My latest can't sleep music musing drifted me towards a new (interesting?) rock category "Best British Invasion songs not by The Beatles or Stones". The



criteria were obviously songs released by British bands, ostensibly those that were influenced by, copied or were perceived as Beatles wannabes as record companies tripped all over themselves trying to sign the next Fab Four. Therefore, all the songs selected were released between 1964-1967, the heyday of the B. I.

My list consists of 17 songs, all big hits in the U.S. and U.K. starting with number 17 and counting down to NUMBER 1!!! Ya know, building suspense and all. Artist and year released included. DISCLAIMER: This list is solely based on my opinion. There were several bands with multiple selections, so I tried to pick their very best. Your opinions may vary. Here goes;

- 17. You Really Got Me (1964) The Kinks Their first hit in the U.S. I have to admit it's somewhat tainted by the awful Van Halen cover.
- 16. Over Under Sideways Down (66) Yardbirds Cool, jangly sitar sounding guitar riffs by Jeff Beck. 15. Please Don't Let Me Be Misunderstood (65) The Animals
- 14. I'm Into Something Good (64) Herman's Hermits Peter Noone's voice is annoying and most of their hits were goofy, but this is a fun pop song, reminds me of Hansen's mmmbop.
- 13. My Generation (65) The Who Some will probably want this early Punk Anthem icon ranked higher, but I only added because of its iconicness (is that a word?)
- 12. So Tired (65) the Kinks
- 11. Ferry Cross the Mersey (64) Gerry & The Pacemakers One of the few one hit wonders on this list (see also #8).
- 10. For Your Love (65) Yardbirds Cool bongo usage.



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- 9. The Kids Are Alright (65) The Who
- 8. Needles and Pins (64) The Searchers When I saw this performed "live" on Ed Sullivan I thought "Dang, these guys are just as good as the Beatles!". Bonus points if you can name their one other hit**
- 7. Bits & Pieces (64) Dave Clark 5 Now these guys were legit competition for the Fab Four. Great look, good mix of blues, soul & pop. Never quite got back to that level after initial buzz.
- 6. Heart Full of Soul (65) Yardbirds Eric Clapton hated this breakthrough hit so much he quit the band...not bluesy enough.

Here we go, the Top 5...

- 5. House of the Rising Son (64) The Animals This reworking of an Appalachian based folk song from the 1930s put this band on the map. Sort of a poor man's Stones but with a better lead singer.
- 4. We Gotta Get Out of This Place (65) The Animals
- A more traditional rock song. Starts slow then explodes showing Eric Burdens incredible vocal range.
- 3. Waterloo Sunset (67) Kinks Keeps up the band's tradition of lampooning British society.
- 2. Substitute (66) The Who More teen rebellion from the Godfathers of Punk.

And here it is...drum roll please...

1. Glad All Over (64) Dave Clark 5 - THIS SONG KICKS ASS and holds up really well even today. Check out the down and dirty saxophone track. Reminiscent of the Beatles Please, Please Me but a wee bit grittier. Still not sure why these guys weren't bigger stars but at the beginning of the B.I. they were right there with the Fab Four.
