




President's Podium

s usual, some of my ramblings in this column come from reading articles in Car & Driver, Road & Track, and others. I don't subscribe to these usually. I prefer to wait until I am work travelling and buy a few to read on airplanes. This avoids some of the boredom and gives uninterrupted time to read cover to cover.

A recent periodical investigated the reality about pure electric vehicles and the supposed energy savings. I had wondered about the math and efficiency behind the generation and distribution of the electricity on the grid to enable charging of vehicles at the individual consumer home. Since more efficient 3 – phase electricity isn't available at residences, most charging is done via 220v single phase, similar to what the common electric dryer or oven uses. So....there is the generation, which can be coal, gas, nuclear, wind, geothermal, or solar. There is transmission. which involves transforming the voltage to a lower usable level but also creates energy losses through heat and distance. Then the battery charger also has losses due to heat and inefficiency as well. The net of all of this is that in some parts of the country, ours included, the cost of electricity makes the fully electric car

"equivalent" to anywhere from the upper 30's to lower 40's in mpg. Only in parts of the country serviced by efficient generation, such as nuclear, does the mpg equivalent significantly exceed the good old Honda Civic and similar cars. So before you run out and buy a Chevy Volt for \$40k or so, do your homework and do the math. Yes, it is certainly noble to do one's part to the rate of fossil consumption, but the alternatives need to be competitive at a rate that entices the public. The current rate of hybrid sales is only about 2.5% of the total. I'm sure this will slowly grow, as will the pure electric, but supply and demand will always be king.

As some of you had the opportunity to be there, we had a Driver's Ed event in the past and the Tesla folks brought the Lotus based electric car for the club and some potential buyers. It was a very quick car, as full electrics have amazing low end torque. It was hard to get used to nothing but wind noise as we sped around the track. I think I would add the gas engine sound option that some have available.

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PARADE 2012

y trip to Porsche Parade 2012 in Salt Lake City, UT had a passenger once again. My wife Jeanette came along this year. Our first night was in Boulder, CO. I have a cousin who lives in Boulder and it was great to eat dinner at the Boulder Café on the mall in downtown Boulder. The weather was perfect and we ate outside.

The next day we were up early and driving toward the Rocky Mountain National Park. It is a great place to be when the temps in OKC were well into triple digits. To see snow in July is a treat for flatlanders.

One reason we went the northern route was to see the Dinosaur National Park. There are two different entrances, one in Colorado, one in Utah. The one in

Colorado is free and one does not really see anything but remote wilderness where dinosaur fossils have been found. It is a very remote part of the country and there are very few people there. That is my type of national park, free of people and cost. We drove up on a road that is about 30 miles long and we saw way more cows on the road than cars or people.

We spent the night in Vernal, UT just so we could come back to the park the next day and take a one mile hike to see views that are like nothing else on the planet. It is a one mile hike that is at high altitude. The view is wonderful all the way.

We walked one mile out and one mile back. I have a picture of the two of us breathing hard. Two 50 something

flatlanders walking a mountain trail was fun, but we were happy to get back to the car and crank up the air conditioning. After that we went to the Utah entrance. That is where you can see and touch a wall of real fossils. It is a very interesting place. There is a small fee on the Utah side entrance.



We drove on to Salt Lake City (SLC) and arrived to find a great hotel room. The Parade hotel was great, and I can't think of any complaint except maybe the room refrigerator was almost too cold. I got up early and got my car washed before we went to registration. My car was extra dirty. We saw a lot of rain on the trip.

After registration, we explored SLC some and found a great lunch spot. That night was the welcome party held at the hotel across the street. I saw fellow WBR member John Temple looking for a place to sit. I went out and invited John and his family to join us. It was one of the best welcome party meals I have ever been a part of. For the first time in my 11 trips to Parade, I was first in line for the banquet.

The next morning was the Concours. It was a beautiful setting at the State Capitol building and grounds. If you want to see a lot of photos just go to the PCA web site or Google Porsche Parade 2012. There is simply not enough space in the War Whoop to cover it.

The next day was the rally, but we opted to take a driving tour instead. It was the longest drive of the 4 tours we participated in. The drive to Bear Lake is almost to Idaho. It is a long but fun drive. The City of Garden City has a nice park and they allowed us to park there. We then went to an overlook and took a photo with almost 100 Porsches.

The next day was the first day of the autocross. This year for the first time ever I decided to not even bother with the autocross. My 911 is a 1985 model. Porsche national has decided that any car that old must run in the production class. Production class allows any tire, so autocross sticky tires are allowed. That is a 2 or 3 second advantage for any car driving on real street tires. There is no way to overcome that advantage except to spend many thousand dollars on wheels and tires and shipping them to Parade to have a chance to win a trophy. I just can't see that as logical. I decided another tour made more sense. We did the Alpine tour. I know now what Robert Redford saw in the place. He named it



Sundance. It is his headquarters for his production company and ski resort. We had another great lunch and wonderful drive.

John Temple and his wife Johre made the same tour. He was nice enough to take a picture of us at the Sundance resort.

Next we took a ride to the top on the ski lift. It was a nice ride up and back.

Since the competition event was the second day of autocross, we went on another tour. This time it was the High Uinta tour. It was another great drive to Mirror Lake. We ate lunch outside in 64 degree cool air next to a very pretty lake. It was 104 degrees back in SLC but it could not be prettier weather at Mirror Lake.

Our final tour was the Canyons drive. Just 35 miles from downtown SLC is an



11,000 foot mountain with a great ski resort named Snowbird. We took the gondola to the top. More wonderful scenery, more cool weather in July.

Back to the hotel and find a place in the underground parking garage. I found a great spot next to a car that looked familiar. My car is in the front. The other car is a European version and has the side marker lights. There are a few differences, but for the most part they were twins.

Bricktown Charity Car Show:


