In June we had several members travel to French Lick, Indiana to participate in the 2015 National Parade. They all reported back great stories and memories from the event. John Leaton, our Social Activities Chairperson, led us on a great tour at the end of May. We began at Pops then drove to Guthrie to tour the Oklahoma Territorial Museum. am pleased to announce that we had our ladies only autocross on Saturday July 18th at the local sheriffs training center. I just wanted to say that it went very well for our first one and hope to have many more in the future. As some of you may know, we had a couple lovely ladies come up from the Maverick region, which is around the Dallas/Fort Worth area, and from the Lone Star region, which is around Houston.

Two of the ladies from the Maverick region that came up were Wendy Shoffit and her husband James, and Robyn Howard and her husband Travis. The one lady from the Lone Star region was Lynn Schermerhorn Friedman which is our Zone Rep for Zone 5. All of these ladies are avid auto crossers and track stars.

We also had four ladies show up from our local region. Two of them have been out to one of our normal track days and loved having some extra help. They got to learn techniques from someone with a little bit more skill and talent than some of us have. The other two have never been out to our track and have never done anything like this. One was a newly joined member who has always wanted to try this and came out to make herself a better driver and more

involved in the club. The other was a seventeen year old that wanted to have an experience that most teens never get to have. We started out with a simple and a technical track which would help the ladies with the three main things to learn and work on which is: handling, steering and braking. After we did a couple of laps around the track we talked for a little and decided to do a big circle on the skid pad. That helps with throttle control in that you pretty much hold the steering wheel at one position and add or subtract the throttle to try and lose control in a safe manor. We switched both driver and instructor in driving and, also changed from clockwise to counterclockwise. After we did a couple turns around the circle we switched from the original student/instructor combo and went back to the original track set up and rotated the three instructors with the four students. After we completed all of the fun and learning, everyone helped me set up the track for the normal autocross the next day. Then everyone helped test it out to see if there was anything I needed to change. The test runs help to make improvements to the track for both the setup and anything that might be good in the future.

On Sunday, which was our normal autocross day, two out of the three instructors joined us to see how and what our autocross was like. We had 25 drivers which is about our average number of participants.

All in all, it was a good weekend both as a region and as a zone. It's good to see that even though there are a couple of hours between here and Dallas or Houston, that the things that helps bring us together are also helping the regions grow and get better at everything. I know I learned a lot of different things and was able to meet some new people. I saw that everyone has different ways of taking corners and different techniques. I just hope that all had as good of a weekend as I did and that we might have more ladies join us at future autocrosses.



Treasurer's Tid-Bits

uess what? The treasury is still in sound financial shape. We continue to make a good income from the autocross. It is the only event that we charge any fee to participate in besides the Christmas party and the annual charity car show. In years past we had an event fee for every single event. Now we rely on the autocross and national rebates from membership dues to pay for everything the club does, including charity donations to the Sunbeam Family Services.

Parade 2015 in French Lick, Indiana was a great event. Jeanette rode with me this year. It is an easy 750 mile one-day drive. I will not even bother to write about the Concours and all the other competitive events. Panorama will have far better coverage and photos of those events. We actually stayed in West Baden but that is just a mile down the road from French Lick. They have constant shuttles and even an old neat train trolley that we rode once. We never had to wait more than a few minutes to go between the hotels.

The West Baden resort is an amazing place and that was where the concours and the final victory banquet were held. The grounds are about 500 acres of gardens and trees. The atrium of the West Baden hotel was the largest

unsupported dome on the planet until the Houston Astrodome was built. As you walk in the doors everyone just looks up and gawks. It is simply an astonishing place. The atrium is 200 feet across, 600 feet in diameter and 100 feet high. It is decorated on every square foot and there are large statues on the floor. It is pretty much impossible to get a good representative picture since it is a circle.

The hotel was built as a health resort and spa. The first hotel was built on the site in 1855 but it burned down in 1901. The current hotel was opened in June of 1902. When the stock market crashed in 1929 the hotel emptied of guests almost overnight. Eventually it closed in June 1932 and in 1934 it was sold to the Jesuits for one dollar. In 1966 it became the Northwood Institute, a private college that closed in 1983 and was abandoned. In the late 1990s the Cook Group, Inc., a global medical manufacturing company, stepped in to preserve both French Lick Springs Hotel and West Baden Springs Hotel. It was really Mrs. Cook who was the driving force behind restoring the hotel and the French Lick hotel. They now own and operate both hotels, and they have done a wonderful job on the restoration. The grounds are just beautiful.

We took two driving tours and two bus tours. One day we drove up to the Indianapolis Speedway. We were allowed to make three laps on the track. I wish we could have had some real fun, but we were in a large string of cars and never got above 70. I did get to take a picture of the yard of bricks and other parts of the track. The track is nice and smooth of course, but I can't imagine going 200 MPH around it, especially side by side with other cars. We did not get to get onto the F1 track at all which would have been even more fun. The

corners of the main track are banked way more than I ever thought. I always thought they were fairly flat. It is nothing like a NASCAR oval but there is a decent banking in the four corners.

The grandstands are just huge. The entire facility is just overwhelming in size. There is a golf course on a part of the infield. We toured the museum, and they have an impressive collection as expected. During lunch on a different day we were talking to a couple that own a house just a few block from the

track. The wife of the couple said she has been to the last 48 years of Indy 500. She is thinking she wants to do two more and then she will stop at 50. I can't even imagine the traffic and the crowds of race day.

The next day we took a bus tour to the Maker's Mark distillery. The tour starts where the water is first mixed with the corn, barley malt and yeast. It starts off just like the process of making beer with slightly different ingredients. The opentop barrels are 12 feet across, and have a crust of the ingredients floating on the top. The new batches are bubbling like crazy and the bubbles are carbon dioxide made by the yeast converting the corn into alcohol. The older batches are bubbling slowly. They encourage





anyone that wants to, to stick their finger in the tank and taste the brew. The fresh bubbling tanks have a sweet taste and the old slow bubbling batches taste sour. One person asked about the sanitation of letting anyone stick a finger in there but the fact is that one of the major steps is to twice boil off the alcohol and that sterilizes the product completely. We saw the bottling line and where employees hand dip each bottle with the wax seal.

Next we did a tasting of four different types of Maker's Mark. I am not a hard liquor drinker and I had no idea there were four types of Maker's Mark. They had one type that was aged very little and it was more like white lightening and they call it Maker's White. They also had Maker's Fully Matured,

Makers' 46 and finally Maker's Cask Strength. I have not had a shot of bourbon in several decades. It was interesting to taste the differences. Not interesting enough to buy anything, but interesting. We then rode for over an hour to eat lunch and we all felt rather mellow for some reason.

After lunch we went to the Jim Beam distillery. It is a much different operation. Maker's Mark is all about consistency and they are located in the middle of nowhere because that is where the spring is that all of their bourbon is made from. It is in a very rural area. Jim Beam is right off the highway and looks very industrial. The Jim Beam factory makes 75 gallons of alcohol per hour 24 hours a day 6 days a week. We only had two shots of some

of the 15 or so types of Jim Beam. We were allowed to pick which two and they were not as smooth as the Maker's Mark.

The next day we went to the Louisville Slugger Museum and factory. That was fun to see baseball bats made. They were super busy and just packed with visitors. We hit the tour just at the perfect time. We walked right up and got our tickets and only waited a few minutes to start our short tour. It ends up in the gift shop and we were

amazed to see the line of people standing in line to buy tickets. The line was soon out the door and down the block. The gift shop had everything from plain bats to autographed game bats that were used in the World Series.

Our final tour was a driving tour of the Ohio River scenic river area. They had some fun, curvy roads. Overall the roads in Indiana are just great. Nice and smooth and well maintained. I wish Oklahoma roads were nearly as nice. The roads along the river were curvy and hilly and smooth. One of the challenges is a large group of cars arriving at

restaurant all at once. Everything was set up ahead of time and the German restaurant was ready with the space and staff to take care of us. The tour staff did a great job of running a lot of different tours every day. There were some minor snafus, but what large event goes off with no hitches? Next year's Parade will be at Jay's Peak, VT. That will be a long three-day drive.






Speaking of the Mercedes club..... They are interested in putting together a "German" car show. We will be working together to make this event happen in 2016.
