
October - December 2023

ProCloud and Glasgow Street Aid Updates!

Last Newsletter we told you all about our new partnership with CSS:Europe and Pro-Cloud!

Pro-Cloud will be GSA's asset management software. This will allow us to document, control, and keep track of all our equipment! As a charity, we use a lot of consumables such as bandages, gauze and gloves. Pro-Cloud will mean we can keep an eye on how much we have and when to restock. It will also help us to keep track of equipment servicing!

Our store room has now been converted and filled with boxes for us to help segregate stock and keep everything neat and tidy! Our amazing partners, Prime Secure, have also fitted a mag lock to the door to ensure only the appropriate people can get access meaning less stock being circulated and ensuring we can keep running as smoothly as possible!

Within the next while, we will be testing the software and getting it ready to roll out.

Qintil: Recruitment Manager

Qintil are working in partnership with Glasgow Street Aid to develop a bespoke recruitment platform!

Recruiting volunteers can be a lengthy process, particularly with our governance. Glasgow Street Aid works with a variety of vulnerable people and requires their volunteers to have the appropriate training and safeguarding in place prior to starting in post.

Qintil are helping to develop recruitment software which will help GSA to make the volunteer recruitment process more streamlined. This will help ensure volunteers are onboarded with ease and without going back and forth via email. The software is still in development but please keep checking back for updates!





Our new ambulance!

Like a lot of motorists within Glasgow City Centre, GSA have been affected by the implementation of the LEZ. Our current ambulance does not meet LEZ requirements and therefore is subject to restrictions within the city centre.

Due to this, we have been looking for a more up to date ambulance so that we can continue to treat and transport patients to hospital.

At present, our current ambulance has a time-limited extention therefore our services will continue as normal.

Luckily, thanks to grants from The Robertson Trust and Clothworkers Foundation we have managed to secure funding for a new ambulance!

We are waiting on collecting the new ambulance and once we have it, we will require to put it through testing and then have our logos placed on it. In the meantime, he's a sneak peak!





Our Statistics



Here at Glasgow Street Aid, we record all our data regarding the patients that we see, and break them down into subcategories:

Medical - the patient required medical attention.

Welfare - encompasses a variety of different circumstances from helping people find their way in the city centre, to more serious incidents such as helping victims of domestic violence and vulnerable people to a place of safety.

Aggression - incidents of abuse, violence, and aggression towards our volunteers.

As well as these categories, we also include the total amount of overdoses that our volunteers attended in which they were required to administer Naloxone.

We are also now including the total amount of patients we transferred to hospital using our GSA ambulance.

So, let's take a look at the stats!

Meet the Volunteer



Here at Glasgow Street Aid, we want you to get to know us. So, each newsletter you will get to 'meet' one of our volunteers and get to know a bit about them!

This edition's volunteer is... LAURA!



Tell us a bit about yourself and what role do you have within Glasgow Street Aid?

I'm Laura and I'm a 3rd year student mental health nurse at the University of Stirling.

With Glasgow Street Aid I volunteer as part of the street team and am out and about in the streets of the city centre helping wherever I can. I also help out with any serious mental health jobs if other crews need some extra support.

I live with my parents in Cumbernauld. Through my university course I've worked with children and adolescents with mental health struggles as well as adults in both acute crisis and long term conditions. We learn about psychosis and suicidal ideation and trauma informed care, all of which we encounter on the streets of Glasgow.

How did you come across Glasgow Street Aid and what made you decide to join?

I came across Glasgow Street Aid after being on a night out for a friend's birthday. Another girl at the bar who was not with my friends had been kicked out and was standing near us outside. We noticed that she didn't look very well and informed the door staff. Someone contacted an ambulance for the girl as it appeared that she had taken an unknown amount of drugs. The ambulance would be upwards of 2 hours to arrive at which point the door staff contacted Glasgow Street Aid who arrived within 10 minutes and supported the girl to get home safely and make sure she was fit and well. I didn't know about the charity before this but after speaking with our head of service John Barclay who had attended the incident, I decided to join GSA. It seemed like such an amazing charity and I could further my skill set from university as well as learn new skills while also helping people out in crisis.

What do you like about volunteering at Glasgow Street Aid?

I think Glasgow Street Aid is like a big family, which I know is what everyone says about their jobs but it really is. It's such a professional and respectful environment when we are working but we are able to decompress after a shift and we never go home with any worries about the shift.

What advice would you give to people who are interested in volunteering with Glasgow Street Aid?

I would say to absolutely go for it. It's such a learning experience regardless of your current skill set. It's such a different environment to working in a ward or the community or out the back of an ambulance. Regardless of whether you're in the building, street team or EOC it's such an amazing experience to try.

Do you have any interesting/fun facts about yourself?

I honestly can't think of any party tricks, I mean I can do the worm but that's not that impressive I don't think. I'm a massive reader and I love to read all genres. I probably read too much and don't know how to find the time.

Last year I read 144 books!

Where would you like to see yourself in 5 years time?

That's a tough question, I think I would like to have traveled and seen nursing techniques in different countries. I think i would like to work in MHAATS which is the mental health acute assessment team or the CAMHS equivalent.
