Economy


The Northwest Territories' economic decline is driven by the downturn of its resource industries, aging infrastructure, and limited economic diversification, leading to job losses and financial uncertainty.

The Northwest Territories is facing a crime epidemic driven by social and economic challenges, with high rates of violent crime, substance abuse, and strained policing resources, particularly in remote communities.

2025-2026 BUDGET



\$2.5 Billion

That's the total operating expenditures for the GNWT's 2025-26 budget.

\$2.35 Billion

That's how much money the GNWT is spending on its bureaucracy.

\$150 Million

That's how much the GNWT is spending on the the priorities of the 20th Legislative Assembly. 6% of the total budget.

COMPETING PRIORITIES


MLA priorities should be the **ONLY** priorities of the GNWT. The political machinery of government that drives decision making has been handed over to senior officials rather than elected leaders.

Results and Delivery should be the only priority of public servants. Unelected officials should not be setting the mandate of government.

IT'S A NUMBERS GAME

Any parliamentary or legislative system comes down to voting. Voting is how decisions are made and business gets done. In voting procedures the side with the most votes wins.

Consensus Government is incorrectly referred to as a "perpetual minority government". This is because minority governments only exist when other parties hold them to account.




Cabinet Solidarity

Cabinet solidarity is a constitutional convention in parliamentary systems where all members of the cabinet must publicly support and defend government decisions, even if they privately disagree.

In practice this means Cabinet has <u>seven</u> votes at all times when it comes to spending and legislation.

All it takes is for <u>two</u> member to tie a vote or <u>three</u> to win.

CABINET + 3 = MAJORITY GOVERNMENT



Regular Members

Independent MLAs must secure <u>nine</u> votes to pass legislation, motions and change proposed spending.

Independent MLAs have limited to no incentives to build voting coalitions, lacking access to monies, appointments, travel and other resources afforded to Cabinet.

CONSENSUS GOVERNMENT IS NOT LOCAL GOVERMENT

After a Chief and Council election, there is an expectation that everyone will work together and stand by the new leadership. But our system is not the same.

Cabinet is in the tent, and regular members are on the outside looking in. We are not welcomed at the same table and we do not work together like a band or municipal council.

The Legislative Assembly is a parliamentary system and requires more accountability then local governments.

Without a clear alternative to the government, the role of cabinet and non-cabinet members are blurred. This often leads to a chilling effect on public criticism of government officials and decision makers.

MLAs are more concerned about who they are working with, rather than who they are working for.

INDEPENDENT CAUCUS

MLAs are proposing establishing an independent caucus to share their constituents' views, discuss policy, plan parliamentary strategy and help develop caucus positions on subjects being debated in the House.

Caucus provides a forum in which Members can debate their policy differences among themselves without compromising unity. A caucus usually does not vote on issues before it, but instead, discussion proceeds until a consensus is reached.

DISADVANTAGES TO CURRENT SYSTEM

No Membership Choice

MLAs did not choose to be members of the standing committee on accountability and oversight (AOC) were house affairs are discussed and decided.

This inhibits solidarity and unity on policy and parliamentary strategy.

No Policy Alternatives

Committees do not possess the mechanisms nor resources to develop alternatives to government policy. This results in stagnant policy processes, delayed legislative initiatives and unwillingness to consider alternatives to the GNWT's proposals.


No Political Staff

Legislative Assembly staff are frequently placed in situations were they are asked to provide political advice on house business and strategy. This is an unfair burden to place on non-partisan public servants.

No Meeting Flexibility

AOC has an expansive mandate that includes review of all proposed government legislation and the business of supply. Political decision making takes time away from committee business, resulting in a greater frequency of meetings and a substantial time commitment for MLAs.

CHANGING THE NUMBERS GAME




Independent Members Caucus

This group of MLAs would act as a counterbalance to the Cabinet, offering members an opportunity to vote together as a bloc.

Other Members

Other MLAs would remain independent.

INDEPEDENT POLICY DEVELOPMENT



If the current system was working, then we wouldn't be having this discussion ...

WE NEED TO ACT NOW

- Our message is not getting through to decision-makers
- Priorities are not being actioned by the government.
- Committees are being ignored by the departments they oversee.

We need a real breakthrough to make progress.

IT'S BEEN DONE BEFORE

Prior to division in 1999, Nunavut MLAs sat in an informal Eastern Arctic caucus. The 10 members worked together as a voting bloc to support areas of mutual interest.

Even though this group was not the majority of members, the Eastern Arctic Caucus commanded significant influence over the entire Assembly through voting power, solidarity and unity.

CHOICE NOT DEMAND

MLAs are invited to participate in this concept in the spirit of democratic renewal and political empowerment.

Participation will not upset the workings of Cabinet, AOC, Caucus or the Legislative Assembly at this stage.

However, consequential changes may be sought in the future by an Independent Caucus.
