TERMS OF ADMISSION.

Candidates for admission to the Freshman Class are examined in Geography, Arithmetic, and Algebra through Quadratic Equations; in English, Latin and Greek Grammar, including Prosody; in Caesar's Commentaries, Cicero's Select Orations, Virgil and Sallust; in the Greek Reader and two books of Xenophon's Anabasis.

Andrews & Stoddard's Latin, and Crosby's Greek Grammars—and Andrews' Latin, and Liddell and Scott's Greek Lexicons, are used.

Candidates for admission to an advanced standing, must also be examined in the studies that have been pursued by the class which they enter, or in others equivalent to them.

Testimonials of good moral character, are in all cases required—also of the amount of preparatory study.

Students from other Colleges must bring certificates of dismissal in good standing.

No one can be admitted to the Senior Class after the first term.

No student is considered a regular member of the College, until he has signed the By-Laws and paid his matriculation fee; which, to students entering the Freshman Class, is \$1; Sophomore Class, \$2; Junior Class, \$3; Senior Class, \$4.

PUBLIC WORSHIP AND RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

Prayers are attended in the College Chapel every morning, with the reading of the Scriptures, and all the students are required to be present.

Public worship is held in the Chapel on the Sabbath; and all the students are required to attend, except such as have special permission to attend other places of worship. Such permission can be obtained only by presenting to the President a written request from the parent or guardian.

The classes ordinarily recite in the Greek Testament on Monday morning. A religious meeting is held every Thursday evening by the President. Thus the doctrines and duties of the Christian religion are brought continually before the minds of the students, while no effort is made to teach the peculiarities of any sect.

RHETORICAL EXERCISES.

Attention is given to Declamation, Composition and Extemporaneous Speaking, by the Senior, Junior and Sophomore classes, under the direction of the President.

DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL SCIENCE.

The collection of Philosophical and Chemical Apparatus has now become very extensive, and is still increasing by the purchase or presentation of modern and improved instruments. The course of experimental illustration is thereby rendered very full and complete. For the maintenance and increase of the apparatus, each student is required to pay a fee of fifty cents for each of the sessions in which he attends recitations and lectures in this department.

ASTRONOMY.

The study of this science has been very much facilitated and its interest greatly increased, by the large Equatorial Refractor, lately purchased. With this instrument the students have frequent opportunities of observing the Sun, Moon, Planets, and other objects of interest.

SPECIAL STUDIES.

Instruction is given, at the expense of the student, in the Hebrew, French, and German languages, by the Professors in those departments.

EXAMINATIONS.

All the students are examined each term, on all the studies pursued during that term.

EXPENSES.

The charge for tuition is \$6 per term, payable in advance.

Each student on a Scholarship must, on entering the College session, exhibit his Certificate to the College Treasurer, who shall endorse thereon the tuition of that session.

Contingent fee, \$2 per term.

Graduating fee, \$6.

The price of boarding in the village and neighborhood varies from \$1.50 to \$2.50 a week; room rent, for furnished rooms, from \$4 to \$6 per term.

All Text books used in the College can be obtained, at the ordinary prices, in the village.

The annual expenses of a student, for tuition, board, lodging, washing, fuel and lights, need not exceed \$150.

Parents and Guardians are earnestly advised, on the one hand, to restrict the youth sent to this College to such an amount of money as is necessary for their comfortable and respectable support; and on the other hand, to see that they receive the amount that is really proper, with absolute punctuality; so that the temptation to extravagance, and that of running into debt—both of them amongst the greatest evils of College life—may be avoided.

Students are required to be present during the whole term time, unless excused by the Faculty. The loss of even a few days, especially at the beginning of a term, may exert an injurious influence on the progress of the student during the whole term.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

These are in a flourishing condition, and are probably unsurpassed by any similar associations. They are ornaments to the College, and valuable auxiliaries to the mental training of the students. Their Halls are commodious and handsomely furnished, and their Libraries extensive and well selected.

LYCEUM.

An association for the advancement of knowledge in the various branches of Natural Science, has long been established in this institution, and has made valuable collections of minerals, fossils, shells, coins, medals, Indian antiquities, quadrupeds, birds, reptiles, &c.

Donations to this Cabinet are respectfully solicited from the friends of Natural Science.

LIBRARIES.

The whole number of volumes in the various Libraries connected with the College is about ten thousand.

DEGREE OF MASTER OF ARTS.

The Degree of A. M. will be conferred, in course, on every graduate of three years standing, who shall, in the interval, have sustained a good moral character, and been pursuing professional or other studies, and who shall *make application* personally or by letter to the Board, at least one day previous to the Annual Commencement, accompanied with a fee of \$5, in advance, for his diploma.
