<b>COMPOSITION AND ORDERING SPECIFICATIONS</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. This position can be ordered as a single resource.</li> <li>2. Discuss logistics for deploying this position, such as security, lodging, transportation, and meals, prior to deployment</li> <li>3. The position typically works 12 hours per shift, is self-sustainable for 72 hours, and is deployable for up to 14 days</li> <li>4. Requestor specifies competency areas necessary based on the animal population the position will serve</li> </ol>

Each type of resource builds on the qualifications of the type below it. For example, Type 1 qualifications include the qualifications in Type 2, plus an increase in capability. Type 1 is the highest qualification level.

<b>DESCRIPTION</b>	<p>The Animal Behavior Specialist:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Assesses behavioral status, identifies potentially dangerous behaviors, and makes behavioral recommendations for animals in one or more of the following competency areas during and after disasters:               <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Companion animals, including pets, service animals, and assistance animals</li> <li>b. Livestock, including food or fiber animals and domesticated equine species</li> <li>c. Wildlife animals, captive wildlife, and zoo animals</li> <li>d. Laboratory animals</li> </ol> </li> <li>2. Triage animals to determine behavioral status</li> <li>3. Classifies animals by behavioral status to determine the appropriate type of Animal Care and Handling Specialist or other staff to assign to handle them</li> <li>4. Identifies potentially dangerous behaviors that could put the animal, the handler, or other people or animals at risk</li> <li>5. Designs and coordinates animal enrichment and socialization programs</li> <li>6. Develops and implements treatment plans to address animal behavioral issues for stray, abandoned, unattended, or relinquished animals</li> <li>7.
