Mr. and Mrs. Hutzal had been well known residents of the city since coming here in 1900 from Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Surviving are three sons, Max H., and Victor C. Hutzal of Muncie, Hugo Hutzal of Waterbury, Connecticut; two daughters, Miss Melita Graf Hutzal, Miss Elizabeth Hutzal; three grandchildren, Mrs. Richard Post of Northampton, Massachusetts, Miss Hilda Hutzal, a student in the University of Munich in Germany, and Robert Hutzal of Muncie.

The body was removed to the Meeks mortuary where arrangements for the funeral services will be made today.

Mrs. Hutzal was born October 11, 1851, in Kirchheim, Wurtemberg, Germany, and was educated in a convent in Baden. She came to America in 1868, joining her brother, August Graf, who resided in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Until her marriage to Herman Hutzal in 1877, she was a teacher of German in private schools of Ann Arbor and Detroit. Her church membership was in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Ann Arbor until she became a resident of Muncie, after which she attended St. Johns Universalist Church.

Hermann Hutzal is a member of the firm of Hutzal & Co., plumbers, steam and gas fitters, and dealers in paints, oils and glass, their place of business being at No. 14 South Main Street, Ann Arbor.

Mr. Hutzel was born in this city April 5, 1850, his father being August F. Hutzel, and his mother Sophia (Mann) Hutzel. The mother emigrated to the United States in the year 1824 from Germany, coming to Michigan in 1829, and the father in 1836. They were married in Washtenaw County. Mr. Hutzel at that time being a trader and a practical business man, afterward went into the paints, oil and glass business in Ann Arbor until 1856, when he added a stock of groceries, continuing in the business until 1888, when he retired, transferring the business to his two sons. He died the same year, aged eighty-three. His wife still survives him and is now residing with her daughter at the old homestead. They were the parents of twelve children, eight of whom are living, six girls and two boys, Hermann being the eldest of the family.

Hermann Hutzel was educated in the schools of Ann Arbor, which, with the High School, have a very high standing. On leaving school he entered the store of his father as an assistant, afterward purchasing an interest in the same. In 1878 he added to his business piping, plumbing and steam supplies, not only doing business in Ann Arbor, but in different parts of the State, besides doing considerable in the building and construction of waterworks, chiefly the waterworks at Elgin, Illinois, and also at Streator. The Hutzel Bros. built the waterworks at Ann Arbor. Mr. Hutzel was married, in 1877, to Miss Paulina Graf, of Ann Arbor, daughter of Christian Graf. Six children have been the result of this union.

Our subject has always been a public-spirited man and has held many prominent offices. He was Alderman from the Second Ward for four years, member of the Board of Public Works two years and Vice President of the Allmandinger Piano and Organ Company. He and his wife are members of the Lutheran Church. In his political views he is an advocate of the Democratic Party. They reside in a handsome brick house on one of the finest streets of the city.

Muncie, Jan. 16, 1995 - The downtown Muncie building into which Christian Ministries of Delaware County recently moved has housed several organizations significant in local social and cultural history. Located on the southeast corner of Elm and Main Streets, the two-story brick structure is now covered with modern siding, so whether it has a capstone or cornerstone with a name and/or date can't be seen. Until a generation ago, the ground floor housed the offices, showroom and shops of Hutzel and Co., for two generations a major heating and plumbing contractor in Muncie and East Central Indiana. Hutzel & Co. opened in Muncie in 1900. Its founder was Herman Hutzel, who came here with his family from Ann Arbor, Michigan, where his grandparents, natives of Germany, were among the community's first residents.

A 1915-16 Muncie City Directory lists Herman and Max Hutzel as principals in the firm, although Max is listed as living in New Castle. There might have been a branch of the company there, and he later lived in Muncie. Herman Hutzel and his wife Pauline lived at 715 N. Elm St. There were two daughters: Elizabeth, who taught German in Muncie High School until the subject was discontinued at the outset of World War I, and then taught mathematics, and Melita, who was instructor in German at Muncie Normal Institute, a predecessor of Ball State University. Neither of the daughters ever married. In addition to Max, Hutzel sons included Victor, who in 1915-16 was listed as manager of Hutzel & Co., and Hugo, then not with the company. Herman Hutzel died in 1932. Victor Hutzel remained with the firm until his death nearly a generation later. Following the death of Max Hutzel in 1943, Hugo returned to Muncie after living in Buffalo, New York, Detroit and Kenosha, Wisconsin. In one of his positions he had headed the air conditioning division of the Nash-Kelvinator Co., manufacturers of automobiles and refrigeration equipment. An engineering graduate of the University of Michigan, he died in 1971 at age 82 after a number of years as head of Hutzel & Co.

The firm was engaged not only in domestic and commercial heating and plumbing (and, later, air conditioning) projects but also in major construction. Plumbing and heating systems installed in Ball State buildings from its beginning as a teacher's college in the 1920s until the late 1950s were done by Hutzel; one of the last major projects was Woodworth Residence Halls, completed in 1956. According to Royce Lewis of Muncie, who was with the firm for a number of years beginning soon after Max Hutzel's death, the firm was sold to another company in 1962. But the acquisition did not work out, and a few years later Tibbetts Inc., an Ohio-based mechanical contractor, acquired Hutzel & Co.

Robert Hutzel, son of Max Hutzel, might be the only third-generation survivor of the Hutzel family. A graduate in 1937 of Burris High School and later of the United States Naval Academy, he was a commissioned officer in the Navy through World War II and for many years afterward. Now retired, he lives in Arlington, Virginia.

Max, Victor and Hugo Hutzel were also involved in an organization that in the 1930s and '40s was

located on the second floor of their building: The Muncie Club. A social organization of several dozen Muncie businessmen, the club was founded early in the 20th century and met in the Anthony Block, northwest corner of Jackson and Walnut Streets. From there it moved to the second floor of the Arcade Block, on the northwest corner of Main and Elm Streets, and then it moved to the Hutzel Building. In the late 1940s it built its own building across Main Street to the east, and it remains there today. During its stay in the Hutzel Building (and for several years after it moved), The Muncie Club's food and bar service was supervised by Lee Ton, a gentleman of Chinese descent who had the rather ornate title of chef steward. Noon and evening meals were served, and on Sunday nights through World War II, family dinners were held. The club staff included Reuben Poole, who took, over management following Lee Ton's death; Kenneth Ivy and Mary Helen Thomas. Its operation was characteristic of clubs in much larger cities.

Succeeding the club in the Hutzel Building was Muncie Amvets Post 12, a veteran's group newly formed after World War II. The post remained there for a few years before moving to its longtime location at 3421 S. Walnut St. Then in the 1960s along came the Children's Playhouse, a theater organization founded by Irene Belcher in the late 1930s and operated by her and her husband, longtime Muncie firefighter Aaron Belcher. The playhouse had been in several downtown locations, including east of the courthouse on Walnut Street and in the Commercial Club building on the northeast corner of Jefferson and Main streets. The Hutzel Building was its last location. The theater group disbanded in the late 1960s, but the Belchers remained active with Muncie Civic Theatre, where he was technical director for several years, for the balance of their lives. Numerous businesses have occupied the ground floor of the Hutzel in recent years, including Indiana Dearing Co., Fire Equipment Service Co. and the Pittsburgh Paint Center. Wiley W. McDavitt, minister of St. Johns Universalist Church, officiating. The body of Mr. Hutzel will be cremated and the ashes interred at Ann Arbor, Michigan. Mr. Hutzel was president of Hutzel and Company, plumbing and heating concern, which he founded in 1900, coming here from his birthplace, Ann Arbor, in that year. He was one of the city's most widely respected business men.

Richmond, Indiana, July 28, 1917 - Charles Davis, 45 years old, foreman of the steam fitters for Hutzel and Co., plumbers of Muncie, was fatally injured, and Victor Hutzel, 26, a member of the Hutzel firm, and Albert Glaser, 25, a contractor, also of Muncie, were cut and bruised when an automobile in which they were driving overturned two miles northwest of here at 8 o'clock, this afternoon.

Davis's abdomen was lacerated, exposing; the intestines which could not be returned to their normal position despite the efforts of three physicians. Death occurred at 7:20 o'clock tonight. Relatives in Muncie have been notified. Davis was taken to the Reid Memorial Hospital here, to which place Hutzel and Glaser were taken to have their injuries dressed. Both of the latter were able to leave the hospital immediately.

Glaser sustained a deep cut on the cheek and Hutzel suffered minor cuts and bruises about the body. The trio was returning to Muncie from Eaton, Ohio, in the Hutzel truck, where the men are employed on the construction of the Preble County courthouse. Davis held the wheel while Hutzel, who was driving, lighted his pipe. In going around a curve, Hutzel suddenly grasped at the wheel, and the car swerved from the road and off an embankment. The windshield brace pierced Davis's abdomen. Davis ran a distance of 100 yards to a nearby house, supporting his intestines in his arms.
