

COINAGE SPECIFICALLY MINTED FOR COLONIES

England, Spain, and France all had colonies in North America from the late 1500's throughout the 17th century. As Floridians, we're pretty familiar with St. Augustine being the oldest city in America, originating as one of Spain's outposts established in 1565. The first successful English colony was Jamestown established May 14, 1607. The Roanoke Colony was founded in 1585, however nobody was found in 1590 when a British ship stopped by for a visit. Fort Caroline was established by the French in 1562 at the mouth of the St. John's River. The settlers didn't stay long and returned to France after a few years, but France maintained a massive swath of territory depicted in blue on this 1534-1803 map.



Out of these three Nations only one produced coinage specifically for its Colonies.

England never provided enough coinage for its North American Colonies. Lord Baltimore Coins were produced in Britain, but not authorized by the crown and were immediately confiscated. The Spanish Silver Dollar was the first International Currency. "Pieces of Eight" were accepted worldwide, but never a minting specifically for any colony. Until recently there has been a numismatic debate concerning "French-Canadian" coins minted specifically for the American Colony.

A lesser-known fact, the continents of North and South America were named such due to the infamous Italian Explorer Amerigo Vespucci. He used the female version of his name, America, to label the two unnamed land masses on his charts in 1499/1500.

The American Numismatic Society, ANS Curator Dr. Jesse Kraft, Prof. Eric P. Newman, and extensive research by Prof. Jerome Jambu have concluded that French coins in America are not French-American Coins. Some French coins that have been considered "Canadian" or French-Canadian need to be reclassified as French, and other French coins reclassified for specific islands of the West Indies. The 1738-1764 "sol-marque" Rouen was classified as "Canadian" until recently. These are French coins that were merely used in the colonies. Fur traders, merchants, and explorers used these coins and other French coins all across the North American Colony as well as in France.



For more than 300 years, French, Canadian, and American Numismatists attributed the 1670 5 & 15 sol "Gloriam Regni" coins to "New France," particularly Canada. These coins have been reclassified to The French West Indies. From unpublished French Documents it has been confirmed these coins were created specifically for the French West Indies, known today as The Caribbean. King Louis XIV authorized The French West India Co. to manufacture and ship these coins at their own expense for the Antillean part of the American Colonies. The identifying reverse lettering

GLORIAM REGNI TUI DICENT is a phrase from Psalm 144 "They will speak of the Glory of Your kingdom". It was a subtle effort to promote evangelism to the Island's natives.



French coins made specifically for the American Colonies are in truth very few. They are only small coins. The 5 & 15 sol coins dated & 12 sol coins dated 1731 & 1732, and depicting "Isles 1670 were the first in silver, followed by the 6 Du Vent" (Windward Isles) especially for the Island of St. Lucia. These coins were only produced for a 2-year period and the 1732 date had a low mintage of 720K. France colonized a lot of the Caribbean, and if you've ever been there the terminology can be confusing. The Lesser Antilles are Southeast of Puerto Rico, which is the Eastern most island of the Greater Antilles, but not all Lesser Antilles are "Windward Isles", the others are "Leeward Isles". It depends on their location in reference to the Northeast Trade Winds.



The "Colonies Francoises" coins were also meant for use in the Lesser West Indies Colonies; however, they were outright refused in Martinique. They sent them back on returning ships, and Guadeloupe just stored them. These were all copper coins and copper did not circulate well in the Caribbean. This region was accustomed to gold and silver coins, Pirates, and Pirate Booty! Their only use for copper was to put it on the ship's hull to keep the barnacles off. These copper coins were accepted in the Canadian region with distrust. They were better received in the 13 British Colonies.



The Crowned "C" coins are a simple coin that mean "French Colonies" and began production in 1763. (Fig. A) The French Government used many "sol-marques" coins minted since 1738 that were too worn to circulate in France and just restamped them with the "Crowned C." This process was called "estampge," giving its nickname of "sol tampe". These coins were pretty successful and were made out of fresh planchets from 1780 onwards. (Fig. B) The first shipment of the 1780 production went to the newly settled Guyana. All through to 1797 the British were producing considerable quantities of forgeries in brass. (Fig. C)



All of the French Royal Coins could have been in circulation in the American Colonies, but specific coins made for the colonies are few. After 1763 "New France" lost territory to the British, and later the Louisiana Purchase happened. France maintained their colonies in the Islands of the West Indies trading sugar and spices. Many French coins that have been considered coins of French Canada need to be reclassified for the specific Islands in the West Indies.
