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Welcome Family!

It all began in Anderson, South Carolina, hometown of the Mack family. The Mack and McDowell families began having family picnics or reunions as far back as 1906 when Robert Mack was 43 and his wife, Lula McDowell Mack, was only 33 and already proud parents of 8 children. The picnic or reunion was always held on the Church Grounds, in some woods or in a pasture near a family home. The food was always cooked and brought to the site in baskets.

The family began moving around the country in the early 1900's and Robert Mack, Jr. settled in Washington, Pennsylvania where he met and married Nellie Mae Thomas on October 31, 1923, thus joining the Mack and Thomas families. This year marks the 102nd anniversary of that joyful event. Happy Anniversary!

The Macks and Thomases were large, loving families who had been gathering separately for family reunions for many years. But in 1956 both families gathered together in Washington, Pennsylvania for the first Mack Thomas Family Reunion. Soon, the family was too big to meet at homes and be fed by the host family. So, they decided to meet in the cities where the original Clan members lived and be housed and served in hotels, and enjoy each other in relaxed surroundings, free from cooking, bed making, pallets on the floor, and all the other unpopular chores. The last home-based reunion was held in the yard of Birdie and Lee Mack in Anderson, South Carolina in 1963. Beginning in 1965, our families followed a rotation plan and gathered for reunions every two to three years in Philadelphia, Atlanta, Williamsburg, Wheeling, Wintergreen, Hilton Head, Pittsburgh, Valley Forge, State College, Plymouth Meeting, Frazer, Columbia and now Newport News.

Mack Thomas Family Crest

The Mack-Thomas family crest was designed by Lawrence M Washington, Jr, of the Atlanta Group. It was officially adopted as the family crest at our fifth family reunion in 1971 in Williamsburg, Virginia. The symbol represents the two main family groups – Mack and Thomas.



The birthplaces of the families are represented by the keystone for Pennsylvania, a dogwood blossom for Atlanta, and Palmetto branches for South Carolina.

The crest is shaped like an African war shield, and the spears represent our African heritage. The red, green, and black colors of the streamers represent the colors of the new, liberated countries.

Our family descended from many different races. The people on the crest represent all the people of the world. The Swahili inscription, "Wan Tu Wazuri", describes our family group as "God's beautiful people".

NMAAHC Museum Tour

The National Museum of African American History and Culture is the only national museum devoted exclusively to the documentation of African American life, history, and culture. It was established by an Act of Congress in 2003, following decades of efforts to promote and highlight the contributions of African Americans. To date, the museum has collected more than 40,000 artifacts, and nearly 300,000 individuals have become members. The museum opened to the public on September 24, 2016, as the 19th museum of the Smithsonian Institution.

Mission

The National Museum of African American History and Culture captures and shares the **unvarnished truth** of African American history and culture. We connect **stories**, **scholarship**, **art**, **and artifacts** from the past and present to illuminate the contributions, struggles, and triumphs that have **shaped our nation**. We forge new and compelling avenues for audiences to experience the **arc of living history**.

There are four pillars upon which the NMAAHC stands:

- It provides an opportunity for those who are interested in African American culture to explore and revel in this history through interactive exhibitions
- 2. It helps all Americans see how their stories, their histories, and their cultures are shaped and informed by global influences
- It explores what it means to be an American and share how American values like resiliency, optimism, and spirituality are reflected in African American history and culture
- 4. It serves as a place of collaboration that reaches beyond Washington, D.C. to engage new audiences and to work with the myriad of museums and educational institutions that have explored and preserved this important history well before this museum was created.

The NMAAHC is a public institution open to all, where anyone is welcome to participate, collaborate, and learn more about African American history and culture. In the words of Lonnie G. Bunch III, founding director of the museum, "there are few things as powerful and as important as a people, as a nation that is steeped in its history."

Hop Aboard The Free King Street Trolley

Discover a convenient, environmentally friendly and fun way to get around Old Town Alexandria. The FREE King Street Trolley transports riders between the King Street Metrorail Station and Alexandria City Hall/Market Square. With stops every 2 to 3 blocks for hopping on and off, explore the shops, restaurants and attractions found along Alexandria's historic main street.



Hours

The King Street Trolley operates daily (and on holidays), every 15 minutes: Daily: 11:00 A.M.—11:00 P.M.



Plan Your Visit

The FREE Alexandria Visitor Guide and Map are available on the trolley. A great place to start is by hopping off at the Alexandria Visitor Center located at 221 King Street, for maps, brochures and to purchase tickets for historic attractions and tours.

Helpful Information

Smoking, eating, or drinking are prohibited on the trolley. Passengers with strollers must close strollers before entering. The trolley stops at designated stops. Passengers must pull the cord to signal a stop.

Accessibility

The King Street Trolley is equipped with wheelchair ramps and bike racks. All trolleys are equipped to provide stop announcements.
