

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President's Podium

he following is a member spotlight by Barry Bell:

"Well, son, those were turbos." Such was the response from my father the greatest race driver of all time in my young eyes, to the question: "Dad, what happened?"

I didn't even know what a "turbo" was, and I certainly didn't understand why my father and our green 1969 911S had finished so far behind them, relegating us to a distant third in a local SCCA club race at an abandoned airfield outside of Houston, Texas. I had a few more questions for him too: Why were

they so fast? How were they different? And most importantly, when are we getting one? They seemed so much bigger than our little car, louder too and just look at the rear end — holy smokes!

I later learned that the drivers of those two cars were merely testing them for a much bigger event and wanted to see how they performed under race conditions — sort of — it wasn't a real





track after all and my guess is, they didn't want to attract too much attention. But back to the "turbos". As the legend of those magnificent cars grew so did my desire to drive one. Once I even tried to con a dealer in our town into a test drive. My story was that I needed to take a test run in order to be able to tell my Dad what I thought about these "turbos". If the car received my approval, then I'd tell my father to go ahead and purchase one. I was 17. It didn't work. In fact, I never did get to drive, let alone own one. My father sold our little 911 and began racing formula Fords. The FFs were really cool and I loved the open wheel style. In fact, Dad raced several over the years and I had a ball watching him run. But I'd been raised around Porsches. The brand was in my blood now and the itch just wouldn't be scratched. Later, after my father quit racing, I went off to college then a career, wife, family, mortgage, you know the routine. I would admire Porsches on the road or in a parking lot whenever I saw them, but they were an extravagance I just couldn't justify at the time and gradually the dream was buried under the details of life.

A few decades passed as it occurred when my own teenaged son came to me with a report from our local Porsche dealer. He too had become a devotee of the iconic brand by now you see. "Dad, there's a 997 Turbo down there and I think they'll move on it for the right price". Not wanting to pour water on his fire I offered what I thought was a fairly neutral response, Fine, I said, "What's the right price?" Thinking naively that would be the end of it but that statement was followed by several weeks of "did you go look at it yet? Have you driven it yet? What's

the hold up?" etc., etc., ad nauseum. Worn down and tired of making excuses I finally did look at AND drive it with the result being that a lifetime of dreaming, longing, lusting and coveting rushed forth like a great fountain and I simply had to have my Turbo, and I had to have it now! Later, one afternoon, with nothing else to do I placed a call to my beloved banker during which we worked out a financing scenario, IF I were to "pull the trigger" so to speak. I then told my young, sweaty palmed son that if we could get to "X" then we just may have a deal. A few days later, said son and I went to the dealership just to take a look you know, and met a much better salesman than the one who had offered me a test drive earlier. We sat down to talk numbers. His opening remark was, "I know we're asking this for the car, but it's been on our lot a while, if we could get to 'X' would that work? Coincidentally, 'X' was the same magic number I'd hit upon with my beloved banker! Son moved visibly in his chair, but still managed to stay in it.

So, after a little more wrangling we were able to make a deal on a one owner, low mileage, black on black, six speed manual 997 911 Turbo - and we could not have been happier. Since that day my son and I have been on many high an early morning speed adventure, later teaching him to drive the great beast himself, my daughter too. The Porsche has been such a wonderful addition to our family that I have since purchased several more over the years including a 997 GT3 RS, a 991 C4S (which my wife quickly commandeered) and a 997 GT3 Cup car which I campaign in PCA competition along with my brother — another dream come true. These cars have become such a part of our lives I only wish my dad were around to see them now...and I wish I'd bought one sooner.

If there's a moral to this story it's this: Porsches are uniquely magnificent



machines. If you've ever thought of owning one but have let the flame die down as I did, think again t h e y ' r e worth it, I p r o m i s e you.

The War Bonnet Gourmet

Oven Baked Chicken Parmesan

INGREDIENTS:

2 tablespoons olive oil

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

1 ? cups shredded mozzarella

1 teaspoon kosher salt

1 teaspoon dried oregano

1 cup marinara sauce

1/2 teaspoon black pepper 1 egg

2 tablespoon minced parsley optional, for garnish

1 cup panko bread crumbs

2 chicken breasts About 1 pound of chicken total

1/2 cup parmesan cheese fresh grated

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Line a baking sheet with foil, brush foil with olive oil. Adjust oven rack so that is in the second from the top space. Preheat the oven to 400°F.

2. Cut the chicken breasts in half and pound to even thickness: Cut through the middle of the chicken breast as if you are going to butterfly it (cutting it open like a book), but cut all the way through to make two equal sized pieces.

3. After cutting the chicken breasts in half, place them in a gallon sized zip top bag in an even layer, seal it, then

pound them to an even thickness using a meat pounder or a rolling pin.

4. You can also place the chicken breasts between two layers of cling wrap instead of a zip top bag if you prefer.

5. Pat the chicken breasts dry with a paper towel, then season with salt and pepper.

6. In one shallow dish, mix together panko bread crumbs, grated parmesan cheese, salt, pepper, garlic powder, oregano, and black pepper. In another shallow dish, whisk one egg.

7. Dip one chicken breast into the egg, then into the bread crumb mixture. Ensure chicken breast is fully coated in the crumb mixture, and gently press with your hand do help the crumbs stick to the chicken. Place chicken breast on prepared baking sheet, repeat with remaining pieces of chicken.

8. Place baking sheet in oven on the second from the top rack. Bake for 15 minutes, or until cooked through.


9. Flip chicken, pour 1/4 cup of marinara sauce over each piece of chicken, then top with cheese. Place back in the oven. Turn on the broiler. Broil for 2-4 minutes, until cheese is melted and bubbly and edges of chicken are browning.
