Reflections

June was always a month filled with so much! There was graduation at every level of education, which meant ceremonies and parties and presents and cakes, very proud students, moms and dads and grandpas and grandmas, gathering together to celebrate. Traditionally it was the month of weddings—lots of weddings and although that has changed some, there are still lots of couples planning their nuptials for this month.

For those churches like Church of the Chimes who are members of the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches, it also meant that we gathered for our annual meeting. Each year the conference was held in a different place, and each year there were new faces, but each year too, we saw the folks who had a part of our lives for years. I have missed only two meetings since 1976 – one because of a parishioner funeral, and one when my husband was too sick for me to leave.

So our four days of business and worship, and learning and sharing will be condensed into a "virtual meeting" for a few hours, one Saturday in June. There are financial matters that need to be attended to, and elections. This was to be the great year when we were celebrating the 400th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims! Greg Abbott, Sylvia McCormick and I were looking forward to the same great time we had in Cleveland last summer, with some baseball, some boat rides and maybe even a little dancing mixed in with the important and helpful meetings and workshops we attended.

Nothing, though, can tarnish or diminish the importance of the NACCC to all of us and to our churches. We are joined together by our heritage, yes, but also by our hopes for the future. We are as committed to religious **freedom** as were those brave women and men who landed in a foreign land so they could worship the Lord as they felt called to worship. We are committed to the **fellowship** of churches, knowing that together we have much to share, and together we have the strength of commitment. We are founded on the deepest **faith** in God, and on the path set forth for us by God's son.

The church gathered in 1629 as the covenant of the church in Salem, MA. There are perhaps no words that express more clearly or more beautifully, who we are as individual churches. Many believe, as do I, that these words Continues on the next page...

WHEN WILL THE SANCTUARY OPEN FOR WORSHIP?

On Tuesday, May 26th, Los Angeles Mayor Garcetti announced that houses of worship can resume operations as long as they follow proper safety laws.

On Tuesday, June 2nd COTC Council was going to meet on the Hamilton House patio (staying 6 feet apart and wearing masks) to determine when to open the Sanctuary for Worship Services. However, given the current county-wide curfew now in place, they will not meet until such time it is determined it will be safe.

Thus, the decision to reopen has now been postponed indefinitely. When that time comes, we will be following the guidance from the CA Dept. of Public Health.

- Attendance is to be limited to 25 percent of the building's capacity, or a maximum of 100 people, whichever is lower.
- Temperature screenings may be done at the door.
- All congregants and staff are required to wear face coverings, use hand sanitizer frequently and practice physical distancing.
- Services should be shortened to limit the amount of time congregants are spending around one another.
- Places of worship should consider discontinuing singing in situations "...where there is increased likelihood for transmission from contaminated exhaled droplets..." At the beginning we will not have congregational singing but we will have music from our incredible musicians!
- Common areas are to be thoroughly disinfected regularly.
- The Bibles and hymnals will be removed from the pew rack.
- Offering plates will not be passed; a moment of gratitude will be observed for donations dropped in the narthex basket, mailed in or donated on-line
- Congregants are discouraged from hugging or shaking hands and removing from service" or finding "low-community touch alternatives for communal/ religious water containers.

These limitations will be in effect for 21 days; then they will be reevaluated by the health department. "Even with adherence to the above, convening in a congregational setting of multiple different households to practice a personal faith carries a relatively higher risk for widespread transmission of the COVID-19 virus, and may result in increased rates of infection, hospitalization, and death, especially among more vulnerable populations," DPH wrote.

Given the understood risk factor and her abundance of caution mode, Beth suggests that when we do get together again, we will learn how to wave, keep our ears tuned to hear others speak behind masks, remain six feet apart and perhaps most importantly---we will learn how to smile with our eyes!

We have been so fortunate to have had our services via live streaming over these past weeks and months, and we will continue this for now and when we do open the Sanctuary for worship, remote broadcasting will indeed continue so that more vulnerable people can worship safely at home...

WHO'S WHO AT COTC

Nancy Nelsen

Nancy spent the first years of her life on a farm in Illinois where she developed a strong work ethic. Her family raised cattle, pigs and chickens. One of three children, she was always expected to complete her share of the daily chores which included caring for, feeding and butchering the chickens.

Unfortunately, Nancy's childhood was disrupted when she was involved in a horrific accident. At the age of eleven she was riding in a school bus that swerved off the road and burst into flames. She was severely injured, suffering first and third degree burns. She was confined to a hospital bed for seven weeks; she underwent several surgeries that

would continue through her high school years. Although it was a difficult time, Nancy credits her parent's love and support for getting her through it. She said, "My parents never treated me differently; they expected me to go on with my life as usual and not wallow in self-pity." And so, that's what Nancy did. Proving herself to be a brave and resilient young girl, she forged ahead carrying on as a normal teenager, partaking in all the social happenings such as dances, cheerleading and boyfriends.

Her sophomore year, however, brought on another challenge. At 15 years old Nancy's father passed away unexpectedly. It was an emotionally difficult time for the family. As a way of coping with the loss, a friend suggested that they join a group that was going to Asia to visit the missionaries. Then at 16, she traveled extensively to Singapore, Borneo, Indonesia and India, observing the work of the missionaries. She still has vivid images of that experience, and reflects, "I learned so much about different cultures and religions."

When she returned to Illinois she receive a teaching degree, and taught 3rd grade for several years. In 1970 she met her husband, Randy, and after a short courtship they were married. In 1972 they built a house in the country-side. They constructed 80% of the house themselves. (Such a power couple!) In 1978 their daughter, Christy, was born. During that time they were members of the local Congregational Church where Nancy was the Director of Christian Education for 16 years.



Lately, creators and artists are performing live online for free. We can pretty much tune in to a performance every night of the week. You can start the week with Grace Potter or Metallica, wind down each night with a live stream from the Metropolitan Opera; during weekends, there are a plethora of performances. My personal favorite is John Mayer who has a half hour Instagram show which is a mix of his music, humor and hosted guests which is fabulous!

We have had a chance to reconnect with friends from long ago, and family that we don't usually speak to for long periods of time. We are using Zoom, Facetime and just good old phones to connect. Importantly, we have had the chance to reconnect with ourselves.

With this slower life, Collin Reiff, a psychiatrist with NYU Langone Health, said "The crisis has had an interesting way of giving us permission to reach out to those closest to us for support, reinforcing positive relationships, picking up old hobbies or created new ones". Mental health experts say hobbies do wonders for our mental health and well-being, but, it can be tough to find the time to take on new hobbies in our normal busy life. Mr. Reiff said he's noticed many people are using this free time to practice self-care; going on walks, crafting, cooking, reading, writing and gardening. People are also revisiting activities they loved as a kid—like playing soccer, or making friendship bracelets—as a way to relax, revisit old memories, and of course, stop thinking about the virus.

Finally, the pandemic has given us time to check-in with ourselves, and has allowed us to make an effort to prioritize our own well-being. For us to take care of ourselves, both physically and spiritually.

Not only is it important to keep ourselves healthy, other people now depend on it. It's OK to let ourselves rest. It's wonderful to have a little more time to explore our spiritual lives more deeply, and reawaken our faith. Let's hope some of these life lessons, if not all of these silver linings, last now and forever! It would make for a more peaceful and better world to live in. AMEN!

Yes, there is a Silver Lining...

The last three months have undoubtedly been difficult both physically and mentally, while we deal with the differing aspects of loss and disappointment. However, not everything is bleak. In fact, there are many things we can be thankful for, even when the world seems to be, figuratively speaking, like a Rubik's cube; mixed up and confusing.

I recently read an article in the *Huffington Post* which noted that there are many silver linings arising from our stay-at-home orders. After reading the article, my hope is that these are not just temporary; rather these will continue and help reshape our world and thinking, as the months and years pass.

Here are some silver linings worth recognizing:

Our air is getting cleaner. Pollutants that cause smog are not filling our atmosphere, given far less car traffic and industrial activity. A new report found there's been a nearly 17% decline in global carbon dioxide emissions since last year; potentially the largest drop in pollution ever recorded. Los Angeles is seeing clear crisp skies and stars at night, while Detroit is down 30% in smog, Minneapolis is down 15%, and major cities across the U.S. have clearer skies. Additionally, the smog infected country of India is at a 20 year low for smog!

Scientists are innovating at lightning speed, creating COVID-19 testing, drugs and technologies around the world and uniting to share their findings. Onyema Ogbuagu, a Yale Medicine infectious disease doctor, said, "There are currently over 250 trials looking at various drugs and treatments for COVID-19".

New technologies have been developed to sanitize personal protective and medical equipment for reuse. Old drugs are being repurposed; new drugs are being developed.

It's amazing to see how much innovation is going on; and it's all happening at record speed. These new discoveries won't just help us recover in the short-term, but they'll transform our lives for years to come. The pandemic has ushered in an unprecedented era of cooperation and innovation from the private and public sector and medical community, towards achieving common goals," Ogbuagu said. "This level of collaboration has transcended country borders and regions, and galvanized the research community. The world is united in a way we've never really seen before." GREAT RECIPE of the MONTH

FROZEN FRUIT SMOOTHIE

1 frozen banana, peeled and sliced

2 cups frozen strawberries, raspberries, or cherries

1 cup milk

1/2 cup plain or vanilla yogurt

1/2 cup freshly squeezed orange juice

2 to 3 tablespoons honey or to taste

GLIMPSE INTO THE PAST

The Corral at the Golden West Fair

What is one person's junk may very well be someone else's treasure. This is the underlying theory of the <u>Corral</u> at the *Golden West Fair*, an integral part of the Fair for the past sixty-five years. Originally, the <u>Corral</u> operated outside of a shed at the rear driveway of the campus. The booth provided an abundance of goods for sale. Almost any item is acceptable for the Corral, ranging from very useful hand and power tools, to more mundane and dated items like old suitcases and book ends.

Prices are at bargain levels, but gatekeepers like John Drew staunchly enforced a minimum floor of pricing to discourage highway robberies at the Corral! Over the years, it has been a formidable profit center for the Fair.

Originally, the Corral was run by Dallas and Jessie Getz, parents of dear member Ginger Getz Wright. Next, Bill and Carol Miller ran it and then Kelley Judd. We also need to mention Dora and Larry Humphreys ably assisting Dallas and Jessie. For a year or two, there was a role reversal, with the Humphreys' running the concession and the Getz's assisting. Over the years, there have been countless others who have contributed to its success.

Dallas Getz was originally from Utah. His mother, not of the Mormon faith, was pleased to see Dallas migrate to California (more correctly...away from Utah). Jessie was home grown - born and raised in Hollywood, and a Congregationalist from the outset. She attended Mount Hollywood Congregational Church, before joining the Church of the Chimes. They were married in 1942, and have three married children, son Bill in Granada Hills and daughters Kaye Carlson in Stillwater, Oklahoma and Ginger Wright of Reseda.

The Getz's used to live a half block away from the Church...in the second house on Hartsook Street, near Hazeltine Avenue. Upon Dallas' retirement, he worked almost full time at Church, before moving out to Green Valley. Dallas and Jessie continued to worship with us and never considered worshiping anywhere else. They moved again to Santa Clarita, to a home closer, cutting the distance to the Church by a half.

The Getz's had a wonderful anecdote about the Staves and the Corral. He recalls that Dr. Walter Staves, when driving to Church on refuge collection day,

had his eyes out for potential Corral items, much like the eyes of an eagle seeking its prey.

Whenever he came upon something of value, he would stop his car to execute an EVR, a space age acronym for *Extra Vehicular Rescue*. Whenever Evelyn was in the car during an EVR, she would become quite embarrassed....being the proper lady that she was. We can all share in her anxiety at the sight of an outstanding citizen of the community and her own husband, scrounging around in other people's garbage cans! So as soon as Walter stopped his car to retrieve an item, Evelyn would begin slumping lower, and lower, and lower until she was completely out of sight of anyone passing by at that moment!

In carrying out God's work, obviously Dr. Staves believed that saving an object from oblivion was merely an extension of saving a person's soul.
