Abe would be chopping wood or reading by candlelight, and George would be cutting down a cherry tree.



HISTORY FOR THE CURIOUS

The Symbols in Our Sanctuary

The outside church wall of solid brick is constructed of Ojai stone. Some other architectural details in the lower part of this wall on the Magnolia Ave side, deserving our attention, are six symbols of our past, three on each side between the cross. Furthest left is a stone of Bethlehem; to its right is a piece of stone from Corinth. Both symbolize significant places in the formation of our Christian faith; Bethlehem was the city of David's ancestry, where Jesus Christ our Lord was born, and Corinth was the city where the Apostle Paul started a great early church.

The third stone on the left side is a Greek cross, characterized by the four equal sides. Going from left to right on the right side of the cross, is a five point star, symbolizing the Epiphany of our Lord, reminding us of the sign given to the Wise Men. Next is a stone from Srooby, Nottinghamshire, England where the earliest Congregational Church on English soil, under the leadership of John Robinson and William Brewster, can be traced. On the far right side is a stone from Plymouth, England, the point of departure of the Pilgrims on the Mayflower, on their historical trip to the New World.

The wood carvings surrounding the Magnolia and Hazeltine Ave doors provide more symbols of our faith. They remind us of the source of the story of the Life of Christ, as related in the gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

There are many memorials and special gifts to our Church, which are listed in the *Book of Life*, located in a special glass-covered stand in the Narthex. Next to the Hazeltine entrance is a handicraft model of an outrigger, a gift from the Congregational Churches of the Marshall Islands. The table and case enclosing this outrigger was constructed by Maurice R. Leech and dedicated on January 26, 1977.

Directly above the *Book of Life* is the *Life Eternal Plaque*, of baked enamel on copper, which was designed and created by church member and organist, Mrs. Millie Andrews. This plaque symbolizes the Christian conviction that mankind, even though in the unknown, proceeds Christ-like into the light and reality of God's presence.

The Sanctuary has a seating capacity of approximately 750 in the pews, with 100 more in the choir stalls. At the front is the magnificent stained glass

I didn't get permission from my folks, for fear they would say no. They were so busy on Sundays, that I knew my absence would go unnoticed.

Wayne's dad, Mr. Freeman arrived, looking for an explanation as to why he had been driving the uninsured (for him) family car, so he authorized my care.

I had been dreading the moment when my parents found out, and was relieved when they weren't available. I knew that a single band aid would cover the stitches, so my hope was that they wouldn't notice. Unfortunately for

me, Mr. Freeman was much more responsible than I was, and he made sure that my folks were apprised of my injury.

My friends all thought that it was hilarious that I'd been caught going to <u>Bob's</u> instead of Sunday School. My parents did not!

Sunday School

For years, the church had trouble finding enough locations to conduct children's Sunday School classes and various solutions were implemented over the years.

At first, the stables at the back of the property, where Weddington Street is now, were cleaned up and used. A major obstacle was that the City refused to issue a permit to install electricity. The solution was to run a <u>very</u> long extension cord from Dreier Hall!

Several years later, the stables were gone, the educational unit hadn't been built, and the number of children had grown substantially. Consequently, there was even more of a need for Sunday School class facilities. Fortunately, our temperate California weather provided the solution; classes were held outside under the trees.

Every Sunday, an older teen, Wayne Freeman and I would arrive at six am, and set up a table and chairs for ten to fifteen children, under various trees around the campus. With church services at 8:00, 9:30 and 11:00, classes would cycle through the locations in shifts. For the babies, there was a nursery in the north upstairs bedroom of Hamilton House.

The adults had Sunday School too. Called <u>Koffee Klatch</u>, it was held on the Hamilton House patio, and was led by Dick Hoffman. Chairs faced the fireplace in a semi-circle, the coffee pot in the same place as now. On cold or rainy days, a fire blazed in the fireplace.

More of a discussion group, the religion based subjects were wide ranging and stimulating. Many times their discussions became so involved, that they had to abruptly wrap up a spirited debate, in order to welcome the congregation after the service, as they joined them for refreshments.

One Sunday, when I was fourteen, after singing in the choir at the 9:30am service, I was supposed to go to Sunday School at 11:00. However, Wayne and his friend invited me to go to <u>Bob's Big Boy</u>, on Van Nuys Blvd. This was exciting, as they were the "big kids" and <u>Bob's</u> was *the* place to go if you were a teenager. Naturally I went!

window, donated by church members as a memorial to Dr Walter Staves. Also in front is the 17 foot tall silver cross, designed by silversmith Allan Adler. Fabricated from treasures contributed by the members, it was worked into a gleaming symbol, representing the faith of the congregation.

The eight small windows in the Sanctuary Balcony are all symbols of Christ: (1) *I am the Door*, John 10:9; symbolic of our Savior, (2) *I am the Vine*, John 15:1; the branches represent his followers, a symbol that is often seen in wood carvings and paintings, (3)*The Fish*; a secret sign used by early Christians to identify each other, and keep from exposing themselves to the foes of Christianity, (4) *The Good Shepherd*, John 10:11; symbol of Jesus Christ, who laid down his life for his flock; (5) *I am the Way*, John 14:6; symbol of Christ's leadership; (6) *I am the Light*, John 8:12; signifying that Christ's followers will enjoy the light of life; (7) *The Bread of Life*, John 6:35; signifying that Christ satisfies our spiritual hunger; (8) *The Crown*, representing Jesus as Lord and King, as suggested in 1 Peter 5:4, "And when the chief Shepherd is manifested you will obtain the unfading crown of glory."

The sixteen wood carvings in the Nave symbolize the contributions of the Christian faith to the life and welfare of mankind. Starting from the back of the Pulpit and winding all around to the back of the lectern, they are (1) Immortality, (2) Marriage, (3) The High Position of Womanhood, (4) Family Life, (5) Peace, (6) Liberty, (7) Justice, (8) Social Action, (9) Scientific Research, (10) Medical Research, (11) Freedom of Interpretation, (12) Education, (13) World Missions, (14) Representative Government, (15) Brotherhood and (16) Ecumenicity. These symbols represent the very essence of Congregationalism. Most of them were designed by Dr. Staves and Theodore Sebern.

Beyond the front window, is the Chapel of the Garden, a gift from Dr. Katherine Gibson. The three sprays of water represent the Trinity: the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

With so many Sanctuary symbols reminding us of God's Love and His purposes for our lives, how can we not feel His presence among us?

At the end of our meeting, we entered Executive Session to discuss additional matters of importance.

ANOTHER GREAT RECIPE FOR THE MONTH

Strawberries and Cream Pie Kathy Trump

1 Graham Cracker pie crust Filling: 8 oz. cream cheese (softened) 1/3 Cup sugar 1/2 tsp. vanilla 1 Cup whipping cream (whipped) 2 Pints strawberries, (washed and hulled) Cornstarch

In large bowl, beat cream cheese until fluffy. Gradually add sugar and vanilla. Blend well. Set aside. Fold whipped cream into cream cheese mixture. Spoon into pie crust. Chill while you make topping. Arrange strawberries, pointed side up, on pie. Puree remainder of berries in food processor or blender. Place in small saucepan. Add sugar to taste and heat. Make a slurry of cold water and cornstarch. Add to sauce in pan. Heat until thickens.
