# From the Desk of Pastor Julie Higgs

Dear Partners in Ministry,

One of the gifts of being in an interim time between called pastors is the opportunity to sit back and consider where we are as a congregation, assess in what ways we're meeting—or not meeting—the needs of our members and our community, and make changes where God seems to be leading us in new directions.

As the call process moves into its next phases (see the note below about nominating people to serve on the Call Committee), we are in a moment ripe with possibilities. We are in a moment where each of us can consider the ways in which we are serving in and through Zion's many ministries. I want to highlight three ways we can consider these possibilities:

#### Are You Considering Joining Zion?

We, of course, welcome visitors, including frequent visitors. But for some of you, it may be time to make a fuller commitment to God through Zion's ministries. If you've wondered about joining (or if you've definitely decided to join), please come to any <u>one</u> of the prospective members' gatherings we'll have in July:

- 4:15 pm Saturdays, July 6, 13, or 20
- 10:15 am Sundays, July 7, 14, or 21

These will be informal conversations about what it means to become a member of Zion, with a chance to ask whatever questions you have about ministry at Zion, how or why we do things, what Lutherans believe, and more. We'll meet in the library (except for Sunday, July 7, when we'll meet in the conference room).

#### **Ministries at Zion**

We have <u>a lot</u> of active ministries at Zion with <u>a lot</u> of volunteers doing great work. Sometimes that work is satisfying, joy-filled, and life-giving. And sometimes people can feel "stuck" when they've helped with a ministry for a long time. Others might be interested in helping with something different, but they're not sure who to talk to or what they're supposed to do.

Wherever you find yourself, <u>opportunity is knocking!</u> In your worship bulletins during July will be your opportunity to tell leaders at Zion whether you want to continue your commitments, if you need to change them, and/or if you want to start doing something new for you. Once we gather responses from you, we'll schedule teaching opportunities for things like being an Assisting Minister, ushering, setting up for or serving Communion, etc. And we are particularly grateful for those of you who will happily continue to serve as you have been serving.

#### Timelines

So, I've noticed that the timelines haven't quite caught on, and I know that I haven't jumped up and down to get you excited about them. But in order to consider our future, we need to understand our past. The timelines cover the last quarter-century of ministry at Zion, and at some other congregations that closed in that time. The goal is for them to be a visual representation or reminder of what has happened in the last 25 years of ministry—so that can inform us as we looked toward the next 25 years.

What has mattered to you in the life of this congregation? What has been meaningful, frustrating, life-giving, life-sapping? What did the pandemic cause us to do that we want to continue? In what ways did the pandemic give birth to less helpful patterns in our ministry? Where have we reached out to help meet the needs of our community? Where have those needs—and our responses to them—changed?

If I can find someone to help me go through old *Couriers*, we'll add to the timelines when various ministries started—or ended. For example, when did we start hosting GriefShare? When have we sent quilts to Lutheran World Relief? When did the Wednesday morning Bible study and Holy Communion start? When did we adopt Jefferson Elementary School and start having mentors there and collecting school supplies? How has our worship life evolved?

Let's tell these stories on the timelines!

#### **Call Process**

Part of living into the call process will be doing the work to describe accurately who we are as a congregation, as well as where we believe God is calling us. Within this newsletter, on pages 8 & 9, is an information sheet about the election of a Call Committee. Please consider prayerfully whether you know of someone you want to nominate to serve in this important role. And thank you for your participation in these—as well as future—steps to support their work.





# New Zion Library Books for July 2024






*White Chrysanthemum* by Mary Lynn Brecht is a novel that tells the story of two Korean sisters, one captured by Japanese

Zion's Book Club will meet on Wednesday, July 17th at 10 a.m. in the church library. We will be discussing **The Wager**, a novel by David Grann. In 1742 a decrepit vessel washed up on the coast of Brazil with 30 emaciated men on board. They were survivors of a British ship named the Wager and were greeted as heroes for surviving more than a hundred days traversing nearly 3000 miles of storm-wracked seas. But then, six months later, another craft landed on the coast of Chile containing three castaways from the same ship. So the thirty sailors were not heroes, they were mutineers! The first group responded with charges of their

own, and a court-martial was held to see which group of men was telling the truth. The stakes were literally life and death, for whomever the court found guilty could hang. **The books are on a cart in the library and are due back to Zion on the 17th**. Everyone is welcome!

There are many choices including honey bees, animals, vaccinations, school fees and supplies for children, water filters, and small business loans. There are so many needs in our world. This is an opportunity to make a difference.



### CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR THE CALL COMMITTEE

Our congregation's constitution calls for the Council to elect six persons, reflecting a crosssection of the congregation, to serve on the Call Committee. The Council invites members to consider prayerfully who would serve well on the call committee. Please confirm with anyone you would like to nominate that they are open to being considered before filling out the nomination form. You may nominate yourself. In order to have the widest possible representation from the congregation, Council members are not eligible to serve on the Call Committee.

It is likely that not all nominees will be elected to serve. We are limited to six people, and the Council needs to ensure that the committee reflects a cross-section of our congregation. All nominees, whether elected or not, should trust that the Council will consider all nominations carefully and prayerfully.

The Council invites your continuing prayers throughout the call process.

#### What Does a Call Committee Do?

- Participate in training provided by the Office of the Bishop.
- At all points in the process, keep the congregation informed about progress being made.
- Prepare the Ministry Site Profile, seeking assistance from the congregation council and the congregation at-large.
- Seek approval of the Ministry Site Profile from the congregation council.
- If desired, seek names of potential candidates from the congregation and submit those names to the office of the bishop for consideration.
- Receive from the Bishop's representative the names of candidates to be interviewed.
- While maintaining strict confidentiality, prayerfully review the Rostered Leader Profile for each candidate.
- Invite the candidates for an interview.
- Prepare for the interviews by developing questions, scheduling the interviews, and providing hospitality.
- Interview the candidates, debrief the interviews, and decide upon a candidate, taking time for second interviews if considered necessary.
- Recommend a candidate for call to the congregation council.
- Assist the congregation council in planning a "meet and greet" event and provide information about the candidate to the congregation prior to the congregational vote.
- The call committee's responsibilities end with the installation of the new pastor.
- The chair of the call committee will be asked to participate in the "Walking Together" process with the new pastor, the president of the congregation, and the Office of the Bishop.

#### How Much Time is Expected from Call Committee Members?

The time commitment varies at different points in the process, but usually continues for at least several months.

- While preparing the Ministry Site Profile, the committee will likely meet once or twice a month, for two or three months, depending on how information is gathered.
- Once the committee receives Rostered Leader Profiles, and depending on how many candidates the committee has to consider, meetings will likely occur more frequently for a week or two as committee members decide who to interview.
- Each interview may require up to three meetings:
  - Preparation for the interview
  - o The interview itself
  - Review of the interview
- Depending on the call committee's discernment, second interviews may be required, with similar preparation and review.
- Once the call committee recommends a candidate to the council, its work is mostly complete, assuming that the congregation votes to call the recommended candidate.
- If a candidate withdraws or the council or congregation choose not to move forward, the process continues with seeking one or more new candidates.

#### July 2024 – God's Work, Our Hands

It's nearly that time of year again – God's Work, Our Hands! Though the official day is in September, it's not too late to plan how your congregation can engage with GWOH Day. One of the best ways to practice GWOH is through volunteering.

## **Holy Communion for All**

Many of you will remember the days during the pandemic, when it wasn't safe to gather for worship, and we provided packaged wafers and wine or grape juice for people to receive Holy Communion. As it got safer to gather, most of us returned to our "normal" patterns of receiving bread and wine in person at worship in the church. For some of our members, however, their ability to come to our building for worship never returned. Some of them receive supplies of the packaged Communion elements. In some places where several of our members are able to gather, they share in the Lord's Supper while worshiping together listening to the radio or watching the Facebook Livestream of worship. But for others, worship has become a time filled with longing—longing to be together with other members of our faith community—and longing to receive Christ's real presence in the bread and wine of Holy Communion.

We had a number of home Communion ministers before the pandemic, assisting Pastor Mark in visiting and communing homebound members. We haven't gotten back up to speed with this, even though it's generally safe for us to visit—and commune—those who are homebound. <u>Will</u> <u>you help?</u>

We're asking for a dozen or so members who will each take Communion to one household a month. Pastor Julie will provide simple guidelines for how to deliver and serve Communion appropriately outside a worship service. We have three volunteers already; we need several more. Please contact Pastor Julie to learn more or to volunteer for this important ministry. And thank you for helping us care, share, and serve members who are unable to worship with us in person.



# COUNCIL NEWS

**Summary of Congregation Council Minutes – May 14, 2024** (*The full minutes are posted on the bulletin board near the church office.*)

Pastor Dan Kuckuck, Assistant to the Bishop for Leadership and Congregational Transition, joined the Council for the May meeting. Pastor Kuckuck was present to discuss with the Council the Call Process and its goals outlined by the Synod. The four phases of the Call Process are Leavetaking, Preparation, Discernment and Walking Together. Each phase was reviewed in detail by Pastor Kuckuck. There was an opportunity to ask questions at the end of the presentation.

**Pastor's Report:** Each Council member was given Pastor Julie's *Monthly Report for April*. The areas of activity on the report, with detail included, were Worship, Growing in Faith, Getting to Know One Another, Caring for One Another, Sharing Leadership, Community, Wider Church and Time Away. Pastor also shared additional thoughts on some of these categories.

**Membership Update:** Travis Morehead reviewed the Statistical information. A member was reactivated with a unanimous vote.

**Treasurer's Report:** Treasurer Deb Vath reported to the Council that Offerings are above the Budget estimate and that Income is over Expenses YTD. Deb reviewed select line items. The Bank balances and Accounts were also reviewed. Diane Honeywell made a motion to accept the Treasurer's Report and Patti Lauritzen seconded the motion. All ayes.

**Committee Reports:** Deb Vath moved to approve the standing Committee reports en bloc. Laurie Behrens seconded the motion. All ayes.

#### **Old Business:**

**Portico/Canopy Update:** It was reported to the Council that striping is left to complete.

**Call Process**: Pastor Julie discussed the Story of Zion project. History will be forthcoming. Pastor shared that she wanted to have meetings with new members that have come from different congregations.

**Fresh Produce**: Deb Vath reported to the Council that Information and Referral Services will have a place set up for *Genesis VNA'S Let's Live Healthy* initiative. It was also reported that the rest of the county is covered so there is no need for Zion to provide an additional set-up.
