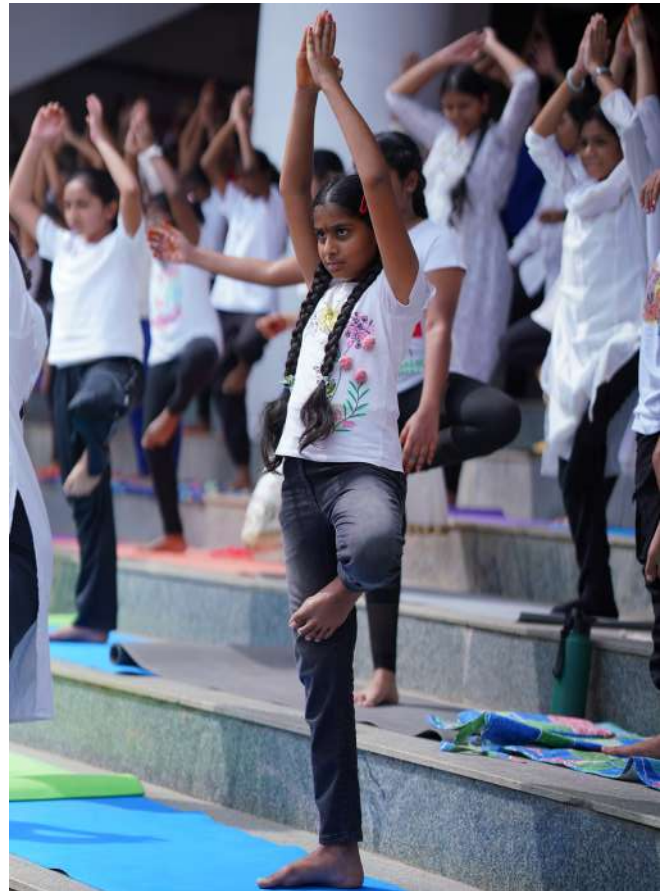


INTERNATIONAL YOGA DAY

MAKEATHON 2024: OUR EDUCATIONAL AND FUN JOURNEY TO GERMANY



On July 5th, we embarked on our eagerly anticipated trip to Germany. Starting by bus at 9 AM, we reached Hyderabad airport by 6 PM. Our flight to Abu Dhabi departed at 9:45 PM, and from there, we caught a connecting flight to Munich. We arrived in Munich at 6:30 AM local time, which was 9 AM in India due to the 3 hour and 30-minute time difference.

From Munich International Airport, we took a scenic three-hour train ride to Nuremberg, where our German partners warmly greeted us at the station. Exhausted from our journey, we went to our partners' homes to rest.

The next day, Sunday, July 6th, our German partners took us to the zoo. We had the opportunity to see many animals, especially those from cold regions like polar bears, penguins, and dolphins. On August 7, 2024, our project officially entered the implementation phase. We divided ourselves into three dedicated teams: THE GUIDING GAZE, POWER WALKER, and PULSE PEDAL. Each team began by outlining their respective plans and started tackling small tasks to lay the groundwork for their projects.



The following day, our teams made significant progress. We worked long hours throughout the week at the university, starting as early as 8 am and continuing until 6 pm. Each team encountered

its own set of challenges, yet we persevered and supported one another through every hurdle.

On the third day, August 10, 2024, we concluded our session earlier than usual. We enjoyed a guided city tour in Nuremberg, led by the knowledgeable Mr. Pulau. This break from our intensive work schedule allowed us



to recharge and appreciate the cultural and historical richness of Nuremberg.

As we approached the fourth day, our teams faced difficulties in finalizing our prototypes. However, with determination



and collaboration, we managed to pull everything together by the fifth day, just in time for our presentations. This journey was a rollercoaster of ups and downs, but the support from our professors, teachers, and peers was invaluable.

Though our projects are not yet complete, we have successfully finished our prototypes to introduce our ideas to the public. The final products will be showcased when the German students visit India in October. 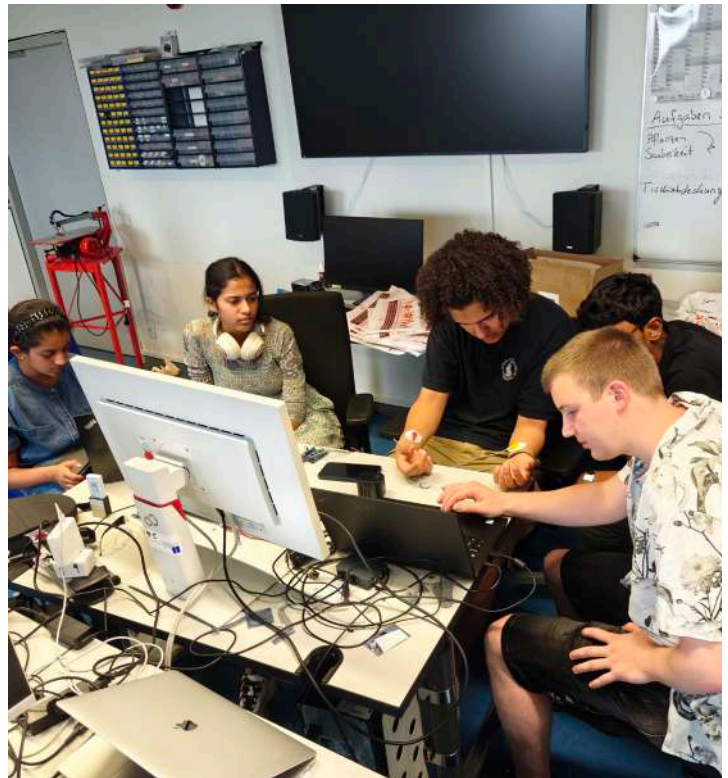


obstacles and celebrating achievements together.

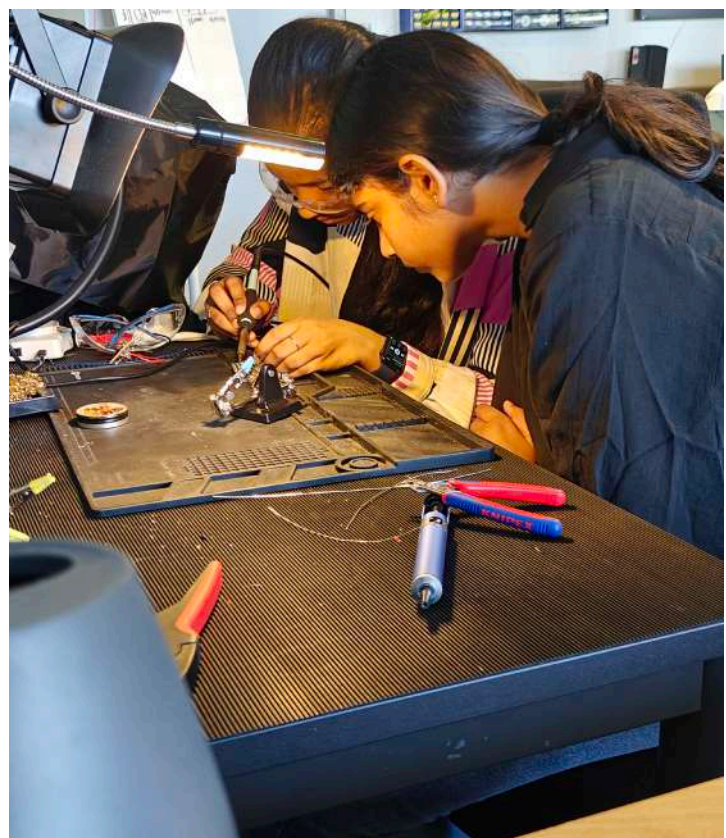
The town exuded an enchanting, old-world allure, and we had the privilege of exploring breathtaking rock formations and visiting the fascinating devil

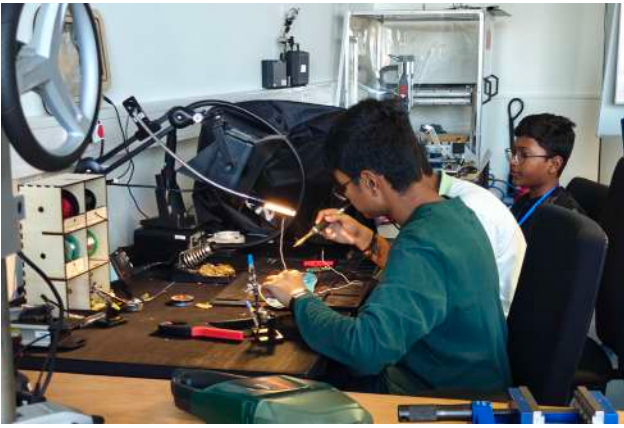

On July 15th, we set off to explore Munich, embarking on a three-hour train journey filled with singing, games, and laughter. Upon reaching

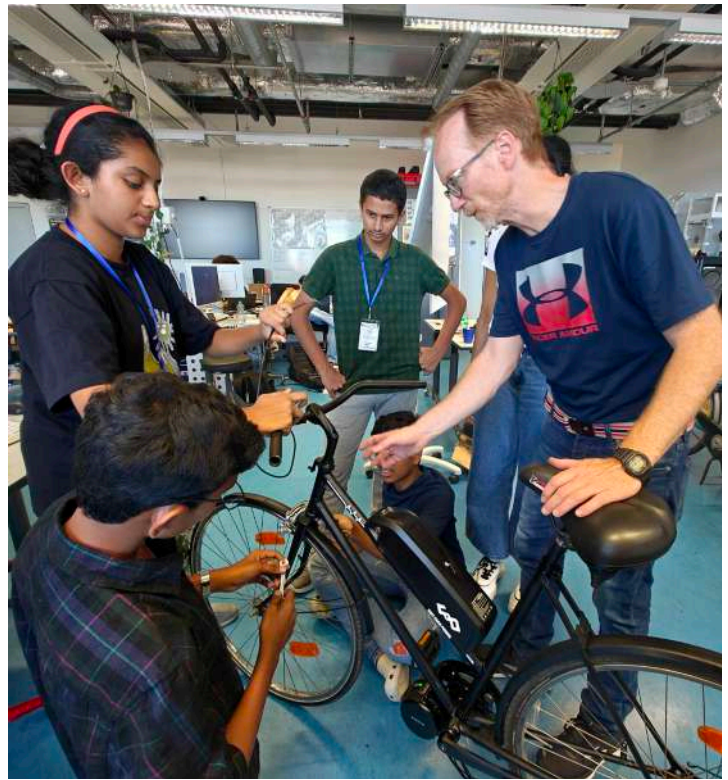




Munich, our first stop was BMW World, where we marveled at various car models and the innovative designs of BMW vehicles.

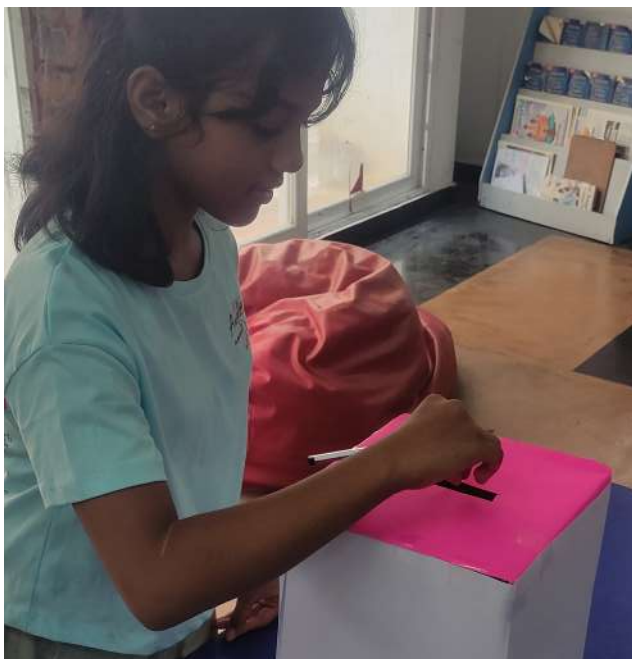
MOCK-ELELCTIONS

THEME DAY (UNIT 1)

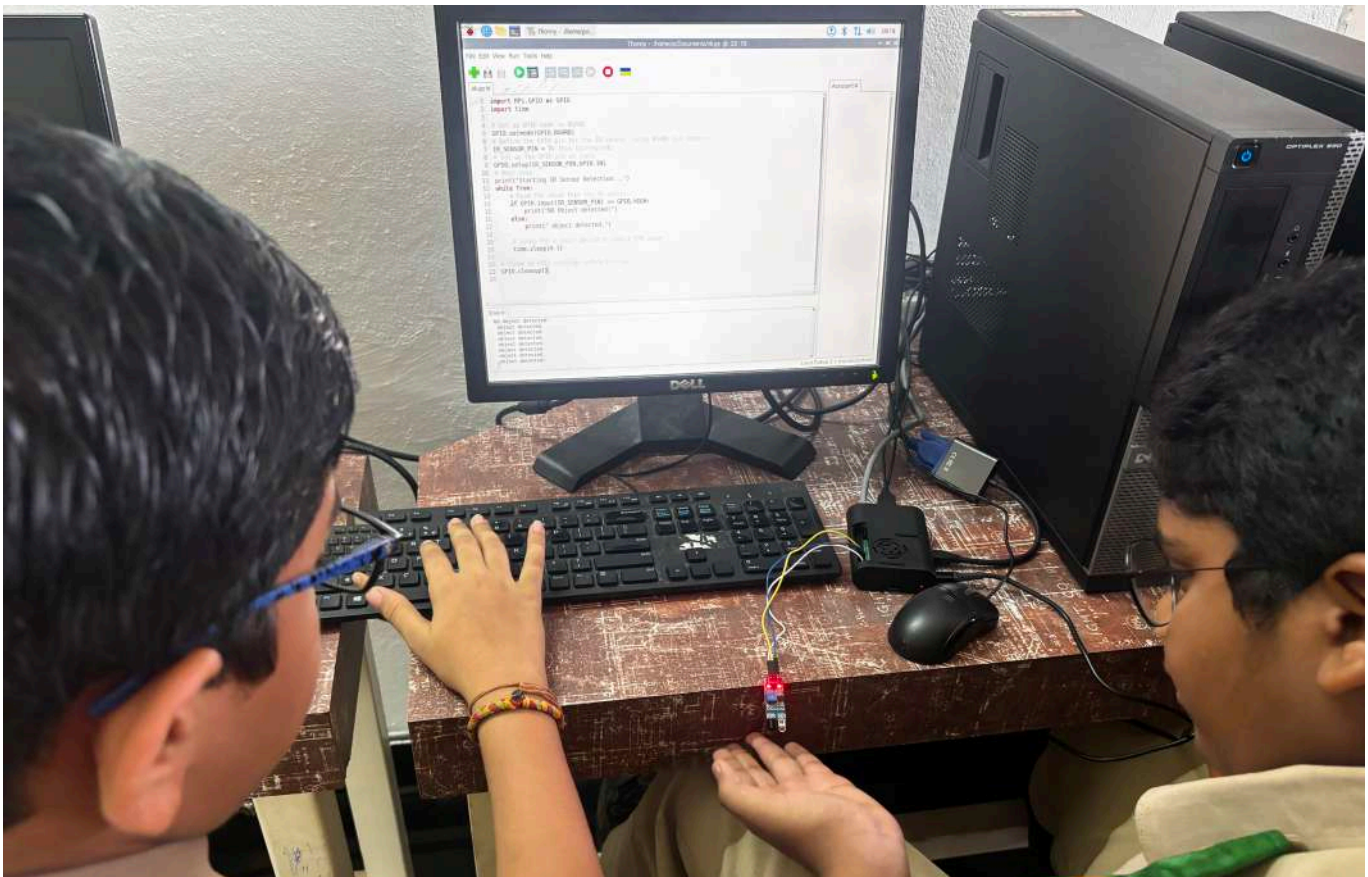

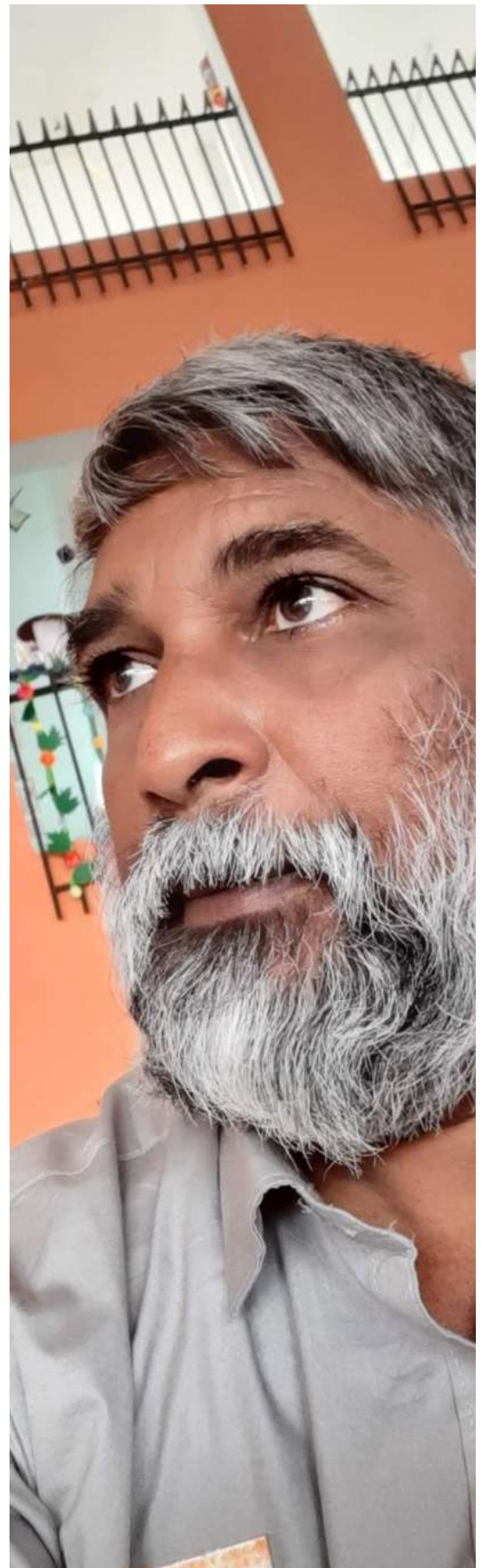
