From the Pastor's Nook:

"Go and Do Likewise": A Call to Compassion in a Wounded World

Pastor's Nook – August 2025

In Luke's Gospel, a lawyer asks Jesus the question many of us still wrestle with today: "Who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:29)

Jesus responds not with a lecture, but with a story — the Parable of the Good Samaritan. A man lies beaten on the side of the road. Two religious leaders pass by. But a Samaritan — a social outsider, a religious enemy in the eyes of many — stops. He sees the man's suffering. He responds with mercy. And Jesus finishes with a charge: "Go and do likewise."

That's our challenge. And it's not abstract.

In 2025, our nation is a modern Jericho Road. People are hurting — economically, emotionally, spiritually. Across the country, we see growing homelessness, skyrocketing healthcare costs, deepening racial inequities, and the marginalization of refugees and immigrants. Our social safety nets are fraying. And too often, political arguments about who deserves help take the place of compassionate action.

We may not walk past a bleeding stranger on our way to church, but we scroll past headlines about suffering every day. What does it mean, then, to "go and do likewise"?

It means choosing mercy over apathy.

It means seeing the image of God in people whose pain may challenge our politics or comfort.

It means acting not only as individuals but as a church that takes risks for love.

This is the heart of Christianity — not only asking "What would Jesus do?" but committing to actually doing it.

"Everyday Faith: Practicing the Sacred in the Ordinary"

Faith Formation at the Presbyterian Church of Sweet Hollow – August 2025

As summer slowly ripens into its late-August glow, we're reminded that faith formation isn't just for Sunday mornings or church classrooms. It happens in the in-between spaces of life — when we're walking the dog, sipping coffee, scrolling the news, or folding laundry. God meets us in our ordinary rhythms and invites us to make them sacred.

At Sweet Hollow, we believe that spiritual formation isn't about becoming perfect — it's about becoming present. Becoming attentive. Becoming open to how the Spirit is moving through even the most mundane moments of our days.

Here are a few **practical daily practices** you can try this month to nourish your spirit:

1. Begin the Day with a Breath Prayer

Start your morning by taking a few deep breaths and praying a simple phrase as you inhale and exhale.

For example:

- Inhale: "God of peace"
- Exhale: "Be with me today"

It takes less than a minute, but it creates space for calm, clarity, and connection with God before the rush begins.

· 2. Practice the "One Verse" Method

Choose one verse of scripture each day. Just one. Write it on a sticky note, put it on your fridge, or make it your phone wallpaper.

Let it speak to you throughout the day — not as a rulebook, but as a companion. A few suggestions to get started:

- Micah 6:8 "What does the Lord require of you...?"
- Psalm 46:10 "Be still and know that I am God."
- Romans 12:12 "Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer."

Now for Something a Little Different...

· Out-of-the-Box Practice #1: Art as Prayer

Set aside 10 minutes a week to **paint, draw, or doodle** your prayers. Don't worry if you're not "artistic" — the point isn't the result, it's the process.

Use colors to express gratitude, shapes to express longing, scribbles to release frustration. Let your heart speak in color when words feel hard to find.

Out-of-the-Box Practice #2: Spiritual "Unplug Hour"

Pick one hour a week to intentionally unplug — no phone, no screens, no distractions. Just be. You can take a walk, sit on the porch, pray, journal, or do nothing at all. Let it be a mini Sabbath. A reset for your soul. You might be surprised what you notice when the

This August, let's remember that God doesn't wait for us to be ready, rested, or "religious." God is already with us — in the sunlit morning, the chaos of a Tuesday afternoon, the cool breeze at dusk.

"You Are Welcome Here": Building Relationships One Greeting at a Time

Presbyterian Church of Sweet Hollow – August 2025 Newsletter

Hospitality is one of the oldest and holiest practices in the Bible. From Abraham offering strangers rest and a meal (Genesis 18), to Jesus breaking bread with outcasts and newcomers, God's people are called to make space for others with love, openness, and warmth.

At the Presbyterian Church of Sweet Hollow, we believe that building meaningful relationships is one of the most sacred things we do. Our community is not built on programs alone — it's built on **people** who reach out, remember names, make introductions, and say with every handshake or smile: "You are seen. You are welcome. You belong."

That's why we're launching a **new Welcoming Team** — a ministry of connection and care.

This team will be made up of folks who serve as:

- **Greeters** at the door not just handing out bulletins, but offering a warm, genuine welcome to everyone who enters.
- **Connectors** during and after worship helping newcomers feel at ease, introducing them to others, and making sure no one sits alone or leaves without a friendly word.
- **Bridge Builders** helping new folks take the next step, whether that's joining a small group, meeting the pastor, or just coming back next Sunday.

This isn't just about smiling at the door. It's about cultivating a culture of belonging — one where people don't just attend church, they feel at home.

In Romans 15:7, Paul writes: "Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God." That welcome isn't passive. It's not accidental. It's a choice to reflect the grace of Christ in how we greet, include, and love one another.

We need people of all ages and stages to be part of this team — extroverts, introverts, longtime members, and newer faces. If you've ever been new somewhere and felt lost, you know exactly how important this work is.

If your heart beats a little faster thinking about making someone feel noticed and included — then this may be your call.


Let's build the church not just with bricks, but with relationships.

Worship in Every Key: Traditional and Creative Elements

Worship comes in a variety of forms. During the year, we incorporate lots of these elements as part of our liturgical calendar. Here are just a few you might experience — or be invited to help lead!

- **Liturgical Worship** Rooted in scripture and tradition, this includes written prayers, calland-response liturgies, lectionary readings, and sacraments. It connects us to the global and historic Church.
- **Visual Worship** Through banners, candles, altar arrangements, or interactive prayer stations, we worship with our eyes as well as our hearts.
- **Musical Variety** From contemporary songs and classic hymns to Taizé chants and beautiful musical reflections music helps us connect with God in different emotional languages.
- **Embodied Prayer** Worship can include movement: standing, kneeling, lighting candles, or even stretching and breathing deeply during prayer. Our bodies, too, are instruments of praise.
- **Creative Word** Sermons might include storytelling, poetry, drama, or even congregational conversation. God speaks in many ways!
- **Silence and Stillness** Sometimes the most powerful moment in worship is the one where nothing is said. In a noisy world, silence is a sacred gift.

But thankfully, there's a growing collection of prayer books that speak with honesty, inclusivity, and deep compassion — prayers that match the rhythms of justice, grief, hope, and wonder that we experience daily.

If you're looking to deepen your prayer life in this season, here are two beautiful, accessible books to consider:

Prayer Books for the Journey

1. A Rhythm of Prayer: A Collection of Meditations for Renewal

Edited by Sarah Bessey

This powerful anthology includes prayers and reflections from diverse Christian writers — women, people of color, LGBTQ+ voices — all offering raw, real prayers for those who wrestle with doubt, yearn for justice, or simply need spiritual grounding.

2. Every Moment Holy (Vol. II): Death, Grief, and Hope

By Douglas McKelvey (with a progressive lens for reinterpretation)

While not always framed in progressive language, this liturgy collection invites readers to find sacredness in loss, healing, and care. Many Sweet Hollow members have found its structure comforting and adaptable to various life moments.

Make our hearts soft enough to feel the pain of another, and strong enough to carry love where it's needed. Bless the caregivers, the listeners, the volunteers, the ones who bring meals, write cards, check in. Let us be counted among them — not for recognition, but because we are Yours. Teach us to love as You do: Widely. Patiently. Tenderly. Amen.

· A Prayer for a Broken World

As James reminds us, "Faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead" (James 2:17). Real faith walks with the wounded. Real discipleship picks up the burdens of others, not just when it's convenient, but when it's urgent.

Here at PCSH, that might mean organizing around food insecurity, advocating for affordable housing, or forming partnerships with immigrant-led ministries. It might mean educating ourselves on systemic injustice and then showing up at the town meeting or the polling place. It definitely means seeing our neighbor not as someone who looks like us, thinks like us, or votes like us — but as someone beloved by God.

The Samaritan wasn't the one with religious status. He wasn't part of the "in crowd." But he had the one thing that matters most: compassion that takes action.

May we be that kind of neighbor. Not just in thought, not just in prayer, but in practice.

"Go and do likewise."
