Florida Senator Ed **Hooper to provide** update on latest legislative session



In even numbered years, the Florida legislature meets in regular session for 60 days starting on the second Tuesday after the first Monday in January. This year, from January 9 to March 8, legislators wrangled with a number of important issues, including bills to increase the minimum base pay for teachers, to lower the minimum age for purchasing rifles and other long guns, to reduce criminal penalties for possession of small quantities of cannabis, to allow veterinarians to provide telehealth services for pets and to prevent insurance companies from including the value of land when setting coverage limits for houses.

Those curious about the outcome and discussion of these bills and other proposed 2024 legislation will not want to miss the July 12 Belleair Women's Republican Club luncheon meeting where Florida Senator Ed Hooper will update club members and guests on the as chair of the Senate's Approprilatest session in Tallahassee.

Note the date of the July luncheon tation, Tourism and Economic has been moved from the regular meeting date of the first Friday of the month to the second Friday due to the July 4th holiday weekend. As usual, the luncheon will take place at Belleair Country Club, 1 Country Club Lane, Belleair. Check-in begins at 11:30 am, with lunch starting at noon followed by the speaker. The cost to attend is \$37 per person with reservations and payment due by Thursday, June 26.

Senator Hooper represents District 21, which consists of parts of Pasco and Pinellas counties. He was first elected to the Senate in 2018 and was reelected in 2022. Previously, he served a maximum of four terms in the Florida House, 2006 to 2014 and was a Clearwater City Commissioner from 1996 to 2000.

Currently, Senator Hooper serves ations Committee on Transpor-

Development Committee and as Vice Chair of the Regulated Industries Committee. He is also a member of the Appropriations, Rules and Transportation committees and serves as well on the Joint Select Committee on Collective Bargaining and on the Appropriations Committee on Criminal and Civil Justice. During the 2024 session, Senator Hopper introduced 20 bills and co-introduced 16 more, all of which means he will have a lot of information to share at the July 12 BWRC meeting.

A native of North Carolina, Senator Hooper moved to Florida in 1972. He is a retired firefighter and has two children and five grandchildren. His wife, Lee, is a long-term, active member of BWRC who has served on the club's board in a variety of positions and who is a recipient of the BWRC Outstanding Member

MAIL BALLOT FACTS

- Any registered voter may vote by mail.
- Vote-by-Mail requests remain active through the calendar year of the next regularly scheduled general election.
- All requests for ballots to be mailed must be received no later than 5 p.m. on the 12th day prior to an election.
- A request for a ballot to be mailed to an address other than the voter's address on file with the Supervisor of Elections must be made in writing and signed by the voter.
- Voters may pick up mail ballots in person except during the mandatory early
 voting period through 7 p.m. on Election Day. By state law, mail ballots cannot be
 issued during this period unless an emergency prevents the voter from reaching an
 early voting site or assigned polling place. The voter or voter's designee must submit an
 affidavit regarding the emergency.
- Convenient ballot return locations are available during designated dates and times throughout the county.
- State law requires all Florida voters to vote a paper optical scan ballot whether voting by mail, at an early voting site or at the polls on Election Day.
- · Voters will NOT receive a paper receipt after voting.
- ALL accepted mail ballots are included in official final results, per Florida law.
- A mail ballot is the same as an absentee ballot; however, voters do not need to be absent to vote by mail. Legislation passed in 2016 replaced the term "absentee ballot" with the term "vote-by-mail ballot" throughout Florida Statutes.
