Brahms used Rupert's poem for the first in his set of four songs for women's voices, horn, and harp. While each of the poems is of a different character and origin, all are laments, the first for lost love, the second for a lost lover, the third for love unexpressed and unrequited, and the last for a slain warrior in a distant time. Brahms chose his instruments to complement the affect of the words: the quickly decaying sound of the harp traditionally represented the transience of life, and the horn was the instrument of destiny.

A full harp sound rings forth, increasing love and longing; It pierces deep into the frightened heart and makes the eyes overflow. O tears, flow on; O heart, throb and tremble! Love and happiness sank into the grave; life is lost!
