





- A. Samuel's birth and lifelong dedication to YHWH: 1:1-2:11.
  - Born in Ramah, back and forth to Shiloh.
  - B. Eli's wicked sons show contempt for YHWH at the tabernacle: 2:12-26.
    - C. Prophecy that Eli's sons will be killed in one day: 2:27-3:1a.


      D. TURNING POINT: Samuel's call: 3:1b-4:1a.
    - C. Prophecy about Eli's sons comes true in one day: 4:1b-22.
  - B'. Philistines learn to respect YHWH with the Ark: 5:1-7:1.

## 1 Samuel 4-7 Grusting GOD.







# Aim: Learn that God is holy and only he can be trusted.

### hebrew roots: KBD or KVD:

kavad (verb)	it is on you	to weigh heavily upon
kaved (verb	it defines you	to be glorious, honorable, weighty
kavod (noun)	you receive it	honor glory
kibed (verb)	you give it	give honor to, to clean or sweep
kibud (adj)	you proclaim it	honoring
koved (noun)	you carry it	mass or weight

Eli and his sons gain weight physically while losing honor and failing to glorify God. Eli refuses to exert any weight on his evil sons. So the Lord dishonors Eli with a weighty prophesy of lost glory.




## Eli and his sons were not holy and could not be trusted.

# While they lose honor, Samuel gains honor as he glorifies the Lord through obedience.

Psalm 115:1
Not unto us, O Lord,
not unto us, but unto
thy name give glory,
for thy mercy, and for
thy truth's sake.



## Gather at Ebenezer:



Stone of help: If we gather where the Lord helps, then he will help us.



If the stone did not help, then maybe the Ark and the sons of the priest will insure victory!

Disaster follows as Eli's dying daughter in law names her son I-KABOD: Where's the glory.

Remember that they are still in the era of the Judges when "everyone did what was right in their own eyes." Why should the symbol of the Lord's glory, his "mercy seat" of judgment, remain with people who fail to bring him glory?

Note that the bad news is brought by an unnamed man from Benjamin who escaped:? Relative of future King Saul?



# Gruth: A Moly God cannot be manipulated.

Application: how are we trying to manipulate God?

A holy God can be trusted to honor holiness.

"Be holy, for I am holy."

A God who can be manipulated is NO6 a God who can be trusted so why would we want that?



# Irony: The people deserve exile but God symbolically exiles the symbol of his presence.

## This will serve two purposes:

- 1. Cause the people to repent and return to behavior and worship that glorifies God.
- 2. God's Ark in exile will achieve what the people could not do.





Ghen the Philistines think they can force UNWN to worship Dagon! Symbolically, Dagon loses his head (ability to reason) and his hands (ability to act). In the place where they hung the heads of conquered enemies, their god loses his head.



# Many allusions to the Egyptians of the Exodus as referenced by the Philistine priests.

The presence of the one true God brings plagues and display the powerlessness of false gods. Remember that the Philistines are descendants of the Egyptians.

5 cities of the Philistines: echo of the 5 sinful cities of the plain of the Jordan in Genesis, an enclave of pagans that cause trouble for God's people.

Interesting prophesy of 5 cities dedicated to the Lord in Isaiah


In that day five cities in the land of Egypt will be speaking the language of Canaan and swearing allegiance to the LORD of hosts; one will be called the City of Destruction.

— Isaiah 19:18 (NASB®)



# The Ark did not work out as a slave to Dagon, and like the slaves of the Exodus, it must be sent back with gifts.

The ingenious "test" of the Lord's will for the Ark: cows not accustomed to pulling a wagon and are in stage of feeding their calves are not going to naturally go anywhere. Therefore, the cause of their actions must be supernatural.





# Why go to Beth-Shemesh? Why go to a Joshua?

City given to Levites: They should know how to handle the Ark.

Joshua's namesake led the conquering of the land and knew how to honor the Lord.

But they "looked" at the ark and were struck-down (same word as strike with plague).
Surely the Philistines "looked" at the Ark and did not die. So why?








And they sacrificed cows instead of bulls.

## how do they react?

Send it away! Just like the Philistines. These Levites are no more holy than the Philistines. The perverted Priests and Levites are a repeating theme in Judges-Samuel starting with no one less than the grandson of Moses in the story of Dan in Judges.


### Why Kiriath-jearim?

It was a city of the Gibeonites who tricked Joshua into a sinful treaty. Ghis place is like a mini-version of being in the wilderness: an island of wilderness within the land. It is like the wilderness because the "slave" has been freed but has not entered the promised land. Amazingly, it remains there until David conquers Jerusalem.



# We are told in 7:2 that 20 years pass. What is happening during this time?


After the Ark decapitates Dagon in Ashdod, Samson crushes Dagon and his followers in Gaza. Was this the catalyst that caused the people to return to the Lord?





## Both Eli end their Judgeships as blind men but Samson gets revenge.

Their heads are crushed which should make us think of the prophesy of the son of the woman crushing the head of the serpent.





# Samuel gathers the people to repent and reject false gods.


Grue repentance requires feeling the weight of our sins: showing honor to God, and seeking to glorify η im by being living images of η im.

Jesus transfers the weight of our sins onto himself and shares his glory with us. For this, we honor him.



The prior battle of APDEK is reversed. Now the Israelites are in fear but choose to trust the Lord and the Lord "thunders" and confuses the Philistines.

The new stone is not a stone of manipulation but a stone of remembrance of salvation.

Now well can you trust that the Lord has sealed your heart for his courts above?




Why not choose or make an object as your personal Ebenezer... your stone of remembrance ... to remind you to trust your Ŋoly God?







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
