Why Criminal Justice Reform?

- An overcrowded criminal justice system
- What were we talking about in 2006?
- The System Cycle: Emergency to Emergency
- The Result: (1) Defining success and failure, (2) How the system orients itself, (3) What are the actual underlying issues?

Why Criminal Justice Reform?

- •Low-level, non-violent offenders cycling through the system over and over again
- Behavior driven by mental illness/addiction
- Scope of the Problem? Look to collateral issues and systems
- Very costly and less safe

How do we reform?

- •Create a system that avoids incarcerating those who shouldn't be in jail through intervention and prevention (particularly for those with mental illness and/or addiction)
- Enact policies promoting accountability and transparency
- Support a culture of innovation through data-driven decision making in all criminal justice offices
- Address aging, inefficient criminal justice facilities-specifically our county jail system

Criminal Justice Reform - MCAT

- Mobile Crisis Assistance Team (MCAT)
 - Partnership between Eskenazi and IMPD: Mental Health
 Professional and a Law Enforcement Officer
 - 1,456 unique runs (East District)
 - Demographics:

White: 55.5%, 809	Asian: 0.6%, 3	Other: 0.6%, 9
Black: 39.8, 580	Hispanic/Latino: 2.7%, 39	Unknown: 1.6%, 23

Reforms in Action

- Commissioned report to assess the mental health and substance abuse treatment landscape of Marion County
- "Crisis Intervention Training" for all IMPD Officers and 911 Operators
- Mental health assessment tool Pilot Project for IMPD officers developed in partnership with NYU
- Pilot of diversion of individuals to Reuben Center for Downtown District



II. Where are we now?




What we've done together so far . . .

- Proposal 89 (2017) council authorized \$2M to determine financial feasibility of the CJC Project.
- Proposal 175 (2017) council authorized \$20M for development and design of the CJC Project.
- Proposal 411 (2017) council authorized \$55M for site preparation and site enabling.
- Proposal 367 (2018) enables the construction of the core buildings by authorizing lease payments to MCBA, which will provide security for bonds.

CJC Construction Packages

<u>Package</u>	<u>Description</u>	Nov. 9 Status
1. Site Prep	(Earthwork and soil management)	Complete
2. Site Enabling	(Building Pad and utilities)	Under construction
3. AIC	(Assessment, temp. housing, detox facility / REC)	95% Designed
4. Courthouse	(Consolidated Courts, judicial and admin offices, etc.)	Bids opened
5. Jail	(Adult detention center and MCSO Office)	Bids opened
6. Site Completion	(Parking, landscape, lighting, etc.)	Conceptual design

Assessment and Intervention Center


- Delivery method: Traditional Bidding
- A mental health and addiction treatment clinic with colocated temporary housing unit to facilitate assessment and diversion.
- Health & Hospital Corporation of Marion County will provide staff to conduct assessments, supervise clients, and provide referrals.












IV. Adult Detention Facility




Consolidated County Jail | Adult Detention Center

- Delivery method: Design-Build
- Will replace the Arrestee Processing Center, Jail I, Jail II, and Hope Hall (inside CCB).
- 2,700 general population beds, 300 specialty beds.
- 40,000 50,000 square feet of space for inmate education, job-training, counseling, and other programs











V. Consolidated County Courthouse



Consolidated County Courthouse

- Delivery method: Design-Build
- Consolidates Marion County Courts, namely Civil,
 Criminal, Juvenile, and Probate into one building.
- Working side-by-side with the Judiciary on design and construction of the building based on assessments of modern caseloads and operations.
- Executive Committee of the Judiciary approved courthouse design on March 15, 2018.








14P JURY COURTROOM OPTION 2 1,700 SF




Program Detail Courtroom Configuration







VI. Procurement Update



Project Goals

- Executing procurements that are lawful, ethical, transparent and competitive
- Managing Stakeholder interests in a way that provides an opportunity to succeed and results in substantial improvement to the criminal justice system in the City and the County
- •Establishing a collaborative relationship with the Design-Builders that leverages the talent and innovation of the Design-Builder Teams to enhance performance as it relates to schedule, cost and future maintenance and operations
- Avoiding project disruptions and disputes
- Maximizing positive economic impact on the CJC campus, the City, the County and the broader Indianapolis Metropolitan Statistical Area



CJC Project Procurement Tracks

Track 1: Design-Build Teams

- Jail Package
- Courthouse Package

Track 2: Traditional Bidding

- Site prep
- Site enabling
- AIC
- Site completion

Track 1: Statutory Design-Build (I.C. 5-30)

RFQs

- Designers and Contractors Team up and respond ("SOQs")
- City Technical Review Committee ("TRC") short-lists 3-4 teams for each package
- TRC Members: Paul Babcock, Kate Warpool, Angela Smith-Jones, Camille Blunt, Martin Hurford, P.E.

RFPs

- TRC Publishes Design Criteria and short-listed teams respond
- TRC evaluates responses Qualitative Scores
- Qualitative Score (X) Guaranteed Max. Price = Composite Score (award to best scoring team)

Contracts

- Tentative awardees enter into contract negotiations
- If negotiations fail, go to next best scoring team

Track 1: Design-Build Projects

- Consolidated County Jail | Adult Detention Center
- Consolidated County Courthouse
 - RFQs and "short-listing"
 - RFPs Published
 - Oct. 2018: RFP Proposals submitted for each
 - Nov. 7-9, 2018: Bids scored, prices opened
 - Nov. 9, 2018: Awards determined
 - Contracts finalized EOY 2018

Design Build: Procurement Guidance

- Firms permitted to submit on both projects
- Maximize M/W/V/DBE Participation
 - 30% of spending to date on XBE firms
- XBE participation part of scoring guidelines
- Local economic impact was scored
 - 68% of spending to date on local firms

Bids and Pricing

- "Best Value Determination" dictated by I.C. 5-30-7-1
- Consolidated County Jail | Adult Detention Center
 - Community Justice Partners (AECOM-Smoot): \$280 Million
- Consolidated County Courthouse:
 - Wilhelm: \$174 Million

Core Financial Principles

- •The Project Cost and Sources are conservative.
- Setting forth a <u>ceiling</u>.
- Though a Design-Build Project, financial approach includes contingency.
