# Report finds "walkable urban" is hot in D.C.

Developers in the Washington area are sharpening their focus on dense and walkable locations, typically served by mass transit and plentiful retail, The Wall Street Journal reports, citing a study by George Washington University and a smart-growth industry group called Locus.

The report — slated for release Thursday — found that 43 "regionally significant" neighborhoods and larger areas in the Washington region met certain "walkability" criteria, and have thus seen the level of development jump in recent years compared with the past two decades.


