#### **KENNY FIELD AT 50**


ball field in Big Rock and an idea by three men about lights: that is how it all began. The ball field had been there a long time. The Big Rock Town team played there back in the 1920's. Long before the Plowing Match Association bought the land plenty of ball games had been played and lots of kids had fond memories of the field. It was 1965 when Bill Thurow Jr., Roger Hatfield and Kenny Raymond went to the Plowing Match Board to ask about putting four light poles at the baseball field. They had a church team that was playing at a field in Wheatland and wanted to play in Big Rock. The request was turned down.

Two years later in June of 1967, a fatal car accident on Rhodes Avenue and Granart Road took the life of Kenny Raymond. Before the funeral, his uncle Roy Raymond spoke to Bill Thurow and Roger Hatfield and said we are going to build a lighted baseball field at the Plowing Match grounds. It will be built by donations and I (Roy Raymond) will pay the balance.

And so it began. Less than one week after Kenny's death we had started planning for getting lights on the ball field. Valley Electric Supply in Aurora was contacted first and that got the ball rolling by getting a drawing of a lighted field. Within two weeks Muscatine Lighting & Manufacturing Co. was in contact and wanted dimensions of the field. By July 6th they were working with us on what was to become Kenny Field.

In the meantime, the Big Rock community was gathering donations and people were making time to work on the project. Cement blocks were donated for the dugouts and concession stand and was quickly followed by the labor to build. After ComEd put the electrical system in place, more donors stepped up to complete all the ground level electrical work.

The 60' poles were ordered from Joslyn Manufacture Supply Company in Chicago and a Rock Falls trucking firm delivered the poles. Now, how to get them set and power to them? As luck would have it there were about six



men staying at the Big Rock truck stop (current location of Crossroads). They were installing the power lines north of Big Rock and knew Kenny. I asked what it would cost to set 8 poles at the ball field. They got back to me the next day and said if we would do it on a Saturday and Sunday they would set them and aim the lights. Two weeks later the poles were set, the lights aimed and the poles were wired from the ground up.

And the donations still kept coming. Electrical supplies and concession stand necessities were purchased: popcorn stand, flattop grill, refrigerator and other items. Water was run from the main well for drinking fountains at the ball

field. Metal fencing for around the park was donated and the installation was paid for by the group. Volunteers put up the wooden outfield fence. A sound system was donated, as well as a scoreboard to be erected in centerfield. Restrooms were built.

By early August it was time for the finishing touches: complete and paint the restrooms, roof the concession stand and press box, assemble the bleachers, and run electricity to the poles, scoreboard and sound system then get it all connected and running. Next the field itself was laid out and base plugs were put in the ground. That's it—the building of Kenny Field was done. The field was dedicated at the Plowing Match that year. Local softball players choose up teams on Saturday night, turned on the lights at 8 pm, played a Donkey Ball game and dedicated the field as Kenny Field. A week later it was seeded.

A Kenny Field Board was formed and rules & regulations, or as they were called at the time Procedures and Operational Guidelines, were put in place. Lined up to



- ◆ All plowmen must leave the field at designated finish time, unless granted more time by field committee for some reasonable cause.

All plowmen will be scored back:

- ◆ 4 points for each foot in width for not finishing the land by the specified finish time.
- ◆ 4 points for each inch less than the minimum depth of 5 inches.
- ◆ 4 points for each inch in excess of the maximum depth of 7 inches.





Awarded premiums/ prizes ranged from 25 to 75 cents, as well as a china salad dish, silver butter or fruit dish, silk umbrella and crocheted bed spread.


