



In 1956 then Senator John F. Kennedy published a book he called “Profiles in Courage.” In it he wrote short biographies of 8 senators, from John Quincy Adams who broke away from his party in the 18<sup>th</sup> century, to Robert Taft in 1948 who lost his senate seat because of a strong stand he took as Nazi criminals were being tried. These courageous men made decisions based on what was right but not easy.

As we celebrate the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, our “Independence Day” we might think about all those who have acted courageously throughout our country’s history. Their strength has been tested on battle fields, in halls of government, in hospitals. They have fought fires and fought hatred. They have saved lives in hospitals, in crumbled buildings, and when they have stopped by the side of the road, often risking their own lives. They have given their all for others and for the principles of our nation—that we are all created equal and that we all have the right to “life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.”

And as a faith community we offer our particular thanks for the freedom of religion which is a cornerstone of our nation. We can worship God as God calls us. We follow the path that Jesus set before us, a path of justice and mercy and kindness and peace. We love our neighbors as ourselves even if they do not understand the world the way we do. We can courageously live our faith without fear.

So, let us sing in our hearts “God Bless America, land that we love!”

## **RECIPE OF THE MONTH**

COTC Cook Book

### **Mildred Ray’s Favorite Lasagna**

1 lbs. Ground beef, pork, sausage, etc.	Teaspoons Salt
2 ½ Cups Canned Tomatoes	1 Clove Garlic, minced
16 oz. Tomato Paste	1 Tablespoon Parsley Flakes
1 lb. Lasagna noodles	1 Tablespoon Basil

Brown meat. Add above amounts of garlic, parsley, basil and salt.

Add Tomatoes and paste and simmer 1 hour.

Prepare noodles per package instructions.

Mix together: 1 lb. Grated Mozzarella	2 Tablespoons Parsley
3 Cups Ricotta	2 Teaspoons Salt
2 Eggs	½ Cup Parmesan

In a greased 9x13 pan, spread a little of the tomato/meat mixture.

Layer half the noodles, then half the ricotta mixture, half the mozzarella, and half the meat mixture. Repeat layers reserving some mozzarella for the top. Bake at 350 degrees for approximately 30 minutes. YUM!

### AMERICA'S FREEDOM

There is a woman I know who weighs 31 tons, is 305 feet tall and lives on her own island. She's has a specular headpiece and even though her color is green, she is majestic. Her only job in life? To project freedom for all!

I've been fortunate enough to pay visits to the Statue of Liberty many times in my life. I've climbed her 162 stairs and stared out of her crown's windows at the city and waters surrounding her. It's an unforgettable experience.

The last time I visited her, our family was there around the 4<sup>th</sup> of July just a year+ after 9/11. Although all my visits to her are memorable, this one was an extremely powerful experience that remains lodged in my heart. Lady Liberty is a universal symbol of freedom who is also called "Liberty Enlightening the World." And THAT she does. Standing at her base that day, I thought about all the so meaningful elements of her.

A gentleman by the name of Salazar once wrote about her saying: "There is nothing that symbolizes what America is, more than this statue. Standing at the top is awe-inspiring and sends goosebumps from my shoulder blades down to my spine." That's how I felt that day when I visited her.

It's difficult to see her feet clearly, but she is standing on a broken shackle and chains with her right foot raised, representing moving away from oppression and slavery.

The seven rays of her crown illustrate she is divine and represents the seven seas & continents of the world. That day I thought about how my grandparents felt as they saw her from the ship they were on. Fleeing from the oppression they faced in their countries of birth, they approached Ellis Island with hopes and dreams in their hearts.

On her base is a tablet inscribed with words written by Emma Lazarus in 1883: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, the wretched refuse of your teeming shore". That's what it's all about, to breathe free.

The 25 windows in her crown symbolize gemstones and heaven's rays shining over the world. Yes, God is a part of her story and obviously ours. Our freedom story. God's promises of freedom ring true daily and help us to deal with the troubles the world presents us. We are sometimes shackled to the events surrounding us, but our Lord lifts us up and helps us to break those shackles through his grace, love and light. How blessed we are for our freedom and God's love.

## FROM OUR ASSOCIATE MINISTER

### VISION RENEWED

*And Hannah prayed, and said, "My heart rejoiceth in the Lord, mine horn is exalted in the Lord : my mouth is enlarged over mine enemies; because I rejoice in thy salvation. There is none holy as the Lord: for there is none beside thee: neither is there any rock like our God." - 1 Samuel 2:1-2*

A certain gentleman explains "After a painful minor surgery on my left eye, my doctor recommended a vision test. With confidence, I covered my right eye and read each line on the chart with ease. Covering my left eye, I gasped. How could I not realize I'd been so blind?"

While this man adjusted to his new glasses and renewed vision, we are reminded how daily trials often cause us to be spiritually nearsighted. Focusing only on what we could see up-close—the pain and ever-changing circumstances—we sometimes become blind to the faithfulness of our eternal and unchanging God. With such a limited perspective, hope can become an unattainable blur.

First Samuel 1 tells the story of a woman who failed to recognize God's trustworthiness while focusing on her current anguish, uncertainty, and loss. For years, Hannah had endured childlessness and endless torment from Peninnah, another wife of her husband Elkanah. Hannah's husband adored her, but she was not able to find contentment. One day, Hannah cried out and prayed with bitter honesty. When Eli the priest questioned her, she explained her situation. He assured her that God would "grant her request" (1 Samuel 1:17). Though Hannah's situation didn't change immediately, she walked away with confident hope (v. 18).

Her prayer in 1 Samuel 2:1-2 reveals a shift in Hannah's focus. Even before her circumstances improved, Hannah's renewed vision changed her perspective and her attitude. She rejoiced in the ongoing presence of God — her Rock and everlasting hope.

Today I want to encourage you to "look again". God has not forgotten you. Your situation is not beyond repair. It only appears that way, when we can only see the problems we are facing. I challenge you to begin to tell your problem to God. Change your focus to the things that are positive in your life. The enemy thought he was going to knock you out of the game. BUT GOD has a different plan, and you are still here!

God promises that He will see you through this. And you will live to see it happen. Command yourself to LIVE, LIVE, LIVE, LIVE, LIVE! ***Believe it!*** Curtis

All Church members are welcome to attend Council meetings. If you have questions or concerns about the Church please see me before or after worship or send me an email.


**RACIAL EQUITY AND THE CHURCH: Concept Definitions**

Equity and equality are different. Equality means everyone is treated the same exact way, regardless of differences. Equity means everyone is provided with what they need to succeed.

**Equality** is one of the central principles of democracy and is based on the belief that all people should have the same opportunities to be successful and have a productive, enjoyable life. Equality is rooted in fairness since it is linked to another American ideal, that of a meritocracy. The idea of equality is key to the notion that everyone will be able to achieve based on their efforts and contributions to society instead of their status or position. Equality was particularly important during the civil rights era when nonwhites didn't have equal standing or treatment before the law. More recently there has been a debate about whether equality is enough and whether equity is a more important principle.

**Equity** recognizes that everyone doesn't begin in the same place in society. Some people face adverse conditions and circumstances making it more challenging with the same effort to achieve the same goals. Equity advocates for those who may have been historically disadvantaged, making it difficult for them to be successful. What is "fair" as it relates to equity is not a question of what is the same but rather the point from which a person begins. Equity takes into account historical and other factors in determining what is fair.

Does the removal of the wooden fence eliminating the structural barrier to access achieve fairness?

### **The Birth of a Child.....and the Birth of Our Church: 1949**

The War was over and the Valley was dotted with new homes and new hope—hope for peace in the world and peace in the neighborhood... The future was here.

One small group of believers felt it was a good time to plant a church for worship in the San Fernando Valley. They had been meeting at a theater in Encino on Sundays, dreaming of someplace near where they could gather to learn of the ways of the Lord, to develop and expand their faith. There were roughly a dozen or so couples, including my Mom and Dad and a new Babe they called Bob (me). They learned of a large and unique property owned by Doctor Hamilton who had delivered me.

With the support of the National Association of Congregational Churches and others, they purchased the property and set out upon the job of turning the grounds into a campus, with a little chapel, the family home, a pool and much more—oak trees, other buildings which became the foundation of what we are blessed to call Church of the Chimes.

Seventy two years ago and still spreading The Word, supporting the community and the world at large. This is the beginning of Our Story. In months to come we'll shed some light on many special times. His blessings to you. *Robert*

## **COMMUNITY & WORLD SERVICE NEWS** Robert Dunn, Chair-TBD

### **A MISSION MOMENT with MEND (**M**ee**E**t **E**ach **N**eed with **D**ignity)**

Located in Pacoima, CA, over the past 50 years, MEND has continuously served the most vulnerable in our community, including those who are homeless, unemployed/under-employed, very low income, and older adults. Their mission is to meet the immediate needs of individuals and families and to increase their access to opportunities that strengthens their capacity to thrive—to help them address and overcome long-term challenges that have kept them from thriving. Core services are provided by a Foodbank, Homeless Care Services and Clothing Center. Deeper case managed services are offered through the Family Support & Pathways to Wellness Programs. Plus, they provide work experience, life skills and financial literacy classes and support services to enrolled clients.

A majority of the individuals and families who come to MEND live in extreme poverty – some in unconverted garages, uninhabitable spaces or vehicles. Still others live in apartments with multiple other families – one family per bedroom. Some are able to secure transitional housing or stay in a shelter, still others are completely unsheltered. Applying the Public Health Service Act and HUD's definitions of homelessness – which include lacking any fixed, stable shelter; living in conditions not fit for human habitation; and “doubling up” – almost 100% of our clients qualify as homeless.
