Notes	OPENING STATEMENT
	<ul> <li>Purpose</li> <li>Inform the judge or adjudicator what the advocate is going to talk about</li> <li>Preparing an Opening Statement helps the advocate to focus their thinking on the case</li> <li>What would the decision-maker want to know about the facts and evidence?</li> </ul>
	Format
	State the Theme of Your case  • Theme is derived from the Theory of the Case
	<ul> <li>Identify the Parties</li> <li>Who are the parties and how do they fit into the case?</li> </ul>
	State the Cause of Action or Defence  • E.g. "This case involves the Tort of Battery"  • E.g. "The defendant's defence is that the plaintiff consented to the"
	<ul> <li>State Facts Consistent with Your Theory</li> <li>Set your version of the case/facts</li> <li>State whom you will be calling as witnesses</li> </ul>
	State the Legal Issues  Legal issues raised by the facts  Use "Whether" or Question
	State the Outcome You Desire  Brief statement of your outcome  If plaintiff, state damages wanted but no details  If defendant, state you want case dismissed
	<ul><li>LANGUAGE FOR ORAL PRESENTATION</li></ul>
	<ul> <li>Keep your sentence structure simple and your sentences short</li> <li>Use introductory sentences to take the place of headlines: E.g. "There are three issues in this case. The first issue is The second issue is The third issue is"</li> <li>Use words you know how to pronounce</li> </ul>
