Ulrich, H. (2006) Examining the variability in the long-term outcome of child sexual abuse victims.

<u>Dissertation Chair:</u> Christine Fiore, Ph.D.

Examined a proposed model to explain the variability that has been found in the long-term outcome of child sexual abuse victims within a college population. Social support, family environment, and attributional styles were examined, in addition to the abuse characteristics of intrafamilial versus extrafamilial, gender, the presence of treatment interventions, severity of the abuse, and the handling of the disclosure. This model

attempted to identify which of the aforementioned variables are most strongly correlated with the presence or absence of trauma symptomatology in child sexual abuse victims. Results indicated that the child sexual abuse victim's attributions about the abuse and their current satisfaction with their social support were most strongly correlated with presence of trauma symptoms, over and above the other variables.
