
I am hoping to restart the "In the Spotlight" section of the War Whoop in the upcoming months, so be looking for that in the upcoming issues.

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or a good part of the year (November-April), Watkins Glen is a sleepy village of about 2000 denizens nestled in the middle of the Finger Lakes region of upstate New York, at the southern tip of Seneca Lake. But in spring, summer, and fall (May-October), the Glen comes alive with all kinds of activities including treks up the famous gorge, wine tastings, car and food festivals, outdoor concerts, sailing, lake trout fishing, spectacular fall foliage tours, and road racing.

Wine is big in the area as there are over a 100 wineries dotting the Finger Lakes within an easy drive from Watkins Glen. This is the largest concentration of wineries in the US outside of Napa Valley. However, to most sports car enthusiasts Watkins Glen is the home of American road racing, and 2008 is the 60th anniversary of racing at the Glen.

This author is partial to the area as he grew up in Corning, NY, which is about

15 miles south of Watkins Glen. I have fond memories of attending the races, and even driving my Karmann Ghia and Honda 305 Scrambler and my friend's Austin Healy 3000 on the Grand Prix track as a teenager in the 60s. I remember seeing the famous drivers of the day in and out of their race cars (Jim Clark, Jack Brabham, Dan Gurney, Bruce Mclaren, Graham Hill, Innes Ireland, and Masten Gregory a.k.a. the Kansas City Flash).

The beauty of the Finger Lakes Region with the green forested hills and valleys, clear lakes and streams, lake-side vineyards and wineries, winding two lane roads, and small quaint villages is something that needs to be experienced in person, and Jane and I are fortunate to be able to vacation there in the summer. The area is still pristine and has changed very little since I was a kid.

1948 was the inaugural year for road racing at Watkins Glen and the town's first Grand Prix. The original road

course started down Franklin Street past the court house and through the surrounding countryside. This 6.6 mile road course exists today for your driving pleasure (the start/finish line is still marked in front of the court house), and the race course is in the National Registry of Historic Places.

This street course was used from 1948 to 1952, when the circuit was deemed too dangerous and was moved to a hill above the village. The first race was sponsored by the fledgling Sports Car Club of America which formed shortly War after World II. Cameron Argetsinger, who passed away in 2008, almost single handedly started road racing at the Glen. His crowning achievement was the running of the United States Formula 1 Grand Prix at Watkins Glen from 1961 to 1980 at the scenic race course on the hill above the village overlooking Seneca Lake. The Collier brothers (Miles and Sam) of Florida Collier County fame as well as Briggs Cunningham also were organizers of early races before World War II and after the war at the Glen.

The first road race in October of 1948 produced several shunts which to this day are part of the lore of Watkins Glen. Denver Cornett, an early racing enthusiast from Kentucky, in a practice race before the Grand Prix, flipped his MG TC into the dry creek bed below the stone bridge on the backside of the 6.6 mile course. Pinned underneath his car, he heard spectators milling around wondering out loud if he was dead. To which he yelled out, "well why don't you flip this dang thing over and find out?". Denver with help from his friends pulled the MG out of the creek bed, patched it up with a spare wheel from Briggs Cunningham, and placed 7th in the Grand Prix the following day. Forever after that, stone bridge is called Cornett's bridge and Denver Cornett is





a legend in the area. Another driver, Bill Milliken, flipped his Bugatti entering the final turn before the home straight in the inaugural race, pushed it back over, hopped in, and sped off to the enthusiastic cheers of the crowd. From that day on that corner is called Milliken's corner. Other famous drivers of the street course at Watkins Glen included Dave Garroway and his Jaguar. Dave was the first host of the popular TV morning show Today (my apologies to younger PCA members who never heard of Dave or his chimp sidekick, J. Fred Muggs).

Unfortunately, like all road racing in the 50s and 60s, tragedy struck and eventually was the undoing of the historic street course at Watkins Glen. After his brother Miles won the race in 1949, Sam Collier was killed leading the race in 1950, flipping his Ferrari 166 at the curve in the picture above. The picture shows Sam's memorial

monument in the foreground at the spot his car came to rest with the curve in the background. Miles gave up racing soon after and died several years later of polio. Sam was 38 and Miles was 40 at the time of their deaths. Their father, Barron Collier, was responsible for much of the early development of southern Florida where he made his fortune. Finally in 1952 a spectator, a young boy, was killed and several others injured when a car brushed wide into the crowd just past Milliken's corner. These sad events triggered moving the race to a hill above the Glen overlooking Seneca Lake where the US Grand Prix course resides today. You can even take a couple laps around the famous track for 25 bucks in your own car.

Cameron Argetsinger, the organizer of the original races, also founded in Watkins Glen the International Motor Racing Research Center (www.racingarchives.org) which is located in the town's public library just off Franklin Street. This small gem of a museum/research center for car enthusiasts has lots of fascinating reading, picture, and video material, and always has a vintage race car on display in its lobby. This past summer on display was the racing Porsche 914 which belonged to Bob Snodgrass (Richard, do you think you could post some nice autocross time in this racer?). Bob who passed away recently grew up in nearby Elmira NY and was a Porsche racing enthusiast and owner of the famous Brumos Porsche dealership in Florida. As a fund-raiser every year the museum auctions off a sports car, and this summer I bought two raffle

tickets for a cobra 427 replica with a 1968 390 Mustang GT engine so please wish me luck. One last point, engraved on the sidewalks up and down Franklin Street are the names and accomplishments of the great racers who competed at Watkins Glen over the years, from Jim Clark and Graham Hill to Richard Petty and Mario Andretti, a historic list indeed.

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

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

Louis Lackey is currently working on a new design for club t-shirts. Once perfected we will be able to order club t-shirts online.




After all those years, I should be the fastest guy on the track. I am not even close to the fastest, but I do think I have the most fun.

Still told that the last one was too hard. This one should be easier.


