Olga Dies Dreaming - Xochitl Gonzales Rating: ★★★★☆



Olga Dies Dreaming is a tale of Mexican gothic meets New York City. Both Pedro, a congressman trying to fight gentrification and Olga, a florist and wedding planner for the ultra elite, have to grapple with a family secret, the return of their mother, and a

hurricane on its way to Puerto Rico. This part love

story, part social critique, part mystery, will keep you engaged for the entire read. It calls into question the reality of the "American Dream" and the perils of assimilation. The characters are complex and incredibly well written. Gonzalez's writing style is fluid and detailed, and her storytelling ability is captivating. If you are interested in a story about immigration and female empowerment, this book is for you.

Babel - R.F Kuang Rating : $\star\star\star\star$




Babel, or the Necessity of Violence by R. F Kuang, is a historical fantasy novel set in an alternate reality of Victorian England where magical silver powers the world. Babel's protagonist is Robin Swift, an orphan from Canton, China, who is brought to England and adopted by an Oxford professor.

Robin spends his childhood studying Latin, Greek, and Mandarin to eventually become a translator for Oxford's prestigious school of translation, Babel. But Babel, and England, aren't what they seem.

Robin is soon forced to reckon with his role in the British empire. For lovers of linguistics, this book is a delight to read, filled to the brim with pages on the etymology of words and the moral questions of translation. The world-building crafted from Kuang's intense research makes the book feel incredibly immersive and easy to imagine. Babel is also very heavy-handed in its commentary on colonialism and imperialism. With witty and informational footnotes, charming and relatable friendships, and a compelling plot, Babel is well worth your time.

Sea of Tranquility - Emily St. John Mandel Rating : $\star\star\star\star$



Sea of Tranquility by Emily St. John Mandel follows the lives of an exiled 18 year old in 1912, a Mars colony resident in the distant plague ridden future, a detective, and a mysterious violinist. Each character's stories are weaved together in a strange tale of time travel

and the supernatural. With touches of historical fiction, fantasy, and sci-fi, this book's unique writing style and story line is captivating. In this untraditional pandemic novel, this book is less centered on the illness and more the way humanity stretches generations. The book will keep you questioning exactly what's going on, but it ends with a beautiful reflection on humanity and the mystical power of music and time.

Finding Me - Viola Davis Rating: ★★★★



In her new memoir, *Finding Me*, Viola Davis takes us through her journey to self love and discovery. Davis is an Oscar and Emmy award winning actress who has been in over 80 movies and shows. But in her memoir, she starts at the beginning, from growing up in

How High we Go in the Dark by Sequoia Nagamatsu


Rating: ★★★★☆

character and their experience with the plague, and the Nagamatsu weaves together their lives in such a way that we can't help but be reminded how connected we all truly are. The book can get quite dark, and it was slightly disturbing to read sections that were so relatable, given our own experience with the COVID-19 pandemic and yet, rather dystopian. The author's commentary on global warming and corporate greed is scorchingly cynical. The thing that strikes me most from this book, however, is the humanity that Nagamatsu imbues in every character he writes. The heart wrenching beauty of Nagamtsu's writing is what makes this book so incredible.

This is the kind of story that will stick with you long after you turn the final page. It follows the story of Sadie and Sam, who meet in a hospital ward and bond over a love for video games. Once in college, they reconnect and collaborate to design video games, creating stories and

The book is an interesting commentary on media, gaming, and gender, like when the two have to make certain decisions about the marketing of their game or partnership to please consumers. Movie Picks

Everything Everywhere All at Once Rating: $\star\star\star\star\star$



Everything Everywhere All at Once directed by Daniel Kwan and Daniel Scheinert is a superhero movie like no other. It centers the lives of a first generation immigrant and her experience in America. The movie starts off with the main character, Evelyn Quan Wang,

portrayed by the incredible actress Michelle Yeoh, as she struggles to pay taxes and relate to her daughter, Joy. However, her entire life changes when she is introduced to the multiverse by an alternate version of her husband who asks for her help to save the universe. She must make the difficult decision to choose to deal with her own life's problems or help everyone else in the

multiverse. This movie is hilarious and moving. It's an interesting and original take on the multiverse, and makes us question how the choices we make shape our lives. Everything Everywhere All at Once is clearly an action movie, but it doesn't overlook the importance of character development, humor, and depth. The relationship between Evelyn and Joy is particularly moving, illustrating the power of mother and daughter relationships, and the ways in which prejudice can be overcome in favor of love. One of the most beautiful things about this movie is that no singular character is good or bad, everyone is flawed and human. Belle - Mamoru Hosoda Rating: ★★★☆



Belle, directed by Mamoru
Hosoda, is an animated film
about a shy girl named Suzu who
finds solace in a virtual reality
universe. The game allowed her
to grow into herself and she
became a global singing
sensation. As she jungles the
challenges of stardome, grief,

and social anxiety, she is faced with a new challenge. A user enters the VR universe intent on destroying it, and she makes it her mission to discover who they are and what their motivation is. The animation is superb, pulling from both

traditional and modern anime styles. The styles are especially effective when contracting the provincial town Suzu lives in and the extravagant virtual reality universe she occupies. The show addresses the expectations of social media and beauty standards, the issue of anonymity in online mediums, and VR escapism. It also illustrates the way music can be a unifying medium and demonstrates the way music can unite people and bring out their humanity. Even if you've never watched anime, this is a highly enjoyable film with deep relevance to our relationship with the growing online world.

Turning Red - Domee Shi

Turning Red is Pixar's newest animated film, and an authentic portrayal of tween girlhood. It follows the life of Mei, a dutiful daughter, who suddenly begins to transform into a giant red panda when she experiences strong emotions. She is torn between family responsibility

and friendship, tradition and self expression. It's a

beautiful story of growing up and balancing family expectations and your own passions. Mei's friend group is an honest portrayal of what middle school life truly is. Middleschooles are dorky, excitable, and boyband obsessed. The movie also doesn't shy away from the difficulties of tween life, without disregarding them or labeling them as immature. It's heartwarming, hilarious, and if you stay for the credits, you're in for a fun surprise.

Aftersun - Charlotte Wells Rating: $\star\star\star\star$



Aftersun is a heartbreaking and deeply moving portrayal of parenthood and remembrance. It centers Sophie, who reflects on the vacation she spent with her father when she was eleven years old. Now 31, she uses her memories of this vacation to try and reconcile with the father she thought she had and the things

about him she hadn't understood at the time. We also glimpse her teen years as we begin to understand more about the struggles her father faced and his life outside of Sophie's immediate recollections. The sound track is exceptional and the multiple styles of filming create a cool distinction between the time periods of Sophie's life. It deals with the hard truths of mental illness and how children remember their parents.

THE JANES - Tia Lessin and Emma Pildes Rating: ★★★☆



During the pre-Roe v. Wade era, when abortion was outlawed, and the Catholic Church condemned it, women in the Chicago area built an underground network of female activists known as 'Jane.' *The Janes* is a documentary about women who risked their reputations to support people

with unwanted pregnancies. They provided low-cost and even free abortions to an estimated 11,000 people. This film showcases interviews with previous Jane members, highlighting the

dangerous positions they were willing to put themselves in to protect reproductive liberties. The complex planning and secretive communication between Jane and the women with unwanted pregnancies shows the intense atmosphere of the pre-Roe v. Wade world. Without Jane, tens of thousands of women would attempt dangerous and life threatening abortions. The documentary manages to clearly describe the way Jane ran while also displaying the emotional stress abortions have on women. This is a must watch, especially in a time where our reproductive rights are at risk.

The Banshees of Inisherin - Martin McDonagh Rating: $\star\star\star\star$



The story of *The Banshees of Inverness*, taking place on an fictional island off the coast of Ireland in 1923, follows the relationship between ex-friends Colm and Padraic. Colm is a tortured artist and Padraic is a cow herder. They had been friends for as long as anyone

could remember, until Colm inexplicably ended his friendship with Padraic. Padraic refuses to accept that it is the end and makes multiple attempts to get back in Colms good graces, even as Colm insists that he doesn't want to waste his time with Padraic anymore. This movie, while initially humorous, takes a dark turn when Colm starts to make threats when Padraic won't leave him alone. The cinematography is stunning and idealistic, and inspires longing for the pastoral picturesque. Their story is a subtle metaphor for the conflict on the Irish mainland, but it's also an interesting depiction of friendship, loneliness, and mental illness.

Don't Worry Darling Rating:★★★☆



Derry Girls - Caroline Leddy and Liz Lewin Rating: ★★★☆

Music Picks

De Todas Las Flores Rating: $\star\star\star\star\star$



De Todas las Flores by Natalia Laforcade, which translates to 'All the Flowers' is an incredible album that explores loss, vulnerability and love; the album takes us through Laforcade's experience and

emotional journey after the end of a relationship. The album combines traditional Mexican folk, classical orchestral, bossa, and pop rock styles. I recommend listening to 'Vine solita', 'Mi Manera de Querer", and "Que te vaya bonito Nicolás", to get a sense of the breadth of styles that she incorporates into her music. Laforcade's voice is raw and lamenting, and you can't help but be sucked in by her sound. Laforcade also writes poetic texts filled with metaphors and stories with duplicate meaning, particularly ones that connect to the natural world. For this, I recommend checking out 'De todas las Flores' and 'Pajarito Colibrí. This album is truly a work of art, and each song flowers to the next to create a beautiful story.

Florist - Florist Rating: ★★★☆



Florist's music has a melancholic touch to it, an intricate blend of rock, acoustic, and folk. The biggest themes of this album are growing up, family dynamics, and earthly beauty, portrayed by vocalist

Emily Sprague's minimalistic lyrical style. Songs like *Red Bird Pt.2* and *Dandelion* are some of my personal favorites, particularly because of the balance Sprauge strikes with the other

instrumentalists. Their music feels like sitting outside in the early morning and listening to the earth wake up. Florist incorporates sounds from nature into their music, blending them into an enveloping, ambient experience. Songs like *June 9th Nighttime* and *Duet for Guitar and Rain* are excellent examples that I recommend checking out. Some of their work is very experimental and abstract like the three part *Bells*, while other songs are more standard and straightforward. This album is perfect for studying or a walk outside.

Laurel Hill - Mitski Rating: ★★★★



In Laurel Hell, Mitski definitely embraces Pop music more than she ever has. This is ironic because this entire album seems to be a manifestation of how tired she is of the music industry. She has earlier said

that the music world was "shaving away (her) soul little by little." There are consistent themes of feeling intense pressure and being burnt out, the best example of that is the second song on the album "Working for the Knife," the title of which, I think, is self-explanatory. Every beat in

this album is mechanical, almost as if making music has become mechanical, robotic, and repetitive for her. Laurel Hell seems to be a midlife crisis of sorts, with lyrics like "I used to think I'd be done by 20. Now at 29, the road ahead appears the same" or "I didn't know that I was young. I didn't know what it would take" or "I guess, I guess, I guess this is the end. I'll have to learn to be somebody else." As usual, there are songs about heartbreak and lost love, but that's all in the vein of typical Mitski. I think this is a great album, but next to Mitski's other works, it's not as groundbreaking or as heartwrenching or as genuine.

Midnight - Taylor Swift Rating: ★★★☆



Midnights, released on October 21, 2022. However, Midnight's 3 a.m edition was released later on, at 3 a.m. This is a testament to Swift's creativity within song writing, signing and producing her work. She never fails to add

her own spin to her work, dropping unforeseen easter eggs and teasers. Her latest album *Midnights* is an example of this. In my opinion, Midnights had one of the most controversial drops in Taylor Swift's history. Critics went to twitter to complain about how "mundane", "boring" and "untaylor swift like" the album was.

The album takes a different approach to Swift's carefully crafted pop princess identity. Songs featured follow a slow beat and always have what Swift is perhaps most known for, a very catchy chorus. Most songs seem to have a common theme, sleepless nights. A personal favorite song of mine is "Paris" released in Swift's 3 a.m album. "Paris" is unlike most of the other songs as it has a faster beat and swifter coming lines. The opening lines are some of the catchiest and unique lines I have heard. I enjoyed how Swift utilized a narrative element in this song, and I thought that this was a creative spin on a typical conversation Swift may have encountered.

Renaissance - Beyonce Rating: ★★★★



Renaissance is very Beyonce. It has her classic touches, her speak-singing, her riffs, and her layered vocals. But there is something distinctly new-age about it. This is a little pre-emptive, but I think this

album could be the blueprint for the future of pop. If that is true, I'm very excited for the coming years. This album contains more dance beats and electro-pop elements, which Beyonce has definitely included before but to this extent. This is great club music, but would also be amazing for a workout, a study session, or a car ride. The album's reminiscent of Azealia Banks, stylistically, but

has been fully adopted and elevated by Beyonce. Definitely Beyoncified. She utilizes Afro-beats, something many western Black artists have been doing in recent years, and it always sounds fantastic. The album cover is perfect because it depicts her god-like and above all, which is the theme of many of her songs. This album is an acknowledgment that she is a pop revolutionary and has changed the music industry forever. As her third song is titled, she really is the "ALIEN SUPERSTAR." Some songs feel more "classically" Beyonce and classically pop, like "CUFF IT" or "PLASTIC OFF THE SOFA" This album should've won album of the year, no contest.

Scarecrow - Citizen Soldier Rating: ★★★★



Alternative Rock comes in many shapes and forms, one of which is in Citizen Soldier. Citizen Soldier is a rock band whose music focuses on mental health, depression, anxiety, and abuse. Released on December 14th,

2022, *Scarecrow* contains a brand new collection of 18 songs, such as "Monster Made of Memories,"

Last year, Sabrina Carpenter released her fifth studio album titled *emails i can't send* with Island Records. The album has 13 songs, and is generally consistent with a pop style. However, in an interview with

Travis Mills, she said she wanted the album to be genreless. Sabrina Carpenter explained that she worked on the album for three years in an, and said it helped her heal through a tough time in her life and understand herself. The song ranges from upbeat feel good songs like *Read Your Mind* and Already Over, to slower ballads like *emails i can't send* and *how many things*. Sabrina incorporates guitar, piano, and synth to vary the styles of each of her songs and give them a unique sound. "Nonsense" is just a fun song with synth and vocals, and is her most popular song on the album. In a Genius interview, Carpenter said all of the lyrics she wrote for "Nonsense" were literally nonsense and how it's about falling in love.
