Modern Application: Strategic leaders develop pattern recognition by studying trends across industries, customer behaviors, and competitive movements before they become obvious.

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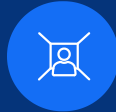

Principle 4: Master Information Advantage

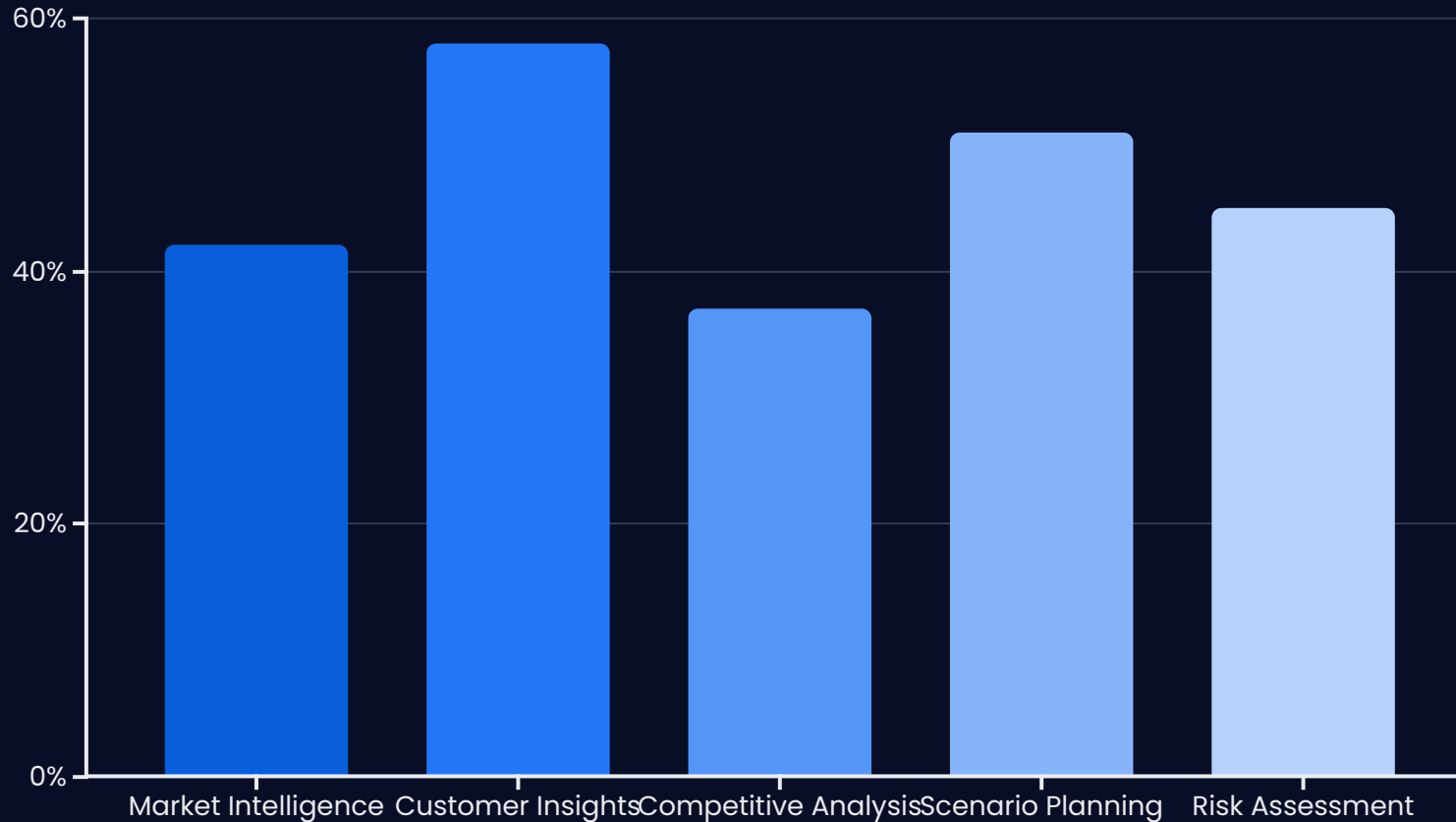


Chanakya built an extensive spy network throughout the Nanda kingdom. He knew troop movements, treasury status, and court politics before the king himself did.
