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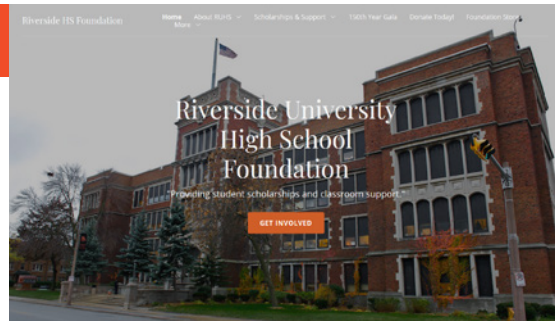
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## Foundation Web Site

## Scholarship Profiles

Our revised web site also contains profiles on the 2017 and 2018 recipients of the RUHS Foundation Scholarships. These are remarkable students who continue to do remarkable things to prepare themselves for college. They get outstanding grades while taking the most academically challenging college preparation courses offered by any high school in the Milwaukee metropolitan area. They serve their community in many ways. They participate in many of the extracurricular activities offered by Riverside. They were the leaders of the school setting the tone for the entire student body that Riverside is an educational institution that places great emphasis on academic rigor and high academic achievement.

## "The Survey Says ..."

Riverside has never had anything more than an anecdotal way of determining how their graduates perform in college and what kind of adults they become. The Foundation is trying to change that. We believe that feedback from graduates will help guide teachers in deciding what they teach and how they teach it. It will also help the Foundation determine whether its limited funds are being spent in the best way possible.

Since 2010, the Foundation has granted 262 scholarships totaling \$157,250. Several surveys that we have done recently of these Foundation Scholarship recipients have resulted in some interesting feedback.

1. Our scholarship recipients are completing their undergraduate degrees in the standard four years.
2. 78.6% attended Wisconsin colleges. Of those students, 68% attended colleges in the Milwaukee area.
3. The fields of study included Business (39.3%), Sciences (21.4%), Human Services (35.7%), Arts (3%).
4. The average undergraduate cumulative grade point average was 3.34.
5. The recipients gave Riverside a B+ in the quality of preparation they received for college.
6. Our students are graduating from college with a student loan burden ranging from \$0 to \$250,000. Of those who accumulated student loan debt, the average amount was \$55,000.



Donations to the Foundation are down from last year. We are likely to have to offer **fewer Scholarships** in May than we normally do. We did not have enough money to fulfill all of the **Teacher Classroom Assistance** requests this semester and we are going to have to do aggressive fundraising in order to meet the 2019-20 School Year first semester requests. The updating and expansion of the **Wall of Honor** will cost \$6,000. We have only been able to raise \$1,800 toward that goal so far. We need your help now more than ever. 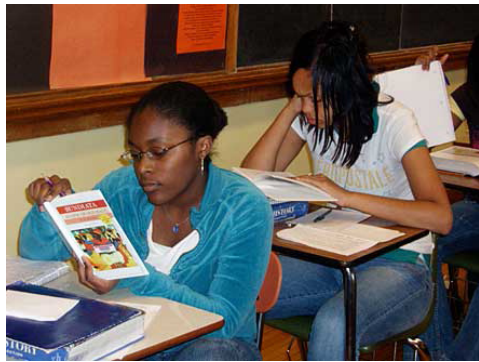

## Classroom Assistance Grants

The RUHS Foundation places an equal emphasis on raising money for both student scholarships and for grants to assist teachers in their classrooms. The Foundation recently provided such grants to eight Riverside staff members to assist them in meeting the needs of their students. With the severe budget cuts that all Milwaukee Public Schools have endured over the past several years, the district and the school were simply unable to provide the funds to support these needs so the Foundation, which is supported primarily by Riverside alumni, stepped in to fill the void. The Foundation takes applications for Classroom Assistance Grants from teachers at the beginning of each semester. A panel consisting of three Foundation Board members and one member of the teaching staff review the requests and determine which requests merit support within the amount of money the Foundation has raised for this purpose. The panel's recommendations are then promptly acted upon by the full Foundation Board and teachers are notified of the status of their requests.

Last month we provided funds to Ms. Jennifer Kringel, a guidance counselor, so that she could purchase a book that sets forth highly regarded methods for helping students build the necessary skills to regulate their behavior issues (\$40).

Ms. Whitney Gulbranson, English, was provided funds to purchase a Crayola marker box for each of the students in her English class thus providing them with an additional resource to complete their advanced English projects such as their proposed projects for their research topic.



Mr. Jakob Cychowski, English, wanted to purchase additional books for his classroom library where he works hard to encourage students to become life-long readers. He proposed a list of

thirty-seven (37) books that was developed with the assistance of his students (\$420).

Ms. Mary Zietlow, Mathematics, uses a "personalized math" approach in her teaching. All of the students in her six classes need a personal notebook for their work. The school did not have the money to support this important need. Ms. Zietlow also requested funds for the purchase of a "probability kit" for her classroom that would provide hands-on lessons in the area of mathematics probability. She also requested a projection camera that would allow her to show student work and promote classroom discussion. Due to its own limited funds for Classroom Assistance Requests, the Foundation was only able to provide Ms. Zietlow with about 86% of the funds that she needed for these worthy causes (\$370).

The pressures on Riverside teachers to maintain the high academic standards of the school are enormous. The

personalized attention they pay to each student's needs require patience, compassion and a deep commitment to help each student.



Classroom management is not always easy due to the poverty-induced psychological and emotional problems that so many students bring to the classroom. Teachers needed a place of their own in the building where they could practice self-care, where they could decompress, relax, meditate and practice mindfulness. Ms. Kringel, along with several other teachers, proposed the establishment of a "Mind Spa" for teachers. A small room was converted into such a space. It was furnished with donated furniture, some lamps, a privacy screen, a wave machine, a sound machine, curtains, a table and a mirror and it was painted (\$683).

Riverside offers a wide-range of extracurricular activities for students where they can develop their leadership skills, their inter-personal skills, their friendships as well as life-long personal health skills. Mr. James Reynolds, a Special Education teacher, has added an optional activity that would provide female students with the opportunity to participate in a Majorette team called the "Tigarettes". This team would perform at athletic and other school events as well as at community events. Participants would be required to meet good school attendance, behavior and academic standards (\$500).

A Spanish teacher, Ms. Jennifer Terry, has spent the past 18 months planning a student trip to Costa Rica. Vigorous fundraising by students fell short. The trip was in jeopardy of being cancelled. The Foundation stepped in to make sure that the trip would take place (\$1,000). A full report on the outcome of this trip will be given in a future Foundation newsletter.

Finally, Mr. Steve Wolf, a Health teacher, requested funds for materials that students could use to fulfill the classroom requirement for creating posters on the dangers of addictions. The materials requested were a 100 foot roll of 50 pound paper and a Crayola Class Pack assortment of markers. This request was deemed valuable because it involves Riverside students sending a message to their peers about the dangers of chemicals (\$150).

Riverside teachers are dedicated and creative professionals. They take their craft seriously. They deserve our support of their work with students. We cannot allow them to become disillusioned by the lack of funding from the District and the State. We need to find ways to encourage them to unleash their wealth of professional creativity. Look at all that Riverside teachers have already done to maintain and enhance the quality of their work with their students in the face of extreme obstacles. Just imagine what these highly trained, highly motivated professional educators could accomplish with their students if they had the right tools and classroom materials to implement their ideas. We simply cannot let them down. They have earned our admiration and our support.

## Alumni Update



Michael Schultz, a 1957 Riverside graduate, was recently featured in a New York Times article regarding his 1976 movie "Car Wash", which the Times referred to as a "quintessential 1970's film". Schultz's first hit movie was the coming of age drama "Cooley High". "Car Wash" was the first movie by an African American director shown at the Cannes Film Festival competition.
