- Immediately call your gas supplier from a neighbor's phone. Follow gas supplier's instructions.
- If you cannot reach your gas supplier, call fire department.
- 7. When operated for first time, logs may emit a "paper burning" smell. This smell will gradually diminish and will be totally eliminated after first few hours of operation. Do not use blower at this time.

A. Turn off the gas supply to fireplace.

WARNING: ANY OUTSIDE AIR DUCTS AND/OR ASH DUMPS IN FIREPLACE SHALL BE PERMANENTLY CLOSED AT TIME OF APPLIANCE INSTALLATION.

B. Read the following sections before installing your unit; Section III, page 20 "Installation In A Solid-Fuel Burning Fireplace" and Section VIII, page 29 "Producing Adequate Air For Combustion And Ventilation".

INSTALLATION AND CLEARANCES

To ensure a safe installation into a masonry or factory built fireplace, the following instructions must be carefully followed:

(1) Sidewall Clearances:

Clearance from side of fireplace opening to any adjacent combustible wall should not be less than: right side 7", left side 7".

(2) Ceiling Clearances:

The ceiling height should not be less than 24" from top of fireplace opening.

(3) Mantel Clearances:

Clearances from top of heater to mantel or mantel supports should not be less than 20".

GAS CONNECTION


Always use an external regulator for all LP heaters to reduce supply tank pressure to a maximum of 13" W.C. This is in addition to regulator furnished with heater.

WARNING: CONNECTION DIRECTLY TO AN UNREGULATED LP TANK CAN CAUSE AN EXPLOSION.

Normal gas connection is 3/8" N.P.T. made at left side of appliance (facing front of appliance). If a right side connection is desired, connecting pipe may be led under rear of burner base to terminate at right side for connection to inlet of valve.

NOTE: The connecting pipe must be internally tinned copper tubing for use with natural gas. Test for leaks using a solution of soap and water after completing the connection. **DO NOT USE OPEN FLAME**



- Front Log (s) #1-R and 1-L (Slim Log s) wrapped in cardboard box). Place 1-R between front portion
 of burner and log grates on right hand side of log base. Next place 1-L between front portion of burner
 and log grates. Note: logs 1-R and 1-L should over lap in center of burner base to create front log.
- 2) Middle Glow Log #2. Place rear of log on top of middle log supports located in open center portion of burner base. Front of log should rest slightly behind rear line of burner holes on front portion of burner. Align notch on left front bottom side of log, hold down nut of burner. This should align log at right position from left or right on burner.
- 3) Rear Log #3. Place log in rear log supports, center from left to right.
- 4) Left Top Log #4. Log has two (2) holes in bottom front side. Align holes with two (2) pins located on left top of log #2. Rear of log #4 should rest on left top end of rear log #3.

WARNING: POSITIONING OF LOGS IS VERY CRITICAL (SEE DIAGRAM ABOVE).

MODEL E.S.B: (1) Rear Log, (2) Middle Log, (3) Left Top Middle Log, (4) Right Top Middle Log (5), Left Front Log (6), Right Front Log (7), Glowing Embers in front of 5 & 6 logs.

- 1) Place rear log #1 on rear log supports. The log has alignment notches on each rear corner.
- 2) Place Middle log #2 in front of rear burner tube and then move log forward. The log should sit just behind brass knob (s), located in middle section of base between rear burner tube and front burner pan.
- 3) Place Left Top Middle log #3 on pins located on left top section of Middle log #2.
- 4) Place Right Top Middle log #4 on pin located on right top section of Middle log #2 and align notch on right side #4 with side shield on right.
- 5) Place Left Front log #5 on locator pins located on left middle section of front burner pan.
- 6) Place Right Front log #6 on locator pins located on right middle section of front burner pan.
- 7) Provided with your log set is a package of Glowing Embers (rock wool). Open package and tear off small pieces of wool material and place it over small holes (ports) located on front burner pan in front of logs #5 and #6. Cover entire section of holes (ports).

*Replacement of loose (Glowing Embers) must be purchased from the original manufacturer and application of excess loose material may adversely affect performance of heater.

NOTE: Wash your hands immediately after coming in contact with wool material. The wool can cause slight itching or burning, avoid any contact with eyes.

WARNING: All previously applied loose material must be removed prior to replacement.

GAS PRESSURE CHECK

Check inlet pressure to burner to ensure that it is as shown in table below. **NOTE:**The pressure check point is located on the right side of valve facing burner, for SIT Millivolt, and left side for SIT Modulating.

Appliance and its main gas valve must be disconnected from the gas supply piping system during any pressure testing of that system at test pressures in excess of 1/2 psi (3.5kPa). 



1. Thermostat control on this heater differs from standard thermostats. Standard thermostats simply turn burner on and off. The thermostat used on this heater senses room temperature and adjusts amount of gas flow to burner. This will increase or decrease flame height. At times, room may exceed set temperature, which will cause burner to shut off. When room temperature drops below thermostat setting, burner will cycle itself on again. The control knob can be set to any level between "LO" and "HI".

NOTE: Thermostat sensing bulb measures temperature of air near heater cabinet. This may not always agree with room temperature (depending on housing construction, installation location, room size, open air temperatures, etc.). Frequent use of your heater will allow you to determine your personal comfort levels.

MANUAL LIGHTING PROCEDURE

- 1. If pilot cannot be lit with piezo, it can be manually lit with the use of a paper match and a lighter rod.
- 2. Open access panel door located at bottom front of appliance.
- 3. Place match in holder and light. With left hand, turn control knob counterclockwise to "PILOT" position. Press in gas control knob for fifteen (15) seconds.







- 8. Press in and turn knob on gas control counterclockwise to "PILOT" and continue pressing in knob for (15) fifteen seconds.
- 9. With control knob pressed in push down (in) and release igniter button (igniter button is located on front left hand side of appliance). This will light pilot. If needed, keep repeating this step until pilot lights.
- 10. Keep control knob pressed in for (1) one minute after lighting pilot. After (1) minute, release control knob and it will pop back up. Pilot should remain lit. If pilot goes out, repeat steps 1 through 9.
- If knob does not pop up when released, stop and immediately call your service technician or gas supplier.
- If pilot will not stay lit after several tries, turn the gas control knob to "OFF" and call your services technician or gas supplier.




MANUAL LIGHTING PROCEDURE

- 1. If pilot cannot be lit with piezo, it can be manually lit with the use of a paper match and a lighter rod.
- 2. Open access panel door located at bottom front of appliance.
- 3. Place match in holder and light. With left hand, turn control knob counterclockwise to "PILOT" position. Press in gas control knob for fifteen (15) seconds.
- 4. Use rod to light match and ignite pilot. Pilot is located in front of rear log and burner on right hand side of appliance.
- 5. Continue to hold the control knob for an additional one (1) minute to ensure pilot is lit.
- 6. Turn control knob counterclockwise to "ON" position. Push "ON/ OFF" toggle switch to "ON" position. Main burner should light.
- 7. Close access panel door.
- 8. Turn on all electrical power to appliance.
- **NOTE:** This unit may be used with an optional Wall Thermostat. If so, Wall Thermostat needs to be set at a higher temperature than the room temperature.





- **Rear Flames:** The flames at rear or at either side of top log should be very similar, yellow in color, and should be about 3" to 4" above large rear log for natural gas logs and about 6" for propane (LP) gas log sets.
- **Front Flame:** The flame should be 1-1/2" to 2" high and touch the back of front log. This will produce a red glow on this log.



HEATING APPLIANCE HEAT OUTPUT

When used as a ventless heater, flue damper of a solid-fuel burning non-combustible fireplace must always be closed.

The heat output is controlled by the "ON/OFF" switch or wall thermostat, when using the SIT Millivolt Valve. When using -SIT Modulating or -SIT Manual Valve, heat output is controlled by dial with LOW to HIGH settings. The Vent-Free fireplace may be installed where permitted by local, state and city codes.

In the absence of local codes, the latest edition of the *National Fuel Gas Code (ANSI Z223.1)* must be met.

WARNING: ELECTRICAL GROUNDING INSTRUCTION: HEATER IS EQUIPPED WITH A THREE-PRONG PLUG FOR YOUR PROTECTION AGAINST SHOCK HAZARD AND SHOULD BE PLUGGED DIRECTLY INTO A PROPERLY GROUNDED THREE-PRONG RECEPTACLE.

- **NOTE:** #PESBRO84 Blower may be used with Model 34. Rating: 120 volts/60HZ/1.1 Amps. See Figure 17, page 34 for wiring diagram.
- **NOTE:** For convenience, allow licensed electrician to install properly grounded 3-plug receptacle near unit.

ROOM BLOWER INSTALLATION AND OPERATION INSTRUCTIONS

Room air blower is located at rear of unit in bottom chamber. To remove or replace blower, open lower louvered access door. The motor is located right center in rear (See Page 35, Figure 17). Remove two (2) hex head screws holding motor and motor bracket to outer bottom of unit. Unhook two motor wires and remove motor from unit. Next remove two (2) screws that fasten motor bracket to motor. Locate motor bracket onto new motor in same position as with old motor. Using two (2) hex head screws fasten bracket to new motor. Place new motor into lower compartment. **NOTE:** Make sure motor opening 1" x 5" is behind inner wall of stove and not touching any metal. Fasten new motor and bracket to motor support onbottom of unit. Hook motor wires as shown in diagram on page 34.

Installation and repairs should be performed by a qualified service person. Appliance should be inspected before use and at least annually by a professional service person. More frequent cleaning may be required due to excessive lint from carpeting, bedding material, etc. It is imperative that control compartments, burners and circulating air passageways of appliance be kept clean.

SECTION III INSTALLATION MODEL 34 (FP) IN SOLID FUEL BURNING FIREPLACES

- (1) Model FP-34 may be installed in a masonry fireplace. The **minimum fireplace dimension** must be <u>24" high, 29-1/2" wide, and 12" deep.</u>
- (2) For minimum dimensions for the sidewall and mantel see Figure 8.
- (3) Center heater in fireplace opening.

NOTE: See "Producing Adequate Air for Combustion And Ventilation" page 29-32.

NOTE: Installer of this appliance must mechanically (peel and stick) attach marking supplied with this unvented appliance before installing to inside of firebox of solid-fuel burning fireplace or listed vent less firebox enclosure into which unvented fireplace insert is installed. See example of marking on Page 9 of this manual.


CAUTION: Cutting any sheet-metal parts of solid-fuel burning fireplace or listed vent less enclosure in which unvented fireplace is to be installed is prohibited.

NOTE: If factory-built fireplace has no gas access hole(s) provided, an access hole of 1.5 inch (37.5) diameter or less may be drilled through lower sides or bottom of firebox. This access hole must be plugged with non-combustible insulation after the gas supply line has been installed.

Refractory, glass doors, screen rails, screen mesh and solid-fuel log grates (if applicable) can be removed from fireplace before installing unvented fireplace insert.

NOTE: After the unit is positioned in fireplace, mark trim panels as follows:

A. Set side panels in place, flat against fireplace. Mark down inside edge of trim panel to make a vertical reference line.



CEILING

B. Set top (long) trim panel in place on top of unit. Panel should be flat against outside face of fireplace and standing vertically. Mark along lower edge of trim panel with a pencil to make reference line for mounting.

NOTE: If used in installation, trim panels or surrounds shall not seal ventilation openings in fireplace. Also provide adequate clearances around air openings

(4) Slide the unit out of fireplace far enough to work behind trim panel reference lines with a screw gun.

NOTE: You need to make sure supply gas line is hooked up at this time. Be sure to check for leaks at connection using soap and water. **DO NOT USE OPEN FLAME TEST FOR LEAKS.** With screws provided, attach both side trim panels. Next, attach top trim panels.

- (5) Slide heater back into fireplace with trim panels flat against face of fireplace.
- (6) After hooking up gas line, checking for leaks and mounting trim panels slide heater into fireplace.
- (8) Place logs on burner base as shown on page's 7 or 8.
- (9) For gas hook-up and pressure tap test, see instruction in Section II page 6.

NOTE: Smoke shelves, shields and baffles may be removed if attached by mechanical fasteners.

WARNING: Solid-Fuels shall not be burned in a fireplace in which an unvented room heater is installed.

CAUTION: Any outside air ducts and/or ash dumps in the fireplace shall be permanently closed at time of appliance installation.

WARNING: Before installing in a solid-fuel burning fireplace, the chimney flue and firebox must be cleaned of soot, creosote, ashes and loose paint by a qualified chimney cleaner.

SECTION IV

INSTALLATION OF MODEL 34 (WS) OPTIONAL WOODEN SURROUND (KIT#PAKDFP34)

- (1) When choosing right location for your heater and surround (mantel) keep the following in mind:
- **NOTE:** Due to high temperatures, this heater should be located out of traffic areas and away from furniture and draperies.
- **CAUTION:** INSTALLATION MUST CONFORM TO LOCAL CODES. IN THE ABSENCE OF LOCAL CODES, INSTALLATION MUST CONFORM WITH NATIONAL GAS CODES.

NOTE: See Section II for gas hookup and pressure check page 6.

NOTE: See "Producing Adequate Ventilation" page 29-32.

WARNING: CHILDREN AND ADULTS SHOULD BE ALERTED TO HAZARDS OF HIGH SURFACE TEMPERATURES AND SHOULD STAY AWAY TO AVOID BURNS OR CLOTHING IGNITION. YOUNG CHILDREN SHOULD BE CAREFULLY SUPERVISED WHEN THEY ARE IN SAME ROOM WITH APPLIANCE


WARNING: DO NOT PLACE CLOTHING OR OTHER FLAMMABLE MATERIAL ON OR NEAR APPLIANCE.

- (2) Position screen before leaving heater unattended.
- (3) Instructions for assembly of Wooden Surround (Mantel):

TOOLS NEEDED: Medium Phillips screwdriver, tape measure, power drill, and 5/16" socket.

- STEP 1: Lay out all components.
- STEP 2: Assemble end panels A & B to top front rail C.
- STEP 3: Stand end panels and top front rail onto hearth.
- **NOTE:** (Position back of end panels with back of hearth, centering assembly from each end). Install front screws first, then pull back towards inside to square mantel. Install screws through back holes.
- STEP 4: The owner must decide at this time if parts D, E, and F are to be wood or green. Beginning with panel E stand chosen color face out on hearth, flush against stop block located inside end panel A and attach. Position left end of top window D on top of E and attach. Slide panel F under right end of D and attach.
- STEP 5: Take metal trim panel provided with surround (mantel) and position it on top of heater. Measure 11 1/8" from back of stove, center panel and attach with self-tapping screws.

- STEP 6: Place a cloth or blanket over front portions of surround (mantel) as not to scar wooden part of surround.
- STEP 7: Slide unit into front opening of surround so top metal trim panel and outer sides of heater meet flush with the surround front.
- STEP 8: Remove cloth or blanket from underneath stove.
- STEP 9: Take two metal "L" brackets with screws provided and anchor back of fireplace to surround.
- STEP10:Place top on to surround (mantel), flush with back and equal on each end. Secure both ends and middle with screws.



SECTION V

MODEL 34 (ZC) ZERO CLEARANCE INSTALLATION

The installation must conform with local codes or in the absence of local codes, with *National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA54*.

This appliance may be installed in an After-Market^{*} Permanently Located Manufactured Home, where not prohibited by state or local codes.

* (After Market: Completion of sale, not for purpose of resale from manufacturer).

This appliance is only for use with the type of gas indicated on trating plate. This appliance is not convertible for use with other gases.

NOTE: See "Producing Adequate Air For Combustion And Ventilation" page 29-32.

CHOOSING THE LOCATION FOR YOUR FIREPLACE:

The figure below shows some of many ways your fireplace may be installed. Consider traffic pattern in your room and location of doors and windows. Moving air from ceiling fans, open doors and hot air grills may cause flames to soot. If a disturbance is found that affects flames, it must be eliminated by turning off ceiling fan, closing door or closing or moving hot air register. A corner location may be best where space is limited.

Your fireplace weighs no more than some of your furniture. If fireplace is located near a load bearing wall, additional supports to foundation will not be necessary. HEAVY FACINGS, SUCH AS BRICK, STONE, ETC., MAY REQUIRE ADDITIONAL FOUNDATION SUPPORT.


NOTE: If this appliance is installed directly on carpeting, tile or other combustible material, other than wood flooring, appliance shall be installed on a metal or wood panel extending full width and depth of appliance.


GAS LINE

Gas supply line and electrical supply must be installed before framing in the fireplace by a licensed installer.

DRAFTS

Do not locate the fireplace in high traffic areas or areas exposed to high drafts and winds. Locate the fireplace away from furniture and draperies.





WARNING: Installation and repairs should be performed by a qualified service person. The appliance should be inspected before use and at least annually by a professional service person. More frequent cleaning may be required due to excessive lint from carpeting, bedding material, etc. It is imperative that control compartments, burners and circulating air passageways of appliance be kept clean.

FIREPLACE CLEARANCES (ZC)

Fireplace may be placed directly against a combustible wall at using marked clearances. If fireplace is to be installed on a raised wooden platform, platform must be a continuous level surface. The fireplace must be secured in place so it cannot shift positions. Only header (see below) may rest on standoffs on top of firebox. When the firebox is installed over carpeting, vinyl tile, or any combustible material other than wood flooring, it must be installed on a metal or wood panel extending its full width and depth. Alternatively, carpeting, vinyl tile, etc. may be removed beneath fireplace before installing. COMBUSTIBLE MATERIALS MUST NOT BE INSTALLED OVER OR TOUCH ANY BLACK PAINTED SURFACE. DO NOT BLOCK HEAT CIRCULATING AIR OUTLETS. DOING SO MAY RESULT IN POTENTIAL FIRE HAZARDS.

- 1. Sidewall Clearances: Clearances from side of fireplace opening to any adjacent combustible wall should not be less than 7"right side and 7" left side.
- 2. Ceiling Clearances: Ceiling height should not be less than 24" from top of fireplace opening.

INSTALLING FIREBOX (ZC)

This list of specific instructions will help you make certain that every installation operation is performed correctly. Complete installation steps in sequence shown.

LOCAL BUILDING CODES SHOULD BE CONSULTED IN ALL CASES AS TO PARTICULAR REQUIREMENTS CONCERNING INSTALLATION OF FACTORY BUILT FIREPLACES. Select location for fireplace by taking into consideration factors previously outlined in "Choosing the Location."

Framing Firebox

Width of framed opening must be 33". Height of framed opening must be 25 1/8". Entire fireplace can be elevated above floor to achieve a raised hearth effect. This can be done by adding a small platform to achieve desired height.


NOTE: Wiring for lower blower must be installed during framing stage. Insulation should be used in framing on back, sides, and top.


Install Firebox

Install firebox into framed opening by placing it directly in front of opening and sliding it into proper position. Please follow wooden surround instructions.

Level Firebox

Check level of the firebox on top edge of fireplace face. Shim if necessary.





FINISHING YOUR FIREPLACE (ZC)

There is a wide variety of finishing material available for your fireplace, from formal wall treatments with marble and mantels, to rustic wood paneling, stone or brick. Noncombustible materials used in this installation such as slate, tile, marble, etc. must be at least 1/2" thick.

IT IS IMPORTANT THAT THE BLACK FACE OF FIREPLACE NOT BE COVERED WITH ANY TYPE OF COMBUSTIBLE MATERIAL.


Check to see whether man-made brick and stone are made of non-combustible materials before using them on face of fireplace. Some of these products contain combustible materials. Combustible wall coverings such as paneling or wall-board may not overlap black face of fireplace. Space between wall covering and fireplace should be sealed with a heat resistant material such as rock wool insulation or mortar.


NOTE: An "L" shaped steel lintel must be installed across top of firebox opening where facing materials such as brick or stone is used on the face of firebox. It acts as a support/ firestop. It should be attached to face of fireplace with screws and sealed to fireplace with a heat-resistant sealer.

CLEARANCES (ZC)

To ensure a safe installation, following must be carefully observed.

- 1. Sidewall Clearances: Clearances from side of fireplace opening to any adjacent combustible wall should not be less than 7".
- 2. Ceiling Clearances: Ceiling height should not be less than 24" from the top of fireplace opening.
- 3. **Mantel Clearances:** Clearance from top of heater to mantel or mantel supports should not be less than 20".
- 4. **Floor Clearances:** No clearance is required if the appliance is installed per these instructions.





SECTION VI



INSTALLATION AFTER MARKET PERMANENTLY LOCATED MANUFACTURED HOME

NOTE: See "Producing Adequate Air For Combustion And Ventilation" pages 29-32.

THIS APPLIANCE MAY BE INSTALLED IN AN AFTERMARKET*, PERMANENTLY LOCATED, MANUFACTURE HOME, WHERE NOT PROHIBITED BY LOCAL CODES. *(After Market: Completion of sale, not for purpose of resale from manufacturer.)

THIS APPLIANCE IS ONLY FOR USE WITH THE TYPE OF GAS INDICATED ON RATING PLATE. THIS APPLIANCE IS NOT CONVERTIBLE FOR USE WITH OTHER GASES.

NOTE: For Permanently Located Manufactured Home installation follow "Installation", pages from 5-28.

PRODUCING ADEQUATE AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION

This section is for residential or permanently located manufactured home installation

This heater shall not be installed in unusually tight construction unless provisions are adequate for combustion and ventilation air.

NOTE: This heater shall not be installed in a room or space unless the required volume of indoor combustion air is provided by the method in *National Fuel Gas Code, ANSIZ223.1/NFPA 54*, the *International Fuel Gas Code*, or applicable codes.

National Fuel Gas Code, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54 defines unusually tight construction or unconfined space as a space whose volume is less than 50 cubic feet per 1,000 BTU per hour (4.8m³ per kw) of aggregate input rating of all appliances installed in that space and an unconfined space as a space whose volume is not less than 50 cubic feet per 1,000 BTU per hour (4.8m³ per kw) of aggregate input rating of all appliances installed in that space. Rooms communicating directly with space in which appliances are installed, through openings not furnished with doors, are considered a part of unconfined space.

WARNING: IF AREA IN WHICH HEATER MAY BE OPERATED DOES NOT MEET THE REQUIRED VOLUME FOR INDOOR COMBUSTION AIR, COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION AIR SHALL BE PROVIDED BY ONE OF METHODS DESCRIBED IN *NATIONAL FUEL GAS CODE, ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54*, THE *INTERNATIONAL FUEL GAS CODE* OR APPLICABLE CODES.

WARNING: IF AREA IN WHICH HEATER MAY BE OPERATED IS SMALLER THAN THAT DEFINED AS AN UNCONFINED SPACE OR IF BUILDING IS OF UNUSUALLY TIGHT CONSTRUCTION, PROVIDE ADEQUATE AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION BY ONE OF METHODS DESCRIBED IN *NATIONAL FUEL GAS CODE*, *ANSI Z223.1/NFPA 54* AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION OR APPLICABLE LOCAL CODES.

Unusually tight construction is defined as construction where:

- a) Walls and ceilings exposed to the outside atmosphere have a continuous water vapor retarder with a rating of 1 perm (6 x 10⁻¹¹ kg per pa-sec-m²) or less with openings gasketed or sealed.
- b) Weather stripping has been added on openable windows and doors.
- c) Caulking or sealants are applied to areas such as joints around window and door frames, between sole plates and floors, between wall-ceiling joints, between wall panels, at penetrations for plumbing, electrical and gas lines and at other openings.

NOTE: SOME AREAS IN THE UNITED STATES HAVE HIGHER REQUIREMENTS FOR CUBIC FEET PER 1000 BTU/ HOUR INPUT. (EX. CINCINNATI, OHIO CODES REQUIRE 70 CUBIC FEET). CHECK YOUR LOCAL CODE BEFORE INSTALLATION.

DETERMINING FRESH-AIR FLOW FOR HEATER LOCATION

DETERMINE IF YOU HAVE A UNUSUALLY TIGHT CONSTRUCTION OR UNCONFINED SPACE

Use this worksheet to determine if you have unusually tight construction or unconfined space.

SPACE: Includes the room in which you will install heater plus adjoining rooms with doorless passageways or ventilation grills between the rooms.

1. Determine the volume of the space (length x width x height).

Length x Width x Height = cu.ft.(volume of space)

EXAMPLE: 20 ft.(Length) x 16 ft.(Width) x 8 ft.(ceiling Height)= 2560 cu. ft. (volume of space)

If additional ventilation to adjoining room is supplied with grills or openings, add the volume of these rooms to the total volume of the space.

2. Divide the space volume by 50 cubic feet to determine the maximum BTU/Hr the space can support.

(volume of space)/50 cu. ft. =maximum BTU/Hr the space can support

EXAMPLE: 2560 cu. ft. (volume of space /50 cu. Ft .= 51.2 or 51200 (maximum BTU/Hr the space can support)

3. Add the BTU/Hr of all fuel burning appliances in the space.

Vent-free heater	_	BTU/Hr
*Gas water heater		BTU/Hr
Gas furnace		BTU/Hr
Vented gas heater	_	BTU/Hr
Gas fireplace logs		BTU/Hr
Other gas appliances	+	BTU/Hr
Total	=	BTU/Hr
Example: Gas water heater 40000 BTU/Hr		
Vent-free heater + <u>18000</u> BTU/Hr		

Total = 58000 BTU/Hr

*Does not include direct-vent gas appliances. Direct-vent draws combustion air from outdoors and vents to the outdoors.

4. Compare the maximum BTU/Hr the space can support with actual amount of BTU/Hr used.

BTU/Hr (maximum the space can support)

BTU/Hr (actual amount of BTU/Hr used)

Example: 51200 BTU/Hr (maximum the space can support)

58000 BTU/Hr (actual amount of BTU/Hr used)

Space in above example is unusually tight construction because actual BTU/Hr used is more than maximum BTU/Hr the space can support. You must provide additional fresh air. Your options are as follows:

- A. Rework worksheet, adding space of an adjoining room. If extra space provides an unconfined space, remove door to adjoining room or add ventilation grills between rooms. See "Ventilation Air From Inside Building", page 31.
- **B.** Vent room directly to the outdoors. See "Ventilation Air From Outdoors", page 32.
- C. Install a lower BTU/Hr heater, if lower BTU/Hr size makes room unconfined.

If actual BTU/Hr used is less than the maximum BTU/Hr the space can support, space is an unconfined space. You will need no additional fresh air ventilation.

WARNING:

YOU MUST PROVIDE ADDITIONAL VENTILATION AIR IN UNUSUALLY TIGHT CONSTRUCTION

AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION INSIDE BUILDING




Figure 14 Ventilation Air From Inside Building

This fresh air would come from an adjoining unconfined space. When venting to an adjoining space, you must provide two permanent openings: one within 12" of ceiling and one within 12" of floor, on wall connecting two spaces. (See Options 1 and 2, Figure 14.) You can also remove door into adjoining room. (See Option 3, Figure 14.)

WARNING

REWORK WORKSHEET, ADDING SPACE OF ADJOINING UNCONFINED SPACE. COMBINED SPACES MUST HAVE ADEQUATE AMOUNT OF AIR TO SUPPLY ALL APPLIANCES IN BOTH SPACES.

NOTE: Each opening shall have a minimum free area of 1 square inch per 1000 BTU's per hour of the total input ratings of all gas utilization equipment in the confined space, but not less than 100 square inches.



AIR FOR COMBUSTION AND VENTILATION OUTDOORS

Provide extra fresh air by using ventilation grills or ducts. You must provide two permanent openings: one within 12" of ceiling and one within 12" of floor. Connect these items directly to outdoors. These spaces include attics and crawl spaces. Follow **National Fuel Gas Code NFPA 54/ANSI Z223.1**, Section 5.3, "Air For Combustion and Ventilation" for required size of ventilation grills or ducts.

IMPORTANT: Do not provide openings for inlet air into attic if attic has a thermostatcontrolled power vent. Heated air entering the attic will activate the power unit.



Ventilation Air From Outdoors

IMPORTANT SAFEGUARDS

Although your gas logs are very realistic in appearance, it is not a real burning fireplace and must not be used for burning rejected material.

- To avoid irreparable damage to heater or personal injury, matches, paper, garbage or any other material **must not** be placed or thrown on top of logs or into flames.
- To avoid personal injury, do not touch hot surfaces when heater is operating.
- Close supervision is necessary when heater is being operated near children.

WARNING:

THE LOGS ARE MANUFACTURED FROM BONDED CERAMIC FIBER. THIS IS A COMMONLY USED MATERIAL IN INDUSTRY WORLDWIDE. IN EVENT THAT A LOG SHOULD BE REMOVED, CARE SHOULD BE TAKEN NOT TO DAMAGE BONDED MATERIAL. INTENTIONAL MISUSE OR DELIBERATELY FRAGMENTING MATERIAL COULD LEAD TO INHALING FIBERS AND BE HAZARDOUS TO YOUR HEALTH.


CLEANING BURNER AND PILOT AREA:

Turn unit off and let cool. The appliance must be turned "OFF" before cleaning inside firebox (burn area), make sure pilot is "OFF" completely and appliance has cooled.

- All cleaning should be carried out when heater is cold. Limited cleaning is required with normal use. Dusting front of base, top of piezo cover or control knob panel may be required occasionally. Do not use cleaning fluids to clean logs or any other part of heater.
- If flames show unusual shapes or behavior or if burner fails to ignite properly, burner holes may require cleaning. If this occurs, contact your nearest dealer to service heater.
- Slide screens open if equipped or open doors.
- Remove logs very gently (to clean logs use a soft brush or compressed air). Place logs aside. NOTE: If unit is equipped with embers on front burner remove and put aside before cleaning area.
- Use vacuum cleaner with furniture brush attached and gently clean burner. It may be necessary to use brass brush when cleaning the burner making sure all holes in burner are open. Vacuum pilot, making sure not to damage any of parts. Replace logs in proper position, replace embers if equipped. (See Page 8).
- Close screens or door. Make sure unit is plugged up.

WARNING:

Failure to keep the primary air openings (s) of the burner (s) clean may result in sooting and property damage.





MAINTENANCE

CLEANING BOTTOM COMPARTMENT - MOTOR AND MOTOR REPLACEMENT

- 1. Unplug power cord.
- 2. Open access door at front bottom facing unit to access bottom compartment.
- 3. Using vacuum cleaner, remove all dust, fuzz, dirt and foreign materials from bottom of stove. Also vacuum the fan blade on motor. They must be kept clean to ensure peak performance of motor.
- 4. Check to see if there are no loose fitting.
- 5. If motor needs to be replaced, use a 5/16" hex driver to loosen and remove the (2) two screws holding motor racket to motor support. (See Figure 17).
- 6. Mark wires and disconnect motor from unit.
- 7. When replacing motor use only Part # PESBR085.
- 8. Reconnect all marked wires to motor.
- 9. Reinstall motor buy installing the two screws thru motor bracket into motor support and tighten screws using 5/16" hex driver.




RHEOSTAT REPLACEMENT

- 1. If rheostat needs to be replaced. Open access door at front bottom facing unit, rheostat is bottom right of compartment. Mark wires and disconnect rheostat from unit. (See Figure 18).
- 2. Remove knob from rheostat by gently pulling it. Remove lock nut from stem of rheostat and remove from rheostat holder.
- 3. When replacing rheostat use only Part # PEBC204.
- 4. Reinstall rheostat into rheostat holder. Reinstall lock nut onto stem of rheostat and tighten nut.
- 5. Replace knob onto stem of rheostat.
- 6. Reconnect all marked wires to rheostat

THERMOSTAT REPLACEMENT

- 1. Thermostat is located at top front of unit under visor in room air channel right side of opening.(See Figure 19).
- 2. Thermostat is positioned under flanges of thermostat bracket. Gently bend flanges of thermostat bracket up and slide thermostat out.
- 3. Disconnect (2) two wires from thermostat electrical post.
- 4. When replacing thermostat use only Part # PE400130.
- 5. To reinstall thermostat, reconnect the (2) two wires to electrical post of thermostat. NOTE: On a new thermostat you bend the electrical post up 90° then reconnect the (2) two wires to electrical post of thermostat.
- 6. Slide thermostat wings under the flanges of thermostat bracket, making sure disk of thermostat is flat against inner top of unit. Gently bend flanges of thermostat bracket down to hold thermostat firmly in place against surface of unit.






