He married **Juliane Luise Haller** 10 Oct 1809 in Stuttgart, Stuttgart, Wurtemberg, daughter of Johann Haller and Friedrike Dattrin. But by 1832 feeling was strong for a church of their own. In that year, therefore, Jonathan Henry Mann, representing German settlers in and near Ann Arbor, sent a petition to the Evangelical Missionary Institute of Basel, Switzerland, asking that a pastor might be sent here. In answer to that petition, the Reverend Frederick Schmid was sent to America, arriving in Ann Arbor August 20, 1833. He immediately announced that a service in the German language would be held in a little log schoolhouse in Scio Township, about four miles west of the Court House Square. When this service opened, nearly all the German people in Scio and Ann Arbor were there. This was the first religious gathering of Germans in Michigan Territory. Before the devotionals were over steps had been taken to perfect a church organization, and a date was set upon which more formal action was to be taken. During the last week in August a meeting was held in the home of Daniel F. Allmendinger, about two miles west of the village, and a religious organization created under the name of "The First German Evangelical Society of Scio."

It was decided that a church building should be erected at the earliest possible moment. Mr. Allmendinger presented the society with an acre of ground, and on it, at a total cost of \$265.32, a small frame building was erected. The list of members and non-members who contributed to the building fund offers accurate information as to the names of these early German settlers and at the same time it tells us who helped to perfect the organization of this pioneer society. Among the nonmembers were David F. Allmendinger, Ludwig Mayle, John G. Koch, George Kleindop, Frederick Traver, Charles Schmid, John George Allmendinger, Emanuel Wild, Howard Eyley, Jacob Paul, Karl Hornung, George Guterkunst, Andreas Beck, Christian Auch, John Stollsteimer, Gottlieb Nordmann, Frederick Laubengayer, George Prussia, Salome Schweizer and Elizabeth Katherine Allmnendinger. The members of the church who contributed to the building fund were Daniel F. Allmendinger, Jonathan Henry Mann, George Straatmen, Jacob Markle, George Mayle, Christian Prussia, Abraham Kroman, Josiah Kroman, John Kroman, John Beck, Jacob Steffe, John M. Schneider, Jacob Stollsteimer, and the minister, Frederick Schmid. Twenty dollars were also given by the Josenhans family, who were still living in Stuttgart, and ten dollars were given by "a friend" living in Philadelphia. On the third of November, members of the "Evangelical Society" again met at Mr. Allmendinger's home and trustees of the society were chosen. The men so honored were Christian Prussia, John Beck and Abraham Kroman. They were to be known as the "Trustees of the First German Evangelical Society of Scio." After some discussion, it was decided to incorporate, so a record of the proceedings was filed in the Court of Washtenaw County under date of December 16, 1834.

Meanwhile, work on the little church building was progressing rapidly, the workmen doubtless receiving a certain amount of stimulation from a barrel of beer which, at a cost of four dollars, had been hauled out from Detroit for their use. By the latter part of December, 1834, the little edifice was ready for occupancy. During a solemn service the building was dedicated to the service of God and called Zion Church. With the opening of this church most of the German people withdrew from worship in the Protestant churches in the village. Some idea of the leanness of its beginnings may be obtained from the fact that the total Sunday offerings for the first year amounted to the munificent sum of \$13.29!

The following is from the pen of Emanuel Mann, whose father was one of the first German settlers in the county: It was in the autumn of 1829 that Frederick Schilling, of Weinsberg, and Jonathan Henry Mann, of Stuttgart, in the kingdom of Wurtemberg, in South Germany, crossed Lake Erie together in search of a new home in the Territory of Michigan. Schilling was accompanied by his family, consisting of wife, son and daughter. (Both son and daughter are still living at Sebewaing, Huron County. J. H. Mann left his family at Reading, Pennsylvania, with a view to move in the following spring in case he found a desirable location in Michigan. They were advised by Daniel F. Allmendinger, also a native of Wurtemnberg, living near Dansville, New York, who had visited Michigan a short time before, to go to Washtenaw County, where said Allmendinger had already purchased Government land in the Township of Lodi. As there was some good Government land in the Township of Scio, Frederick Schilling purchased 80 acres on section in said township. J. H. Mann, a tanner by trade, concluded to settle in the village of Ann Arbor, and to move his family the following spring. On his return to Pennsylvania, lie wrote a letter to his brother-in-law, Emanuel Josenhans, in Stuttgart, giving a very favorable account of what he saw of the new Territory and the route by which it could be reached by immigrants from Germany, from New York via Erie Canal and Lake Erie. Mr. Josenhans circulated the letter amongst the peasantry in the neighborhood of Stuttgart. The consequence was that numerous immigration was started for Michigan by a class of small farmers and mechanics who had very limited means.

J. Henry Mann with his family arrived at Ann Arbor in the first days of June, 1830, where he purchased a tannery of Harvey Austin. Said tannery was situated at or near where the present depot of the Toledo & Ann Arbor railroad is situated. During the following summer and fall the families of Jacob Paul, Jacob Stollsteimer, Carl Horming, Jacob Gross, Christian Auch and Daniel F. Allmendinger settled in Scio. George Mayle, a shoemaker, and Emanuel G. Wildt settled in Ann Arbor. In the winter of 1830 to 1831, Professor Gottlob Nordmann from Berlin, Prussia, arrived with his family. Mr. Nordmann, was Professor of Mathematics in a military academy and lost his place on account of his liberal political views. Mr. Nordmann moved in the spring of 1831 to Lima and became a farmer. During the year 1832, the following Germans arrived: William F. Osius, from the Granddutchy of Hesse, who immigrated to

Pennsylvania in 1825, settled in Freedom. Mr. Osius was born March 21, 1797, served in the Germany army against the First Napoleon. He was for nine years Supervisor for the Township of Freedom and Justice of the Peace for 20 years.

John Schneeberger, John Hoberger, Thomas Roth, Jacob Haab, Jacob Haas and Martin Grauer settled in Freedom. Andrew Beck, with his sons, Jacob and Godfrey, David Luick, Frederick Staebler, Michael Kaercher, Jacob April, Frederick Laubengaier and Ulrich Laubengaier, Johannes Stollsteimer, Jacob Wild, Conrad Bissinger, were some of the first settlers in Scio.

In the summer of 1833, the Evangelical Mission Institute of Bale, Switzerland, sent Rev. Frederick Schmid as a missionary to the German Protestants in Michigan. A Church was organized and incorporated as the First German Evangelical Society of Scio. The first church building which the Germans in the Territory erected, was built by this society on an acre of land donated by Daniel F. Allmendinger for this purpose and as a burying ground. This building is still standing about two miles west of Ann Arbor, on the so-called territorial road. Rev. Frederick Schmid was for many years the only German Protestant minister in Michigan. He organized Churches in Detroit, Monroe and Waterloo in Jackson County. The foregoing were the pioneers of the German element, which now constitutes at least 30 per cent, of the population of Washtenaw County. In point of intelligence, in wealth, in all that goes to make up good citizens, those representing this nationality will compare favorably with others. In every station of life, as business or professional men, as office-holders, none bear a better reputation.

Jonathan Henry Mann (deceased) was born at Ludwigsburg, Kingdom of Wurtemberg, Germany, April 26, 1784. He came to the United States in 1824, and spent several years traveling in this country and Mexico. In 1826 his family, who had remained in Germany, joined him at Reading, Pa., where he was engaged in agricultural pursuits. In the spring of 1830 he moved to Ann Arbor, where he followed the vocation of farmer for many years. He died Aug. 18, 1865, at the advanced age of 81 years.

Henry, or using the German name, Heinrich, Mann brought his family to Ann Arbor in 1830. They had remained in Detroit several weeks while Mr. Mann was visiting other places in order to learn where he might settle to best advantage. Such was still the condition of the roads at the time of the removal that a team of horses occupied three days in transporting the party with their goods to this place. Mr. Mann was a tanner by trade. He came over to Pennsylvania leaving his family at Stuttgart, in the Kingdom of Wurtemberg. He went from Pennsylvania to the city of Mexico, and on his way thence with the money he had earned, defended himself with his fists against the attempt of an armed Spaniard to rob him. The family joined him and made their home at Reading, Pennsylvania, until they set out for their future home. I have referred to the remarkable family of the Muhlenbergs. It is of interest to note here that the Reverend Henry Muhlenberg, a grandson of the apostle of the American Lutheran Church, whose family I have sketched, was at the time pastor in Reading of the church which the Manns attended, and his wife was the daughter of Governor Heisler. Mr. Mann bought the lot, corner of Washington and First streets, in Ann Arbor, where his daughter, widow of the late August Hutzel, now lives, for \$12, the one next it on First street for a pair of shoes. The family is numerous. The late Emanuel Mann, once a member of our state senate, was a son of Henry Mann. Many of the German people now in our city came over as farmers and settled first on farming lands.

THE BETHLEHEM CHURCH - The elder Mann early wrote to the Basel Evangelical Missionary society for a missionary. Frederic Schmid was commissioned in the spring of 1833 for this service, and arrived on the ground in August following. He held his first public worship on August 26th, in a schoolhouse, four miles west of the initial village. As. early as November 3rd, next following Pastor Schmid's arrival, measures were taken for building a house of worship. At a meeting held on that day, 15 members were present, as follows: J. H. Mann, George Stattman, Jacob Maerkle, George Mayle, Charles Brusche, Abraham Cromann, John Beck, Jacob Steffe, John M. Schneider, Jacob Stollsteimer, Johann

Cromann, Jesaja Cromann, Joseph Cromann, D. F. Allmendinger and Frederic Schmid, the new pastor. Of these, Messrs. Mann and Allmendinger were chosen as trustees and the work of the building was at once determined upon, for which a lot, two miles west of the site of the Ann Arbor courthouse, was given by Mr. Allmendinger.

Hon. Emanuel Mann, druggist, Ann Arbor, was born at Stuttgart, Wurtemberg, Germany, June 4, 1814. When he was but 12 years of age his parents came to the United States and located at Reading, Pa., where Mr. Mann received his education. In 1S30 they migrated to Michigan, and settled at Ann Arbor. Mr. Mann lived with his father and worked with him in the tanning business, later on carrying on the business for himself. He remained out of business until 1878, when he purchased the drug business at No. 39 South Main street, where he is now located. Mr. Mann was among the first Germans to come into Washtenaw County. By careful and industrious habits he has acquired a fair share of this world's goods. His strict integrity and upright ways have won for him the confidence and regard of all who know him. For three years he was a member of the Common Council of Ann Arbor, and was also one of the Board of Education of the city. In 1870 he was elected State Senator from Washtenaw County, which position he held one term.

Notes for Rev. Friedrich Schmid:

In 1831, Salem's first house of God was a log cabin located about 1/2 mile north of Scio-Church Road where the present Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church is located. In 1832, Jonathan Henrich Mann acting for a group of early German settlers in Washtenaw County, Michigan petitions the Evangelical Missionary Institute of Basel, Switzerland (Rev. Josehans), to send a pastor.

On June 8, 1833 Rev Friedrich Schmid set sail from the port of Havre, France on the ship 'Florida' and a journey of about nine weeks arrived in Detroit, Michigan on August 16, 1833 staying with August Kunz. Then on August 18, 1833 in Detroit, Michigan held the first Lutheran service ever held in Michigan.

Rev. Friedrich Schmid arrives in Ann Arbor, Washtenaw Co, Michigan on August 20, 1833 in response to the call. He provides the first service in Washtenaw County in a little log schoolhouse in Scio Township on Territorial Road four miles west of Ann Arbor on August 26, 1833. Late in August 1833 (maybe Sept. 20, 1833) an Evangelical congregation (of about 25 families) is organized under the name of "The First German Evangelical Society of Scio" (Die Erste Deutsche Evangelische Gesellschaft yu Scio). A small church (26' x 34') was built late in December 1833 at Scio (total cost \$265.32), on an acre of ground donated by Daniel F. Allmendinger. The church was called Zion Church and dedicated to the glory and service of God.

In 1845, the congregation decides to build a church in Ann Arbor and buys a lot on the corner of First and Washington streets. The new church is built (cost \$1,820) and is dedicated as Bethlehem Church on June 24, 1849 located on Fourth Street.

As the first Lutheran pastor in Michigan, he help the early development of the church in Michigan. With his untiring missionary activity he made his way on horseback along forest trails to help organize congregations in Detroit, Monroe, Ypsilanti, Plymouth, Wayne, Waterloo, Freedom, Northfield, Lansing, Grand Rapids, Saginaw, Sebewaing, Marshall, Allegan, Adrian, Fredonia, Woodland, Cohoctah, etc. At regular intervals he would minister unto these congregations, eventually supplying them with a pastor from Basel Mission Society or one personally tutored and trained by him in Scio.

September 20, 1833 Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church was officially organized by the name "The Second German Evangelical Society of Scio" in a log cabin located about 1/2 mile north of Scio-Church Road where the present Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church is located. In about 1835-1837, Salem congregation built a new structure on 7474 Scio-Church Road in Scio Twp., it was 30' x 40' at an expense of \$1,000. The two acre parcel of land in Section 32 of Scio Township was donated by Jacob Paul. A donation of \$200 and a set of sacramental vessels was received from fellow Christians in Echterdingen, Wurtemberg (one mile south of Stuttgart). He established his first pastorate, in due time on Scio-Church Road in Lodi Twp., on the opposite side of the street from Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church. Rev. Stephen Klingmann served from 1867-1891 and his son, Rev. Julius Klingmann, from 1891-1901.

Rev. F. Schmid continued to serve Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church until 1867. And at Bethlehem, in 1871 Pastor F. Schmid retires and Rev. Herman Reuter is called. Plans for a new church are made. Differences in congregation over how the members would fund the project results in the withdrawal of a group of members (including Pastor Schmid) who then organized the Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church.

In 1843 Rev. F. Schmid with a small number of other pioneer pastors organized the first Lutheran Synod of Michigan. It was called the Mission Synod, for it planned extensive mission work among the Indians in the state. Because of doctrinal differences this first Lutheran synodical body was abandoned in 1846. Salem became a member of the Ohio Synod, which was severed in 1859. In 1860 Rev. F. Schmid and eight other pastors (including Rev. Stephan Klingmann of Adrian and Christian Eberhardt of Hopkins) and three delegates from different congregations, organized another Michigan Synod. Rev. F. Schmid served as chairman from 1860-1866 and Rev. Stephan Klingmann from 1867-1880. Salem retained membership of this organization until 1892 when Michigan Synod in conjunction with Synod of Minnesota and the Synod of Wisconsin organized the larger body of the Joint Synod of Wisconsin.

Rev. Friedrich Schmid passed away in Ann Arbor, Michigan on August 30, 1883.

Rev. Friedrich Schmid. The venerable F. Schmid, the first Lutheran pastor in the State of Michigan, and residing since 1833 in or near Ann Arbor, fell asleep August 3, 1883. He was not only a pastor of the various German settlements in Washtenaw County, but was in labors most abundant and in journeys oft, seeking out the scattered German settlers over the state. Educated n the Mission House of Basle, he had the mission spirit in an eminent degree and with many prayers and sacrifices commenced and carried on for years the first mission of our American church among the North American Indians. He was also the founder of the Synod of Michigan, now in connection with the General Council. Like not a few of the old German pioneers from Wurtemberg, who were educated in Basle, Father Schmid had his own troubles in his long and eventful life. In this intensely practical atmosphere, where principles rapidly develop into actual life he suffered greatly from withdrawals of pastors and churches from the Synod because of its too Lutheran character. These went to the United Synod of the West! Not less was he distressed and embarrassed by the withdrawal of others to the Missouri Synod, to whom his Synod was not sufficiently Lutheran. Even the missionaries he had trained for the Indian mission among the Chippewas, were carried away by the last movement, taking we believe both the Indian and the German congregations with them.

Since 1860 this venerable man has been suffering from paralysis, but he bore this great trial with quiet submission, although for fourteen years he has been confined to his room orbed. "Verily, he rests from his labors and his works follow him." He leaves behind him a family of ten children, among whom are Rev. Prof. E. Schmid, of Capital University, Columbus, Ohio, and the wife of Rev. Pastor Voltz, of Buffalo, New York. On Monday, September 3, his earthly remains were committed to the grave, from the German Lutheran church in Ann Arbor, a large number of his brethren in the Synod being present, and an immense concourse of people from various parts of the surrounding country. —Workman.

#### CHURCHES:

Detroit - St. John's German Evangelical Church - Rev. Friedrich Schmid on August 18,1833, in a carpenter shop owned by John Hais, located on the corner of Woodbridge & Bates Streets in Detroit, Michigan. He gave a service out of which started St. John's German Evangelical Church. Rev. F. Schmid preached at this church until July 1836, then Rev J. P. Schwabe took over. St. John's Church was built on the northeast corner of Monroe Avenue & Farrar Street in January 1836.

Detroit - St. Peter's Evangelical Church - established 1841 by Rev. Frederick Herman. First held in members homes. The minor differences between the Evangelical and the Lutherans led to misunderstandings and in 1846 the Lutheran group withdrew to organize their own church. The remaining group incorporated on December 8, 1848 as "The German Lutheran Church of St. Peter". In 1926 with the coming of Rev. Oscar Laubengayer the name was changed to "St. Peter's Evangelical Church". The old church building (the second one) built in 1865 was razed and a new structure was built.

Detroit - St. Paul's German Evangelical Church - was an out growth of the St. John's Evangelical Church in October 21, 1872 (incorporated in November 1, 1872). It was located on the corner of Seventeenth & Rose Street in Detroit, Michigan. Rev. J. G. Hildner was the first pastor.

Detroit - St. Mark's German Evangelical Church - located on the corner of Military & Dix Avenues was dedicated on January 16, 1884.

Detroit - Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church - organized in 1850 (incorporated Mach 10, 1851). Rev. J.M.G. Schaller was the first pastor and accepted a calling November 1851. They meet in a building on Woodbridge Street, in rear of Christ Church.

Detroit - German Evangelical Church of Delray established February 25, 1885. And for a time was named St. John's II Church. Later called Trinity Evangelical Chruch. This church was established with the help of both Rev. C. Haass and Rev. J. Hildner. The first minister was Rev. J. Jann in August 1885. And succeeded him in 1886 by Rev. R. Beutler. The old church burned in 1918. Rebuilt on West Fort Street in October 1919.

Detroit - Immanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church - an out growth of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in 1864 (incorporated August 14, 1865). The first building was on Trumbull Avenue, between

Orchard & Plum Streets.

Detroit - Immanuel Evangelical Church - begun on June 30, 1893 with the help of Rev. J. Lambrecht of St. Mark's Church.

Detroit - Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church - organized August 22, 1882, by Rev. K.L. Moll on Welch Avenue, near Michigan Avenue. Dedicated on July 8, 1883.

Detroit - Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church - organized Easter 1887, located on McKinstry Street, between Fort & Dix Avenues. Dedicated November 20, 1887. Rev. F. Tresselt was the first pastor and took charge July 31, 1887.

Sebewaing - New Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church - in the fall of 1852 a few young members of Salem in Scio Twp. were encouraged by Rev. F. Schmid to leave and to establish a new home in Sebewaing Twp., Huron Co., Michigan. The pastor assigned was Johann Jacob Friedrich Auch by Rev. F. Schmid.

Sebewaing - Immanuel Lutheran - (800 E. Bay Street) Its beginning dates back to the year 1851. As early as 1845, Rev. J. J. Auch had come to this region as a missionary to the Indians. He had been sent by Rev. Fr. Schmidt of Ann Arbor. Rev. Auch was probably the first white man who entered this territory. The assistant, who accompanied him, was Rev. Simon Dumser. These two pioneers preached to the Indians at Sebewaing and at Wishkawking, now called Unionviile. There was another Indian settlement at Shebahyonk, nine miles north from Sebewaing. Rev. J. Roeder had been sent there as missionary by the Missouri Synod. The Indians in this part of the state were Chippewas. Those at Sebewaing numbered about 100 souls; about 80 were at Shebahyonk, and about 60 at Wishkawking or Unionville. The Indian chief at Sebewaing was Nock-chi-co-me. He remained away from the Christian church and did all he could to keep others away. Yet, strange to say, he wanted his children to be instructed in the Christian school. This old heathen was no opponent of Christian day schools like so many so-called Christians of our day.

Sebewaing - St. Peter's Lutheran - (9667 Bach Road)

Unionville - St. Paul Lutheran - (6356 Center Street) This congregation is a daughter of Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Sebewaing. Several families belonging to that congregation lived here in Unionville and vicinity. As the way was far and the roads were bad, divine services were conducted now and then in the homes of these members by the pastors, Auch and Speckhard. With the permission of the mother church, on February 14th, 1876, these families united and organized a new congregation, consisting of but seven voting members. Small as it was, it soon grew, and in 1883 it felt strong enough to call its own pastor.

Woodland - Zion Lutheran Church - founded July 17, 1856. Rev. F. Schmid instructed Rev. Christian Volz of Lansing, Michigan to serve the people of Woodland in the early 1850's and left on March 29, 1857 for a call to St. John's Lutheran Church in Buffalo, New York. Rev. Adam Buerkle took over in the middle of 1858. (6338 Velte Road)

Genoa, Livingston Co. - St. George Evangelical Lutheran Church - began in 1842 with Rev. F. Schmid serving the congregation on visits. On April 23, 1845 was organized under its present name. The building was dedicated on April 1849 and Dr. Adolf E. Buek took over till July 1852, when Rev. L.C. Meyer presided over the congregation.

Cohoctah Twp, Livingston Co. - Rev. F. Schmid on May 14, 1858 came, in later in 1858 Rev. Joseph Raehm of Cleveland, Ohio came and pastored to the congregation every two weeks. In 1864 the first church building 20 x 30 feet was erected, first called 'The first Evangelical Church in Livingston County'. It belonged to the circuit of Owosso, Flint, Pierpont and Howell. In 1968 it merged with the Methodist Church. The charter members were: John & Catherine Shedel, John & Barbara Bohm, Henry & Anna

Unbahoun, George & Mary Schrepfer, Charles & Henrietta Greener, Henry & Hannah Zahn, John & Mary Drosten. Margaret Stelzer. and John Bohm.

Ann Arbor - In 1845, the congregation decides to build a church in Ann Arbor and buys a lot on the corner of First and Washington streets. The new church is built (cost \$1,820) and is dedicated as Bethlehem Church on June 24, 1849. In 1871 Pastor Friedrich Schmid retires and Rev. Herman Reuter is called. Bethlehem Evangelical Church later named Bethlehem United Church of Christ.

Ann Arbor - Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church - July 11, 1875, the first services of the new congregation are held in old Congregational Church at Fifth and Washington Avenue by Rev. J. Graessle form the Joint synod of Ohio. On July 16, 1875, Zion Lutheran Church is organized. On July 20, 1875 it was decided to purchase the First Congregational Church for \$4,300. The official name of "First Evangelical Lutheran Zion Church of Ann Arbor" was adopted. July 1892 Pastor Max Hein preaches the first English sermon. May 27, 1894 the cornerstone of the new church is laid and Zion resided at this structure until September 1958. Theodore Schmidt replaces Louis Boes as parochial school teacher October 1910 and English becomes the predominant language. April 1924 marked the long period of transition from German to English as the predominant language in church services. On September 15, 1957 a cornerstone for a new church is laid location was 1501 W. Liberty Street in Ann Arbor. September 28, 1958 the dedication occurs.

Scio Twp - Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church - organized September 20, 1832. Rev. F. Schmid serves this congregation till 1867. It is located at 7474 Scio-Church Road. Rev. Stephan Klingmann of Monroe was called as Salem's second pastor. In 1867 the church purchased land on the opposite side of the street for a school. In the fall of 1868 it was decided to start construction in 1870 for another church building on the same property. On May 3, 1870, the corner stone was laid. And on October 9, 1870 dedication took place, the cost was \$14,000.

Freedom Twp - Bethel Evangelical Church later named Bethel United Church of Christ on 10425 Bethel Church Road. The present church was built in 1909 and dedicated in 1910.

Freedom Twp - St. Thomas Evangelical Lutheran Church - founded by Rev. Schmid in 1842 and the early services were held 1/2 mile west of current church that is on Haab & Ellsworth Road. The land was donated by Thomas Roth, so at first it was called Thomas Church and later St. Thomas Church. The first English hymns were sung in 1930's.

Freedom Twp - Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church located at Rogers Corner on Waters Road, was formed when the congregation of St. Thomas Evangical Lutheran Church split off the western half of the congregation. On Nov 1867 a new church was dedicated by Rev. Hildner who served the congregation at Bethel United Church of Christ in Freedom Twp. Rev. Gebauer jointly served St. Thomas & Zion Evangical Lutheran churches. A complete separation from St. Thomas occurred when Rev. John Baumann began his ministry in Aug 1873.

Bridgewater Twp - St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church - began as one of Rev. Schmid's missions, probably about 1835. The first church building was dedicated in 1854. It is now used as a wool shed on the property of the Penn Central Railroad at Saline & Austin Roads. Services were held in the brick school house from 1862-1882, when the present structure was built. German was used in the services until about 1914.

Saline - Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church - Jan. 9, 1865 Rev. Wolf, of Bridgewater, preached first sermon in Saline with five families in attendance. May 1865 Church organized with 11 male voting members. Spring 1868 Rev. J. Doerfler became pastor of Lutheran congregations in Bridgewater & Saline, Michigan. October 1871 cornerstone laid for new church at Michigan and Harris streets in Saline, Michigan. In 1874 Rev. Doerfler succeeded by Rev. Frederick Mueller. In Jan 1978 Rev. C. A. Lederer became pastor for congregation of 59 families.

Dexter - Faith Lutheran Church - (9575 North Territorial Road)

Dexter - German Lutheran Church organized July 1875 with a membership of 22 with Rev. M. Graupner as pastor. He was also the pastor for St. Paul's Church in Chelsea, Michigan till 1877. On March 1, 1883 Fred Jaeger as chairman organized a congregation. On April 26, 1883 they purchased property located on Ann Arbor Street & Fourth Street. On May 13, 1883 the German Lutheran Society was incorporated. Dedication of the 32' x 50' building took place on October 14, 1883 with Rev. Gottlieb Robertus as pastor. Later known as St. Andrew and were part of the Evangelical and Reformed Church. The Evangelical Synod of North America and the Reformed Church of the United States merged to become the Evangelical Lutheran Church in 1940, thus known as St. Andrew's Evangelical Church. In 1957 St. Andrew's became known as St. Andrew's United Church of Christ, as a result of, a merger with the Congregational Christian Churches.

Manchester - Emanuel United Church of Christ Church initially gathered in the homes of Friedrich Kurfess and Christian Jaudes in 1859. Rev. J. G. Hildner was consulted in 1859 to help organized the church. Out growing homes in 1862 they moved to a framed building from Soulesville, an area east of Raisen River to the southwest corner of Wolverine & Vernon Streets. It was dedicated in May 1866. They incorporated on Oct 3, 1867 as "The German United Evangelical Immanuels Congregation". Charter members included: Kurfess, Jaudes, Casper Raby, J.J. Walter, Sr., Michael Jung, Georg Unterkircher, Johann Hartbeck, Fred Schill, Heinrich Aichele, Heinrich Haeschle, Georg Briegel, Johann Schlicht, and Matthias Schaible.

Northfield Twp - St. John's Lutheran Church - Rev. Schmid first served the congregation that was organized in 1869 with 43 charter members and the first services were conducted in Sutton School for five years. A permanent build was built in 1874. On March 13, 1932 a fire burned the church and parsonage to the ground. A new building was built and it was dedicated June 12, 1932.

Sharon Twp - Sharon United Methodist Church (formerly Salem Lutheran Church) 19980 Pleasant Lake Road was organized by Rev. Edward Weiss in 1874 by having Evangelical classes. The trustees Herman Gieske, Lambert Gieske and Bernhardt Kuhl on behalf of the congregation bought land at Rowe's Corner and erected a building that was dedicated in November 1876. The denomination merged with the United Brethren Church in 1946 and with the Methodist Church in 1868.

Ypsilanti - Emmanuel Lutheran Church established by Rev. Schmid in 1859 as 'St. Emmanuel's Evangelische Lutherishe Geminde' at the home of George Ehman. Charter members were N. Bamor, C. Breining, G. Ehman, F. Dergler, J. Collins, G. Erich, Y. Hartman, G. Fran, C. Kohler, W. Lange, G. Otto, L. Schade, C. Siegmund, G. Schweizer, A. Thumm and G. Warner. The first church building was erected in 1860. at the corner of E. Michigan Avenue and Grove Street. The present church is located at 201 N. River Street in Ypsilanti.

Christian Volz received a call from the congregation in early 1856. Christian Volz received a call in April 1857 from St. John's Church in Buffalo, New York which he accepted. Pastor Adam Buerkle, also from Ann Arbor, was called, and he assumed the pastorate in May 1857. At the same time, he also served the congregations in Westphalia Twp and Woodland, Michigan. Pastor Buerkle resigned his pastorate in Nov 1866.

Lansing, Nov. 26, 1955 - The colorful history of the beginning of Lutheranism in the city more than 100 years ago, will be reviewed Sunday in a "Founder Day" observance at Emanuel First Lutheran church. The day's services will climax the month-long centennial observance of the oldest. Lutheran organization in the city. Rev. Oscar J. Naumann, St. Paul, Minnesota, president of the Evangelical Lutheran Joint Synod of Wisconsin and other states, will speak at both the German service at 9:30 a. m. and the English service at 11 a.m. Special music will be under the direction of Victor J. Schulz. The senior choir will sing "Psalm VIII," by Warner, and the combined senior and junior choirs will offer "Praise the Lord, Ye Heavens, Adore Him," by Pritchard.

The history of the Emanuel church dates back to 1853, when a small band of German Lutheran families, who had migrated to Lansing, wishing to continue worship in their mother tongue, met and held services in the various homes. Worship also was held for a time in the North Lansing school.

In 1855 under the direction of Rev. Frederick Schmid, the pioneer Lutheran pastor of Michigan, the 52 families organized the first Lutheran church in the city. Mr. Schmid had previously organized the first Lutheran congregation in the state in Scio Township, west of Ann Arbor in 1833.

Rev. Christian Volz became the first regular pastor, serving the organization from 1855 to 1857. Other pastors who have served the church were: Adam Buerkle, 1857-1866: John Her, 1866-1869; Robert Conrad, 1870-1873; Louis Zuber, 1873-1876; John Eipperle, 1876-1S89; William Kramer, 1889-1909; Frederick M. Krauss, 1909-1941; and the present pastor Karl F. Krauss, serving since 1921. Leonard J. Koeninger, co-pastor, was appointed in 1933. The early pastors also served congregations in Westphalia Township, Woodland, and Grand Ledge. The first parsonage was erected in 1867 and remained in use until 1912. A day school was erected in 1868. The school was discontinued in 1927.

Back in Europe, under the leadership of Rev. Loehe, the German Protestant Church had been known as the German Evangelical State Church. This church body contained both Lutheran and Reformed clergy. To this date Rev. Schmid is claimed by the Lutherans and the Reformed (now the United Church of Christ) as their founding Pastor in Michigan.

The Basel Mission

The German Missionary Society (subsequently became the Basel Evangelical Missionary Society) came into being as a result of a pledge taken by few dedicated Christians at Basel in the face of a military threat. It was the year 1815 when Napoleon had escaped from the Island of Elba (where was a prisoner), and landed in France. The War continued in Europe. The City of Basel was very close to the borders of Germany and France. The French General Barbanege threatened to blow up Basel. A group of pious Christians, both Clergy and Laymen, belonging to the Reformed Church of Basel and the Lutheran Church of Wurtenberg pledged to start a seminary for the training of Missionaries, if God would spare their city. The Tartars and Calmucs marched through Basel to invade France with the Russian Army, made these people feel even more convinced regarding their seminary. The French General capitulated and Napoleon met his doom at Waterloo. In the same year, on 26th September 1815, six Christian men, a Professor of Philosophy, three Clergymen, a Merchant and a Notary, gathered in the Rectory of St. martin in Basel under the Presidency of Rev. Nikolaus von Brunn, constituted themselves as the Evangelical Missionary Society of Basel. The applied to the Government for permission to start an Institution for training Missionaries. On 26th August 1816, this Institution was opened with seven students

## **LUTHERANS IN MICHIGAN AND DETROIT**

with Rev. C.C. Blumhardt in charge

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther, a German Roman Catholic priest, nailed 95 theses to the door of the Wittenburg Church. Martin Luther wanted to discuss various ways in which the church of the day could cleanse itself of corrupt practices that crept into its life. He, as well, possessed a burning desire to make available the Holy Scriptures in a language the people could read and understand. The theme of the Reformation was "Solely by Scripture, Solely by Faith, Solely by Grace". Luther attempted to work within the framework of the church hierarchy of the day. He held bold discussions and diets (conferences) on the scripture, on the Lord's Supper in two kinds, the cleansing of the church of indulgences, and the separation of the church and the state, etc. Martin Luther had little desire to start a new church, much less one in his name, i.e., The Lutheran Church.

History tells us that many reforms arose out of the Reformation. There were those who loved the Roman Catholic liturgy, its masses and its worship services. There were those who said anything that was "too catholic" had to go. They tore out stained glass windows and stripped the church of statues, artifacts, and altars. Over the next decades many "reformed" movements, denominations, and sects arose over doctrinal differences as well as differences in church practices and administration. Some groups maintained the hierarchy of the Bishop, while others wanted the authority to be administered by a convention body of the laity.

As financial and economic times became more difficult in Europe, more taxes were extracted from the people by the state. Many taxes were collected for the maintenance of the church. The church became involved in the state's affairs and the state became entrenched in the operation of the church. The Reformation and Renaissance of the 1500's and early 1600's changed the face of the world. The 30 Year War in the mid 1600's took a heavy toll on the lives of the Europeans.

In a very broad sense, two basic philosophies had developed by the 1700's. PIETISM emphasized chiefly practical Christian charity and the personal piety. That led to the OXFORD MOVEMENT, mainly in England. RATIONALISM condemned emotionalism and deism and dealt primarily with morality and self interest. It promoted social, scientific and literary interests which led to CONFESSIONAL MOVEMENT and flourished mainly in Germany, Holland, and Scandinavia.

Out of this emerged the United Evangelical State Church in Germany during the 1800's. More and more the Germans were finding their mother church torn apart by various difficulties and they began to flee Europe. Also, the failure of the Revolution of 1848 in the Germanies sent thousands to America seeking

political asylum, economic opportunity, freedom from military conscription and religious freedom. The American land became a magnet for Europeans and the cry, "Go to America", was heard everywhere throughout Europe. The drawing power was freedom of speech, freedom of the press, and freedom of religion. So they came from Europe to the U.S. As one pastor said, "There was no evangelism program then; the people just kept coming by the boat full. Each separate boat brought its own form of Lutheranism to these shores."

From SAXONY the Dresden group of the Lutherans began in 1781 and developed the Dresden Bible and Mission Society in 1814. They elected a Pastor Martin Stephan as their Bishop in 1820. By 1836 they broke from the Basel Mission Society to become the Evangelical Lutheran Mission Society. They took their boat to America in 1839 and settled in Perry County in Missouri. Bishop Stephan put all of their money in a common treasury and, while on board ship, demanded obedience both in spiritual and secular matters on their way to establishing their new home in Missouri. He built himself a nice house, lived an immoral life, and squandered the funds of the faithful. He was put on a boat in the Mississippi River and sent to Red Bud, Illinois, where today he is buried outside the fence of the church graveyard.

Meanwhile in St. Louis, Missouri, another Saxon Pastor, Carl Ferdinand Wilhelm Walther, was publishing a Lutheran paper called "der Lutheraner". He was sent down to Perry County to straighten matters out. From this event, "the Altenberg Debate", came the strong sentiment for a church hierarchy free of the "Bishop", but strong in "congregational authority". Dr. Walther stressed the doctrine of the Office of Keys and gave the congregation the authority to call the Pastor. This finally led to the beginning of the Missouri Synod in Ohio and in other states in 1847. The Rev. Gottlieb Schaller of Trinity Detroit was elected the first vice president, with Dr. C. F. W. Walther, Sr., as President. Rev. Schaller later left Trinity Detroit for Old Trinity, St. Louis, to be Pastor Friedrich Konrad Dietrich Syneken's assistant. Pastor Wyneken had been the famous circuit rider and "Father of Home Missions in the LCMS" in the Fort Wayne, Indiana area.

This was most evident in the establishment of the Lutheran Church in Michigan and Detroit. As early as 1820 there were attempts to establish a Lutheran church in Detroit. The many boats kept coming and they kept bringing "so-called" preachers with them. None took hold until 1830 when Jonathan Heinrich Mann, a layman from Ann Arbor, wrote asking the Mission House at Basel to send a pastor to Michigan. On August 16, 1833, Rev. Friedrich Schmid arrived in Detroit and stayed with an August Kunz. Later Rev. Schmid married the daughter of Jonathan Heinrich Mann. On August 18, 1833, Rev. Schmid preached the first Lutheran sermon in Detroit, in the carpenter shop of John Haik (the present site of the Ford Auditorium). Rev. Schmid then left for Scio Township to establish the Lutheran Church to which he had been called. He established Salem Lutheran Church, now on Scio Church Road in Ann Arbor. It was the first official Lutheran church in Michigan, organized September 20, 1833, as the First German Evangelical Society of Scio.

Rev. Schmid continued to return to Detroit, walking all the way from Ann Arbor and back every five weeks for three years. Five weeks after his first Detroit sermon on August 18, 1837, he established the German Protestant Church. There is much confusion over this name as it was also called the German Lutheran Church. In 1872 it was named St. John's Evangelical and Reformed Lutheran Church, and in 1873 we find it listed also as Holy Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Back in Europe, under the leadership of Loehe, the German Protestant Church had been known as the German Evangelical State Church. This church body contained both Lutheran and Reformed clergy. To this date Rev. Schmid is claimed by the Lutherans and the Reformed (now the United Church of Christ) as their founding Pastor in Michigan.

The next pastor sent by this group to Detroit was a Rev. F. P. Schwabe in 1836, three years after the German Protestant Church was established by Schmid. Rev. Schwabe established the church as the St. John's Reformed Church. Today it is Old St. John's or St. John's-St. Luke United Church of Christ.

Rev. Schmid continued his missionary zeal from the Ann Arbor area. With the help of missionaries from the European Societies, and particularly Loehe, he established Lutheran Churches in Detroit, Monroe, Lansing, Marshall, Adrian, Grand Rapids, Sebewaing, Saginaw, Waterloo, Chelsea, Bridgewater, Northfield, Saline, Ypsilanti, Plymouth, Jackson and Wayne. Loehe's men, Otto F. Hattstaedt in Monroe, Philipp Jakob Trautmannn in Adrian, Friedrich Lochner in Toledo, Friedrich August Craemer in Frankenmuth and F. K. Wyneken in Fort Wayne, were called to these parishes. Wyneken was the Pastor who got Loehe interested in the church in the U.S.

Rev. Schmid found himself caught up in various European church struggles and the various Synods in

America. In 1840 he started the Michigan Synod I as a mission synod for both Lutherans and Reformed. This Synod I died out in 1846 because the Lutheran-Reformed mix was impractical. It later affiliated with the newly formed Missouri Synod.

In 1860 Rev. Schmid tried again to start a Michigan Synod II. By now the Buffalo Synod had entered Michigan, and many of its members joined the St. John's Reformed Church. Later these Lutheran members left St. John's to join Trinity after it had been established in 1850. Another group of Lutherans broke away from the Buffalo Synod and moved to Iowa and formed the Iowa Synod.

Meanwhile, an American Indian mission in the Frankenmuth area requested Rev. Schmid of Ann Arbor to send them some missionaries for their Bethany American Indian Mission. Schmid sent them three preachers from Loehe, two Lutheran and one Reformed. The Lutherans of The Saginaw Valley were offended by the Reformed preacher, and some broke off and left for Wisconsin to join the new "True Lutheran" seminary. The others remained in Michigan and established Wisconsin Synod parishes.

Salem Lutheran Church in Ann Arbor joined the new Wisconsin Synod and drove their pioneer pastor, Rev. Schmid, out of the congregation. He went to Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Ann Arbor where he served until his death, and is buried in Forest Hill Cemetery in Ann Arbor. For years there was an annual pilgrimage to his grave in thanks for his great pioneer spirit on behalf of Lutherans in Michigan.

Not only did "the boats keep coming" and the Synods keep springing up, affecting the church at large, but it also affected the local parishes. Some congregations in their earlier years would be in Buffalo Synod, then Independent, then Ohio Synod, then another Synod. Local parishes were formed around three basic issues. (1) A bishop form of church government or a congregational form of government. (2) The use of candles, statues, etc., or the non-use of them. (3) Whether private confession was necessary before Holy Communion. At one time one Detroit area parish had three facility locations under the same church name, at the same time, based on these three issues.

On the local scene, Rev. Schmid had begun the Lutheran church in Detroit, but when Rev. Schwabe arrived the church became a Reformed church. Therefore, the Lutherans did not become official in Detroit again until in 1845, when Rev. Johann Friedrich Winkler arrived and established the first official Lutheran Church in Detroit, St. Matthews. St. Matthews Lutheran Church started as an independent Lutheran Church on Cadieux and East Warren. St. Matthews built a church at Rivard and Congress, and in November of 1845 became a Buffalo Synod Church. Pastor Winkler also started St. Peters Church in Erin Township (East Detroit) in 1846. St. Matthews was in constant turmoil over the synodical issue and the authority of the bishop vs. congregation.

In 1850, Rev. Winkler excommunicated a member from the church without church officers approval. He said as Pastor it was his right. Seventeen men said it was the congregation's decision, and as a result they broke off and formed Trinity Church in 1850. These seventeen Lutherans, together with other Lutherans who had remained at St. John's Reformed Church, formed Trinity and associated themselves with the Missouri Synod that began in 1847. Thus Trinity became the Mother Church in Detroit of the Missouri Synod.

During the past week the people of our village have been called to mourn the loss of another of one of our highly esteemed and respected citizens, whose death came suddenly and unexpectedly. Gottlieb C. Mann was born in Freedom Township, this county, August 28,1853, and died in Ann Arbor on August 16, 1914. He was the eldest son of Conrad Mann and Christina Roehm Mann. On December 22,1874, he was married to Miss Mary Rentschler, and is survived by the bereaved wife; four daughters, Mrs. Jacob Bauer of Lodi, Mrs. William Schlicht of Manchester, Misses Nora and Louise Mann, at home; two sons, Ernest, who is on the farm, and Ralph; also one brother, George Mann, president of the German American bank of Ann Arbor, and one sister, Mrs. Fred Rentschler.

Deceased had lived, on the farm where he was born for 58 years, on until August 31, 1911, when he came to this village to reside. Mr. Mann had been a faithful member of Bethel Church in Freedom since his boyhood, and for twelve years was a member of the board of deacons. He was one of the prominent officials of the Saline Savings bank, having been a member of the board of directors since its organization, and at the time of his death was serving his second year as vice president. He was a man of broad acquaintance, with friends wherever known, upright in his dealings, and a good citizen and neighbor. Seemingly he had enjoyed good health until July 3rd, when his final trouble made its appearance, yet in no way alarming, and it was not until August 8 that he gave up to confinement. The following week, August 12, the case-suddenly became more serious and the next morning he was taken to the hospital at Ann Arbor, where an operation was performed the same day. It was too late. The trouble, which was a growth of cancerous nature, made rapid progress and he gradually failed until Sunday morning at one o'clock, when the end came.

The obsequies, which were held at the home Tuesday forenoon and later at the church in Freedom, were very largely attended, conducted by Rev. F. Mayer of Bethel church and Rev. C. H. Wittbracht of St. Paul's Church.

Portrait and Biographical Album of Washtenaw County, Michigan. Chicago: Biographical Publishing Company 1891:

Frederik Schmid is the junior member of the firm of dry goods merchants that is extensively known as that of Mack & Schmid of Ann Arbor. Frederick Schmid was born in Lodi Township, this county, May 17, 1839. He is the third of twelve children, six boys and six girls. The parents were Frederick and Louisa (Mann) Schmid who came to the United States when young. They were married in this city. Our subject's mother came here in 1829. She was a daughter of Henry J. Mann, who was the first German settler in Washtenaw County. Frederick Schmid, the immediate progenitor of our subject, was a Lutheran minister and coming from Germany located in Washtenaw County in 1833, and in company with Mr. Mann was extremely useful in influencing the settlement of many good German families in Washtenaw County.

Our subject's father was very active in organizing the Lutheran Church in this county and the result of his effort has been most happy. He came here from the Fatherland in the first place as a missionary and well did he perform his charge. He came from Basle, Switzerland and was a recognized factor of large influence in the Lutheran Church. His death occurred August 30, 1883. His wife died in 1889. Frederick Schmid, Sr., was a man who was very zealous in his religious belief and although in pioneer days he made his circuit to the different charges on foot through heavily timbered country and through mud and water he was always punctual in meeting his appointments.

Of twelve children born to the parents, eleven are now living. Our subject, Frederick, Jr., remained on the home farm until reaching his twelfth year. During that time he attended the district school in the vicinity and worked out on the neighboring farms, receiving \$12 per month for his services. He was thus engaged until nineteen years of age and then left the farm and entered the employ of John W. Maynard in the capacity of clerk and with him he remained for some months. After that he was employed by Christian Mack, and at the end of eighteen months was taken into the firm as partner and has since continued his relationships with the business.

The firm of Mack & Schmid is among the leading dry-goods houses of Ann Arbor. They not only deal extensively in everything with which to clothe the body that appeals to the feminine taste and instincts of beauty, also in carpets, but deal besides largely in wool. The original of our sketch was married in 1862, to Miss Eliza Mann, a daughter of Emanuel Mann. Mrs. Schmid was born in this city and here was reared and educated. To our subject and his wife have been born three children, whose names are Emma E., Oscar F. and Edwin E. Oscar is a chemist and engaged in the drug and chemical works in Jackson, Michigan.

Our subject has been honored by election to various municipal offices. He has been Alderman for one term and is now President of the Ann Arbor Piano & Organ Company and is Vice-President of the Ann Arbor Brick & Tile Company and holds the same position in the Business Men's Association. He was appointed Trustee of the Eastern Michigan Asylum for the Insane and is an interested worker for any humanitarian or progressive enterprise, Our subject is the owner of a valuable farm in this county. In politics he .affiliates with the Democratic Party. In their church associations our subject with the other members of his family belongs to the Zion Church. He is Superintendent of the Sunday-school and also one of the Church Trustees. His elegant residence is located on Fifth Avenue and denotes refinement and culture in its owner and occupant.

Cheboygan, Michigan, July 28, 1906 - Miss Emma Schmid, aged 23, daughter of Frederick Schmid, a wealthy resident of Ann Arbor was drowned, shortly before noon today, when the Inland route steamer Valentine went down in the Cheboygan River near where it enters Mullett Lake. The steamer struck a deadhead, which pierced its hull. The steamer left here with about forty passengers aboard, bound for Topinabee. The tug Merchant, which was nearby, hurried to the rescue and took all the passengers and crew on board, with the exception of Miss Schmid, who ran back for her valise.

The body was recovered a few hours later. Miss Schmid was going to Dodges Point, on Mullett Lake, with her brother and sister when the accident occurred.

Henry J. Mann for forty-three years, or from boyhood down to the present time, Henry J. Mann has been a representative of the business interests of Christian Mack and now of his estate. He was born in Ann Arbor January 3, 1847. His paternal grandfather, Jonathan Henry Mann, was born in Germany April 26, 1784, and came to America in 1826. He settled first in Pennsylvania and on the 20th of May, 1830, he arrived in Ann Arbor, Michigan. He had been married in Germany on the 10th of September, 18O9, to Miss Louise Haller, who was born in that country August 6, 1786. They were resident of this city for more than a third of a century and here Mrs. Mann died on the 9th of July, 1864, her husband surviving until the 18th of August, 1865. They were the parents of ten children, all of whom were born in the fatherland, and with the exception of three all died prior to the emigration of the parents to the new world. The eldest of the survivors was Emanuel E. Mann. Louise, who was born June 21, 1817, became the wife of Rev. Frederick Schmid, the first Lutheran minister in Michigan and the organizer of many of the German churches of this state, where he arrived in 1833, Mrs. Schmid departed this life March 10, 1889, Sophie H. Mann, who was born November I0, 1821, and is the only living representative of her father's family, is now enjoying good health at the age of eighty-four years. She married August Frederick Hutzel, who was born in Germany, February 25, 1807, and died September 18, 1889. Emanuel E. Mann, whose birth occurred in Germany June 4, 1814, died in Ann Arbor, November 24, 1887. He came to America with his parents in 1826 and was married in this city to Anna Niethamer, who was born in Germany February 9, 1825, and died in Ann Arbor November 2, 1880. Emanuel Mann learned the tanner's trade under the direction of his father in early life and later he built the first steam tannery in this city, which was located back of the old jail on Allen's creek. This he operated alone until 1848, when it was destroyed by fire. He then entered into partnership with Christian Eberbach under the firm name of Eberbach & Company, and they began dealing in drugs and similar goods, the partnership being maintained until 1881, when it was discontinued. A year later Mr. Mann purchased the George Granville drug store, which was located on Main Street where the Goodyear drug store now stands. Later he removed his store to the location now occupied by his sons under the firm name of Mann Brothers, and it was there that he sold out to them. On retiring from commercial pursuits he settled on his farm, where his remaining days were passed. He was

a very successful man, much esteemed by all who knew him. In politics he was a republican and was vice-president of the republican meeting held "under the oaks" at Jackson. Michigan, when the Republican Party had its inception. At the time when he was conducting business as a member of the firm of Eberbach & Company his store used to be the meeting place of many politicians of the day and also the place of rendezvous for prominent and well known early settlers. At one time Mr. Mann represented his district in the state senate and he held various local offices, serving on the school board of the city and also as alderman. He was very active in city and council affairs and wielded a wide and beneficial influence, his efforts proving effective in promoting the general good, in his family were eleven children, of whom seven are yet living, namely: Eliza, Henry J., Emilie, Eugene G., Albert, Clara and Charles F. Henry J. Mann obtained his education in the schools of Ann Arbor and on leaving the high school in 1862 entered the employ of the firm of Mack & Schmid as a clerk. He continued with the firm for many years as confidential clerk and right hand man, and in fact so continued until the death of Christian Mack in 1901 a period of thirty-eight consecutive years. He was at that time acting as bookkeeper in the loaning and banking department of their business and on the death of Mr. Mack he became the bookkeeper of the Christian Mack estate, in which capacity he is yet serving and is also the manager of the Christian Mack Agency, which was established by his late employer and has since been conducted most successfully. Mr. Mann has been in the employ of this house for forty-three years, from boyhood to the present time and his business position has ever been of the most honorable, his business integrity above question. On the 27th of May, 1880, in Ann Arbor Mr. Mann was married to Miss Mary Wagner, a native of this city and a daughter of John Wagner, one of the early settlers of Washtenaw County. They have one child, Louise A., who was born in Ann Arbor.

Rev. Prof. Emmanuel Schmid was born July 3rd, 1835, at Ann Arbor, Michigan, then a small hamlet of a few hundred inhabitants, with Indian camps in the neighborhood. Wakening to life just previous to the anniversary of our national day, while Michigan was yet a territory (became a state, 1837). Prof. Schmid appears from early childhood to have been associated with the religious and intellectual growth and development of our country. His father, Rev. Friedrich Schmid, accompanied by his wife, Louisa, planted the Lutheran Church in that wilderness frontier, and for many years he was the only Lutheran minister in Michigan. Emmanuel Schmid made frequent trips with him to the scattered and lonely settlements of German Lutherans, through a large portion of the state; now and then also visiting the Indians. From earliest youth, he had the purpose to become a minister, and these missionary tours increased this desire.

After having attended the common school, and part of the year the parochial, and then the academy, with also the privilege of enjoying private instructions in Latin and Greek, he entered as freshman the University of Michigan in 1851, receiving three years after the honorary degree of A. M. A few months after graduating, in August, 1855, he left for Germany to study theology. Again the name of Schmid appears as pioneer, but this time eastward. In that comparatively early period of the development of the center of our continent, attendants at German Universities from this so called western country, were not often met with, and many frontier log houses were to be passed in going to reach those old, densely populated and ornate seats of European culture. While the starry lamp of empire was moving westward, it proved necessary with many to return, as it were, to the fountain source, for a new supply of oil. He entered the University of Tuebingen, where there were then prominent as Theological Professors Palmer, Beck, Landerer, Oehler and Baur.

After spending three "semesters" at Tuebinger, he went to Erlangen, where many theological students at that time congregated, to hear such men as Hofmann, Delitzsch, Schmid, Thomasius and Zetzwitsh. The vacations were spent in traveling through a large portion of Germany, Switzerland, France, and Italy.

In the later part of 1857, he returned to America, with the intention of entering the ministry. At first he assisted his father in his extensive field of labor in Michigan. A few months after his return, he received a call to Columbus, O. This was a two-fold one: as Professor of Latin and Greek in "Capital University" of the Lutheran Joint Synod of Ohio, and as pastor of a small English Lutheran congregation in Columbus. He accepted both calls, and at Easter, 1858, moved to Columbus. He was married the same year to Wilhelmine C., youngest daughter of Rev. Prof. W. Schmidt, the first professor and founder of the Theological Seminary in Columbus. His wife died in 1884, leaving two daughters. life, he suffered greatly from withdrawals of pastors and churches from the Synod because of its too Lutheran character. These went to the United Synod of the West! Not less was he distressed and j embarrassed by the withdrawal of others to the Missouri Synod, to whom his Synod was not sufficiently Lutheran. Even the missionaries he had trained for the Indian mission among the Chippewas, were carried away by the last movement, taking, we believe, both the Indian and the German congregations with them.

Soon after the arrival of Emmanuel Schmid in Columbus, he also took charge of a German congregation in Grove City nearby. After serving these congregations some years, he resigned their charge and accepted the call of another congregation (English and German) seven miles from Columbus, which he has served twenty-eight years, and of which he is now pastor. As professor, he has now, without interruption, been connected with "Capital University" nearly thirty-three years. For twenty-two years he taught the languages and history, then of the languages a few years only Greek. Since 1883, his labors have been confined to lectures on Universal History. Since 1863 he has also filled the office of Secretary of the Faculty continuously to this day. When the Joint Synod in 1859 resolved to publish a German paper, The Lutherische Kirchen-Zeitung, he was appointed associate editor with Prof. Lehmann. The department edited by Prof. Schmid was that of Church News, and it is yet, after thirty-one years. During all this time he has enjoyed the blessing of good health, so that not a single number of the periodical has appeared without some news published by him. Of "Luther's House Postil," published in English by the Rev. J. A. Schulze, he translated the first volume and the greater part of the second. During his connection with the "Ohio Synod," he has held for thirteen years the office of president of the "Western District," and holds it at the present time.

It will be observed that a special feature of the life of Prof. Schmid is the continuousness of his occupancy of the positions he has held.

Lansing, Nov. 26, 1955 - The colorful history of the beginning of Lutheranism in the city more than 100 years ago, will be reviewed Sunday in a "Founder Day" observance at Emanuel First Lutheran church. The day's services will climax the month-long centennial observance of the oldest. Lutheran organization in the city. Rev. Oscar J. Naumann, St. Paul, Minnesota, president of the Evangelical Lutheran Joint Synod of Wisconsin and other states, will speak at both the German service at 9:30 a. m. and the English service at 11 a.m. Special music will be under the direction of Victor J. Schulz. The senior choir will sing "Psalm VIII," by Warner, and the combined senior and junior choirs will offer "Praise the Lord, Ye Heavens, Adore Him," by Pritchard.

The history of the Emanuel church dates back to 1853, when a small band of German Lutheran families, who had migrated to Lansing, wishing to continue worship in their mother tongue, met and held services in the various homes. Worship also was held for a time in the North Lansing school.

In 1855 under the direction of Rev. Frederick Schmid, the pioneer Lutheran pastor of Michigan, the 52 families organized the first Lutheran church in the city. Mr. Schmid had previously organized the first Lutheran congregation in the state in Scio Township, west of Ann Arbor in 1833.

Rev. Christian Volz became the first regular pastor, serving the organization from 1855 to 1857. Other pastors who have served the church were: Adam Buerkle, 1857-1866: John Her, 1866-1869; Robert Conrad, 1870-1873; Louis Zuber, 1873-1876; John Eipperle, 1876-1S89; William Kramer, 1889-1909; Frederick M. Krauss, 1909-1941; and the present pastor Karl F. Krauss, serving since 1921. Leonard J. Koeninger, co-pastor, was appointed in 1933. The early pastors also served congregations in Westphalia Township, Woodland, and Grand Ledge. The first parsonage was erected in 1867 and remained in use until 1912. A day school was erected in 1868. The school was discontinued in 1927.

In 1884, the congregation had grown to the extent that it was necessary to enlarge the church by 30 feet. A teacherage was erected in 1902, and is being used today as the custodian's residence. In 1912 steps were taken toward the erection of a new church edifice. Property was acquired at the present location, N. Capitol Ave. at Kilborn St., and construction on the new brick church was started in 1915. The building was dedicated in November, 1916. Two parsonages were erected in 1922, and a new altar was installed in the church in 1929.

Additional property north of the church was acquired in 1944 and 1931, for the purpose of erecting a new parish house. The Centennial hall was dedicated in 1953. Another parsonage also has been acquired this year by the group. From 52 families in 1855, the congregation has grown to 851 families in 1955, and from a little frame church to a large attractive church, four dwellings and a modern parish house.

American Lutheran biographies: or, Historical notices of over three hundred and fifty Leading Men of the American Lutheran Church. By Rev. Jens Christian Jensson; in 1890. Page 819:

Rev. Christian Volz. Pastor Christian Volz was born at Walddorf, in Wurtemberg, on the 29th of September, 1826. At the age of fifteen he entered the Teachers' Seminary at Esslingen. Later he became tutor at a deaf and dumb institute. In 1852 he came to Ann Arbor, Michigan. Rev. Fried. Schmidt, whose kind hospitality he received, advised him to enter the ministry. After his ordination he served several congregations in Michigan. In 1857 he received a call from the St. John's Church in Buffalo, where Pastor Gunther had labored for more than twenty-four years. At the meeting of the Ministerium at Utica, in 1857, Pastor Volz was made a member of the northern district of the Ohio Synod.

His congregation numbered at this time, over a thousand communicants. His heart beat warmly on behalf of the orphans and their Christian training. He was deeply interested in education. He sent hundreds of dollars to Columbus, Ohio, for the support of the Capital University of the Ohio Synod, and in this he followed the example of Dr. Stohlmann. He regularly gathered alms for the Orphan Asylum, at Pittsburg, Pennsylvania. Finally he conceived the idea of establishing such an institution himself. At this he made a beginning in 1864. On Sunday Latare, after having preached a sermon on the feeding of the five thousand, he announced to his congregation his purpose of establishing such an institution to the honor of God and the relief of poor orphans. As one man, the congregation seconded his noble project. For this purpose, the house of the sainted Pastor Gunther was bought for \$2,000. After having enlarged and remodeled the building, it was appropriately dedicated as an Orphan Home, on the 9th of May, 1865. The Lord prospered the work, and through the kindness of charitable people, the sum of \$3,716.14 was donated to the Home, besides considerable furniture and such like. Notwithstanding these liberal contributions, there was a debt of \$1,541.42 resting upon the institution at its dedication. But "what is that among so many friends of the orphans"; thus argued the founder and first director of the Orphan Home, Pastor Volz, at the dedication service.

At the first anniversary there had already been received thirteen children into the Home. It was a day of thanksgiving and joy, because of the manifest help of the Lord, who had so abundantly prospered the work. Not only had the debt been paid, but a surplus of \$3,042.81 had been received. In 1867 the number of orphans had risen to 27. Notwithstanding the number of children which was constantly increased, the treasury contained at the end of this year, a surplus of \$3,986.70. It now became necessary to enlarge the Orphan Home. During the fourth year the number of children rose to thirty-seven. It was during this year, that the property at Sulphur Springs, New York, was added to the institution. At the fourth anniversary, which was celebrated on June 27th, 1869, a large number of people from far and near partook in the festivities, of which a prominent feature was the dedication of the Orphan Home for Boys, at Sulphur Springs. In 1871 the Orphan Home had to be enlarged. The addition was built of brick, while the old was a frame-building. In 1876 the Orphans' Home at Sulphur Springs was destroyed by fire. But this did not discourage Pastor Volz and his co-laborers. A new, beautiful, and massive building was immediately erected in the neighborhood of where the old building had stood. In 1879 Pastor Volz lost his much esteemed co-laborers, Mrs. Louise Adelberg, who had acted as matron of the Orphan House for nearly ten years, the being called to the Deaconess Institute at Baiern. This year the number of children amounted to ninety-five. With characteristic perseverance and Christian devotion, Pastor Volz discharged his ever augmenting labors. Besides the supervision of his two Orphan Homes and the numerous cares connected with them, he faithfully ministered to a congregation of over two thousand communicants. During the twenty-seven years of his pastorate, he baptized 6,702, confirmed 3,034, administered communion to 49,971, married 1,675, and buried 2,929.

On Sunday, November 11th, 1883, he preached with unusual cheerfulness, it being the four-hundredth anniversary of the birth of Dr. M. Luther. On Wednesday evening, November 14th, he attended a meeting of the directors of his Orphan Home for Girls, when he was suddenly taken ill and died. Pastor Volz was married in 1856 to Miss Louise Schmidt, daughter of Pastor Fried. Schmidt of Ann Arbor, with whom he had three daughters. At his death he was fifty-seven years, one month and sixteen days old. His congregation erected a full-sized marble statue on his grave, which was unveiled with appropriate ceremonies, at the meeting of the Synod, at Buffalo, in 1885.—Nieum's History.

Evangelical Lutheran St. John's Congregation - In addition to the detailed history of the origin of the above name congregation which is found in another part of this book, the following may be said:

In the year 1897 the congregation purchased a magnificent Pipe-organ consisting of three manuals at a cost of \$4,000.00. The twenty-fifth anniversary of the dedication of the present church was celebrated in the year 1900. At this time the interior of the church was handsomely frescoed, new stained glass windows, which with but a few exceptions were presentations of families in memory of their departed ones, were placed; electric lights put in and the exterior received a suitable coat of painting, so that it compares favorably with the many beautiful churches of our city, and bears testimony of the benevolence and christian spirit of the congregation. A stately brick parsonage was erected in 1900. This building is directly opposite the church and school on Hickory Street. The school was built in 1888, in which the various societies have their rooms. The present officers of the church are: President, Rev. J.A.W. Kirsch; F. Kandel (deceased), J.J. Haffa and F. Hause as Elders; P. Ihrig, A. Allinger and J. Vogelmann as Wardens; C. Flierl, Jr., G.A. Herner, F. Erion, J. Hoeckh, Geo. Flierl and C. Mueller as Trustees.

The corner-stone of the present church edifice was laid in the year 1874, and in the month of October of the following year the church was solemnly dedicated. At this time the conference of the Evangelical Lutheran Ministry of the State of New York and adjoining states was held in the church. And at the twenty-fifth anniversary of the dedication of the present church the congregation again had the privilege of entertaining this conference. The church was built under the pastorate of Rev. Christian Volz and is a splendid testimony of his successful activity, as the old church, which formerly occupied the space next to the present one and which was replaced in 1888 under the pastorate of Rev. J. Brezing by a spacious school, had by far become to [sic] small for the constantly increasing congregation. Both the exterior and interior of the church are an evidence of the love of the congregation for their house of worship and of the generosity which is prevalent in maintaining ad beautifying the same.

The beautiful new parsonage of the congregation, which occupies the space next to the former parsonage on Hickory Street, is directly opposite the new school and was completed in the summer of 1900. It was erected upon the lot that formally occupied the parsonage of the first pastor of the church, the Rev. H. Guenther, and which was afterwards used as the girl's branch of the St. John's Evang. Lutheran Orphan Home. This property was purchased by the trustees of the congregation from the Orphan Home that they might erect thereupon a large parsonage with all modern improvements, thus effectuating the unanimous resolution of the congregation. On the 26th of August the parsonage was dedicated and answers very well to its intended purpose.

The schoolhouse was erected in 1888 and is used for the parochial school and for society purposes. The Sunday school finds its rooms in the entire second floor of the building and can be divided into three departments. In the parochial school the instructions are given in both German and English languages. The instructions in the English language correspond with those of the public schools, as the same books are used, so that children that are transferred from the school into the public school are familiar with all forms of education as given there. For children of the church the instruction- and text books are free. The present able teacher, Mr. F.L. Luebben, who is also organist and chorister of the church received his education in one of our own seminary's.

Pastor Francis H. Gunther received his theological education in an institution called the Hartwick Seminary, which was established in the forepart of this century by the Lutheran pastor, Johann Christoph Hartwig, in Otsego County, New York. He was licensed to preach in 1823. Several years he was active in missionary work in the vicinity of Mohawk, and after that he labored six years in the congregations at Ernestown and Frederickstown in Canada. On account of poor health he was obliged to resign his parsonage in Canada in 1831. He resided for a while in New York, and then served a congregation at Rush near Rochester. In 1833 he accepted an invitation to visit Buffalo, where he founded the St. John's congregation, which he served as pastor for 23 years, until poor health and old age compelled him to resign his pastorate. He died on the 2nd day of June 1863, at the age of 70 years. Pastors Volz and Knapp officiated at his burial and his remains were interred in the cemetery of the congregation in the midst of members of his flock who had preceded him into eternity.

Pastor Johannes Albert Wilhelm Kirsch was born on the 5th day of August, 1865, at Kappeln, Schleswig-Holstein, in Germany. After he had absolved [graduated from] the school of his native town he entered the theological seminary at Knopp, to prepare himself for the church service of the Lutheran Church in America and to serve the same as represented by the General Council. In the year 1887 he arrived in America. After having served awhile as vicar in Brooklyn and Sangerties, and after he

acquainted himself with the religious circumstances in this country, he was active in Webster, Flatbush (Brooklyn) and Canajoharie, in the State of New York. Last named congregation he served for over five years, and it required a second call of the Evangelical Lutheran St. John's congregation of Buffalo, N.Y., until his congregation permitted him to go in peace into his new field of labor. The union of the pastor and congregation, which was formed by the act of solemn installation on the 5th of July, 1889, prove itself a blessing for the congregation, and this union has been preserved by both parties unto this day.

Pastor George V. Bosse was educated in a theological seminary at Kropp in Germany, and since 1889 has served several congregations in America. He was assistant pastor in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, pastor at Egg Harbor City, New Jersey, and in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, after which in 1899 he received a call as father of the orphans at the St. John's Evangelical Orphan Home at Sulphur Springs in the town of West Seneca, New York, which he accepted. His knowledge of many situations of Christian charity in Germany and his intelligence of their methods of work enabled him in a large degree to take the management of an office, which requires judgement [sic], patience and self-denial. In his amiable and judicious wife he finds a good assistant in his labors.

# St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Orphan Home

On the 6th day of March 1864, on the Sunday called Laetare, the St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church on Hickory Street, Buffalo, New York, in pursuance to a call for a special meeting by the pastor, Rev. Christian Volz, resolved to institute by free will offerings an Evangelical Lutheran Orphan Home in the city of Buffalo. The object of the institution should be to give to destitute orphans a christian home and education. The board of management, however, reserved the right to admit so-called half-orphans when it might be feared that they would be neglected. On the admittance of orphans neither the native land nor the religious creed of the deceased parents should be considered. By a special act of the Legislature of the state the Orphan Home was incorporated on the 14th day of April, 1865, with the following named gentlemen as directors: Rev. Christian Volz, Jacob H. Koons, George Kney, Andrew Grass, Daniel Lang, Anthony Hasselbach, Jacob Reimann, Carl Sauer and Fr. Wuest. By an act of Legislature on the 22nd day of May, 1874, the act of incorporation was amended giving power to erect in West Seneca, New York, a branch institution which served as a home for boys up to the year 1898, while girls found their home in the city. This home of the boys, which formerly was a bathing establishment in Sulphur Springs, was destroyed by fire in 1876, but forthwith a new building was erected. The indefatigable and self-sacrificing founders and leaders, as in former years, had especially during this period of visitation been assisted energetically in their work of charity by the German inhabitants of Buffalo, who always manifested a deep interest in this Orphan Home.

In the course of time several other German and English congregations grew out of St. John's Church, which have preserved a warm feeling not only to their mother church, but also to this Orphan Home and have assisted in its maintenance as much as possible. To maintain and deepen this interest among these churches the board of directors, which thus far consisted of pastor and members of St. John's Church, resolved that beginning with the year 1897 one member of each of these various churches shall be represented in the board of Directors. This change undoubtedly proved to be beneficial to the home. - Soon after a ladies auxiliary was organized consisting of two ladies out of each of the seven Lutheran churches which assist in maintaining the home. The cost of maintenance which at an average of 90 children is indeed, not a small sum is, aside from the assistance received by a few friends of the home in Buffalo, raised by the surrounding German churches through the efforts of the Board of Directors and the Ladies Auxiliary.

In the year 1898 a large new building was erected in addition to the present one in Sulphur Springs in the town of West Seneca with an expenditure of \$40,000.00. Thus the directors were able to unite the home, transferring the girls from the city to this new building where both boys and girls may receive their education and training. In the 36 years of its existence between 4-500 children have found a home here, protected against many dangers of life under Christian guardianship. At present there are 90 children in the home which is in charge of Rev. George von Bosse and his wife who are assisted in their work of charity by several male and female teachers. The present board of Directors consist of the following gentlemen: Rev. J.A.W. Krisch, Director; Conrad Machemer, Secretary; J. Ansteth, Financial Secretary; H. Zipp, Treasurer; Frank Beer, deceased; Anthony Degenfelder, John Henrich, W. Heiser, W. Hengerer, Chr. Klinck, Ed. Liebetrut, C.L. Sauer, Jac. Schaller, Jac. Schell and Fr. Wendling. The officers of the Ladies Auxiliary are: President, Mrs. Cath. Reimann; Vice-President, Miss Julia Volz; Secretary, Mrs. Th.

Guenther; Treasurer, Mrs. W. Heiser.

The Life of Rev. Christian Volz, Pastor and Foster-Father of Buffalo, New York

Christian Volz, formerly the pastor of the Lutheran St. John's Congregation on Hickory Street was born on the 29th of September, 1826, at Waldorf, in Württemberg, [1] His parents were Fredr, Volz and Anna Maria, nee Schmied. After he had frequented the country school for 8 years and was confirmed, he entered the teachers seminary at Esslingen. After he had gone through its course and passed his examination, he went for a short time to a missionary institution "Chrischona" near Basel in Switzerland, but soon accepted a call as teacher of deaf-mutes at Gmünd, where he was active for some time. In his 22nd year of life he came to America and went to the state of Michigan, where a great many of his native people had settled [2]. Pastor F. Schmid of Ann Arbor was the Lutheran pioneer pastor in that state. As the young man had a great inclination for the clerical profession, he studied theology under him for a year and was then ordained to the ministry. In the Saginaw Valley the young minister organized a Lutheran congregation, which was afterwards served by his brother Conrad Volz as his successor. Afterwards he served a congregation at Bridgewater, near Ann Arbor and then at Lansing. A year after he followed a call of a new congregation at Lansing, Mich., which he organized. At this time he married Miss Louise Schmid, a daughter of Rev. Friedrich and Louise Schmid. In the year 1856 he traveled in the east and visited Pastor Guenther at Buffalo. After that he received a call of the St. John's congregation of this place, which he accepted and came here in the year 1857. As pastor he preserved his love for poor pitiful children. The consequence of it was that in 1864 in harmony with his congregation he founded an orphan asylum in the neighborhood of the church. As evidently a blessing rested upon this work, a little farm 3 miles from the city was soon bought, and a separate institution organized for the orphan boys, while the house on Hickory Street was reserved for the orphan girls. This was a great undertaking for him, in connection with his many duties as pastor of the congregation, which was continually growing, but his love for his holy work and the assistance of his beloved congregation lightened his labors. His whole heart was directed to these orphan asylums, and by his fatherly cares the orphans found here a veritable home. It was a sad experience for him when on the 23rd day of February, 1876, the institution at Sulphur Springs was destroyed by fire. But through his indefatigable zeal he soon solicited a large sum of money by subscription and in July of the same year the corner stone of the new building could be laid. At the 50th anniversary festivities of the congregation on the 11th day of February 1883 Pastor Volz was enabled to report that since the foundation of the asylum already 200 orphans had found a home in the institution. What a joy it must have been to him to see his work prospering so well. In his congregation he was indefatigably active, early and late, Sundays and weekdays. With abundant blessings he was able to perform his pastoral duties for 27 years. He enjoyed the privilege two years before his decease of celebrating his 25th anniversary as pastor of his congregation. On this occasion many congratulations were rendered him and his family from his loving congregation and numerous gifts from various members were made unto him thus showing their high esteem, appreciation and love to their faithful pastor.

That this active pastor should so soon be called from his field of labor nobody expected, as he was apparently in good health and industrious. On the 11th of November he celebrated with his congregation the festival of the reformation. The sermon of this festival was his valedictory sermon to his congregation. Wednesday the 14th of November he attended a meeting with the Board of trustees of his congregation. After the closing of the meeting he pronounced the benediction, and after he had said the word "amen," he fell, being struck with paralysis. "I am dying" was his last word. He was carried dead from the orphan asylum to the nearby parsonage. The horror with which his family, the congregation and his colleagues were seized at the intelligence of his sudden death can be better felt than described. In his 57th year of age the Lord called him suddenly from his labors. He was survived by a sorrowful widow and 3 daughters mourning his demise. The congregation, which he served so faithfully unto his end, still preserves a warm memory for him.

annual festival of the Evangelical Lutheran St. John's Orphan Home, held yesterday July 15, 1908 at Sulphur Springs. The hospital will be known as the Volz Memorial Hospital in memory of the Rev. Christian Volz, who was pastor for twenty-three years and who was instrumental in founding the orphanage. The Rev. J. A. W. Kirsch, president of the board of trustees of the home, presided at the ceremonies.

Services were held at 11 o'clock in the orchard of the home and at 2 o'clock, preparatory to laying the cornerstone, speeches were made in German and English. A band concert was given during the afternoon and evening and dinner and supper were served by the ladies' auxiliary, composed of members of several churches who have worked untiringly for the success of the festival. The board of trustees, composed of a number of prominent Buffalonians, did much toward making the affair the big success that it was. The report of Financial Secretary Liebetrut for the fiscal year ending June 30th showed the total receipts to be \$20,719.14. A number of bequests, both large and small, were made during the year. The largest was that of Henry Coons, who bequeathed \$5,000 toward the maintenance of the home.

Portrait and Biographical Album of Washtenaw County, Michigan. Chicago: Biographical Publishing Company 1891:

Frederik Schmid is the junior member of the firm of dry goods merchants that is extensively known as that of Mack & Schmid of Ann Arbor. Frederick Schmid was born in Lodi Township, this county, May 17, 1839. He is the third of twelve children, six boys and six girls. The parents were Frederick and Louisa (Mann) Schmid who came to the United States when young. They were married in this city. Our subject's mother came here in 1829. She was a daughter of Henry J. Mann, who was the first German settler in Washtenaw County. Frederick Schmid, the immediate progenitor of our subject, was a Lutheran minister and coming from Germany located in Washtenaw County in 1833, and in company with Mr. Mann was extremely useful in influencing the settlement of many good German families in Washtenaw County.

Our subject's father was very active in organizing the Lutheran Church in this county and the result of his effort has been most happy. He came here from the Fatherland in the first place as a missionary and well did he perform his charge. He came from Basle, Switzerland and was a recognized factor of large influence in the Lutheran Church. His death occurred August 30, 1883. His wife died in 1889. Frederick Schmid, Sr., was a man who was very zealous in his religious belief and although in pioneer days he made his circuit to the different charges on foot through heavily timbered country and through mud and water he was always punctual in meeting his appointments.

Of twelve children born to the parents, eleven are now living. Our subject, Frederick, Jr., remained on the home farm until reaching his twelfth year. During that time he attended the district school in the vicinity and worked out on the neighboring farms, receiving \$12 per month for his services. He was thus engaged until nineteen years of age and then left the farm and entered the employ of John W. Maynard in the capacity of clerk and with him he remained for some months. After that he was employed by Christian Mack, and at the end of eighteen months was taken into the firm as partner and has since continued his relationships with the business.

The firm of Mack & Schmid is among the leading dry-goods houses of Ann Arbor. They not only deal extensively in everything with which to clothe the body that appeals to the feminine taste and instincts of beauty, also in carpets, but deal besides largely in wool. The original of our sketch was married in 1862, to Miss Eliza Mann, a daughter of Emanuel Mann. Mrs. Schmid was born in this city and here was reared and educated. To our subject and his wife have been born three children, whose names are Emma E., Oscar F. and Edwin E. Oscar is a chemist and engaged in the drug and chemical works in Jackson, Michigan.

Christian Mack, President of Ann Arbor Savings Bank and one of the leading dry-goods merchants in Ann Arbor, was born in Wurtemberg, Germany, in 1834. He was educated in his native land, and there learned the mercantile business. When 17 years of age Mr. Mack came to America, believing he could do better here than in Germany. From being in company with his employer's children who could speak English, he had learned the language. He first located at Sandusky, Ohio, remaining there but a short time. In 1851 he came to Ann Arbor, where he for a short time was employed on a farm. He remained only a few months and then entered the store of Mr. Ainslee, for whom he worked until Mr. Maynard bought out Mr. Ainslee. In 1857 he went into the dry-goods for himself, and in 1860 took into the business as partner Mr. Friedrich Schmid, Jr. In 1875 he was elected President of the Ann Arbor Savings Bank. He is also a member of the Board of Education of Ann Arbor, and has been for some years. By careful and

economical habits Mr. Mack has come to be one of Ann Arbor's leading merchants.

Ann Arbor, Michigan, August 14, 1901 – Shortly before noon today Christian Mack was found dead in the basement of Mack & Co.'s large department store. He was lying on the floor, where he had been for twenty or more minutes. He had not been feeling well of late, and only yesterday had been troubled with an irregularity in the action of his heart. The supposition is that this morning he did not feel keen and hence went to the basement in search of a cool place, and that while there death overtook him. Dr. Martin L. Belsee, who examined the body, gave it as his opinion that the cause of death was heart failure.

For half a century Mr. Mack had been associated with Ann Arbor, and for the greater part of that time in a business way. He had been president of the Ann Arbor Savings Bank for more than twenty-five years.

He was born in Wurtemberg, Germany, in 1834. His early education was secured in his native land. When 17 years of age he left Germany and came to the United States, believing that his chances were better in America. He first located at Sandusky, Ohio. Here he learned English language from the children of his employer. After a short stay at Sandusky he came to Ann Arbor and went to work on a farm. Soon after he entered a store as a clerk and later launched into business for himself. For over a quarter of a century he has been a member of the school board and he has devoted a great share of his time toward building up the school system of the city to its present term on the school board would have expired in September.

The deceased leaves a widow and four children. The latter are as follows: Edwin F. Mack of the Union Trust Company of Chicago, formerly of the Citizens' Saving bank of Detroit; Mrs. Willis J. Abbott, of Ann Arbor; Walter C. Mack, of Ann Arbor, and Mrs. Henry W. Hawley, of Berkeley, California, Walter C. Mack is in New York on Business at present.

Ann Arbor, Michigan, August 23, 1901. The will of the late Christian Mack was offered for probate this afternoon. The bulk of the estate remains intact, the income being left to the widow during her life. At her death it will be divided equally among the four children, who also receive certain immediate bequests. Mrs. Christian Mack, Edwin F. Mack and Walter C. Mack are appointed executors, the latter having been appointed special executor.

Buffalo, New York, August 27, 1901 - The opportunities which this country affords to those who have the ability to rise are well illustrated in the career of Christian Mack, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of Ann Arbor, Michigan, who recently passed away. Christian Mack came to this country from Germany when a lad and entered a general store on a stipend of \$8 a week. He rose rapidly in his business and in 1855 opened a store of his own. He did not accumulate a colossal fortune, as fortunes go now a days, but at his demise his property amounted to nearly a million dollars. He was one of the organizers of the Ann Arbor Savings Bank and for a quarter of a century was its president. One of Mr. Mack's surviving children, Amanda, is the wife of Willis J. Abbott, the brilliant editor of the Pilgrim and a leader writer, on the New York Journal and the Chicago-American.

Nathaniel Schmid. Among the active business men of the village of Manchester this gentleman who is a native of Washtenaw County, his birth having taken place June 20, 1854, in the city of Ann Arbor. His father is the Rev. Frederick Schmid, a sketch of whom will be found with that given of another son, Frederick Schmid, one of the residents of Ann Arbor. The parents had a true patriarchal family of twelve, and five brothers and four sisters are still living.

Our subject was educated in the High School at Ann Arbor and came to Manchester as manager for the firm of Mack & Schmid, who were handling dry goods and notions here in 1876. After a while he bought out the firm and has since continued alone in this business. His marriage October 10, 1878 brought to his home a faithful helpmate in the person of Joannah Lehn, who was born in Manchester Township, Washtenaw County, December 19, 1857. Mr. Schmid is one of the leading business men in Manchester, a member of the Village Council, and has been for four years a School Inspector. He was village Treasurer for eight years and is President pro-tem of the village Board. He is a charter member of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, and one of

the founders of the Workmen's Aid Society, of which he is President and is also a member of the Knights of the Maccabees. As Mr. Schmid has so wide an acquaintance among the foreign born population he has a large business for them as a Notary Public, and in negotiating exchanges, and is also in the insurance business. # Notes for Rev. Christian Frederick Spring:

Battle Creek, Sept. 3, 1995 - The Zion Lutheran Church traces its beginning to 1848 when the Rev. Frederick Schmid of Ann Arbor first came to serve 40 Lutheran families. He came to Marshall once every six weeks on his regular circuit through central Michigan. The Church was formally organized in 1856, and the old Trinity Episcopal Church on the present site was purchased in late 1857. The Church's first pastor was Rev. H. Spring.

An early Marshall pioneer, S. J. Burpee gave the congregation his old store building which was moved to the church property, and used as a school. By 1868, 160 students were enrolled in Sunday School, which was taught by eleven teachers. On October 2, 1900, the congregation decided to build the current church for a sum not to exceed \$10,000, and it was to be known as the Zion Lutheran Church.

The cornerstone was laid on June 9, 1901, and the congregation had grown to 500 members. The Church was built largely through the efforts of Pastor Christopher Heidenreich who was called to serve the original building before on December 8, 1896. the construction of the Pastor Heidenreich educational wing in 1969. served the congregation for This tremendous project was nearly 50 years, before retiring in 1946. The current Pastor, Rev. Maurice G. Shackell has been with Zion Lutheran Church since 1976. Many additions and modifications were made to 1970. The woodwork in the Sanctuary is charming and enhances the beauty of the church interior. The altar, pulpit and pews are all made of beautiful oak.

Marshall, Feb. 22, 1970 - The congregation of Zion Lutheran Church today began marking the first of four weeks of dedication services denoting completion of the new educational-fellowship building and the rededication of the renovated church. Former pastors and church leaders are scheduled to speak at each of the Sunday dedication services March 1, March 8 and March 15. A fellowship dinner will be served at 5 p.m. today and at the same time during the following three Sundays. The dedication of the educational-fellowship building was to take place at 10:30 a.m. today. Guest speaker was to be the Rev. E. H. Hessler of Trinity Lutheran Church. Conklin. Evening speaker will be Donald Kell, assistant superintendent of Christian education for the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod of Michigan. Activities will close with a vesper service conducted by the Rev. H. H. Hasten, Zion pastor.

About 122 years have lapsed since the first church service for German Lutherans was held at the Calhoun County Court House and the dedication today of the new and refurbished facilities. The handsome educational wing affords an all-purpose room on the main floor, including a basketball, volleyball and shuffleboard area, plus a kitchen, a church office and pastor's study. The second floor contains a choir robing and music area, a large classroom and a balcony overlooking the main floor. In the lower level are 14 individual classrooms and a service area.

The church building, dedicated 69 years ago, has a "new look." The brick has been sandblasted and tuck-pointed and the framework painted. A new entrance has been added, including outside lights and a white steeple topped by a gold cross. New wiring and lights have been installed. There's a new floor in the nave, the pews have been refinished, and a new public address and radio broadcasting system added. The interior has been given a n extensive redecorating job. The Kilgen pipe organ that served the congregation for a half-century has been rebuilt and will continue to provide music for the services. An added new feature are the Calhoun County fieldstone bulletin board and accents at the entrances. The history of the Marshall congregation goes back to 1848 when the Rev. Frederick Schmid of Ann Arbor, armed with his Bible and liturgy, a blanket and a hatchet, traveled 70 miles every six weeks to conduct

services here.

The church was organized in 1856 with the Rev. Christian H. Spring as first pastor. The following year, the congregation purchased the old frame former Trinity Episcopal Church then on the site of the present church. Someone donated an old store building which the church converted into a school, where classes were held six months out of the year to instruct children of the church in the German language and the doctrines of the church. In 1867 the congregation raised enough money to build a parsonage south of the church. By the late 1880's the old church was in need of extensive repair and remodeling to meet the needs of the growing congregation. Plans were launched to build the present church which was dedicated in December 1901.

The Rev. Christopher Heidenreich, then pastor of the church, officiated at the dedication ceremony. He served the church as pastor for 50 years before his retirement in 1946. A special service in his honor was held at the church on Feb. 21, 1954, two days before his 80th birthday anniversary. In 1934, the church became the place of ordination for his son, Herbert M. Heidenreich, when he entered the Lutheran ministry.

A son of the congregation. the Rev. Mr. Heidenreich, now pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Sturgis and counselor of the Sturgis Circuit, will be one of the guest speakers at the dedication services, Sunday, March 15. Another son, Theophil Heidenreich of Marshall, played the organ for church services for many years. The church celebrated its centennial on Sunday, March 25, 1956. There have been more than a dozen pastors serving the church since its organization over a century ago. The most recent is the Rev. H. Kasten, installed August 10, 1969. Remainder of the dedication services scheduled: Sunday, March 1, guest pastor will be the Rev. Marcus Buuck, who served here from 1946 to 1957. Evening speaker will be the Rev. Theodore Zeile, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Flint. Sunday, March 8. will be a folk service at 10:30 a.m. under the direction of the Concordia Swingers of Fort Wayne, Indiana. Morning speaker will be Capt. Kenneth Kuhlman of Ft. Knox, Kentucky. The Swingers will be featured in a hour-long program at 3:30 p.m. Sunday, March 15, the Rev. Theodore Taykowski, former pastor, will be guest speaker. Assisting him will be Prof. Roland Haas of Concordia Senior College, Fort Wayne, Ind. Guest speaker for the afternoon service will be the Rev. Herbert M. Heidenreich of Trinity Lutheran Church, Sturgis. Architect for the church was Christopher King of Vermontville.

Heidenreich and Theophil Heidenreich.

Rev. Christian Frederick Spring was born in Reussen, Germany and died in New Hamburg, Wilmont Township, Waterford County, Ontario. He married Anna Maria Jedele in 1856. She died April 26, 1858. Together they one child who died in infancy. He later remarried.

Rev. Spring was pastor from 1866-1872 at St James' Lutheran Church. He arrived Dec 27th, 1866 to serve New Dundee and to get New Hamburg back into the Lutheran Canada Synod again, which he succeeded in doing. He became full pastor to New Hamburg in August 1873 where he worked until his passing in 1888.

Past and Present of Washtenaw County, Michigan by Samuel W. Beakes, Chicago: The S.J. Clarke Publishing Co.. 1906:

Charles Steinbach, who since the spring of 1872 has been engaged in the harness business in Chelsea, with a patronage that makes him a prosperous merchant, while his business methods and enterprising spirit constitute him one of the leading representatives of commercial interests in the town, was born in Hessen, Germany, in 1844. His parents were Henry and Catherine (Volland) Steinbach. The father came to America with his family in 1854 and made his way at once to Michigan. He was first engaged in the grocery business in Europe, but by trade was a weaver. When he arrived here he purchased a farm of eighty acres north of Ann Arbor, which he cleared and improved continuing its cultivation until 1865, when he sold that property and removed to the Nowland farm a mile and a half to the north. He rented that place for a year and in the fall of 1865 bought a farm a quarter of a mile west of Lima Center, comprising one hundred and ten acres, to which he added by additional purchases until his place comprised one hundred and ninety acres of rich and valuable land. He was thus identified with agricultural pursuits up to the time of his death, which occurred December 3, 1891. His wife died July 30, 1896. In their family were ten children: Charles, born July 15, 1844; Jacob, August 27, 1846; Martha Elizabeth, February 10, 1849; Burnett, February 17, 1851; Martin, who was born April 8, 1853, and died in March, 1885; Caroline. who was born November 1, 1855, and is the wife of Peter Oesterle, of Sylvan township; Minnie Eva, who was born October 27, 1859, and is conducting the Utopia Millinery Parlor at Ann Arbor; John Henry, born March 3, 1862; George, born May 3, 1866; and Anna Catherine, who was born May 22, 1872, and is the wife of Herman Fletcher, of Lima Township. The father was a republican, active in the work of the party and deeply interested in its success. His wife was a sister of Herman and Jacob Volland, the oldest harness merchants of Ann Arbor.

Charles Steinbach acquired his early education in the schools of Germany and laid the foundation for a successful career. After coming to America he remained on his father's farm until 1861, when in August of that year he entered the employ of Jacob Volland, of Ann Arbor, with whom he remained for three years during which time he learned the harness maker's trade. In the fall of 1864 he returned to the home farm spending the winter with his father's family, and then came to Chelsea, where he spent six

months. In the spring he removed to Lima Center, where he engaged in business on his own account for five years, and in the spring of 1872 he returned to Chelsea, where he has since engaged in the harness business with gratifying success. In 1894 he erected a fine brick business block forty by sixty feet and two stories in height. Here he is conducting an excellent business, being accorded a liberal patronage. In 1880 he was granted a patent on a harness pad and in 1881 was granted a patent on a gig tree for harness. He began the manufacture of those articles at Ann Arbor but owing to a destructive fire and the competition of others who forced him out of business he was never able to place his inventions on the market. He has, however, prospered in his industrial and mercantile efforts and is now conducting a good business in Chelsea.

On the 19th of March, 1872, Mr. Steinbach was married to Miss Martha Hutzel, a daughter of August Hutzel, who is represented elsewhere in this work. They have seven children: Henry A., who is married and is connected with the Bell Telephone Company; Otto, who is a piano tuner living in Adrian, Michigan; Charlotte Anna, who is engaged in teaching in Jackson; Emily, who follows the profession of teaching in Sylvan; Helena Louise, who is a graduate of the Michigan University and is engaged in teaching music; Edgar T., who is in the west; and Albert Martin, at home. The family possesses exceptional musical talent and skill and Mr. Steinbach at one time was a teacher of the violin. In his political views he is an earnest republican and for some time he served as township treasurer in Lima, while for four years he was postmaster at Lima Center. Fraternally he is connected with Olive lodge, No. 156, A. F. & A. M., with the Knights of the Maccabees and the Ancient Order of United Workmen. There have been some discouraging and disheartening features in his career but the obstacles he has met have been overcome by determined and earnest purpose and he has gradually and steadily worked his way upward, gaining a comfortable competence and an honored name as well.

Hermann Hutzel is a member of the firm of Hutzel & Co., plumbers, steam and gas fitters, and dealers in paints, oils and glass, their place of business being at No. 14 South Main Street, Ann Arbor.

Mr. Hutzel was born in this city April 5, 1850, his father being August F. Hutzel, and his mother Sophia (Mann) Hutzel. The mother emigrated to the United States in the year 1824 from Germany, coming to Michigan in 1829, and the father in 1836. They were married in Washtenaw County. Mr. Hutzel at that time being a trader and a practical business man, afterward went into the paints, oil and glass business in Ann Arbor until 1856, when he added a stock of groceries, continuing in the business until 1888, when he retired, transferring the business to his two sons. He died the same year, aged eighty-three. His wife still survives him and is now residing with her daughter at the old homestead. They were the parents of twelve children, eight of whom are living, six girls and two boys, Hermann being the eldest of the family.

Hermann Hutzel was educated in the schools of Ann Arbor, which, with the High School, have a very high standing. On leaving school he entered the store of his father as an assistant, afterward purchasing an interest in the same. In 1878 he added to his business piping, plumbing and steam supplies, not only doing business in Ann Arbor, but in different parts of the State, besides doing considerable in the building and construction of waterworks, chiefly the waterworks at Elgin, Illinois, and also at Streator. The Hutzel Bros, built the waterworks at Ann Arbor. Mr. Hutzel was married, in 1877, to Miss Paulina Graf, of Ann Arbor, daughter of Christian Graf. Six children have been the result of this union.

Our subject has always been a public-spirited man and has held many prominent offices. He was Alderman from the Second Ward for four years, member of the Board of Public Works two years and Vice President of the Allmandinger Piano and Organ Company. He and his wife are members of the Lutheran Church. In his political views he is an advocate of the Democratic Party. They reside in a handsome brick house on one of the finest streets of the city.

Muncie, Jan. 16, 1995 - The downtown Muncie building into which Christian Ministries of Delaware County recently moved has housed several organizations significant in local social and cultural history. Located on the southeast corner of Elm and Main Streets, the two-story brick structure is now covered with modern siding, so whether it has a capstone or cornerstone with a name and/or date can't be seen. Until a generation ago, the ground floor housed the offices, showroom and shops of Hutzel and Co., for two generations a major heating and plumbing contractor in Muncie and East Central Indiana. Hutzel & Co. opened in Muncie in 1900. Its founder was Herman Hutzel, who came here with his family from Ann Arbor, Michigan, where his grandparents, natives of Germany, were among the community's first residents.

A 1915-16 Muncie City Directory lists Herman and Max Hutzel as principals in the firm, although Max is listed as living in New Castle. There might have been a branch of the company there, and he later lived in Muncie. Herman Hutzel and his wife Pauline lived at 715 N. Elm St. There were two daughters: Elizabeth, who taught German in Muncie High School until the subject was discontinued at the outset of World War I, and then taught mathematics, and Melita, who was instructor in German at Muncie Normal Institute, a predecessor of Ball State University. Neither of the daughters ever married. In addition to Max, Hutzel sons included Victor, who in 1915-16 was listed as manager of Hutzel & Co., and Hugo, then not with the company. Herman Hutzel died in 1932. Victor Hutzel remained with the firm until his death nearly a generation later. Following the death of Max Hutzel in 1943, Hugo returned to Muncie after living in Buffalo, New York, Detroit and Kenosha, Wisconsin. In one of his positions he had headed the air conditioning division of the Nash-Kelvinator Co., manufacturers of automobiles and refrigeration equipment. An engineering graduate of the University of Michigan, he died in 1971 at age 82 after a number of years as head of Hutzel & Co.

The firm was engaged not only in domestic and commercial heating and plumbing (and, later, air conditioning) projects but also in major construction. Plumbing and heating systems installed in Ball State buildings from its beginning as a teacher's college in the 1920s until the late 1950s were done by Hutzel; one of the last major projects was Woodworth Residence Halls, completed in 1956. According to Royce Lewis of Muncie, who was with the firm for a number of years beginning soon after Max Hutzel'sdeath, the firm was sold to another company in 1962. But the acquisition did not work out, and a few years later Tibbetts Inc., an Ohio-based mechanical contractor, acquired Hutzel & Co.

Robert Hutzel, son of Max Hutzel, might be the only third-generation survivor of the Hutzel family. A graduate in 1937 of Burris High School and later of the United States Naval Academy, he was a commissioned officer in the Navy through World War II and for many years afterward. Now retired, he lives in Arlington, Virginia.

Max, Victor and Hugo Hutzel were also involved in an organization that in the 1930s and '40s was

located on the second floor of their building: The Muncie Club. A social organization of several dozen Muncie businessmen, the club was founded early in the 20th century and met in the Anthony Block, northwest corner of Jackson and Walnut Streets. From there it moved to the second floor of the Arcade Block, on the northwest corner of Main and Elm Streets, and then it moved to the Hutzel Building. In the late 1940s it built its own building across Main Street to the east, and it remains there today. During its stay in the Hutzel Building (and for several years after it moved), The Muncie Club's food and bar service was supervised by Lee Ton, a gentleman of Chinese descent who had the rather ornate title of chef steward. Noon and evening meals were served, and on Sunday nights through World War II, family dinners were held. The club staff included Reuben Poole, who took, over management following Lee Ton's death; Kenneth Ivy and Mary Helen Thomas. Its operation was characteristic of clubs in much larger cities.

Succeeding the club in the Hutzel Building was Muncie Amvets Post 12, a veteran's group newly formed after World War II. The post remained there for a few years before moving to its longtime location at 3421 S. Walnut St. Then in the 1960s along came the Children's Playhouse, a theater organization founded by Irene Belcher in the late 1930s and operated by her and her husband, longtime Muncie firefighter Aaron Belcher. The playhouse had been in several downtown locations, including east of the courthouse on Walnut Street and in the Commercial Club building on the northeast corner of Jefferson and Main streets. The Hutzel Building was its last location. The theater group disbanded in the late 1960s, but the Belchers remained active with Muncie Civic Theatre, where he was technical director for several years, for the balance of their lives. Numerous businesses have occupied the ground floor of the Hutzel in recent years, including Indiana Dearing Co., Fire Equipment Service Co. and the Pittsburgh Paint Center. Wiley W. Muncie - The funeral of Herman Hutzel, 82 who died Wednesday Sept. 7, 1932 at his home, 715 North Elm Street, will be conducted at 4 o'clock this afternoon at the Meeks mortuary, the Rev. Arthur W. McDavitt, minister of St. Johns Universalist Church, officiating. The body of Mr. Hutzel will be cremated and the ashes interred at Ann Arbor, Michigan. Mr. Hutzel was president of Hutzel and Company, plumbing and heating concern, which he founded in 1900, coming here from his birthplace, Ann Arbor, in that year. He was one of the city's most widely respected business men.

May 18, 1986 - Five local businesses will receive Centennial Business Awards from the Ann Arbor Historic District Commission this afternoon. The awards, given for the first time this year, will honor firms which have been continuously in business In Ann Arbor for 100 years or more. They will be presented at the commission's award ceremony from 2-4 p.m. at the Kempf House Center for Local History, 312 S. Division. Recipients of this year's awards are: Schlenker Hardware (1886), Muehlig Funeral Chapel (1852), Godfrey Moving and Storage (1881), Hutzel Plumbing and Heating (1857) and The Ann Arbor News (1835). Displays of memorabilia and photographs from each business will be on display at the Kempf House throughout the month of May.

Hutzel Plumbing and Heating celebrated its 125th anniversary in 1982 and was honored by the Historical Society of Michigan at the time for "more than 100 years of continuous operation in service to the people of Michigan and for contributing to the economic growth and vitality of our state." Hutzel's was founded by German immigrant August Hutzel in May of 1857, at 114 S. Main St., now the

Richmond, Indiana, July 28, 1917 - Charles Davis, 45 years old, foreman of the steam fitters for Hutzel and Co., plumbers of Muncie, was fatally injured, and Victor Hutzel, 26, a member of the Hutzel firm, and Albert Glaser, 25, a contractor, also of Muncie, were cut and bruised when an automobile in which they were driving overturned two miles northwest of here at 8 o'clock, this afternoon.

Davis's abdomen was lacerated, exposing; the intestines which could not be returned to their normal position despite the efforts of three physicians. Death occurred at 7:20 o'clock tonight. Relatives in Muncie have been notified. Davis was taken to the Reid Memorial Hospital here, to which place Hutzel and Glaser were taken to have their injuries dressed. Both of the latter were able to leave the hospital immediately.

Glaser sustained a deep cut on the cheek and Hutzel suffered minor cuts and bruises about the body. The trio was returning to Muncie from Eaton, Ohio, in the Hutzel truck, where the men are employed on the construction of the Preble County courthouse. Davis held the wheel while Hutzel, who was driving, lighted his pipe. In going around a curve, Hutzel suddenly grasped at the wheel, and the car swerved from the road and off an embankment. The windshield brace pierced Davis's abdomen. Davis ran a distance of 100 yards to a nearby house, supporting his intestines in his arms.

Mr. Hutzel was a graduate of Muncie High School and became associated with the family heating firm following graduation. He has been president of the firm since the death of brother, Max, in 1943. Tlitus F. Hutzel is a member of the firm of Hutzel & Co., of Ann Arbor, plumbers, steam and gas fitters, and dealers in paints, oils and glass, their place of business being at No. 14 South Main Street. Our subject was born in this county, February 18, 1855, and is the second son of August F. and Sophia (Mann) Hutzel, natives of Germany. Mrs. Hutzel's father was one of the pioneers of the State. Titus F. Hutzel, our subject, received a good education in the city schools of Ann Arbor and on leaving school became an assistant in his father's grocery store.

Not finding this business congenial to his taste, he concluded to change it and learn the tinner's trade with John Shumacher and Weitbreeht, with whom he spent three years. He then traveled as a journeyman for the firm. Leaving them, he went to Detroit and learned the plumbing trade, spending four years at the Detroit Nittle and Heating Works. Returning once more to Ann Arbor, he went into the plumbing business on his own account, continuing the same until the firm of Hutzel & Co. was formed in 1878, devoting his time entirely to the plumbing department of the business.

In 1880, our subject having shown good business ability, was taken in as full partner of the firm, his father being one and his brother Herman the other members' of the firm, incorporating the plumbing business with that of paints, oils and glass. The firm did an extensive business running up to 1889, when the two brothers purchased their father's interest, still continuing business on the same stand, under the firm name of Hutzel and Co.

In addition to their other business Hutzel & Co, have turned their attention to the construction of water-works, having put in the water-works at Ann Arbor, also at Elgin and Streator, 111. Titus F. Hutzel was married in 1884 to Miss Emma Brehm, of Ann Arbor. She was a daughter of Peter Brehm, whose ancestors came from Germany. Mr. and Mrs. Hutzel have had three children: Eleanor L., August F. and Ima. Mr. Hutzel is President of the Ann Arbor Sporting Club, is also a member of the Ann Arbor Workingmen's Society. He and his wife are both members of the German Lutheran Church, in the interests of which they take an active part. They have a handsome residence at No. 81 West Huron Street. Mr. Hutzel has been one of the directors of the Ann Arbor Water Company since its organization. He is also one of the stockholders in the Michigan Furniture Company, as well as being a stockholder in

the Ann Arbor Piano and Organ Works. Mr. Hutzel's success in life is entirely due to his own push, pluck and perseverance, from a small beginning having risen to a position of prominence in this community, where he is so well known and thoroughly respected.

Past and Present of Washtenaw County, Michigan by Samuel W. Beakes, Chicago: The S.J. Clarke Publishing Co., 1906:

Titus F. Hutzel. The name of Hutzel has figured for half a century in connection with the business of which Titus F. Hutzel is now a representative and which he has conducted continuously since 1878. His father, August F. Hutzel, came to Ann Arbor in 1838 and entered business life here as a grocer. He likewise became interested in a tannery established by his father-in-law, Henry Mann, and his enterprise and activity contributed to the early commercial and industrial progress and up building of the city. He was married on the 30th of June, 1839, to Miss Sophia Mann, a daughter of Henry and Louisa (Haller) Mann, who came to Ann Arbor May 20, 1830, having made the journey from Detroit with a wagon caravan, it requiring three days to complete the trip. At that time there were only eighteen or twenty houses in Ann Arbor and most of these were not plastered. Mr. Mann became almost immediately a factor in the growth of the embryo city and he purchased a tannery in which he ultimately built up a very extensive and profitable business until his years of labor were crowned with a period of ease, and in honorable retirement from further commercial or industrial pursuits he lived in Ann Arbor up to the time of his death, which occurred August I8, I865. In the family were three children: Emanuel, deceased, who was a druggist and member of the legislature in 1868; Mrs. Louisa Schmid, deceased, whose husband was the first German Lutheran minister in the Territory of Michigan; and Mrs. Sophia Hutzel. August F. Hutzel, after a happy married life of more than a half century, passed away on the 18th of September, 1889, his remains being interred in the German Bethlehem cemetery at Ann Arbor. His widow still survives at the age of eighty-four years. She is a cultured lady, still active, retaining her mental faculties unimpaired. She has a wonderfully retentive memory and can relate most interesting incidents of the early settlement of the county when the wilderness was unsubdued and the district had scarcely been reclaimed from the domain of the red man. She was born at Stuttgart, Germany, and in 1824 her father came to America, landing at Philadelphia. Soon afterward he went to Mexico but returning to Pennsylvania located at Reading and in I825 sent for his family to join him. They started in the spring of I826, traveling down the Rhine, their boat tying up each night, while the passengers sought shelter in the inn of a neighboring village. At Amsterdam they had to wait six weeks for a packet to Philadelphia and the voyage covered seventy days. For four years the family lived in Reading, Mrs. Hutzel being then a little girl. Her father made a prospecting tour to Michigan, walking all the way from Reading to Buffalo, and being greatly pleased with Ann Arbor and Washtenaw County, returned east for his family, and early in the spring of 1830 they started for their new home, traveling in the primitive manner of the times. Mrs. Hutzel has since lived in this city. Her children and grandchildren now number sixty and she also has fifteen great-grandchildren. She is a most loved member of this now numerous family and as one of the venerable and esteemed pioneer ladies of Washtenaw County we are pleased to present to our readers this brief record of her life.

In the family of August and Sophia (Mann) Hutzel there were fourteen children. Sophia, who is living with her mother, is the widow of the Rev. C. F. Spring, by whom she had the following children: Samuel J. is deceased; Emanuel C. is a member of the firm of Hutzel & Company; August F. is now with the Swift Company at Detroit; Sophie is the wife of Rev. F. Volz, of Saginaw, Michigan; Mary W. and Victor J. are both deceased; Julius T. is a printer of Cedar Rapids, Iowa; Herman G. is a druggist at Unionville, Michigan; G. Adolph is a minister at Bird City, Kansas; Louisa H. is deceased; Hannah M. is at home; Clara C. has passed away; Emma P. and Thusnelda M. are still with their mother. Pauline, the second child of Mr. and Mrs. August Hutzel, is now the widow of Frederick Wurster, by whom she had twelve children, namely: Louise, the widow of Jacob Wolpert, by whom she had one son, Jacob, Jr.; Christine Wurster, at home; August F. and Matilda, both deceased; Ernest M., who married Emma Fiegel; Carl Victor; Pauline; Johannes T., an electrician living in Cedar.Rapids, Iowa; Oscar H., Anna, Albert E. and Henrietta, all at home. Marie, the third member of the family of August Hutzel, died in childhood. Martha, the next younger, married Charles Steinbach, of Chelsea, Michigan, and they had seven children; Henry A., who wedded Mary A. Laney and has two children, Francis C. and Henry B.; C. Otto Steinbach, who wedded Maud Wortley and has one child, Marion; A. Charlotte and Helena L. Steinbach, both at home; Edgar T. Steinbach, a resident of Helena, Montana; and Emily and Albert Steinbach, who are still with

their mother. Louise Hutzel, the fifth member of the family, died in I868. August Herman, a resident of Muncie, Indiana, married Pauline Graf and their children are: Robert A., who married Lulu Spier and is living at Magdeburg, Germany; Melitha, Sophia E., Max H., Hugo and Victor C., all of whom are at home; and Louise, who was just older than Hugo and who is now deceased. Henrietta Hutzel, the next member of the family of August F. Hutzel, is the wife of Eugene K. Frueauff, whose husband is deputy county clerk of Washtenaw county, their home being in Ann Arbor. Titus Frederick Hutzel, whose name introduces this record, is the next of the family. Johnathan F. Hutzel is deceased. Hannah Hutzel is the wife of Henry Heim, of Saginaw, Michigan, who is president of the state board of pharmacy. Their children are: Dr. Arthur H. Heim, a dentist of Unionville, Michigan; Wanda C., Augusta J. and Henry T., all at home. Charlotte Hutzel is living with her mother. Carl Victor Hutzel is deceased. Two children of the family died in infancy.

Titus F. Hutzel was born in Ann Arbor, February 18, 1855, and has spent his entire life in the second ward of the city. He is indebted to its public school advantages for the educational privileges he enjoyed and in early manhood he embarked in his present line of business, establishing a plumbing plant in 1878 at No. 114 South Main Street. The business, however, has been conducted continuously for half a century under the Hutzel name. The original firm of Hutzel & Company consisted of August F. Hutzel, Christian Eberbach and Emanuel Mann. In 1878 this firm was dissolved and August F. Hutzel was joined by his sons, August Herman and Titus F. Hutzel under the firm style of Hutzel & Company. In 1888 the brothers purchased the father's interest and continued the business together until 1893, when Titus F. Hutzel purchased his brother's interest and associated himself with Emanuel C. Spring and Robert Gwinner, who are now carrying on the business under the firm name of Hutzel & Company. The safe, conservative policy inaugurated by its founder has always been maintained. The firm name is a synonym for business integrity and activity and Mr. Hutzel is recognized as a force in commercial circles of this community. He possesses untiring energy, is quick of perception, forms his plans readily and is determined in their execution and his close application to business and his excellent management has brought to him the high degree of prosperity which is today his.

In 1883 Mr. Hutzel was happily married to Miss Emma Brehm, of Ann Arbor, a daughter of Peter and Louise (Limbert) Brehm, at Ann Arbor. They have five children: Eleanore, twenty-one years of age; August F., eighteen years of age; Irma, Ruth and Matilda, aged respectively fifteen, thirteen and ten years and all now in school. Mr. Hutzel is prominent in fraternal and public interests in Ann Arbor. He belongs to the Masonic lodge and to the local German society and is likewise a member of the Bethlehem Evangelical church. That he has the entire confidence and trust of the people among whom he has always lived is indicated by the fact that he has twice been chosen to represent his ward on the board of city aldermen and he is now superintendent of the Ann Arbor Water Company. He is a man of attractive personality, of public spirit and a leader, in business circles of his community. Thoroughly interested in whatever tends to promote the moral, intellectual and material welfare of Ann Arbor, his popularity is well deserved.

December 14, 1988 - In 1915, when the Bridgewater Elevator was built by Charles Schurer and William Rentschler, Bridgewater was a bustling community that boasted a church, post office, bank, and railroad depot. The train stopped their daily to pick up passengers, produce, milk, and other materials in demand around the nation. Schurer and Rentschler were businessmen who bought and sold wool. They also started the Bridgewater Bank, which operated in the tiny village for many years before it became a tavern and then a restaurant. In 1919, the Elevator was purchased by area farmers who took stock in the company and changed its name to the Farmers Produce Company, Schurer remained as manager.

In 1927, Ernest G. Mann sold his Freedom Township farm and moved to Bridgewater to manage the cooperative. In 1938, Mann and his sons, Earl and Willard, bought the cooperative from Rentschler after Rentschler and August Henes bought out the stockholders. Mann forged a partnership with his sons and started E. G. Mann & Sons at the old Bridgewater Elevator.

"oats were 48 cents a bushel, corn was 65 cents a bushel, and soy oil meal was \$1.75 for a hundred pounds. Today, oats are \$2 a bushel, corn is. \$2.39 a bushel, and meal is \$15.85 for a hundred pounds. Feed salt was \$1 for a hundred pounds then; today it's \$9.90," says Glen Mann. Glen, grandson of Ernest, has been working in the family-owned elevator and agricultural supply business since 1962 with his brother, Vic, and mother, Billie. In 1940, Mann bought the Manchester mill from William Blaess and Willard Mann moved to Manchester to manage it. Ernest became ill in 1952 and sold his interest in the company to his sons. He died in 1955. By 1962, Earl and his wife, Billie, and Willard and his wife, Dorothy, incorporated the partnership and became the principal stockholders. Earl died in 1968 and Glen and Vic were taken on as stockholders along with Willard son, Ron. Willard retired in 1976 and sold his stock to his sister-in-law and her sons. Glen and Vic took the reins of E.G. Mann & Sons in Bridgewater and Ron assumed ownership of the Mann Feed Mill in Manchester. As corn and oats are food staples, the Elevator has been a staple for the area's agricultural community. Mann's buy, sell, and store corn, oats, soybeans, and wheat; maintain a grain bank; spray fields with herbicides and fertilizers; and sell fertilizer, herbicides, livestock and pet feeds, bird seed, and salt pellets.

Over the years, the Mann's have added to the elevator operation. Now, they boast a 70,000-bushel capacity with a grain dryer and grain cooler. "Grain out here comes into the elevator wet. It carries about 20-30 percent moisture. We put it into the grain dryer at 220 degrees and then cool it before storing. If you store wet grain, it will mold in three days," Glen explains While 70,000 bushels seems like a huge operation, Glen notes that the Anderson facility near Stockbridge has a 10 million-bushel capacity; Most of the crops stored at E. G. Mann are products of local farms although the oats now stored there came

from Argentina. "It was a bad oat crop this year so we had to buy some," he says. The elevators range from 45-105 feet high; from the peak of the highest elevator you can see the water towers of Saline and Manchester. In days past, grain was hand weighed and hand loaded. Now, machines do much of the heavy labor. There are machines that load grain, machines that grind grain, and machines that weigh grain. For example, a semi can park under the bin and, in 5 minutes, have a 1,000 bushel load in the trailer. The grist machine grinds wheat and other grain as well as livestock feed blends. With the reduction in the oat crop, many farmers now use an oat substitute for cattle and horse feed.

Since its 1938 founding, E.G. Mann & Sons has expanded and expects to serve the agricultural community for many more years. There are hopes it will remain "all in the family." "My son will graduate from Michigan State this month and he plans to come to work here," says Glen. "I've always been in this business. I've never worked in a shop or anything. It's a job somebody has to do."

Funeral services were held Sunday August 7, 1955 for Ernest G. Mann, 69, at the Lockwood Funeral Home in Saline, Mann was a widely known Washtenaw grain elevator operator who retired from business in 1952. He died at his home at 116 W. Michigan Ave, Saline, after a long illness. Mr. Mann was a co-partner with two of his sons in the ownership and operation of grain elevators at Bridgewater and Manchester. The former they bought on March 1, 1927 and the later on July 1, 1940. Mr. Mann was active in several Masonic orders including the Meridan Chapter 48 of Manchester, the Saline Masonic Lodge, Ann Arbor Council 86, Knights Templar 13 of Ann Arbor and Zal Grotto of Ann Arbor. He was a member of the Emanuel Evangelical and Reformed church of Manchester and the Saline Rotary Club. He was horn September 23, 1885, in Freedom Township, the son of Gottlieb and Mary Rentschler Mann and was married on Aug. 16, 1911 in Saline Township to Laura A. Feldkamp who died on February 12, 1948. He was married in February, 1950, to Mrs. Anna- Fosdick in Saline.

Surviving are his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Milderd Nill of Gross Pointe; three sons, two who were co-partners in his elevator business Earl Mann of Bridgewater and Willard Mann of Manchester and the third son, Paul, who is cashier and vice-president of the Chelsea State Bank. Other survivors are one brother, Ralph Mann of Saline Township; four sisters, Mrs. Clara Schlicht of Manchester, Mrs. Tema Baurer of Saline Township, Mrs. Nora Haeussler, Saline Township and Miss Louis Mann of Ann Arbor and 12 grandchildren.

Saginaw - The Rev. A. G. Bergener, of Detroit, on Sunday will preach at St. John's Lutheran Church, in commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of the ordination of the pastor, the Rev. Frederick Volz. The Rev. Mr. Volz became assistant to his father, the late Rev. Conrad Volz, in 1886, and took full charge on his father retirement in 1900.

During his 50 years' pastorate, he has officiated at 3,378 baptisms, 1,869 confirmations, 2,026

weddings, and 2,370 burials. During this period, the present parsonage and school have been built and the church remodeled.

In 1888, Mr. Volz organized Christ Lutheran Church in Reese, and served it for nine years in addition to his work at St. Johns. An anniversary party will be held in the parish hall Monday night June 15, 1936, and other anniversary events throughout the week. The Rev. Mr. Volz, who has just passed his seventy-second birthday, has two loves in life, his church and his flowers. As he grows older, he lets his garden become a little smaller, but he still putters happily with his trowel among his choice plants and is something of an authority on gladioli.

The Rev. Conrad Volz became pastor of the church in 1854, succeeding his brother Christian, who had served the church for a year previously. On January 2, 1937, Carriage Manufacturer Ernst Wurster died; he was an Ann Arbor High School graduate in 1901, elected to the Board of Supervisors in 1913, and was elected President of the City Council in 1915, and became Mayor when Charles Sauer died, and served through 1921. He was elected Washtenaw County Sheriff, 1926-1928.

Ernst M. Wurster, who served the city and county in many capacities including those of mayor and sheriff, died at 4 o'clock Saturday morning January 2, 1937 at his home at 605 E. Jefferson Street at the age of 63 years. He had been ill since September. His life was characterized by his public service which began almost 25 years ago with his election to the board of supervisors. His greatest Victory in politics was his election as sheriff in 1926, the first successful Democratic candidate for this office in 14 years.

Mr. Ernst M. Wurster was elected to the board of supervisors as a member from the First ward of Ann Arbor in 1913, and was returned to the board for another year in the spring of 1914. In 1915, he was elected president of the city council and automatically became acting mayor after the death in December, 1915, of Mayor C. A. Sauer. His term as acting mayor was followed by two terms as mayor. He was elected in 1917 and re-elected, in 1919. His leadership as mayor covered the critical period of the last of the World War and the years immediately following. He ran for sheriff on the Democratic ticket three times. The first time he was defeated by James W. Robison but ran 7,000 ahead of the Democratic ticket and this was the factor which led to the party's selecting him to head the county ticket in 1926. That year he won, defeating Richard Elliott. Two years later, Mr. Wurster was a candidate for re-election but lost. Mr. Wurster's last public office was as city treasurer, a position he held by appointment under Edward W. Staebler, then mayor. Mr. Wurster once was an unsuccessful candidate for probate judge.

Ann Arbor - Ernest M. Wurster, 63 years old, one of the few Democrats ever elected to the offices of Mayor and Sheriff in Ann Arbor, died at his home here Saturday morning Jan. 2, 1937 after a long illness. Wurster became acting mayor in 1915 when, as president of the City Council, he automatically became mayor on the death of Mayor C. A. Sauer. He was re-elected twice thereafter, serving until 1921. He was sheriff in Washtenaw County from 1927 to 1929, and after that was appointed city treasurer for two years. Until he became ill in September, he was employed by State Highway Department as highway inspector. Wurster was a lifelong resident, of Ann Arbor. Funeral services will he ne, at 2 p. m. Monday in the Bethlehem Church.

In spite of the telegraph strike the news was telegraphed to Jack Wurster at Ann Arbor and he took the first train for Cedar Rapids. The question which he ought to have asked years before now was put with desperate earnestness and it won the answer for which he pleaded. In order, however, to avoid a scene it was planned that she should attend the dinner which had been arranged by a number of friends in honor of herself and Mr. Winne, the groom-elect. When she sprang down the steps of her home and into the big motor car she entered into the fullness of her heart's greatest desire.

EARL GERALD MANN:

FOCUS - Mill's history spans the 20th century

In 1988 when E.G. Mann and Sons threw a picnic party to celebrate 50 years of the family's service to area farmers, more than 600 customers and friends joined the Mann's for food and fun. Back then, the future looked bright, with the family's fourth generation entering the business as Eric Mann graduated from Michigan State University. This past week, customers and friends came to the E. G. Mann and Sons mill and store on Boettner Road in Bridgewater to commiserate, reminisce, and buy. It was the last chance to get bulk fertilizer and other field applications, feeds, and farming essentials from the historic business, whose doors closed at the end of September.

Glen Mann, the family historian, talked to farmers outside the store as Vic Mann wrote out bulk fertilizer orders and Glen's wife Pat and their daughter Kerry Mann McGuire took care of customers looking for everything from bird feeders to cat toys. Kerry's brother Eric moved between store and mill, doing whatever needed doing. More than a few older men in farm boots hung around, the smiles on their faces bittersweet.

The closing of E. G. Mann and Sons marks the passing of an era that actually began in 1915. Back then, when Bridgewater was a daily stop on the New York Central rail line, Charles Schurer and William Rentschler built the first Bridgewater Elevator. Schurer and Rentschler were farmers, wool buyers and sellers, and entrepreneurs. They started the Bridgewater Bank, and Schurer continued to manage the elevator after 1918 when it became a farmers' cooperative, The Farmers Produce Company, consisting of 80 farmer stockholders.

Ernest G. Mann, Glen and Vic's grandfather, started working at the co-op in 1926. By 1927 he was the manager, so devoted to the mill and elevator operation that he moved from his farm, located in Freedom Township where Hickory Sticks Golf Course now stands, to Mr. Schurer's house in Bridgewater. By 1938, Mann was eager to branch out from bulk grains and standard milling operations. He proposed selling bagged feeds, but met with resistance from the other shareholders. August Henes and Ray Rentschler bought out the other elevator stockholders that same year. With a view to the future, and unbeknownst to the co-op shareholders, Mann rented the old dance hall located further north on Boettner Road, bought a new truck, and sent his son Earl (Vic and Glen's father) to Ohio for a load of bagged feeds. "When the guys at the mill saw Earl driving by in that new truck, they asked Ernest what Earl was doing," Glen said with a grin. "When my grandfather told them he was opening a feed store in the old dance hall, they said 'Come inside, we need to talk."

Ernest opened his feed store in the dance hall on Feb. 7, 1938. A week later, together with his sons Willard and Earl, he purchased Farmers Produce Co. and moved the bagged feed business to the company's current office and store location next to the elevator. So began the history of E. G. Mann and Sons. At that time, farmers were getting 88 cents a bushel for wheat; Mann & Sons charged 62 cents a bushel for corn and 48 cents a bushel for oats. Chicken feed was \$2.10 for a hundred pounds, 16% protein dairy cow feed cost \$1.90 for a hundred pounds, feed grade livestock salt was \$1.10 for a hundred pounds, and a five-seater Ford car could be bought for \$600-\$700, about the same amount a Model T cost in 1915 when the elevator was built. After only two years, the Mann's bought the Manchester Mill from William Blaess. Willard became the manager in Manchester, and took an active role in the business there until he retired in 1976.

In 1952, Ernest sold his portion of the business to his grandsons Glen and Vic. Willard's son Ron also became a shareholder. The company incorporated in 1963 with Earl and his wife Billie, and Willard and his wife Dorothy, as principal stockholders. When Earl died in 1968, Glen, Vic and their cousin Ron took over more shares.

Willard retired in 1976, and his stock in E.G. Mann and Sons was bought out by Billie, Glen and Vic. Ron Mann became owner of the Manchester Mill, running it as Mann's Feed Mill. "Mom did a lot of the bookkeeping and paperwork," Glen said. "She was here almost every day and was an important part of the business," just as Glen's wife Pat and their children, Eric and Kerry, became. "Mom and I work really well together," Kerry Mann McGuire proclaims. Together, they hope to open a retail and service business in Bridgewater, taking the king-of-the-counter cat, Waffles, to their new establishment. "He'll enjoy basking in the sun as well there as here, I imagine," Pat hopes.

While Vic Mann plans on managing a bagged feed and animal supplies business for Bridgewater Lumber, the other Mann's aren't sure what their future holds. Right now, Glen and Eric are looking forward to hunting season. "It's economics," Glen said in summary when explaining the family's decision to close now. Not only is the number of farms decreasing, but farm commodities themselves haven't kept pace with the rest of the country's economy. While land values and taxes increase, farm equipment prices rise, seed and fertilizer increase in cost, but the value of what the farmer produces hasn't risen proportionately.

In 1988 when spirits were high and the 50th anniversary picnic took place, oats were \$2 per bushel compared to 48 cents in '38, corn was \$2.39 per bushel compared to 62 cents fifty years before, and feed grade salt was \$9.90 for a hundred pounds, compared to \$1.10 when the company began.

On September 19, as the family contemplated the close of their four-generation mill, elevator, and store, corn was \$2.42 a bushel, just three cents more than 15 years before or just under four times the 1938 price; wheat was \$3.84 a bushel compared to the 88 cents it brought in '38, and oats were \$1.78 a bushel, just three and a half times the value 65 years ago. Putting that into perspective, if car prices rose at the same pace as grain, we would be able to buy a five-person car for somewhere between around \$2,000 to \$3,000 today.

With so much agricultural land now converted to smaller parcels and residential tracts, the need for a 70,000-bushel capacity elevator and bulk fertilizer and field applications in the immediate area has diminished almost as significantly as the price of automobiles has inflated. Unless someone takes over the elevator and mill with an eye to continuing the services E. G. Mann's provided, farmers will have to go further to fill their bulk grain and field application needs.

But, "there just aren't as many farms needing our services," Glen concludes. While the equipment and buildings that comprise E. G. Mann and Sons may fall under the auctioneer's gavel soon, the family's

pride in servicing the farm community for 65 years and four generations will not be so easily disbursed. The Mann family has earned a crucial place in the agricultural history of the area.

After 14 years serving as special assessment coordinator for the Washtenaw County Water Resources Commission, local resident Ron Mann is stepping down. I have a lot of things I would like to do and this affords me the ability to take some time for myself," he said. Mann, who was also recently elected to another four-year term as supervisor for Manchester Township, said his retirement from the county will allow him more time to spend in the township.

"I have worked two jobs for the last 20 years and the supervisor position has been a lot more demanding recently," he said. "I wouldn't say I will have more time, but by working one job, I can spend

less nights and Saturday mornings in the township office." Mann said over the years he has come to enjoy his responsibilities as a special assessment coordinator. "I enjoy working with the county and local units of government," he said. "I also enjoy working with people."

Mann said his interest in politics and a knack for crunching numbers led him to apply for the position over a decade ago. "With my assessment training in the township, this job fit right in," he said. "I've always been a numbers person and with my background, this jump seemed a logical step for me." However, he said he didn't expect to remain with the county as long as he has.

"I didn't figure I would be here for 14 years," he said. "The average person goes through seven different careers in their life; maybe I have a few more left." As an assessment coordinator, Mann is responsible for determining how to allocate the cost of sewer repairs to the county's 500 drain districts. "Anytime we do work on a drain -- from dredging to clearing out trees – the costs are appropriated to the district that the sewer is located in. Each year the Water Resources Commission handles \$1.5 to \$2 million in sewer work which is spread over 60 to 85,000 parcels of land and 100 districts.
