Christian Eberbach, druggist, Ann Arbor, was born in Germany in 1817, and is a son of Joseph E. and Henricka Eberbach. In 1838, and in his 21st year, Christian crossed the Atlantic, and landed at New York, coming directly to Ann Arbor, where he has since resided. From 1838 to 1841 he was employed as clerk in a drug store owned by William S. Maynard. In 1843 he married Margaret Laubengayer, and 8 children have been born to them, 6 of whom survive. Ottmar, who married Katy Haller, daughter of Jacob Haller, received his preliminary education in Ann Arbor, and subsequently graduated from a foreign university, Edward, who married Mattie Bodwell, Mary, wife of Charles Klotz, a resident of Canada, Ernest, Clara and Willie. One son died at the age of 20, and 1 child in infancy. Two of the sons, Edward and Ernest, are engaged in the hardware business in Ann Arbor.

The majestic towered mansion on Woodlawn just north of Packard has piqued the curiosity of passersby for decades. What is it doing in this modest residential neighborhood? Named Woodlawn, it was the country estate of Christian Eberbach, Ann Arbor pharmacist, businessman, and politician. He built the house between 1861 and 1866, when this stretch of Packard was still an unpaved country road. Today there are three houses between the mansion and Packard, set on what was originally Eberbach's front lawn. An orchard, flower gardens, and a working farm stretched back behind the house, across where Forest and Olivia now run, filling the entire area bracketed today by Wells and Granger as far as Burns Park Elementary School.

Born in Stuttgart, Eberbach emigrated to America as a young man. When he arrived in Ann Arbor in 1838, Eberbach was just twenty-one. But he had already apprenticed for three years with an apothecary and studied chemistry for two at the Stuttgart Polytechnicum, making him Ann Arbor's first trained pharmacist. He found his first job here at William Maynard's general store on the corner of Main and Huron, working as a clerk and preparing medicines prescribed by local doctors. By 1843 he was ready to go into business for himself. He opened Washtenaw County's first drugstore in a small frame building on Huron across from the courthouse. He quickly outgrew the space and joined with confectioner Herman

Schlak to build a commercial block on Main Street between Huron and Washington.

Just three years later, Eberbach took a partner, his cousin, Emanuel Mann, son of Jonathan Mann, one of Ann Arbor's original German settlers. The two built a store next door at 112 South Main Street (now Mayer-Schairer office supplies) and remained together for twenty-eight years. Open to new kinds of medicine, Eberbach knew about homeopathy because of his work in Germany. He also was a customer and advocate of Dr. Alvin Wood Chase. Eberbach did not limit himself to his pharmacy; he had many other business and civic interests. In 1857 he and Mann and another relative, August Hutzel, started the Hutzel plumbing company next door to the pharmacy at 114 South Main (now also part of Mayer-Schairer). He was among the founders of the Ann Arbor Savings Bank and of Bethlehem Church of Christ and a member of the relief fire department. He was a musician and singer. (His son and grandson would become active in the University Musical Society.) But his greatest interest was Republican politics.

Eberbach started out as a Whig, supporting presidential candidate William H. Harrison in 1840. After the demise of the Whig Party, he took part in the 1854 convention in Jackson that formally launched the Republican Party. Local Republicans began hanging out in a little room behind Eberbach and Mann's pharmacy to discuss the issues of the day. In 1864, Eberbach was a member of the Electoral College that re-elected the nation's first Republican president, Abraham Lincoln.

In 1868, Eberbach ran for office himself. He was elected mayor of Ann Arbor but lost his bid for re-election the next year. According to a memorial talk given after his death, he was rejected after "a gallant fight to drive the hogs and cows from the streets but the people believed that the experience was contrary to the principles of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution." Eberbach was paid a gold dollar for his year's service. His great-grandson, Robert Eberbach, still has it.

The same year Eberbach opened his store, he married Margaret (sometimes referred to as Margaretha) Laubengayer, who had been born near Stuttgart and immigrated with her family to a farm in Scio Township. During the years Eberbach was establishing his business, the family lived in a brick house on West Washington in a spot now part of the Brown Block parking lot. In 1861, he decided to move to the country, where the air was better. He chose the site on Packard because it was still close enough to town that his children (he had eight, five of whom lived to adulthood) could go to Ann Arbor schools.

The grand house, solidly constructed with 15-inch walls, took more than five years to build. (The builders spent one year just waiting for the basement to settle after replacing a bed of quicksand with lime and cement.) The house was in the Italian Villa style and included a high tower reminiscent of German castles. It was said that you could see Ypsilanti from it on a clear day. Eberbach used the tower as an observation post to oversee his farm workers and also as a playroom for his children. The interior of the house boasts the finest 1860's craftsmanship: carved woodwork, fireplaces, and four-over-four windows. Upstairs were five bedrooms (one since converted into a bathroom) and downstairs the kitchen, pantry, dining room, and library, and a parlor large enough to be divided into two rooms by folding wood doors. The basement included a large vaulted brick storeroom and a smokehouse. Except for the former servants' quarters, usually rented out as a separate apartment, the house has remained a single-family home since it was built.

In 1874 Emanuel Mann retired and Eberbach's oldest son, Ottmar, became his father's partner. Ottmar was well prepared, having studied science and pharmacy in Stuttgart and Tübingen in addition to working in the drugstore. He convinced his father to expand the business to supplying, and sometimes manufacturing, chemicals and lab equipment. That business continues to this day. Germany at that time was the leading manufacturer of scientific instruments. Since Ottmar spoke German and had both scientific training and good connections there, he was in a perfect position to be an importer. Eberbach and Son grew to serve industrial labs, schools, and hospitals all over the world.

Christian Eberbach stayed active in the firm until six months before he died in 1901 at age eighty-four. He remained a loyal Republican to the end. As he lay on his deathbed, wracked with pain from spinal problems caused by lower-body paralysis, his doctor told him that he himself would almost be willing to assume the pain if it would relieve Eberbach. Eberbach replied that he wouldn't want anyone else to suffer so. Then, after thinking a minute, he reconsidered. "Yes, I would too. If you could only take it away and give it to that rascal Czolgosz, I would be glad." He was referring to Leon Czolgosz, the anarchist who had fatally shot President McKinley earlier that month.

Margaret Eberbach remained in the house until her death in 1908. The year before she died, the

surrounding property was subdivided into eighty-one house lots and annexed to the city. In 1913 the school board bought the property on the corner of Wells and Forest for a new seventh ward school, to be named after Ottmar, who had served for twenty-one years on the school board. (The school was later replaced by what is now Burns Park school; the building on Wells and Forest burned down in 1971.) Ottmar Eberbach held on to his parents' house until his own death in 1922, but he didn't live there. Back in 1883, he had built himself a house downtown at 402 South Fourth Avenue (now part of the Beer Depot). Until World War I, the Eberbach estate was looked after by a resident caretaker. The war cut off the Eberbach company's supply of glass beakers, all of which were made in one village in Germany. Before the U.S. entered the war, Ottmar brought one of the German glassblowers to America to make the beakers here, housing him and his family in splendor in the vacant house.

After Ottmar died, the house was sold to state senator George McCallum, who did a major remodeling, putting in a new furnace, modern plumbing, electricity, and hardwood floors. The business stayed in the Eberbach family through two more generations, passing to Ottmar's son Oscar and then to Oscar's son Robert, both of whom studied chemistry at the U-M. Gradually the lab equipment supply and manufacturing business became bigger than the retail pharmacy. As Robert Eberbach put it, "The tail began to wag the dog."

In 1909 they had moved from Main Street to a four-story building on Liberty at Fourth. By the time that building was demolished in 1971 to make way for the Federal Building, the three parts of the business had already been separated, in what Robert Eberbach calls a "reverse merger." Eberbach Corporation, the manufacturing division, had moved in 1951 to 505 South Maple. It's still there under the same name, although Robert, the last Eberbach in the firm, retired in 1980. The supplier division was sold to Will Scientific in 1961, and the retail pharmacy was sold in 1969. The Eberbach mansion is today owned by John and Christa Williams. After they bought it in 1987, they did a major restoration to bring it back to its former glory, adding a garage designed to look like an old carriage house. The house is basically the same inside as in Eberbach's day, albeit with modern amenities. During the Eberbach occupancy, the house was a wonderful place for holiday gatherings and musical evenings. The Williamses continue the tradition: last year they hosted a Robert Burns evening for forty people in the double parlor.

1115 Woodlawn Street, Ann Arbor - Christian Eberbach House, 1863-69. Constructed in the 1860s, this former farmhouse was beyond the southern limits of the city. The site was chosen so Christian Eberbach's children could benefit from an education in Ann Arbor and still enjoy the healthful air and active life of the countryside. Eberbach was already a trained pharmacist when he came to this country in 1838 at the age of 21. At first he worked in the W.S. Maynard store, but in 1842 he founded Eberbach and Company to manufacture articles sold by pharmacists and opened the Eberbach Drug Store on Main Street.

A pioneer of great industry, he not only presided over his successful pharmaceutical enterprises and a productive farm, but was also a founder of the Hutzel Plumbing Company and the Ann Arbor Savings Bank. An early organizer of the Republican Party, he was a member of the Electoral College which confirmed Abraham Lincoln's election. Christian and his wife, Margaretha (Laubengayer), had eight children, of whom five lived to maturity.

The house is Ann Arbor's best example of the Italianate Villa style, a T-shape with a three-story tower rising directly over the front entry. From the second floor a narrow winding staircase led to the children's playroom at the top. The windows exhibit formal treatment with characteristic Italianate corbeled brick crowns, but both the segmental shape of the crowns and the inset wooden enframements reflect Eberbach's German origins in use of the Rundbogenstil motif.

In one of the upstairs bedrooms there is a marble fireplace featuring a scroll keystone and panels with bas relief floral patterns. Under the parlor end of the house a large vaulted brick storeroom kept the grains and fruits of the harvest. Built in at one end is a brick chimney originally used for smoking hams.

Ottmer Eberbach - The gentleman whose name is at the head of this sketch, is without doubt one of the most skillful pharmacists in the city of Ann Arbor. He is a native of this place, being born November 25, 1845. He is the oldest living son of Christian and Margaret (Laubengayer) Eberbach, of whom a more complete history will be given below. Ottmer was educated as far as the rudiments are concerned in the Ann Arbor City schools which he attended sixteen years of age. And then taking a trip to Europe, he entered the Polytechnic School, at Stuttgart, and later in Tuebingen pursued his studies for three years, during which time he paid particular attention to botany, chemistry and the natural sciences. After a delightful course in the German colleges in which he profited much by the thorough methods there employed and the practical demonstration in the laboratories of the studies of which he made a specialty, Mr. Eberbach returned to Ann Arbor and entered his father's store, he being engaged in the drug business. In 1874 he formed a partnership with his father, and the business was carried on under the firm name of Eberbach & Son, and so harmonious have the business arrangements of the firm been conducted, that the partnership has continued until the present time. In the early part of his experience as a druggist, our subject acquainted himself thoroughly with Materia Medica and chemistry, and was one of the first to agitate the question of legislation for regulating the practice of pharmacy in the State, resulting in the passage of the Pharmacy Law in 1885.

The original of our sketch was married November 3, 1870, to Miss Catherine Haller, of Ann Arbor. The lady is a native of Germany, but came to Ann Arbor when a young lady; she is a daughter of Jacob Haller. This couple have had five children, who are by name: Otilie, Emily, Oscar A., Elsie A. and Carl W. Mr. Eberbach was appointed by Gov. Alger, a member of the State Board of Pharmacy, which office he still holds, having been reappointed by Gov. Luce, and being one of the Examiners of the Board. Our subject is the owner of a fine home located on Fourth Avenue. His residence was built in 1883, and is one of the finest in the city. He is a Republican in politics.

It will not be out of place to here give a short sketch of the parents of Mr. Eberbach. Christian Eberbach, the senior member of the firm of druggists of that name, was born in Stuttgart, Wurtemberg, Germany, July 25, 1817. He is the son of Joseph and Wilhelmina Eberbach, and was the fourth in order of birth of seven children. He attended school in his native country until fourteen years of age, and was then apprenticed to an apothecary for three years, being two years assistant. From the age of nineteen to twenty-one he was engaged as a student at the Polytechnicum in which he made a study of chemistry. After that he spent one season with a Homeopathic physician and prepared for him his medicines.

At the age of twenty-one Christian Eberbach, in accordance with the common laws of Germany was obliged to submit to military conscription, but succeeded in being exempted from such duty, and in 1838 he came to the United States, and for three years was engaged as a clerk. Then he established himself in Ann Arbor as a dispensing druggist, and has here made his home ever since. He was married in 1843, to Margaret Laubengayer. By her he has become the father of eight children, whose names are as follows: Carl, Ottmer, Edward, Ernest, Marie, Alfred, Clara and William. Christian Eberbach has been Mayor of Ann Arbor, and filled the position acceptably throughout his term of office. He has never belonged to any secret society but in early days belonged to the fire department.

Eberbach & Sons, druggists, 11 S. Main Street, Ann Arbor, are among the leading drug houses of Southern Michigan. The business was established in this city in 1843, where Christian Eberbach, senior member of the firm, began in a small way in the drug trade. In 1848 Emanuel Mann was admitted into partnership, the firm being Eberbach & Co., for a period of 28 years. At this latter time Mr. Mann withdrew from the firm, and Ottmar Eberbach, a son of Christian, was admitted as full partner, and the firm name changed to Eberbach & Son.

Ottmar Eberbach is a gentleman of culture and rare business talents, who spent his youthful days in the Ann Arbor schools, and ultimately graduated from a university in Germany, where he also studied Latin, a knowledge of which has proved almost indispensable in his present line of business. He married Katy Haller. C. Eberbach & Son, dealers in hardware and cutlery, 23 and 24 S. Main Street, Ann Arbor, became established in this business in 1876, and under the live management of its able members, a large trade has grown up, extending over many of the southern tier of counties. A tin shop in connection is quite extensive, and is kept busily engaged the greater part of the time. Ernest and Edward Eberbach manage the establishment, while William Moore ably fills the position of bookkeeper.

402 South Fourth Avenue, Ann Arbor - Ottmar Eberbach House, 1875. Ottmar Eberbach, like his pharmacist father, Christian, received his professional education in Germany. Returning to Ann Arbor, he joined the firm of Eberbach and Sons, manufacturers of pharmaceuticals and scientific equipment. When Ottmar married Katherine Haller in 1870, he began to build this red brick Queen Anne house. Cherry panels were used for the interior trim and the house was furnished with six handsomely decorated fireplaces. The finest of these, the parlor mantel, was removed with the permission of the Eberbach family when the house was occupied by the Harris Tire Company many years later. Efforts to locate it have been unsuccessful.

The original lot is still defined by two "rustic" iron hitching posts, one at the corner and the other at the far side of an adjacent house which occupies what was the Eberbach garden area. At the turn of the century, the intersection of Fourth and William was a distinguished residential area, with a fine home on each corner. By 1908, however, the DeFries home on the northwest corner had been converted to the Alpha Hotel-Boarding; the southeast corner home had become the Ann Arbor Sanitarium (now Muehlig's Funeral Home); the Bach house was on the lot now occupied by the Ann Arbor Y. Although the tire company began use of the house in 1928, the Eberbach family retained ownership until 1974. The beer depot addition was made in 1938. The house is now a multifamily conversion.

Frank C. Longman, Who Entered University from Battle Creek, was Outstanding On Gridirons of West in 1903-04-05; His Name Has Come Down As Campus Tradition.

A picturesque gladiator of the gridiron during the time of the most colorful chapter of football at Michigan, Frank C. (Shorty) Longman, whose death occurred yesterday April 3, 1928 in Ann Arbor, was one of the pioneer "champions of the west." Longman, known as Shorty because he towered above the football giants of that day, played fullback in 1903, 1904 and 1905, the years in which Michigan's point-a minute teams were beginning to bring fame to Coach Fielding H. Yost. As one of the outstanding players of these three teams, Longman had a vivid part in building up the football traditions that are still cherished in Ann Arbor, and his name is still one of the first that comes to mind in reviewing Michigan's host of football heroes. Longman entered the university from Battle Creek and among relatives surviving him is a brother, Robert E. Longman of 41 Tennyson, who left this morning for Ann Arbor to assist in arranging funeral services which probably will take place Friday. Burial is to be made in Ann Arbor where Longman and his widow had made their home for the last several years.

The Michigan fullback was born in Fulton 45 years ago and attended Kalamazoo high school until his graduation when he moved to Battle Creek with his parents. Among the famous football incidents in which Longman had a part was the memorable 6 to 6 tie game with Minnesota in 1903. It was in this game that the "Little Brown Jug" tradition was born when Minnesota followers, elated by the even battle of their team with an eleven which previously had trampled over everything it had met, filched the water jug out of which the Michigan players had quenched their thirst during the game. After taking it, the Gophers issued a statement that they would return it when Michigan beat Minnesota again, and the two have been battling over it ever since. Longman's last appearance in the Maize and Blue was in the titular struggle in the snow at Chicago, which ended in a two to nothing victory for the Maroons. Shorty's years with Michigan saw some great scores rolled up, many of which have not yet been surpassed. In 1903 Michigan counted a total of 563 points to 6 for its opponents. Next year something was wrong with the defense and the score was 577 to 22. Yost evidently did some tinkering for in the following season the champions of the west counted 495 points to their opponents' two.

Following graduation Longman entered coaching, first at the University of Arkansas, then at Wooster, Ohio, where he accomplished the supposedly impossible by defeating Ohio State. Later he became head coach at Notre Dame and it was while there that the Irish registered an 11 to 3 victory over Michigan, the only time that a Yost-coached player has won from a Yost-coached team. There are many anecdotes about Longman, on and off the gridiron, his popularity being due to personality as well as football ability. One of these has to do with the time Coach Yost, believing his star fullback apparently was getting a little logy, sent him to the university hospital to have his tonsils removed. The straps used to tie Shorty on the operating table were not strong enough and during the progress of the operation, Shorty broke loose, all but throwing the surgeon for a 10-yard loss before he could be tied down again. Longman was attached to the sheriff's department of Wayne county as a deputy sheriff for three years. Upon leaving that office he engaged in building and construction business and later was in charge of the construction of the pavement through Dearborn.

He was married to Edythe Eberbach of Ann Arbor, who survives him. He also is survived by his mother, Mrs. Sarah Longman, of Athens, and brother, Robert, of Battle Creek; another brother, Ray, of Chicago and a sister, Mrs. Laura Case of Athens.

April 10, 1928 - Frank Longman, the football coach who put Notre Dame among top rankers back in 1909, died the other day of tuberculosis at the age of 45. In 1909 Longman had a team which eluded George Philbrook, Sam Dolan, Vaughan, Miller and Edwards, all well known in the northwest. They won all of their first seven games, Michigan and Pittsburgh being among their foes, until they ran up against Marquette, where a scoreless game prevented Notre Dame from having an all-victorious season. Longman also coached the following year, with the Michigan Aggies coming down to wallop Notre Dame and end its winning streak.

Ernest E. Eberbach is the manager of the Eberbach Hardware Company, located in Ann Arbor. Our subject is a native of this city and hence his interests are most closely allied with every aspect of life with he has grown to be very familiar. His natal day was February 4, 1853. He is the fourth of seven children born to Christian and Margaret (Laubengayer) Eberbach. For a fuller sketch of the parents see history under the name Ottmer Eberbach.

Our subject enjoyed the superior educational advantages which has been one of the greatest treasures that Ann Arbor has given freely to her citizens of all classes. The company with which our subject is employed is located on the corner of Washington and Main Streets and takes in Nos. 23 to 25. It is 38x87 feet in dimensions and is three stories in height. The company also has two other stores which serve as warerooms. Mr. Eberbach is still a young man and his history is not so complete as it will be doubtless in later years when he takes upon himself the duties and obligations of domestic life. As yet he is one of the eligible bachelors of the city. Enterprising and industrious, he has already made himself a reputation in the business community. Personally genial and affable, he commends himself agreeably to all who enjoy the amenities of social life. He is a Republican in politics, having abiding faith in the outcome of the tactics of that party.

Notes for Dr. Karl Walter Eberbach:

Dr. Carl Eberbach arrived in Milwaukee in 1928, having moved here from his ancestral home in Ann Arbor, Michigan. At the University of Michigan Medical School he had been an Associate Professor of Surgery and was Acting Dean of the Medical School under Dr. Hugh Cabot, one of the pioneers in Urology in this country. Dr. Eberbach's early beginnings were in the field of Urology, in which he was a substantial contributor to the medical literature in the 1920's. He wrote on many aspects of genitourinary surgery, especially in the field of congenital anomalies. His monograph on renal tuberculosis was considered an outstanding work. His later years in Ann Arbor, however, were in the field of General Surgery, and it was in this capacity that he took up his new work in Milwaukee at the age of 37.

His leaning toward academic medicine was strong, and he maintained a vital interest in our medical school throughout his professional life in Milwaukee. He was Chair of the Department of Surgery for eight years before the arrival of Dr. Edwin Ellison in 1958, and was instrumental in bringing Dr. Ellison here from Ohio State University. Dr. Eberbach regarded himself as a clinical surgeon, and his self-appraisal is reflected in his writings, principally in the fields of biliary tract surgery and in the management of breast cancer.
