Liminal - adjective: (From the Late 19th century Latin 'limen', meaning 'threshold'.)

- 1. Of or relating to a transitional stage of a process.
- 2. Occupying a position at, or on both sides of, a boundary or threshold.

"It is when we are betwixt and between, have left one room but not yet entered the next room, any hiatus between stages of life, stages of faith, jobs, loves, or relationships. It is that graced time when we are not certain or in control, when something genuinely new can happen . .

. . Much of the work for the biblical God and human destiny itself is to get people into liminal space and to keep them there long enough to learn something essential and genuinely new. It is the ultimate teachable space."

This quote from Father Richard Rohr writing about liminal space is something that every person in the world has had some experience in the last two years.

With the coming of the pandemic, and all the injustice and inequalities it exposed in our country and around the world, we have well and truly left behind 'what was' and are not quite sure if we have yet moved into what will be. That has played out on a global scale, as well as national, local and personal ones. Being in flux, always called upon to at least be flexible and usually to find a new way of doing something seems to be 'normal' at this point.



Yet, we still find it hard to be in that place where we have to admit we are not in control. We still find the vulnerability that comes with true change hard. Yet it is this between place where we are most open to the working of our God. It is the wilderness space. It is Jonah in the belly of the whale. It is Mary, pregnant and awaiting the fulfillment of God's promise. It is Holy Saturday, before we know the resurrection hope of Easter morning. In the between times and places, we know we are fully dependent on God, and we are more likely to open ourselves up to the Spirit's guiding and abiding presence, which has been there with us all along.

This June as we mark Pentecost Sunday, we as a church are choosing to step into liminal space together. We have begun to see small glimpses of hope. There have been more faces in the sanctuary, a new director of music, an installed pastor, plans for activities like coffee hour, bible and a brew and trunk or treat are underway.

But also during this time, I and the session have acknowledged the church is running out of money. At our current pace the church will likely only have enough funds to last two to three years at best. With that stress comes some difficult future decisions.

In this in between and betwixt, in this liminal space we can use this time to open ourselves up to the ways God might be calling us to be the church we dream of. If we are brave enough to embrace this uncomfortable space, God can teach and transform us.

Pentecost is the season we celebrate the coming of the Spirit. It is my prayer that this year we will open ourselves up in new ways to the coming of the Spirit in our midst here at PCSH. May we be bold enough to mean it when we pray, 'come, Holy Spirit, come'!

Faith Practice Spotlight:

Fly a Kite

Wind is a good reminder of the Holy Spirit: We can't see it, but we know it's there because of what it does. We feel the wind on our faces, or see it move trees and clouds.

A great way to see the wind move is with a kite! Fly a kite in the sky and watch how the wind makes it move and dance. Do you feel peaceful as you fly your kite? Peace is also a gift from the Holy Spirit!

Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you?

(1 Corinthians 3:16)



id you know the Church has a birthday? It does! The Church's birthday is called Pentecost. Pentecost is the day when the Holy Spirit came to the early believers. In Acts chapter two, the Bible describes it like this:

"When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability" (Acts 2:1-4).

What an exciting day that was! The people heard all the different languages being spoken, they felt the rush of the wind, and they saw a miracle that looked like fire.

Today, we experience the Holy Spirit as God's presence in our lives. Have you ever felt a strong idea about how to love or care for someone else? That's the Holy Spirit. Jesus describes the Holy Spirit as a *helper* in the book of John. He says, "The Holy Spirit... will teach you everything and remind you of all that I have said to you" (John 14:26). Jesus tells us to love our neighbors, treat everyone fairly, and look out for those who need assistance. The Holy Spirit helps us do this. I wonder how the Holy Spirit helps you every day?



Activities at Home

Here are some fun Pentecost activities to try at home to remember the Holy Spirit. *Enjoy!*

- Make an origami dove. A dove is a symbol of the Holy Spirit.
- Have a campfire. Fire is also a symbol of the Holy Spirit.
- Fly a kite or a windsock. Wind is a third symbol of the Holy Spirit.
- Make a birthday cake and sing happy birthday to the Church!
- Wear red or make a collage with red things. Red is the traditional color of Pentecost.
- Learn to say "I love you" or "Hello" in a new language, as a reminder of all the different languages spoken on Pentecost.




Here is a simple prayer of gratitude for the gifts of Pentecost and the Holy Spirit:
