



4-H Livestock Auction

The auction of our livestock animals completes a year's hard work and dedication by the members of the Cumberland County 4-H Livestock Program. The 4-H'ers have selected, purchased, raised and will now sell their animals (lamb or hog).

Take this opportunity to fill your freezer with high-quality meat and help support our 4-H youth at the same time!

Questions & Answers about the 4-H Livestock Auction

When will the sale take place? The sale is set for *Thursday*, *July* 10, 2025, 7:30 PM in the 4-H Livestock Building at the Cumberland County Fairgrounds in Millville.

Who buys the 4-H animals? Businesses and private individuals bid on lambs & hogs for their own use or to donate to charity.

What if I can't use that much meat? Several families can "go together" and divide the meat for their home freezers. Businesses can also buy together. Buyers often donate the cut-up meat to local hospitals, nursing homes, churches or community food pantries.

What if I can't attend the sale or don't know how to bid?

Arrangements can be made for someone to bid for you and you can pre-set the minimum and maximum bid that you are willing to pay per pound or per animal.

What makes this lamb & pork so special?

These are prime animals that have been raised by members of the 4-H Jr. Livestock Association. They have been given only the best feed and care and have not been injected with growth hormones or other chemicals.

How do I get my animal to the slaughterhouse?

The Cumberland 4-H Livestock Program will deliver the animals to the slaughterhouse to have the animal dressed. The packaged meat will be delivered to donated charities.

How much will it probably cost to buy an animal?

Cost depends on the weight of the animal as announced at the sale and bids are "per pound." The average bid for lambs is about \$1.75 per pound. The average bid for hogs is approximately \$1.25 per pound. Lamb weight averages 125 lbs. and hogs average 240 lbs. There is a nominal fee for slaughter and packaging the meat.

Why should I buy a 4-H animal?

In addition to the prime meat you receive, you are supporting the 4-H members in a very worthwhile project. Your support is greatly appreciated.
