received its charter in 2020. Campbell's journey with this organization began in 2010 when it was a group of genealogy enthusiasts. His dedication to the field is evident in his authorship of twenty books on family history as well as a book on "Let's Talk Genealogy for Kids". His passion for preserving and sharing African American heritage is further demonstrated through his role as Executive Director at the Harnett County African American Heritage Center and Museum. Campbell's commitment to preserving and disseminating African-American history is unwavering. He has assisted over 200 families in uncovering their genealogical roots and has organized numerous events to celebrate and preserve African-American heritage. Some notable events include: Presenter for the African American Cultural Celebration annually at the NC Museum of History in Raleigh, NC.

Presenter at the Black History Month AAHGS Yearly Conference: Hosted in various locations such as Winston-Salem, NC, and Raleigh, NC. Currently the SandHills Chapter will be the 2025 Host in Fayetteville, NC.

Presenter at the AAHGS National Conference: A significant event with themes like "400 years of Black History" and "From 1619 Virginia to present day: Correcting the National Narrative in the midst of Covid-19." Serves as Chapter President of the Sandhills Chapter and Book vendor.

Presenter at Juneteenth Celebrations: These include events in Lillington, Dunn, Duplin County, Fuquay Varina, Zebulon, and the Fayetteville NC Juneteenth yearly.

Co-Sponsor of Heritage Festivals and Family Reunions: Such as the Harnett County African Heritage Festivals, DNA Family Fest, Annual IGBO Worldwide Festival and participation in several family reunions throughout North Carolina and South Carolina providing family history, support and demonstrations.

Historical Dedications: Assisted in funding and erecting two African American heritage monuments to honor the ancestors' families in the Harnett County area. One monument is located at the Coats Museum in Coats, NC, and the other at the Wilkins Center in Dunn, NC.

Desi is currently working to collect North Carolina African American obituaries, digitize them, and upload them to a database for public viewing. Additionally, the project involves identifying and locating churches and cemetery grave markers in Harnett County, to be expanded to all of North Carolina later and compiling this information into another accessible database.

Campbell's influence is evident in his active Social Media (Facebook link) participation and presentations in numerous conferences and heritage celebrations, such as RootsTech in Salt Lake City, Utah, and local events like the Harnett County African American Festivals, Duplin County African American Festivals, Southern Wake County and Zebulon, NC Heritage Associations. Through his dedicated efforts, he ensures that African-American history is celebrated, preserved, and passed down to future generations, cementing his legacy as a passionate advocate for heritage and culture.

Campbell is slated to be a presenter along with his cousin Deena L. Hill from Utah, who both are descendants from an Harnett County (African American) family formerly enslaved, Jenny McLean born 1775 and Deena is a descendant of (White) Wiley Holder family of Barbecue.

This event will take place March 6-9, 2025, their topic "Interracial cousins find shared ancestry, sparking a rewarding journey to Africa" has been accepted. This will be a 60-minute live session that happens in the Salt Palace Convention Center in Salt Lake City, UT.

Roots Tech is the world's largest family history conference with thousands joining in person and millions joining online. They will get the chance to share their knowledge, expertise, and passion with people from all over.





# Mount Pisgah OFWB Church Celebrates 164th Anniversary

On October 20, 2024, Mount Pisgah Harnett Original Free Will Baptist Church celebrated its 164th of kingdom building and service. In addition to being the largest African-American Church in Harnett County, Mount Pisgah is one of the oldest as well. The church traces its roots to the late 1850's with slaves who would "steal away" to have their own church meetings to worship more freely. Those meetings led to what would become regular services in 1860, eventually moving three original trustees Jack McKay, Sandy McKay and Thomas Ryals to found Mount Pisgah then known as Old Egypt. Several descendents of the founders still attend the church today.

Homecoming celebrations included tributes to "Living Legends" Mother Lessie Holiday, Mother Diana Lucas, Bro.Paul Robinson and Bro. Robert Johnson. Several families were on hand visiting for homecoming and a highlight of the service was a memorial walk in remembrance of church members who have transitioned to Glory. After services everyone enjoyed an outdoor fish fry with gospel music, games and face painting.

Mount Pisgah is pastored by Bishop Reginald S. Hinton, Sr. and First Lady Janet M. Hinton. Bishop Hinton recently celebrated his 42nd Pastoral Anniversary and with his leadership Mount Pisgah Harnett has celebrated many milestones, most notably the opening of a 700-seat sanctuary, the Sesquicentennial (150 year) celebration in 2010 and plans for future expansion. Mount Pisgah has much to celebrate as God has continually blessed the church with provision to expand its ministries, designed to bless the church and community at large. This includes ministries of Outreach, Marriage, Singles, Grief, Mighty Men, Women of Virtue, Transportation, Nursing Home, Care Teams, Prison, the B-3 Zone children's church and nore. The church continues its pursuit of becoming a full-service ministry, serving God's people from birth until they transition to be with the Lord.

With humble beginnings in 1860, The Mount Pisgah story is indeed a dream worthy to be told. With the dreams of the forefathers and a vision, the church continues to press towards he mark ordained by God. Mount Pisgah Harnett is committed to preserving the past while embracing the future, as the church continues on its path of being "A Fellowship of nspired Saints Loving God and Loving People." 
