FAITHFULLY YOURS

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 2. On that day we come to the table to share the Lord's Supper. We mark our foreheads with the sign of the cross, often with ashes from last year's palm branches which were burned after Palm Sunday. The service is quiet, somber and in the brief time we are together the shadows of the next 40 days begin to fall upon us.

Lent is the time when we prepare ourselves to walk with Jesus to the cross. We are on the dusty trails with him. We see the people crowding close to him, we hear his words falling upon hopeful and anxious listening ears.

They do not know what lies ahead for him, this man who has brought God close to them, who has healed them and loved them. He has given sight to the blind, brought the lame to walk and chased dark spirits out of tortured souls. He has told them stories which touch their hearts and offered prayers which heal their broken bodies and spirits.

They do not know what lies ahead for him, but we do. We hear the whispers of the ones who doubt him, who are threatened by him. We feel the darkness encroaching. And though we know there will be an empty tomb, in these 40 days we are walking with Jesus to the cross.

Let this Lenten season be, for us, a season of reflection, of quiet, of prayer. Let us spend time trying to fathom all that Jesus did, all that was done to him so that he could bring God to us, he could be God for us. We will undoubtedly cringe in fear... We will cry in sadness...

The song that is mine in these days reminds us that "Jesus walked this lonesome valley. He had to walk it by himself, nobody else, could walk it for him. He had to walk it by himself."

But let us walk with him. Let us be on that path. From here to the cross, so that we can rejoice at the empty tomb.

April 10 : On **Palm Sunday** we will have palms and hear the story of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem. Our youth will host Stations of the Cross after the Worship Service.

April 14: During the **Maundy Thursday** evening service we will share the Lord's Last Supper and, in a darkening sanctuary, the words of the betrayal and arrest of Jesus will be heard.


GREATER LA HOMELESS COUNT

STAVES CHAPEL ~ STAINED GLASS WINDOWS

The Chapel's stained glass windows depict Congregationalism from our roots in England to the founding of Church of the Chimes in 1950. Pictured below, is the seventh of the Chapel's fourteen stained glass windows along with a description of its significance entitled "The First Thanksgiving." To the right are the first six of the Chapel's stained glass windows which were detailed in earlier editions.

7: THE FIRST THANKSGIVING:

The Pilgrims' first winter of 1621 was brutal. Most of them stayed on board the ship. They were plagued with illness (scurvy, exposure, and contagious diseases) and only one-half lived to see the spring. They must have seemed a sorry group when in March an English speaking Abenak Indian arrived. A few days later, he returned with Squanto, from the Pawtuxet Tribe, who had been kidnapped by an English sea captain and sold into slavery. He later escaped to London and eventually found his way home. He taught the Pilgrims to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish, and avoid poisonous plants, etc. He helped forge an alliance with Wampanoag Indian Chief Massasoit. Because of their successful harvest, the Pilgrims and their new found friends held a three-day celebration in November 1621. Their feast included fish, lobster, clams, venison, waterfowl, berries, squash, and pumpkins. This celebration became an annual event. In 1863 President Abraham Lincoln declared a day in November as National Thanksgiving Day.

The Wearing of the Green

Three leaf clovers, green beer, Green Eggs and Ham, and even the Chicago River turning green, all indicate that March 17th is fast approaching, that date when everyone seems to be just a wee bit Irish!

As a counselor at the local Rec Center, a Children's Church teacher, and even as a teacher in middle school, each year when March 17th rolled around you'd find me in green head to toe - Kelly, chartreuse, avocado, even "puke" green. My obvious mix of green clothing was a blatant attempt to not take any chances!

In conclusion I'd like to say, whether a Tory or a Whig, a rebel or a patriot, wear your green and wear it proudly! Queen Victoria is long gone (long live the queen!), and the wearing of the green is not likely to result in a death sentence. Me? I just want to avoid getting pinched!
