
Articulation

Tells us how to sing a specific note.

This is similar to how we use punctuation when we speak!


Staccato

Means to make a note short and detached



Legato


Means to make a note smooth and connected.



Slur

Curved line between two **different** pitches.


This tells us to make them connected and smooth (legato).



Tie

Curved line between two of the **same** pitch.


This means the value of those notes are added together.



Accent

Means to make a note more forceful than those around it








Fermata


Means to hold the note for longer than its value.

You will know when to stop singing by looking at the conductor.




Repeat Sign

Means that a portion of the music should be repeated.



First and Second Ending

Sometimes in music there will be two different endings to a repeated section of music.




Articulation Part 2

Turn to an elbow partner and tell them the definition of articulation


Tremolo

Very similar to vibrato when singing, this describes the slight wavering in pitch on a certain note.



Tenuto

Italian word meaning "held to its full value"



Breath Mark

Tells us a particular moment to breathe in music.

Combo: Accent + Tenuto

This means the note should be accented and held to its full value

Combo: Tenuto + Staccato

This means to play a note to the full value but play it detached.

Combo: Accent + Staccato

This means to play the note short and accented.
