

MEMORIAL GIFTS TO PLOWING MATCH ASSOCIATION

CRONIN & FRALEY FAMILIES

Plowing at the Big Rock Plowing Match is a right of passage and a tradition for many families. This is the story of two such families that have been plowing in Big Rock for several generations. The language of plowing is all about the furrow: distinct, uniform depth and width, line of and general neatness of the whole. There is an art to earning points in the competition that involves the covering of trash and appearance of ends. And then there is the plow. Specifically a John Deere Model 44 plow that has been in two families and now a third.

Kevin Davis competed in 1977 and 1978 using a John Deere Model 44 plow (below) that he later sold to the Cronin family. J.M. "Mick" Cronin understood what it took to plow. He was a judge for over 20 years and was President of the Big Rock Plowing Match Association in 1974-1975. Mick encouraged his son Jim and daughter Shawn to compete in the plowing match, borrowing a tractor from Jack Hake the first year Jim plowed. In 1980, at age 13, Jim competed in the 15 & under Class. Using his own plow, Jim scored the highest to become the youngest Sweepstakes Winner. The John Deere Model 44 plow that Mick bought was often used in competition by both Jim and Shawn over the years. No longer competing, Jim serves as a judge.



Enter the Fraley family, also a plowing family with a history of seven generations competing in Big Rock. Jim Fraley, a kilt-wearing Scotsman, has played the bagpipes at the Plowing Match in addition to plowing or assisting family members in the field. He has placed in the Farmers Open Class and the Antique Rubber Class. The Fraleys and Cronins are family friends, plowing




competitors and very much connected.

Recently, Jim Fraley asked the Cronin siblings if they would part with one of the plows they used in competition. Both Jim and Shawn Hoeft felt that "it is just a good little plow and we are glad it will be back in action." So the deal was made for the John Deere Model 44 to go to the Fraley family with the stipulation that the money be given to the Plowing Match Association in memory of "Mick". And so, the John Deere Model 44 plow will be in competition once again in David Field.

Sandra K. Marshall, "Sandy", loved to write poems and send cards. Every year for the past 56 years, on Plowing Match Friday in the late morning, Sandy would arrive at the Ladies Fair building, to deliver a huge stack of 3x5 index cards to the committee. Almost 350 hand-written cards were in the stack, two for each class on the premium list, plus special awards,



all colored coded with blue cards representing 1st place and 2nd place on pink. These cards listed all the information needed for the Association Treasurer to make prize money payouts to the winners. Sandy also prepared the winner cards for the Junior Fair and Vegetable & Grain Show each year since 1965. She didn't miss a year, not even the August her son was born, she just started earlier.

Funds from the Marshall Family have been dedicated to the sponsorship of the Pie Category in the Ladies Fair in memory of Sandy. Her peach pie was a blue ribbon winner for many years and

this year is the featured Special Recipe. Sandy served on the Ladies Fair Committee from 1979-1981.

Drawing for Land Plowing Starts Trophy Presentation

Total Possible Points: 100 Perfect Score

- 25 points: Low back furrows distinct (back to be slightly crowning and all trash covered)
- 25 points: Furrows of uniform depth and width, showing slight ridge and distinct from end to end
- 25 points: Line of furrow
- 15 points: Covering of trash
- 10 points: General neatness of the whole and appearance of ends
- All plowmen must plow 5 inches but not more than 7 inches deep.
- All plowmen must make 7 rounds.
- No assistance to any plowmen after the first round.
- All plowmen using 16-inch plows must plow not less than 14 inches.
- All plowmen using 14-inch plows must plow not less than 12 inches.
- All plowmen using 12-inch plows must plow not less than 10 inches.
- All plowmen must leave the field at designated finish time, unless granted more time by field committee for some reasonable cause.

All plowmen will be scored back:

- 4 points for each foot in width for not finishing the land by the specified finish time.
- 4 points for each inch less than the minimum depth of 5 inches.
- 4 points for each inch in excess of the maximum depth of 7 inches.

The twenty-seventh annual Plowing Match was held on the farm of H. S. Long three miles west of Big Rock on September 23, 1922. The picnic and fair was held in the grove of the same farm, a most delightful and convenient place for so large a crowd as usually attend this event. Conservative estimates placed the total attendance this year at about 1,000 people.

The speaker of the day was Mr. Rummel of the Illinois Agricultural Association, who gave a resume of the accomplishments of the American Farm Bureau Federation and its allied organizations both state and local.

The following summary was published in previous issues of *Plowing Match Times*.

Sept. 23, 1922, H. S. Long A horseshoe pitching contest was held as a feature of the Plowing Match with prizes of \$8 and \$4. This was a regular part of the Plowing Match Program until 1936. The treasurer showed a balance on hand of \$1,899.33. The money to support the men's part of the plowing match has always been made from their stands selling ice cream, pop and candy. Chairman of the stand committees have been listed since 1897 in the record books.


