THE DRIVERLESS CAR DEBATE

Whilst IAM Roadsmart's founding principles of achieving reduced road casualties and promoting better driving standards still hold true today, there is no question that the debate of a future with self-driving vehicles (also referred to as "driverless") will take more and more centre-stage. This issue of the newsletter features an article outlining plans to conduct further tests in the UK, with safety the focus given the recent tragic incident in the USA in which an autonomous car killed a female pedestrian as she crossed its path walking her bike across the road. Uber, the global transportation network company behind the development of the driverless car, has since suspended testing in the USA.

In terms of the safety argument for moving towards self-driving vehicles, I hesitate to suggest that this will reduce the possibility for human error to occur, and so for accidents to be significantly cut, or eliminated altogether. Surely if we as human beings are by nature fallible then the technology we are designing will also have the potential for malfunctioning, and we would have to intervene to avoid a serious incident. I also don't feel comfortable with the image of millions of these machines travelling independently on our roads with the occupants inside watching films, reading, browsing social media and engaging in various leisure activities with no regard to the outside environment and its myriad hazards. Maybe some technologies have their place (I wouldn't rule out investing in a robot to do the household chores one day!), but at this stage visualizing a world with nobody having to physically "drive" a vehicle any more seems a step too far down the road of convenience. Whatever happened to the sheer pleasure of driving for its own sake?

Please remember I'm setting out my own opinions, and I would not claim to object to further progress being made until more research and evidence is produced. Perhaps readers would be keen to contribute to the debate through this newsletter; your thoughts are most welcome!



The MOT test will change on May 20th in England, Scotland and Wales, with new defect types, stricter rules for diesel car emissions, and some vehicles over 40 years old becoming exempt. The changes will affect cars, vans, motorcycles and other light passenger vehicles.
