CANTATE DOMINO

Music by Claudio Monteverdi Psalms 96 & 98

Monteverdi was an Italian composer, string player, choirmaster and priest. Cantate Domino canticum novum was published in 1620. At this time the Renaissance musical style was giving way to the early Baroque style of different groups and/or voices sounding together, or stile concertato. This wasn't a passing musical fad – the notion of different groups that produce contrasting sounds was the exact opposite of the homogenous choral texture that had been cultivated during the Renaissance. Stile concertato eventually evolved into the sacred cantata and secular concerto grosso, the central forms of the Baroque era. And the idea of dividing a choral body into different subsets to generate variety in choral sound is still with us today. The text of this motet is based on verses from Psalms 96 and 98.

Sing to the Lord a new song,
Sing and give praise to His name:
For He has done marvelous deeds.
Sing, exalt, and praise in songs with the harp and voice:
For He has done marvelous deeds.

HYMNE AU SOLEIL

Music by Lili Boulanger Words by Casimir Delavigne

Lili Boulanger's life was a remarkable blend of talent and tragedy, set against the backdrop of a rich musical heritage. Born in 1893 into a family where music was one of the core foundations, Lili's talent was evident from an early age. Throughout the early years of her life, she accompanied her acclaimed sister, Nadia Boulanger, to courses at the Paris Conservatoire, where she would later study with notable figures such as Marcel Tournier, Alphonse Hasselmans, and Paul Vidal.

In 1900, a tragic point in Lili's life altered her emotional involvement in society: the death of her esteemed father, Ernest Boulanger. For the next 12 years, Lili was plagued by constant sickness and grief over this loss. However, a glimmer of hope emerged through her reflections on a poem written by Casimir Delavigne that resonated with her struggles. On her spiritual journey, Lili reflected on this poem to help her move through her grief toward the light at the end of the tunnel.

By the end of those 12 years, Lili finally entered a phase of life not overshadowed by sorrow. In 1912, known as the "happiest time of her life," she spent spring in Italy with her sister and acclaimed pedagogue, Nadia Boulanger. It was during this time that a new work for choir emerged: "Hymne au Soleil." This piece was written to commemorate her journey through grief and reflection, using the text from the poem that she had contemplated for so long. The French setting of the piece reflects the natural beauty of her life and the joy that comes at the end of her long battle. The English text of the piece gives hope to all listeners through its powerful words: "Let us bless the power of the reborn sun / with all the universe let us celebrate its return / Crowned with splendor, it rises, it soars. / The waking of the earth is a hymn of love."
