Enoch Dieterle, 64, of 300 South Revena Blvd., retired funeral director and a lifelong resident of this city, died Sunday morning August 4, 1929 at his summer cottage at Whitmore Lake, after a lingering illness. He was born March 30, 1865, in Ann Arbor, where he later established a funeral home, remaining in this business until 10 years ago. He was a member of Zion Lutheran church, and the church brotherhood. Mr. Dieterle was a charter member and director of Schwaben Verein, and also was affiliated with B. P. O. Elks, No. 325 of Ann Arbor, Arbeiter Verein, and Michigan Undertakers association.

He is survived by his wife, Lydia Fiegel Dieterle; four brothers, Godfrey of Manchester, William of Detroit, Henry of Dexter and August of Baltimore, Md.; a sister, Dr. Anna Dieterle of Ann Arbor, and several nephews and nieces.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 Tuesday afternoon at the residence and at 3 o'clock at Zion Lutheran church. Rev. E. C. Stelhorn will officiate. Interment will be in Bethlehem Cemetery.

Past and Present of Washtenaw County, Michigan by Samuel W. Beakes, Chicago: The S.J. Clarke Publishing Co., 1906:

William G. Dieterle. The large furniture and undertaking establishment of \V which our subject is proprietor, is located in the city of Ann Arbor, and here may be found the most skilled products from the hands of the best workmen. In spite of his name, which proclaims him to be of Teutonic origin, our subject was born in Grand Rapids, Michigan, September 23, 1866. He is the second son of Adam and Christina (Meier) Dieterle, both of whom are natives of Germany. Our subject's parents came to the United States from their native land in 1846 and located at Grand Rapids. The father was a cooper by trade, which he followed as long as he was in the above named city. When our subject was three years old his parents removed to Ann Arbor, where the youth was educated in the common schools of the city. After finishing his educational course he was apprenticed to John Keck & Co., cabinetmakers. He remained with them for two years, and then returned to his native place where he entered the employ of Burkey & Gay, manufacturers of furniture. He remained with them for eighteen months and at the expiration of that time returned to Ann Arbor, and was again in the employ of the gentleman with whom he learned his trade. After remaining two years with Messrs. Keck & Co., Mr. Dieterle, who had been able to accumulate some capital by his prudent ways and industry, went to Manchester, Washtenaw County, where he purchased a stock of furniture and embarked in business on his own account. After remaining there for four years, during which time he purchased the outfit of two other furniture establishments, he sold out his entire business and went to Detroit, where he again entered the employ of his old employer, Mr. Keck, who had established himself at that place. Our subject remained with the firm in Detroit until it closed its doors and then returned to Ann Arbor, purchasing the stock of John Muehlig, and continuing the business at the same stand for five years. At the expiration of that time he removed his stock to his present store, which is located at No. 37, S. Main Street. Here lie keeps a full and well-selected stock of furniture of the latest and most artistic designs. His store room is 22x120 feet in dimensions, reaching from street to alley, and is three stories in height, all of which room he uses to its fullest capacity in his business. Mr. Dieterle is genial and popular, and his patronage is among the best people of this portion of the country. He was married in 1880 to Miss Christina Keck, of Manchester, a niece of John Keck, with whom he had been so long in business. She was born in Washtenaw County, and her parents were formerly from Germany. The home is brightened by the presence of two attractive children, a daughter and son, who are named respectively Emma and William. While in Manchester, Mr. Dieterle served one term as Alderman, and has occupied the same official position, representing the First Ward in this city. He ran as a candidate for County Clerk and was defeated by a very small majority. Their pleasant residence is located at No. 38, Fourth Avenue, and it is as attractive in the surroundings as it is neat and comfortable in its interior arrangements.

Arthur M. Smith was born September 19, 1903 in Scott, Indiana the son of Ora Lynn and Genevieve Mumford Smith His father was a country lawyer. He attended public schools in Webster Township and Ithaca Michigan and graduated from high school in 1920. He attended the University of Michigan and received an AB degree in 1924 and his LL.B. at the law school of the same institution in 1926. In the same year he was admitted to the Michigan and Illinois bars June 14, 1926. Art Smith married Elizabeth Barbara Allan. They had two children Arthur Allan a lawyer and Caroll Jean (Mrs. Dwight A. Lewis). He had five grandchildren and was a devoted grandfather.

Smith commenced the practice of patent law in Chicago with the firm of Williams, Bradbury, McCaleb & Hinkle, where he stayed until 1929. While there he attended some classes at the Armour Institute of Technology and the University of Chicago. He then moved to Detroit where he practiced general and patent law with the firm of Wiley, Streeter, Smith & Ford as employee and partner until 1931. He then opened his own office in Detroit, practicing by himself until 1933 when he joined the firm of Dike, Calver & Gray, which was succeeded by Gray & Smith until 1946. He then forsook the big city and opened his own office in nearby Dearborn conveniently located near his home in Inkster, Michigan his

successive partnerships being Smith & Olsen; Smith, Olsen & Kotts; Smith, Olsen, Lewis & McRae (Lewis was his son-in-law) and Smith, Wilson, Lewis & McRae.

The Smiths lived in Ford country in a marvelously well-constructed house which was one of those which Henry Ford had built for some of his supervisory personnel in his paternalistic fashion demanding the best workmanship. The Smiths became well acquainted with Henry Ford's widow. Arthur collected books about Henry Ford and liked to tell stories about him.

From 1951 through 1959 Arthur Smith lectured on patent law at the University of Michigan Law School, as a result of which he produced first and second editions (1954 and 1964) of his "Patent Law, Cases, Comments & Materials." Another of his well-known writings is "The Art of Writing Readable Patents," done for the Practising Law Institute in 1958.

The nomination of Arthur Smith to be a CCPA judge came about in a strange way. The organized patent bar had recommended a list of patent lawyers to the Administration and Smith was on the list but another man, from Chicago, was initially selected and had neared the end of the selection process at which an FBI check was being run. When Smith heard that he said, "Well I guess that's it." He was in Washington at the time and returned to Dearborn thinking it was all over. Much to his surprise he heard a few days later that the President would like to nominate him. The Chicago man had been the victim of some politically troubling publicity in the Chicago papers which in no way reflected on his qualifications and the Administration decided to drop him and go to the next man on the list.

President Eisenhower sent the nomination of Arthur Smith to the Senate on March 25, 1959, and at the same time nominated Associate Judge Eugene Worley (a Democrat) to be Chief Judge thereby getting credit for nominating at least one judge from the other party. The Senate confirmed both on April 29. On May 4 a regular court hearing day, there was a joint swearing in ceremony in the IRS building courtroom. Mr. Justice Tom Clark had been invited to administer the oath to Judge Worley a fellow Texan. Retired Judge Joe Jackson initially presided since there was no Chief Judge and Acting Chief Judge O Connell (by seniority) had been home ill, or at least away since December 4. Justice Clark first swore in Judge Worley, Judge Jackson holding the Bible thereby creating the Chief Judge who was to hold the office until June 1972. Then Judge Worley administered the oath to Arthur Smith, Judge Rich putting his robe on him. A recess was then declared and the new judges held a reception in the courtroom for their friends. When the guests had departed the court returned to the bench and proceeded with the hearing of arguments in three cases. Judge Jackson sat too to make a fifth because although a vacancy had just been filled an active judge was on the sick list a judge who never returned but whose letter of retirement was not forwarded to the President until April 10, 1962 nearly 3 years later 3 years and 4 months after his last sitting and 8 years after he had become eligible to retire on full pay.

Judge Smith's principal hobby was being a Lincoln scholar. In Michigan he was a member of the Abraham Lincoln Civil War Round Table and in Washington he was a member of the Lincoln Group of Washington and its Vice President 1963-64. He was a member of the speakers bureau of the Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission. His library contained a considerable quantity of Lincoln material and he was particularly interested in Lincoln's relation to the patent system as a patentee himself and as author of the words inscribed on the Commerce Building where the Patent Office long had its home stating that "The Patent System Added the Fuel of Interest to the Fire of Genius".

Judge Smith was also active in the Metropolitan Methodist Church and a former trustee of the Methodist Union of Greater Detroit. He was an ardent gardener and considered himself just a country boy. One opinion he particularly enjoyed writing is in the case of *In re Le Grice* 49 CCPA 1124 301 F 2d 929 133 USPQ 365 (1962) having to do with the patenting of a rose plant but involving questions of patent law which were of greater importance later, in the field of chemical patents. It is a long opinion including some poetry. He somehow managed to find the rose involved in the case on the market and planted some bushes in his front yard.

As a member of the Court, Judge Smith took a very active interest in improvements such as the reproduction equipment and court procedures. In February 1965, he went out to sit with the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals and brought back an idea for a written vote sheet to improve upon the system of deciding cases only at conferences. It revolutionized the court's way of doing things and speeded up the decision process. With improvements it is still in use and is a great time saver. Before coming to the court he had become interested in the court's constitutional status through the Michigan Patent Law Association and when the question came up in the Supreme Court he played a very active role in procuring the filing of an amicus brief on behalf of the court. This subject is detailed in the next chapter

entitled, "The Article III Episode".

Judge Smith's last case was one of some fame involving a computerized method of analyzing gas mixtures *In re Prater* 56 CCPA 1360 415 F 2d 1378 159 USPQ 583 (1968). It was argued in May 1968 and handed down the day Judge Smith died November 20, 1968. In other words it had gone over the summer. Although a majority had joined the Smith opinion the Chief Judge was trying to have it reargued but a majority would not agree and so on November 20 it was still hung up. On learning that Judge Smith had died at 4:00 AM the Chief Judge decided to hand the case down without voting on it himself and appended his two paragraph opinion in which he began by saying.

This appeal was argued May 9, 1968 and assigned to Judge Smith to write the opinion for the court. Although Judge Smith had been strongly advised by his doctors to restrict his activities he continued with the wholehearted dedication so typical of him to rewrite and revise an opinion dealing with one of the most technical legal matters ever appealed to this court.

To set the record straight the statement about doctors having advised Judge Smith to restrict his activities which makes it appear that he was a sick man was entirely false. On the authority of his wife he had not been consulting doctors and as far as anyone knew he was well. He died suddenly in his sleep of a coronary occlusion at the age of 65 to the surprise of everyone particularly of the present writer who spent the 19th of November lunching and working with him and spoke to him on the evening of that day by phone. It had been a tense day over problems involving his *Prater* case created by the Chief Judge but he seemed to be retiring in the evening in a contented state of mind.

Funeral services were held in the Metropolitan Methodist Church on November 21, with a large crowd of admirers in attendance. His wife, children and mother survived him. His present and former law clerks were his pallbearers. Interment was in Dearborn.

Richard Van Akkeren Dieterle passed away after a difficult battle with cancer at his beloved Ann Arbor Township farm on February 28, 2012, surrounded by family and friends. He was born in Ann Arbor on December 24, 1941 to Jennie Van Akkeren Dieterle and Robert Richard Dieterle. Richard is survived by his wife, Karen L. Hertenstein, daughter, Elizabeth Caroline Dieterle of Phoenix, Arizona, son, Carl Jarrett Dieterle of Washington D.C., and sister, Caroline Dieterle of Iowa City, Iowa. He is also survived by three precious grandchildren, Alexander, Mila and Eva Srejcic of Phoenix, as well as a cousin, Richard (Carroll) Walterhouse of Ann Arbor.

Richard spent his childhood days playing with the children of farm neighbors, hunting small game after school and riding Silver, his strawberry roan pony. He attended the one-room Foster School, which was within walking distance of his farm, until middle school, when it was closed and the students were incorporated into the Ann Arbor Public School District. Richard loved to share memories of his rural upbringing. He met his lifelong friends Lloyd Braun and Al Honke on the junior high school bus. High school days brought more hunting, running track (hurdles) and becoming an outstanding student of German, as well as a violinist. He graduated with a degree in Anthropology before enrolling in the University of Michigan's Medical School, from which he graduated in 1969. This was also the year he started The RFD Boys, a bluegrass band in which he was the fiddle player and emcee. He served as a Major in the United States Air Force at Wright Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, O.H. from 1973-75.

In 1975, Richard returned to live at his childhood farm and began working in the Pathology Department at Allegiance Healthcare System (formerly Foote Hospital) in Jackson, Michigan. Richard enjoyed his physician colleagues and was forever inspired by the lab personnel he had the privilege to work with during those years. Richard was known for his on-stage comedic humor and his extraordinary sense of timing as the RFD Boys' emcee. His last, and proudest, contribution to the art form was an instrumental bluegrass CD of his own compositions, which he completed weeks before his death.

August 7, 2011 - Downtown Royal Oak gets a lot of attention, but new schools superintendent Shawn Lewis-Lakin believes "the strength of Royal Oak is really the residential neighborhoods." Lewis-Lakin and his wife, Barbara, moved into Royal Oak in mid-July from Chelsea, Michigan. He has spent much of the summer listening and learning from the school district's stakeholders. He's been talking with civic leaders, parents, teachers, students and staff members in all categories, saying you can "do more when everyone works together." Lewis-Lakin said he's thrilled to be part of the Royal Oak community and believes strong neighborhoods are intertwined with public education. "You need both to be vital and viable," he said. "I've always believed education is the backbone of strong communities." Lewis-Lakin said he is always looking to the community for ways to improve student learning in the classroom, which is where he began his career.

After he graduated from Michigan State University in 1982, he taught chemistry in the Midland Public School District. "I was in my 20s, and at the time, Midland (home to Dow Chemical Co.) had the highest number of Ph.D. chemists per capita," he said. Lewis-Lakin joked that he felt pressure to make sure he graded homework properly. After teaching for three years, he decided to go back to school, getting a Master of Divinity degree from Yale Divinity School in New Haven, Connecticut. As an ordained minister, Lewis-Lakin honed his listening skills while serving as a pastor for United Methodist Church congregations for nine years.

"I have three kids — Peter, Abby and Kate," he said. "When I was a pastor (in the late '80s and '90s), I was always busy in the evenings, on weekends and holidays — the times when my kids were home." He wanted to spend more time with his children, so he went back into education. In 2000, he earned a degree from Wayne State University as an educational specialist. "I felt my work as a pastor taught me leadership qualities, and I wanted to move into a leadership role in education," he said. "But before I did that, I wanted to reimmerge myself in the classroom."

Lewis-Lakin took a teaching position in Trenton, where he taught middle school science for three years (1997-2000). From Trenton, he moved to assistant principal roles in Monroe (2000-01) and Chelsea (2001-03). In Chelsea, he moved up to the position of executive director for student performance, where he led administrators, teachers and support staff in reviewing curriculum, measuring student academic performance and expanding advanced-placement offerings.

In 2007, Lewis-Lakin became the superintendent of schools in Washtenaw County's Manchester Community School District. He credits that community for helping him to "be a better leader." Manchester has a student population of 1,200. There are 5,200 students in Royal Oak schools. "Royal Oak is a great place," Lewis-Lakin said. He said is impressed with test results coming out of the schools, noting the district has some of the strongest student performance results in southern Oakland County. He's also impressed with the staff, many of whom are in new leadership roles, including new principals at the middle school and four of the elementary schools.

"The transition is going smoothly," he said, adding that many staff who have left the district are providing positive support. "Continuity is important, but new people bring a fresh perspective." Budget

concerns will continue to be an issue. He noted the district has faced challenges directly in the past and made difficult choices, but there are still many tough decisions to be made. "The community needs to appreciate that decisions made in Lansing have a real and significant impact on what happens in Royal Oak," he said. "There needs to be a commitment at the state level to value and invest in education." The new superintendent said that with every decision he makes, he asks himself, "Is this the best investment for student learning?"

Expect to see Lewis-Lakin and his wife, who works with families and couples at Samaritan Counseling Center in Farmington Hills, present in the community. The superintendent loves sports and plans to be visible at athletic events. The former track and swimming coach also plans to participate in the Detroit Free Press half marathon in October. Lewis-Lakin said he also has a great appreciation for the performing arts. All three of his children played instruments in high school. Daughter Abby, 20, is studying music education at the University of Michigan.

His son, Peter, 28, is an attorney working for the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office, and his youngest daughter, Kate, 18, is studying politics and government at Ohio Wesleyan University. Look for the new superintendent to be out and about at the Woodward Avenue Dream Cruise, too. The Lewis-Lakins purchased a home near Woodward Avenue and plan to check out the annual parade of classic cars on Aug. 20. "I used to have a 1994 Mazda Miata, but I sold it," Lewis-Lakin said. His current vehicle is more than 10 years old, so look for him as a spectator — not behind the wheel, he said.

January 24, 2017 – Royal Oak - Shawn Lewis-Lakin received a calling this summer that is moving him toward a new life path. Lewis-Lakin, 57, announced last week that he will retire from his position of superintendent of Royal Oak Schools effective June 30, 2017 to begin a new role serving as the senior associate pastor at Birmingham First United Methodist Church effective July 1. Lewis-Lakin said that since August, he has been engaged in a process focused on returning to full-time service in the church.

He has been an ordained United Methodist clergyman for nearly 30 years, serving as a lead pastor at both Pontiac St. James and Trenton First, and an associate pastor at Dearborn First United Methodist Church. He has also worked as a teacher and school administrator in Trenton, Monroe, Chelsea, Manchester and Royal Oak. A bulletin distributed by Birmingham First United Methodist Church states, "The timing of our needs at Birmingham First to find a senior associate pastor with strengths in human resources and administrative functions of the church, and Shawn's desire to combine both his call to pastoral ministry and his experience in organizational leadership and administration has truly been a movement by God's Holy Spirit."

Lewis-Lakin is a graduate of Michigan State University and also received his master of divinity degree from Yale University. In addition, he has an educational specialist degree in general administration and supervision from Wayne State University. "While I am excited about the new opportunity, this announcement is bittersweet," Lewis-Lakin said. "For nearly six years, Royal Oak has been my home. Our district employees, students, families and the community of Royal Oak will always be special to me. "Together, we have taken great strides towards making Royal Oak Schools a true community of excellence."

Lewis-Lakin said that every stakeholder involved in the district has done good work together to inspire learning, creativity and better prepare Royal Oak students for college and careers. "I have truly appreciated the opportunity to serve as superintendent," he said. "It is difficult to leave when there is such good people and such good work that is happening." Lewis-Lakin said he will remain committed to the district and his role through the end of the 2016-17 school year. Lewis-Lakin said he is going with certainty and excitement into his new opportunity, but there is sadness in leaving; however, the superintendent said he knows the district is in good hands. "I have a lot of confidence in the commitment and the capacity of our school board and our district leadership team to move through this transition — not just successfully — but in a way that actually leads us to a better place in the district and community moving forward," he said. Lewis-Lakin said the process to find his replacement is fully engaged.

"On behalf of the Royal Oak Schools Board of Education, we congratulate superintendent Lewis-Lakin and thank him for his hard work, dedication and service on behalf of Royal Oak Schools, students and families," school board President Deb Anderson said in a statement. "As we wish him the best in his future endeavors, we remain proud of the work we have accomplished together. "We have a strong foundation in place and we will continue to reach for the standard of excellence Royal Oak families demand and deserve as we begin the search for our next superintendent."
