






FROM OUR SENIOR MINISTER

other to Maxine North in 1995. Maxine would come often to sit by herself in the garden, as her act of worship.

Vonnie Dickinson was born in Lafayette, Indiana. She and Dick were married in Lafayette in 1941 and moved to California in 1942. Vonnie was an elegant lady and an extremely talented artist. Her favored medium was oils, but she was accomplished with water colors, as well. She shared this wonderful talent with many people, and in many ways. For example, she taught oil painting here, at the Church of the Chimes.

She was involved with two art clubs, whose members supplied paintings to Valley Presbyterian Hospital. Vonnie had forty-eight of them hanging on the hospital walls at any given time. They were for sale, with twenty-five percent of the proceeds donated to the hospital. Over the years, this effort netted it an excess of \$15,000

This activity was just a small part of her over 18 years of volunteer work at Valley Presbyterian. She was the most active volunteer in its history, having completed over 8,500 hours of service. A little arithmetic shows that this translates to more than 355 continuous days (and nights!). She also gave of herself to the Golden West Fair by operating the art exhibit, a job she inherited from Bonnie Kingsnorth.

Vonnie Dickinson was a soft spoken person, delightful and a pleasure to be with, who created much beauty for our enjoyment. The restoration of the Garden to a place of quiet beauty and peace is a truly appropriate remembrance of her elegance, grace and artistry.

ANOTHER GREAT RECIPE FOR THE MONTH:

Zucchini Bread

(Ruth Slike)

2 Cups (2-3 medium) grated zucchini

1 Cup oil
2 Cups sugar
1 tsp baking soda
1 tsp baking soda
1 tsp baking powder
3 Eggs, beaten
2 Cups sugar
1 tsp baking powder
1 tsp salt
1 Cup chopped nuts
1 Cup raisins

Cream together oil, sugar and vanilla. Add eggs and then mix in zucchini.

dry ingredients - mix well in a separate bowl. Add nuts and raisins.

Blend in dry ingredients with creamed mixture, one third at a time. (Do not over mix.) Pour into greased and floured loaf pans or muffin tins..

Bake 55 min. in 350 degree oven. Muffins bake in about 25 minutes.

THE CHAPEL OF THE GARDEN - REMEMBERING VONNIE DICKINSON

Our initial feeling upon entering the Sanctuary is a feeling of closeness to God. From the Chancel, the view reveals a garden radiating warmth and serenity, unmistakable signs of God's Love. These familiar words tell the story:



The garden was donated by Dr. Katharine Gibson, when the Sanctuary was built in 1961. The fountain was donated by the Alexander family in honor of Veryl's step-mother, Dixie Heinz Alexander. By 1994, the Garden was showing its age; additionally, the earthquake had toppled the fountain. It was time to refurbish.

The Garden renovation was made possible by the generosity of Richard Dickinson, in loving memory of his wife Yvonne Dickinson, or Vonnie as she was known to all of us. At the outset of this project, a landscape architect named Pierre Cabrol was called in for ideas. He became so enthused by the challenge of creating a place of joy and beauty that he provided his time and talent without remuneration. Often he was found working right alongside the crew.

The Garden was re-dedicated in the spring of 1994 in Vonnie Dickinson's memory, in a service led by Dr. Richard Bower. Included in the Garden furniture are two benches; one a memorial to Allan Ross, established in 1993, and the

THE DAYS OF HOLY WEEK

As we anticipate Easter Sunday, I find it helpful to walk with Jesus the last days of his life. The joy and wonder of Easter is deeper and more real to me when I ponder the days of holy week. Let me share with you what happened on each of these days (the days vary slightly in each of the Gospels):

Sunday: Jesus arrives in Jerusalem and is greeted by crowds...

Monday: Jesus curses the fig tree and cleanses the temple...

Wednesday: Jesus weeps over Jerusalem...

Thursday: Jesus has his Last Supper with the disciples and

goes to the garden of Gethsemane, where he prays...

Friday: Jesus is betrayed, arrested, crucified and buried...

Saturday: Jesus' body rests in the tomb...

Sunday: Jesus rises from death!

HOLY WEEK AT THE CHURCH OF THE CHIMES

Although somewhat scaled back, Holy Weeks services will be Streaming Live via our Facebook connection:

Palm Sunday: Rev. Peek will be preaching at this 10:30am service assisted by Dr. Bingham, music by Greg Whipple and Alan Steinberger, and a children's moment from Jane Poole. We will have palm branches as we all cry "Hosanna, Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!"

Maundy Thursday: Dr. Bingham and Rev. Peek invite all to gather at 7:30pm. As they celebrate communion you will be invited to break bread and drink from the cup with them. They will share the words of the betrayal and arrest of the Lord.

Good Friday: At noon Jane Poole, Rev. Peek and Dr. Bingham, will be sharing the last words that Jesus spoke from the cross. There will be a time of prayer, and also beautiful music.

Easter Sunday: We will joyfully begin worship at 10:30am as we sing "Alleluia, Christ is Risen!" Dr. Bingham and Rev. Peek will be leading the worship service along with music by Alan Steinberger and Greg Whipple and a children's moment by Jane Poole.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The Stations of the Cross represent events from Jesus' passion and death during His last day on Earth as a man—the day which Christians refer to as Good Friday. Take a sort of personal pilgrimage...Use your senses and imagination to reflect prayerfully upon Jesus' suffering, His Death, and His Resurrection...Seek potential relevance to your life today—

STATION 1 ~ "JESUS IS CONDEMNED TO DIE" Pontius Pilate condemns Jesus to death. Many people yelled at Jesus and said hurtful things to him while others told lies about Him. Even though this was happening to Jesus, he stayed quiet because he knew God was with him. Jesus even asked for the people saying these hurtful things to be forgiven by God. Relevance Today: Are there times when people have said hurtful or harmful things to you? Did you feel sad, scared, or angry? ASK Jesus to help you remember He is always with you, especially during trying times.

STATION 2 ~ "JESUS CARRIES THE CROSS" Jesus willingly accepts and patiently bears his cross. Soldiers took Jesus and even though they were seriously harming him, Jesus didn't say anything unkind when they made him carry the cross. In fact, Jesus knew it would be a long and hard journey and He chose to do it for us. **Relevance Today:** Have there been times when things have been hard for you? Have you struggled to understand why bad things happen in the world, to you, or people you care about? **ASK** Jesus to guide you toward understanding and to help you through the difficult times.

STATION 3 ~ "**JESUS FALLS THE FIRST TIME**" Weakened by torments and by loss of blood, Jesus falls beneath his cross. Jesus grew extremely tired carrying the cross. It was harsh traveling and He had walked for a very long time. The cross He bore was immensely heavy and as a result, Jesus fell. The soldiers yelled at Him to get up and move faster. Without complaining, Jesus got up and continued the journey. **Relevance Today:** Do you remember a time when you fell and it hurt? Another kind of falling which is not physical but a spiritual fall, is called sinning - when we fall away from Jesus. Next time you fall away from Jesus **ASK** Him to forgive you and help you become more like him.

STATION 4 ~ "JESUS MEETS HIS MOTHER" *Mary, Jesus' mother, is filled with grief.* How terribly sad it was for Mary to see her beloved son suffer. Even though she knew it was the Heavenly Father's plan, it was still extremely hard for her to see Jesus bare the load of the cross. **Relevance Today:** Have you ever been despondent because someone you know or love was in pain? It's terribly hard to see someone we love in pain. **ASK** Jesus to help you be a comfort to your friend or loved one, and, to share Jesus' love with them.

STATION 5 ~ "SIMON HELPS JESUS CARRY THE CROSS" Soldiers force Simon of Cyrene to carry the cross. Since the cross was so very heavy and hard for Jesus to carry, the soldiers pulled a man named Simon to help Jesus. Jesus quietly thanks Simon as they carry the cross together. **Relevance Today:** Sometimes it's hard to help others when they need help. Maybe you would rather be doing something else, or you just don't feel like helping at all. **ASK** Jesus for guidance, and the next time you are asked to help someone, remember how Simon helped Jesus and know Jesus is quietly thanking you.



STATIONS OF THE CROSS CONT.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

STATION 6 ~ "VERONICA WIPES JESUS' FACE" Veronica steps through the crowd to wipe the face of Jesus. Jesus is so very hot and dirty from the hard and arduous walk. As he was walking, a woman named Veronica steps in front of Jesus to wipe his face. Because of her kindness, Jesus leaves a picture of his face on her cloth in thanks for her selfless actions. **Relevance Today: ASK** Jesus for support, and every time you do something small for someone else, know that Jesus sees your kindness and is smiling at you from above.

STATION 7 ~ "JESUS FALLS THE SECOND TIME" Jesus falls beneath the weight of the cross a second time. Jesus falls again because he's tired and suffering. The cross is becoming more and more difficult to carry. It's grueling and hard for him to continue this severe and demanding journey. **Relevance Today:** Have you had a hard time finishing a project or didn't feel like doing anything at all because you were emotionally or physically drained? Remember Jesus knows exactly how you feel and sends you blessings from heaven. **ASK** yourself to use Jesus' strength to help you continue on your journey as He did on His.

STATION 8 ~ "JESUS MEETS THE WOMEN OF JERUSALEM" Jesus tells the women to weep not for him but for themselves and for their children. While Jesus is carrying the cross, he sees women crying as he suffers. They are grief-stricken. Jesus tells them not to cry for him, but, to take care of others, especially their children as he taught his followers to do. **Relevance Today:** Sometimes we get so caught up in ourselves we forget to think about other people. **ASK** Jesus to help you become more like him - to stop and think about others and take action when you can.

STATION 9 ~ "JESUS FALLS THE THIRD TIME" Weakened almost to the point of death, Jesus falls a third time. Jesus falls for a third time in unimaginable pain and has been walking for an extremely long time with the cross feeling heavier and heavier. Yet, even though it is difficult, he gets up and begins to walk again. *Relevance Today: It is hard to do our best when we are exhausted. It's so easy to feel discouraged and want to quit. ASK Jesus for help and he will wrap his loving arms around you and give you the strength to go on

STATION 10 ~ "JESUS IS STRIPPED" The soldiers strip Jesus of his garments, treating him as a common criminal. Even after Jesus reaches the end of a long and arduous journey, hurting beyond belief, the soldiers continue to punish him. They take away his clothes and put a crown of thorns upon his head. Jesus looks to his Father God for he knows he is not alone. *Relevance Today: It's difficult to be understanding of people who intentionally hurt us. **ASK** Jesus to open your heart and make it like His. Be kind and know you are not alone.

STATION 11 ~ "JESUS IS NAILED TO THE CROSS" Jesus' hands and feet are nailed to the cross. In front of many people on Good Friday, in the city of Calvary, Jesus is nailed to the cross to die. Before he died, Jesus asks God to forgive the people responsible for his death. *Relevance Today: Even when others hurt us, Jesus wants us to forgive. He was betrayed, and yet, He forgave. **ASK** Jesus to help you forgive those who betray you.

ASK and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you...Matthew 7:7



STATION 13 ~ "**JESUS IS TAKEN OFF THE CROSS**" *The lifeless body of Jesus is tenderly placed in the arms of Mary, his mother.* Jesus' friends take his body down from the cross, and Mary gets to hold him. She is in a blinding state of mourning for her son. People are utterly despondent. ***Relevance Today:** Have you lost someone you love? Losing a loved one is so very painful. You question things, you lose perspective. Your heart becomes heavy. **ASK** yourself, does Jesus know what I am going through? Of course He does. Know that Jesus loves you and He will always walk beside you during life's difficult times.

STATION 14 ~ "**JESUS IS LAID IN THE TOMB"** *Jesus' disciples place his body in the tomb.* Jesus' friends clean his body, wrap him in fresh linen cloth and lay him in a tomb. They push a large stone over the entrance so no one can get inside. ***Relevance Today:** It's hard to say goodbye to people we love. Share your heavy heart with Jesus. **ASK** Jesus to help you and to show His love during your time of grieving.

STATION 15 ~ CLOSING PRAYER *The closing prayer reflects on the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.* **"Follow the Way of the Cross"**

Dear God, During this time where we study Jesus' life, from the time of his condemnation, crucifixion, death, and resurrection; help us to think about our lives and to **ASK** for His help in areas where we have not done well. Let us not be discouraged, but to turn to you Jesus, and ask for *your* help and guidance. Help us to accept each day as it comes, and to live each moment to its fullest. Help us to live and love the way *you* have taught us to do. In the newness of each moment give us comfort of soul and peace of mind. AMEN
