Becoming a Member of Zion Lutheran Church?

When someone wishes to become a member of Zion Lutheran Church, they first converse with the pastor. This conversation may lead to baptism (for one who has not been baptized), an information and education session with the pastor (if one is coming from a non-Lutheran background), and/or transferring one's membership from another congregation. The names of those choosing to join Zion are then submitted to the Congregation Council for approval.

Once the Council gives their official approval, a formal welcome by the congregation takes place within an upcoming worship service. However, we usually wait until we have more than one individual to welcome before scheduling this service.

We currently have four individuals whose names have been presented to the Council and are awaiting their congregation welcome. Before proceeding to choose a weekend for this to take place, we would like to know if there are any others who desire to be welcomed into Zion's membership before the end of this year. Our child care and preschool classrooms enjoyed their Halloween parties that were held on October





New Zion Library Books for November 2022




All American Boys by Jason Reynolds and Brendan Kiely is a novel about two high school boys, one White, one Black. Their lives become intertwined when one boy witnesses the other being beat up by a policeman. How they live their lives after this is told, day by day, from each one's point of view and involves their whole community. Very timely subject! Donated by Bill Zickau.

Our Man in Charleston by Christopher Dickey is the true story of a young man, Robert Bunch, who is Great Britain's diplomat in Charleston during the lead-up to the Civil War. At this time in history, diplomats were expected to also send intelligence back to their home countries. As secession and war approached, the Southern states found themselves in an impossible position. They knew that recognition from Great Britain would be essential to the survival of the Confederacy, and also that such recognition was

little preschoolers with their tasks. At the end of the night, we were able to prepare 3000 meals (6 meals in each bag). Since Zion has partnered with Kids Against Hunger, we have packaged 40,080 meals!

Stewards of God

Good day and God Bless from Zion's Stewardship Committee. It is that time of year when Zion starts preparing for the coming year. That entails planning and budgeting. Of course, we do not have to tell you that, because every family is doing the same thing. You may be considering applying for a new job, buying a house or car, or paying off long-standing credit cards. Some families may just be trying to figure out how they will pay their everyday expenses. Planning is essential in our personal lives and in business. The same is true for Zion Lutheran. Zion's Council needs to make plans for 2023. It will consider mission obligations, benevolence, new projects, and all expenses related to keeping the church on track. Part of that plan is preparing a budget that considers all the above for 2023. A vital part of that budget is figuring out what funds (income) will be available to cover all expenses. That is why the Stewardship Committee is asking every member to examine their "Plan for Giving for 2023". The Stewardship Committee will be mailing out "Plan for Giving" materials in early November to each church family. The mailing will contain a Plan for Giving Card along with some additional materials to help you in establishing your Plan for Giving to Zion in 2023. We ask that you return your Plan during the Saturday evening service on November 12, or at the Sunday morning service on November 13. Other alternatives to return your card are to drop it in the box set aside for that purpose in the narthex of the church or to mail it to the church office.

After the giving cards are returned Zion's Council will prepare the 2023 annual budget for the church. The budget will be submitted to the congregation for approval at Zion's Annual Meeting. The budget contains figures for Zion's projected 2023 income and expenses. Some of the categories included in the budget are capital improvements, mission, benevolence, and operating expenses. These expenses include, but are not limited to, utilities, insurance, salaries, mission expenses, building maintenance, capital improvements, supplies, and many more. Your Plan for Giving is a crucial element in planning the church's 2023 budget. Zion cannot move forward without the funds to implement its mission, paying its staff and covering the costs of the church building and premises. God has truly blessed Zion and its members' families.

God does not need our money. God owns everything. God is more interested in our hearts than in our possessions. God has given each of us all that we have. We have substance because of God's gifts to us.

Most people immediately think of money when they hear the word "stewardship." But stewardship is so much bigger than finances. It is really a heart issue – a longing to offer everything we are and have to our Lord. Consider these truths from the Word of God as you prayerfully ask the Lord to synchronize your heart with God's will. Remember God's gracious gifts to the world. Consider the wonder and beauty of God's creation. God provides us daily with incredible riches and gifts which include a magnificent universe consisting of galaxies, solar systems, stars, planets and so much more. The earth is a beautiful home to billions of animal and plant species. We all live and enjoy life as part of this miraculous planet. We have been granted life, freedom, and free will. But the most amazing gift of all is Jesus Christ. God sacrificed his only son so that each one of us could enjoy eternal life with the Lord in paradise.

Let us look at three Biblical examples of women who gave substance from their hearts:

- ▼ "A woman came to him with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment." Matthew 26:7
- ♥ "Some women...provided for him out of their resources." Luke 8:2-3
- ♥ "He also saw a poor widow put in two small copper coins." Luke 21:2

The woman in Matthew chapter 26 lavished her substance on the Lord. She gave her ointment (some commentators say it cost her as much as one year's wages), her tears, her hair, her love, and her heart-felt affection. Oh, how this woman lavished her gifts on the Lord!

The women in Luke chapter 8 ministered unto Jesus of their substance. The gifts they gave quite possibly amounted to all they had. They gave him money, but they also could have given food, clothing, a bed, sandals, or many other things. Who can doubt their giving was unto their Lord?

The poor widow in Luke chapter 24 gave everything she had. The widow practiced unnoticed giving. Who in the temple that day noticed the giving of that poor widow woman? The Lord noticed it, and the Lord notices our giving today.

God is not concerned with the amount of money you give, but God is concerned with your intention—are you giving from your heart? We sometimes get hung up with the mechanics of our tithes and offerings and forget that we are giving them to the Lord. Do you ever feel that your giving is unnoticed, overlooked, or criticized by others? Do not worry, you're in good company! Note the Biblical women referenced above, it was not important to them what others thought if the Lord saw their giving.

Not everyone is able to make a gift of substance in the form of money. But consider a gift of your time and talent. Zion's mission statement includes many opportunities for service. Service which amounts to a gift of substance. What substance can you give to the Lord? Examine your lives, time, and talents. God has provided you with something to give back. It is important that you give out of a heart of gratitude. Your gift may be in the form of a monetary tithe; it may be a physical possession; it may be volunteering your time as a church committee member (e.g. offering your assistance in Zion's youth ministry program); it may be offering a specific talent that you possess for the Lord; or, it may be your faith offering for missions. Whatever it is, God has given it to you so you can give it back to God (see 2 Corinthians 8:11-12).

During my time as your pastor, I have quite often heard something like "I know that you're busy, so I didn't call you." Let me respond to this statement with a couple of thoughts.

First, I greatly appreciate your thoughtfulness for me in regards to my work, well-being, and time. Yes, I must admit that the call to serve as the pastor of Zion is a full and busy call. But that is (usually) a good thing!

But if you *need* to call your pastor, please call your pastor. I can't think of a time (unless I was out of town or responding to an emergency) when someone has called with a request for a visit, or a prayer, or a time of conversation and counsel when I haven't acted on that request. This said, I know there *have* been times when I have received a non-specific invitation to stop by and "visit sometime," when I have *not* followed through on that general invitation. And, yes, that is usually because of my busyness. "General visitation" seems almost impossible with all that needs to be done as your pastor. So, if you need me to visit you, or you need to visit with me, please contact me and let me know. We'll make it happen!

As I re-read what I have written here, it occurs to me that it sounds like I am responding to something negative that has recently happened or some complaint. This is not the case. I think that it's coming from my feelings of remorse that are generated from the fact that I have found that I can't get everything done that I would like to do.

Homebound Communion Options

Is it difficult for you to join the members and friends of Zion in our times of worship together on Saturday evening or Sunday morning and, therefore, you find it difficult to receive Holy Communion? If it is a transportation issue, Zion's Evangelism Committee may be able to help. If it is a matter of ill-health or physical disability, there are a couple of options available to you to receive the Lord's Supper.

Zion has members that are willing to visit you and bring the Lord's Supper with them. This particular ministry was side-lined by the COVID pandemic, but is now available for those who might want this.

Another option is to receive a few weeks supply of pre-packaged communion elements from Zion (wine and bread, grape juice and bread, or gluten-free bread and wine). Then, as you worship with the congregation as you listen to the Sunday morning service on the radio or watch the service on Facebook (either livestream or at a later time), you can commune with the rest of the congregation.

COUNCIL NEWS

Summary of Congregation Council Minutes – September 13, 2022

(The full minutes are posted on the bulletin board near the church office.)

Zion member Pastor Paul Holmer gave a presentation to the Council on the First Circle of Friends program. This is an adult day program that engages individuals with memory loss in meaningful, cognitively stimulating activities. After a question and answer period, Pastor Holmer requested that Zion take the First Circle of Friends under its umbrella as a non-profit organization. The program had been previously under the umbrella of Immanuel Lutheran Church. After discussion, the Council unanimously approved this request.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Luepke reported to the Council that he was invited to participate in the service of Closure for Immanuel Lutheran Church in Clinton and to celebrate their 150th anniversary. At the conclusion of the service, Pastor accepted a check of \$4,000 for Zion.

Membership: Pastor moved to accept the transfers in of Larry Cramer from Immanuel, Camanche and Lorene Snyder from First Lutheran, Manchester. Motion approved.

Treasurer's Report: Skip Carstensen reported to the Council that in the General Fund at the end of August, the YTD income balance is ahead of the YTD budget.

The Council reviewed the audit report letter that was included in the Council packets. The auditors found all financial records to be in good order.

Committee Reports: Dennis Andersen, reporting for the Building and Grounds committee, brought before the Council the condition of 3rd Ave. South in front of the church property. Dennis requested that a letter be sent to the City Engineer, Mayor, Councilperson and the Councilperson at Large requesting repair of the street. It was decided that President Travis Morehead would draft the letter and Pastor Luepke would review the draft.

The portico/canopy project was discussed and Dennis Andersen informed the Council that blueprints for the project have been developed by the architect and that a cost estimate could be coming by December.

At the request of the Building and Grounds committee, there was a Council discussion on which Building and Grounds projects need Council approval due to their cost. The Council's understanding is that if the project cost is in the budget, no Council approval is needed to proceed. If funds for the project are to be drawn from Special Funds, then the project expenditures need Council approval.

New Business: Vice-President Deb Vath, serving as the chair of the Finance Committee, reported to the Council that all committees have been requested to submit their budget requests by the October Council meeting.

Fellowship for Reformation Sunday, when Bishop Amy Current will be with us, will be hosted by the Council at the 9:00 a.m. service.

Pastor recognized Jurgen and Deb Duhr for their many years of service to Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church. This was Jurgen's last Council meeting as he and Deb are moving to New York state.

The Council discussed the pastor's 2023 health insurance designation. The Council approved the insurance designation as it has been, which is the Gold+ Plan from Portico.

The Council discussed the need to form the nominating committee.

Melissa Werner was thanked for heading the Pork & Sauerkraut Supper this year.
