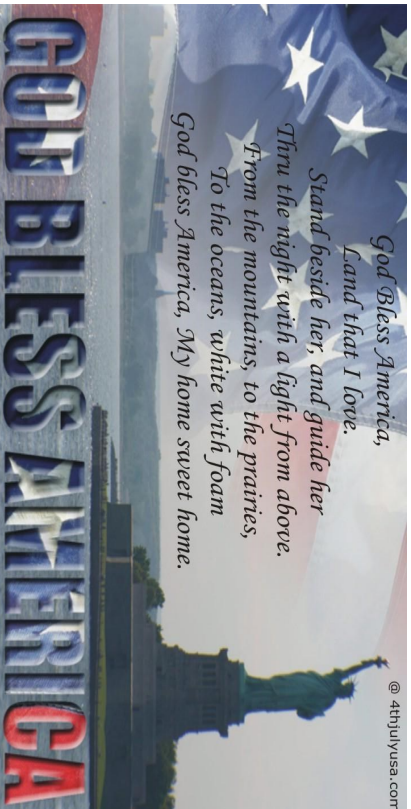

The following was sent to us by Dr. Thomas Richard who received it from Elizabeth Sholes of the California Council of Churches. It was created by the daughter of a friend. In the midst of our nation's confrontation with the "original sin" of racism, she deliberated on the facts behind the deaths of many Black people. She considered how she, as a young white woman, could easily do what they had done without being murdered. It is compelling. We wanted to share it with you.

I have privilege as a White person because I can do all of these things without thinking twice about it...

KIND WORDS AND BLESSINGS

“Juneteenth” 2020 would have been my mother’s 94th birthday (she’s been gone 2 years now). To celebrate, my sister Carla and I decided to meet at the Denny’s that is halfway between our homes. (With COVID-19 in full swing, our previous meeting at that Denny’s consisted of us each ordering our own individual meal for take-out and then sitting in the parking lot, in our respective cars, to eat while chatting through our open car windows.) To our delight, by June 19th the dining area was open with masks, disposable menus, and distancing!

We ordered our lunch, and I shared some of the photos I’d retrieved from our mother’s home in Kona. Handling all the old photos, my hands got quite dirty. So I excused myself and went to wash my hands before the food came. Walking to the restroom, I noticed a black man, about my age, sitting alone in a booth, reading a book. I thought it might be a Bible, so when I returned I peeked over his shoulder and saw that he was reading Colossians! I was so happy to have found a fellow believer and, though I didn’t want to interrupt, I turned and said, “God bless you,” hoping he could see the smile underneath my face mask. He was pleasantly surprised.

I walked back to our booth just before my sizzlin’ skillet arrived. Carla and I topped off the meal by sharing a hot fudge sundae - our mom would have been proud! I kept wondering why they hadn’t brought us the bill.

The gentleman I’d noticed earlier came over to our table, still wearing his mask, and he’d written, on a yellow legal pad, “Today I received a blessing, so I’m giving God’s blessing to you two!” He pointed to heaven and said that God knew about the blessing, and that our bill had been taken care of. We said thank you, but he was quickly out the door before we realized that he’d paid for our lunch!

My sister had no idea about what had happened, so I filled her in about the simple words of encouragement I’d given earlier: God bless you. Neither Carla nor I have ever had anything like that happen to us before! We spent the remaining time filled with joy, and trying to figure out a way to pay it forward. As for me, the Interfaith Food Pantry seems like just the thing!

It was a wonderful memorial birthday celebration honoring our mom, and a day Carla and I will always remember!

**NACCC ANNUAL MEETING NEWS**

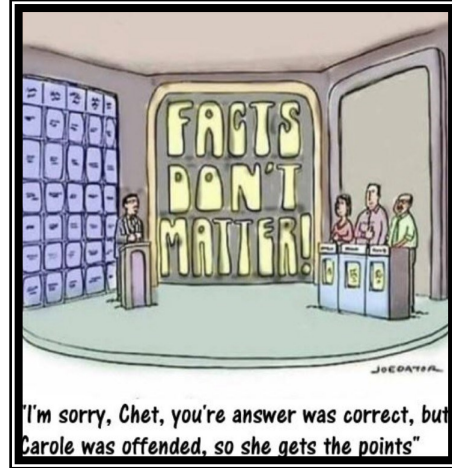

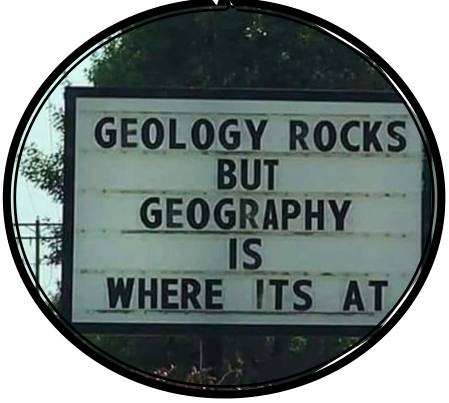

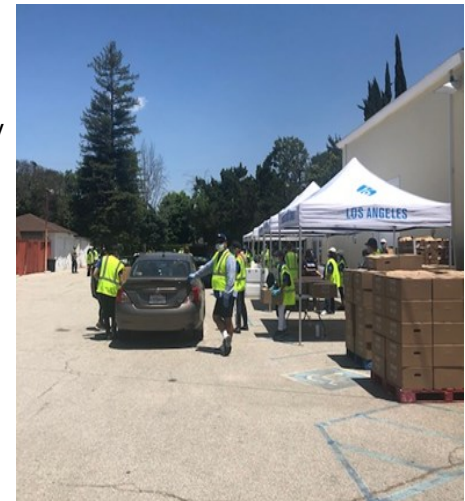

accommodate the various pieces of what was affectionately called *Davis City*. Bob recalled that about 30 members were working there one exceedingly warm evening in which the heat and humidity were excruciating. Leard said "Let's get some beer!" Bob, in his presumed innocence, remarked, "What about Dr. Staves?" To which the response was, "Aah, he's out of town." So the beer flowed and everyone had a can beside his work. Bob was merrily working away through the evening. But at one point, he looked up and to his consternation found Fellowship Hall completely deserted! What more, Dr. Staves was standing at a doorway. He entered and said "Good evening, Bob. I see that the project is coming along very well." Bob, who was now dumbfounded and frozen, just watched as Dr. Staves walked around, admired various pieces of Davis City, and at the same time with nonchalance retrieved beer cans that were empty. After he deposited these empties into the garbage can, he said to Bob, "Keep up the good work," and departed. As soon as Dr. Staves was completely out of sight, Leard stuck his face out from wherever he was hiding and flashed Bob a grin that went from ear to ear. Then, the rest of the men joined in with a roar of laughter. If a picture were taken of Bob's face, it would have captured a sight to behold. If this picture had been made into a cartoon, the bubble with Bob's remarks would have said "\$#\*WZ#a!\$^MS&".

The Lord works in mysterious ways. His method of blessing the men's fellowship, Davis City and especially Leard himself is unusual. But it imbued the Midway with the most proper wild west spirit and assured the success and enjoyment of this part of the Golden West Fair for all the years following that memorable summer evening.

## **GLIMPSE INTO THE PAST**

### **BOB KUYKENDALL AND MIDWAY WILD WEST BOOTHS**

For many years, the Golden West Fair featured the Midway booths, which typified many county fair events throughout the US. This is a remembrance of Bob Kuykendall who was one of many who helped put it together, beginning with the 1971 GWF. Bob was also remembered as an inveterate practical jokester— at his memorial service, we all prayed that God would not become a subject of one of his pranks!

Around 2000, the Midway booths were no longer part of GWF. By then, the set ups were well worn as well as the fair was scheduled for one day only. This anecdote on the fabrication of these booths in the summer of 1971 was told to this writer by Bob himself, wherein he recalled another beloved member of our Church, Leard Davis. Bob, an electrician in the television industry, became acquainted with Leard through his trade. Leard Davis earned a number of Emmys as lighting director for CBS television and was a highly versatile individual with talents embracing many other areas. They included writing and directing many plays for our Church. Many of you may recall the country music television's Hee Haw, one of the shows in which he was involved.

Bob and Gerry Kuykendall were teenage sweethearts at Hollywood High School and married soon after they graduated. When they became parents, Gerry believed that their children should have some spiritual experience, so she suggested that they join the Church of the Chimes. Bob recalled that he was utterly unenthusiastic about this. Nevertheless, Gerry dragged him to church one day; the scene created by Bob of his kicking and screaming all the way to church is left to your imagination. During the offering, Leard Davis, who was ushering, saw Bob. He said in a very clear voice to Bob, one loud enough to disrupt the quiet and beauty of the worship for a brief moment, "I want to see you after church!" There was no doubt that this was the defining moment that called the Kuykendalls to our church.

Bob, being the youngest man of the men's fellowship, was one sent up the ladders whenever there were chores around the campus. He enjoyed this fellowship and all the labors. The hard work of the men was often rewarded by extracurricular refreshments. There was a select group within this fellowship, who were probably inspired by Leard, that ran this operation very discreetly and always without the knowledge or approval of Dr. Staves. Their *modus operandi* would have befuddled even Robert Stack (i.e., Eliot Ness) and earned the praise of all the anti-heroes of the prohibition era.

The Midway booths were an initiative of Leard. For this project, he brought the expertise and skill of the entire CBS staff to bear in its design. During the summer of 1971, Bower Fellowship Hall floor space was subdivided into small areas to

### **DARK CHOCOLATE DELIGHT**

|                           |                                   |
|---------------------------|-----------------------------------|
| 1 Pkg. chocolate cake mix | 14 oz. flaked coconut             |
| 1 ½ Cup evaporated milk   | ½ Cup butter                      |
| 1 ½ Cup sugar             | 2 Cups semisweet chocolate chips  |
| 24 large marshmallows     | 1 ½ Cup slivered almonds, toasted |

Mix cake according to pkg. directions using a 15" x 10" x 1" pan.  
Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

In large saucepan combine 1 cup evaporated milk and 1 cup sugar; bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat.  
Add marshmallows and stir until melted. Add coconut and mix well.  
Spread over cake immediately after baking. Cool 30 minutes.

In small saucepan combine butter and remaining evaporated milk and sugar; bring to a boil. Remove from heat; stir in chocolate chips until melted. Spread over coconut layer; sprinkle with almonds. Enjoy!
