LETTER TO TEACHERS AND PARENTS

Thank you for considering an wilderness trip with Farthest Field Expeditions! It's our joy and honor to work in the outdoors with young people, and we work hard to make each trip the type of experience we would send our own children on. Our expeditions are carefully planned to be not only safe, fun, and challenging, but also to be an experience that enriches our Heart, Head, and Hands.

Safety is our top priority. Nothing we can provide has value if we cannot do it with safety, both physical and emotional. That said, all outdoor activities carry some intrinsic risk. Because of our experienced staff, careful planning, and good equipment, accidents are extremely rare. Fun is our next priority. What's plain fun about an expedition? Try rafting down a river, camperaft and cookery, sleeping under the stars, outdoor games, learning about plants and animals, forming memories with friends, and being outside! With safety and fun accounted for, we can focus on providing meaningful challenges.

Meaningful Challenges are the raw material out of which lifelong skills, confidence, and enriching memories are built. Some of our challenges are pre-planned, such as spoon-carving. It can be hard to carve a spoon. There's a risk of injury, so students need to maintain a high level of focus. But there is a unique satisfaction to eating with a spoon you made.

There are also unplanned meaningful challenges that wilderness expeditions intrinsically offer: that's one of the reasons we go. For example, there may be times when it has rained for days, and teeth are chattering as sodden boats are pulled up on the gravel bar. Students' fingers may be numb with cold as they work together to gather wood for a fire. But soon enough, flames will leap up and hot chocolate will be passed around. Smiles and laughter grow around the fire, and we will have been enriched by a fruit of wilderness expeditions.
