Let's continue to support all of these great activities by renewing your membership. It's fast & easy by going to www.legion.org. Do not wait until the last minute to do it.


COMMANDER'S CORNER



THIS MONTH IN HISTORY – FAMOUS NEW DAYS BATTLES

Several famous battles occurred on New Year's Day, notably the bloody Battle of Stones River (1863) in the American Civil War, a costly Union victory; the Confederate success at the Battle of Galveston (1863); and in Vietnam, a significant engagement known as the Battle of FSB Burt (1968), part of the larger Tet Offensive, which began around that time and featured attacks on New Year (Lunar New Year).

American Civil War

- Battle of Stones River (Dec 31, 1862 - Jan 2, 1863): A brutal, high-casualty battle near Murfreesboro, Tennessee, where Union forces under Rosecrans held off a Confederate attack by Bragg, a crucial Union win.
- Battle of Galveston (Jan 1, 1863): Confederate forces under General Magruder recaptured Galveston, Texas, from Union troops, a significant morale boost for the South.

Vietnam War

- Battle of FSB Burt (Jan 1, 1968): A heavy engagement in Tây Ninh province where U.S. forces defended against a large attack by the People's Army of Vietnam (PAVN).
- Tet Offensive (Jan 30-31, 1968): While not on New Year's Day (Gregorian), the massive North Vietnamese and Viet Cong offensive began during the Vietnamese Lunar New Year (Tết), striking U.S. and South Vietnamese targets, fundamentally shifting public opinion.

These battles highlight how holidays, often seen as times of truce, sometimes became strategic opportunities for surprise attacks or bloody clashes, like those seen at Stones River.
