GRANITE HOUSE has built a 24-hour community residence in Stillwater, Minnesota, for the long-term care of younger adults with severe and permanent brain injury who might otherwise be in a nursing home. Purpose-built with community support, it opened in November 2018.

The beautiful lights on the front wall greeted staff on the long nights this winter. Amber made the trees out of pallets and decorated them with lights. They could be seen coming up the driveway and brightened up the parking area. Thanks to a resident family, we had two indoor trees this year, so the lower level therapy room was festive too. 

DONOR EXPENSES UPDATE

Bringing good news to our donors and friends is the purpose of our semi-annual newsletter. Granite House had another great year of community support, and we share with you this report of gifts and expenses from donor funds. Please note that 90% of the names on the list are "repeat donors," and we appreciate all of you staying with us. For the first time since opening, over half of the year's use of donor funds went to program expenses. This includes sensory programs, resident and staff birthdays, holidays, our staff picnic, and outings. Annual fundraising expenses are now limited to the newsletters, the construction expenses are done, and the administration costs have leveled out. The biggest expense again last year was the hardscape, including drainage and stone retaining walls. This year your gifts will support the new planters for Amber's vegetable garden, the deck, and final drainage work. With our summer volunteers we will continue to plant perennials. It was great to host our board members at the house again, and we are all so proud of what we have accomplished with your support. Thank you and have a great summer.

FEATURED STAFF MEMBERS - A GREAT PLACE TO WORK

BOARD MEMBER/NEUROLOGIST • DONNA KONING, MD



How many neurologists do you know that make house calls? Ours does! Not only does Donna Koning, MD, serve on our board of directors, she works with our residents on issues typical of patients with brain injury. She has been instrumental in developing seizure protocols and managing medications to promote comfort and good health without excessive sedation. As a charter member of the board, Donna played an important role in creating the mission statement and resident admissions criteria.

Starting out as a North Dakota farm kid, Donna pursued a degree in chemical engineering at the U of ND and worked at 3M for 14 years in various capacities. A complete career shift came when she entered the U of MN medical school and then residency in neurology.

Her first practice was with the MN Clinic of Neurology, a great place to work but a long commute from her home in Afton. An opportunity to start a new neurology service in Stillwater began in August 2007. As the founding member of the neurology group at the HealthPartners clinic, she helped to establish a thriving practice that has grown into a full team of four.

Donna is looking forward to gardening and gathering wild edibles outdoors this spring. Her indoor hobbies include sewing, painting and other artistic endeavors. Her husband Norm is also a 3M chemical engineer, and their daughter Katherine is now an electrical/ biomedical engineer. Vacations to the west coast and Rocky Mountains are chosen opportunities for this busy family to spend time together.

It was providence that brought Donna Koning to Granite House. In 2009 she met Granite House founders Tom and Carol Insley and began caring for their son Aaron. Donna came to Granite House quarterly after opening but had to interrupt visits during the pandemic. She is eager to resume home visits and enjoys being at Granite House to meet the staff and see the residents where they are most comfortable. In her words, "To help bring Granite House from an idea...to the real home it is today...has been a privilege and honor." The board would reciprocate and thank Donna for her service to the nonprofit and to the residents.



Grace began her career in health care as a Certified Nursing Assistant in longterm care, while working towards a nursing degree. She completed her LPN licensure in 2021 and is now enrolled in the nursing program at Northwood Technical College, with plans to sit for

her RN licensure exam in December. Grace was a laboratory assistant for five years at MN Urology, where she met our house manager, Amber, in 2015. Amber told her about the plans for Granite House, and after acceptance into the RN program, Grace joined us in March, 2020.

Grace's hours at Granite House follow her class schedule. She does weekends, overnight sleep shifts, and picks up extra days when needed. Late last fall, Grace stepped in as interim nursing lead during Anna's leave. Being on staff and knowing our residents, it was a smooth transition. With Anna shifting her focus to licensing and nursing compliance, Grace will now be the house nurse, taking care of the day-to-day resident needs and emergencies.

When her busy schedule allows for fun, Grace and her husband Derrick go camping with their two dogs and spend time on the river-- kayaking, boating, fishing, and soaking up the sun. They recently took up downhill mountain biking, exploring bike trails on both sides of the river. Aside from a crash landing and a sprained wrist, Grace is eager to get back on the bike. She also enjoys making gifts for people with her Cricut tool.

Grace says the best part of working at Granite House is the mission and the caring, genuine people who work there. As a caregiver for more than half of her life, she is proud to be part of Granite House. She loves the teamwork and enjoys her new role, as it fulfills her passion for nursing and caregiving. To Grace, "...it's clear that Granite House isn't just home for our residents but is a place where staff and family can come and feel as if it's their home away from home, too."

VEGGIE TIME

Every year Amber works hard to provide fresh, homegrown greens and vegetables for meals. She's been working with various planters with mixed results, and now will have the garden of her dreams. Tom is building raised planters made of black locust wood, 3' x 5' and about 32" tall. There will be three of them, to be installed on the flat area between the new retaining walls. This space is perfect for the sun, there is protection from wind, and is has a water source at the well pump. With a gravel base and pathway, residents can be brought down with a staff member for tending and harvesting. They can even reach it from their wheelchairs and feel that cool moist soil. SUMMER PROJECTS

After a cold April and late spring, we are getting off to a great start on our continuing gardening projects this summer. The volunteers from Saint Ambrose Church Ladies Bible Group came out to rake, plant, and get our flower beds ready. Our friend Lizzy is coming back this summer, to help us with our gardening projects and to finish last year's project, planting the raised beds along the sidewalk. Once Tom has the planters attached to the base, she can install the plants and flowers, along with some motion and sensory items to engage the residents and keep the deer away. The volunteer garden group will continue to meet once a week all summer, so contact Amber or Carol to sign up and join us.

NOTE FROM THE STAFF

It's no secret that everyone is experiencing staff shortages these days, with businesses and even group homes closing because of it. Granite House has been more fortunate than most, with half of our staff having started with us in 2018, and now two-thirds of the staff have been with us over three years. With dedicated caregivers who will offer to pick up open shifts, bonuses to pick up last-minute night and weekend shifts, and managers willing to work some awake nights, the residents have always had a full staff on duty to care for them. As we move into warmer weather, we have seasonal and student staff members coming back to full-time, and old friends who left for other jobs and came back to Granite House.
