

A book report on

THE KENNEDY WORLD IN MEDALLIC ART (2014) By William R. Rice



When Bob asked for a volunteer for this assignment, what I 'heard' were two words – Kennedy and **coins**. I enthusiastically raised my hand. For some reason I missed the part on 'Medallic art'. Not knowing a thing about medals, I initially thought I had bitten off more than could chew. I was wrong.

The Author

The author (Rice) was born in Maine just months before the start of World War II. His family moved to San Diego in 1953 and in the years that followed Rice developed an interest in still photography and ultimately became an accomplished photographer. He also took a keen interest in modern history, specifically Kennedy medallic art. The following is an excerpt from the preface of Rice's book. (At the time Rice's father was a Senior Chief in the Navy and Rice was active-duty Air Force.)

In June 1963, I had been invited to join the crowd that would welcome President Kennedy to the Naval Ordinance Test

My father was the Chief
master- at- arms, but I
was sadly unable to
attend because of Air
Force duties in
Northern California.
Since I missed the event,
my father gave me a
bronze medal bearing
President Kennedy's
image and
commemorating his
visit. The moment that

the medal was placed in my hand, the die had been cast for the long road ahead.

Rice was smitten and thus began his hobby of collecting Kennedy medallic art and other Kennedy Memorabilia.

Not long after the China Lake visit, on November 22, 1963, President John Fitzgerald Kennedy was assassinated by Lee Harvey Oswald. The nation grieved. The world grieved. The nation had lost a visionary and a great statesman. After some time, once the event sunk in, the world gave tribute by producing the greatest output of memorials the world has ever seen. Including JFK related medals. In large part that is what this book is about.

The Book

In the introductory part of the book, Rice gives a proper shout out to Edward C.

Rochette.
Rochette was a lifetime collector and spent much of his life in service to the ANA. He also wrote the first book on Kennedy



medallic art, *The Medallic Portraits of John F. Kennedy*, in 1966. Rice greatly expands the compilation of JFK associated medals beyond Rochette's.

The best part of the book, at least for me, was Rice's historical perspective on the life and times of John F. Kennedy. Rice, in detail, explores the history of the Kennedy family, JFK's early years, Harvard days, military service during WW II, political ascendency, inauguration, the presidency, JFK's wife Jacqueline and their children, the assassination, and America's time of mourning. This chronological portrayal of Kennedy's life comprises the better part of

one half of the book and is told with insight and compassion and is chock full of supportive essays and of photographs of relevant medals, tokens, coins and other memorabilia. The history presented in this part of the book was fascinating and I realized h ow much I did not know about JFK.

Yes, there is a chapter on Kennedy coins. It includes 'reminiscences' of both Gilroy Roberts and Frank Gasparro on the design and rush to mintage of the Kennedy half dollar. Also included is the Kennedy Half Dollar 50th Anniversary Sets (2014), including the 2014 West Point gold proof.


There is a presentation and explanation of the Rochette-Rice Kennedy Catalog System.

This system is a practical, clear and concise method to classify all JFK related medallic art and memorabilia. The Kennedy Catalog is



presented in Appendix A (It is amazingly extensive).

Also covered are Kennedy related challenge coins, tokens and stamps. There are other subjects and sections in this book that are too numerous to mention. But rest assured, whether a collector of medals or not, there is something in this book for everyone. And





A LESSER-KNOWN MEDAL... FOR A REASON

A Companion Piece to the January 2025 Newsletter Article, "The U S Mint Produces Rarities...Again"

In the world of numismatics, medals are not always focused on as much as coins. Medals produced by the U.S. Mint require an act of Congress just as coins. Each year, proposals for a medal series, individual medals, and Congressional Medals are considered to be enacted by law. Rep. Lisa McClain took the initiative on August 31, 2021, and introduced H.R. 5124. On December 16th 2021 it was auto-penned into law, enacting Public Law No. 117-72. Three vears later, an exclusive mintage was initially produced in Gold and presented in a ceremony. So why the long hiatus from enacting the law authorizing the medal's production, to the actual production, ceremony presentation, and sale to the public?

Officially Known as the 2024 'Heroes of Kabul Congressional Gold Medal', this lesser-known medal went on sale at the U.S. Mint after September 10th, 2024. Similar in size to the



American Silver Dollar, it is currently only available in bronze due to how Sec. 3 of the Law is written. It only allows duplicates of bronze to be struck. The fact that this medal exists is a hard pill to swallow, and is probably why it took so long to be produced and presented.

There had been a well promoted Silver Medal produced at this same time in 2024. It

did overshadow most numismatic news and could be why most were not aware of this bronze medal's availability. The Silver Medal released during this same time should have been a coin because of what it was representing, and there was a legitimate controversy concerning the gold privy mark coin at this time. You may have already guessed it was the 2024 Flowing Hair. How many 230th anniversary celebrations, events or commemorations has there ever been? Only one? It always seemed such an odd year, 230, but whatever, the mint is producing a Flowing Hair! Making a big deal out of the 230th Anniversary of America's first Silver Dollar, and keeping them strung along with a 230 privy mark gold Flowing Hair coin that will unknowingly go to auction only, would draw



attention away from a newly released bronze medal commemorating an event that should have never happened.

Maybe it was seen as "too soon." Public sentiment was still very raw even into 2022. For many, the memory is a scar. Masking the Gold Medal's Presentation Ceremony with September 11th Remembrance the very next day might have been an attempt to save face, allowing numismatists to focus on the October 15th release of the 2024 Flowing hair.

The act authorizing the medal does not stipulate specifics of when production may begin. It only refers to the Speaker of the House, and the President pro tempore of the Senate to make arrangements for the posthumous presentation. However, it does make the point to mention chapter 51 of U.S. Code 31 shall be adhered to. Within chapter 51, 5111 subsection (a)(2), allows section 321(b) to hold its authority where the Secretary of the Treasury may delegate duties to other Treasury Department Officials, the Mint Director is one of these officials. To determine production and release is a common duty of the mint director.

Ryder left the Mint Director position in September of 2021, a new acting Mint Director was installed, and confirmed in June of 2022. This could be another reason why the medal had not yet been produced and presented, or it was intentionally put on a back burner. The new Mint Director was most likely focused on the change to a new reverse of the American Silver Eagle and the Stack's Bowers & Ponterio Summer 2022 Global Showcase Auction which featured the first time in mint history the production of rarities from the mint, sent directly to grading companies to be slabbed with custom labels, and then to auction. A milestone in U. S. Coinage.

Also in 2022, and a lesser-known fact, the 40th Mint Director was featured on a Bronze Medal due to diversity. Only available in the 3-inch size at \$160, plus tax, and shipping. The American Woman Quarter series was also a new project that began in 2022 through 2025 and each individual quarter was released January, March, June, August, and October of each year which was a time dominating endeavor for the mint director. Among the ongoing demands of the American Women Quarter Series,

throughout the mint director's tenure there had been frequent personal appearances by the mint director in conjunction with the release of a number of American Women featured coins and medals, as well as a 2022 COTY (coin of the year) award.

In the fall of 2023, the mint announced a Flowing Hair coin was going to be produced, but no details were given. The Treasury Secretary's bronze medal design was finally confirmed in April of 2024, and soon released thereafter, again only available in the 3-inch size. Earlier in 2024, a "ground breaking collaboration" between Eighth Era Gaming company and the Mint announced 50,000 Exclusive, direct from mint to NGC for grading and custom label slabbed rarities, the Star Privy Mark Silver Eagles. As of April 7, 2025, gamers shall once again compete for another 50K Silver Eagles slabbed and graded with custom labels, but this time with a new Eagle-in -Flight Privy Mark. Producing rarities has now become a recurring habit for the mint.



The most successful batch of rarities were now being prepared by the mint, to be slabbed with custom labels, and sent directly

to auction. The Gold 230 Privy Mark Flowing Hair.

This could have been seen as the right time to produce the 2021 authorized Heroes of Kabul Congressional Gold Medal. Enough time had passed since



the debacle to schedule a presentation. The September 10th, 2024 Presentation

Ceremony of the 3-inch diameter
Congressional Gold Medal was awarded to
the 13 families, and also to the Smithsonian
for display purposes. The multiple year time
span seems to lend itself to an attempt to
conceal the whole incident. The medallic
artist, Phebe Hemphill designed and
sculpted both the obverse and reverse of this
medal, however it is her only work not listed
among her credits. Also, the 2024 product
release schedule, while other medals are
listed, this one is not.

The mint director was asked to self-deported from the position, and resigned as of March 31, 2025, citing penny concerns in a so long statement. The deputy director of the mint has taken over as acting director until the new appointment is confirmed. The possibility of integrity returning to the U.S. Mint under new leadership could happen... only the future can tell us.

The event that initiated the production of this medal is said to be "controversial," but that is not true due to the facts of the matter. Leading up to 26 August, 2021, the warnings of coordinating enemy forces were ignored, repeatedly, culminating into an attack that competence would have easily avoided. The most tragic lesson of inadequate leadership is the only reason this medal exists.

Contact Rep. Lisa McClain, as well as your Congressman, to request an amendment to Sec.3 of Public Law No. 117-72 allowing .999 fine silver medals to also be struck. Possibly elevating this medal through sales achieving the attention it deserves.
