#### FROM OUR SENIOR MINISTER

# Faithfully Yours

I happen to love Lent, the 40 days (not including Sundays) that lead us from Ash Wednesday, to Good Friday, to Easter Sunday. I love Lent because its deep purple darkness challenges me to be reflective, to be sacrificial, and above all, to live closer to God and follow Jesus. My favorite image is of the construction paper footprints that marched across a bulletin board at North Shore Congregational Church when I was the Director of Christian Education. The footsteps followed pictures of the life and ministry of Jesus, and were imagined and created by the church school classes. Every year I try to fit my feet in those prints and follow the path that Jesus walked.

My favorite words about Lent come from theologian and sometimes whimsical writer Frederick Buechner, in his book Whistling in the Dark:

#### "LENT

"In many cultures there is an ancient custom of giving a tenth of each year's income to some holy use. For Christians, to observe the forty days of Lent, is to do the same thing with roughly a tenth of each year's days. After being baptized by John in the river Jordan, Jesus went off alone into the wilderness, where he spent forty days asking himself the question, 'what it meant to be Jesus'. During Lent, Christians are supposed to ask one way or another, 'what it means to be themselves'.

"If you had to bet everything you have on whether there is a God or whether there isn't, which side would get your money, and why?

"When you look at your face in the mirror, what do you see in it that you most like, and what do you see in it that you most deplore?

"If you had only one last message to leave to the handful of people who are most important to you, what would it be, in twenty five words or less?

"Of all the things you have done in your life, which is the one you would most like to undo? Which is the one that makes you happiest to remember?

"Is there any person in the world, or any cause, that, if circumstances called for it, you would be willing to die for? If this were the last day of your life, what would you do with it?

"To hear yourself try to answer questions like these, is to begin to hear something not only of who you are, but of both what you are becoming and what you are failing to become. It can be a pretty depressing business, all in all, but if sackcloth and ashes are at the start of it, something like Easter may be at the end."

being less on discussion of church issues, with more emphasis on outreach to others, including new visitors; more communion services; and a longer meditation time during the worship service.

As each individual group presented, the entire retreat group was encouraged to ask questions and discuss the points raised. Discussion was lively and positive. Rev. Beth concluded this portion of the service by stressing the need to follow up on all of the points raised. Following the discussion, lunch was served. After lunch, attendees formed a circle, led in prayer by Rev. Beth, who encouraged others to pray as well. Several others prayed stressing what the church meant to them individually.

The after event feedback was extremely positive, as those in attendance felt drawn closer to the church, and one another.

# **Leaping Into The Future With 2020 Vision**

The extra day this year, February 29, was set aside for an all church retreat, named <u>Leaping Into The Future With 2020 Vision</u>. Our goal was to discuss ways to make our church community more vibrant. There were approximately 30 attendees, with Rev. Dr. Beth Bingham skillfully serving as moderator.

We began after breakfast. Following a prayer, Rev. Beth opened a discussion of what faith and the church meant to the group. Responses were recorded on a white board. Following the discussion, she invited each attendee to select from a group of six topics, their preferred area of interest for discussion. The top four choices became the topics for group discussion. Areas of interest chosen were *Financial Sustainability*, *Community Outreach and Service*, *Church Growth*, and *Worship*. Attendees then joined the group whose topic they most wanted to discuss. Rev. Beth had each group spend an hour creating an action plan for their particular topic, then report back to the entire group.

The first to report was from the *Financial Sustainability* group. They suggested that Bower Hall be upgraded for improved paid venue use; that the church hire a person exclusively devoted to increase and manage weddings and receptions; the creation of film and music festivals; the addition of a social media expert, to improve the church's visibility on the internet, and to promote social consciousness.

Next was *Church Growth*, who suggested that the church develop youth and all member mentoring, to better involve all members; a series of dinners for groups of six, including couples, as a way to increase young adult involvement in the church; development of Bower Hall for open community events, focusing on the performing arts; use of advertising on the internet and through the mail, to increase awareness of the church in the community; senior outreach for the purpose of making that community more aware of our church.

Our Community Outreach and Service followed. They suggested continued outreach to the homeless in our community; the development of a more intense partner relationship with a service provider in the community; the improvement of interfaith relations and exchanges; development of monthly mission presentations, with groups invited to speak during the service, and man tables afterwards; and an increase in the <u>Community and World Service</u> budget.

The last group was *Worship*. They reported the group's satisfaction with relevancy of the sermons, and other aspects of worship; the satisfaction with the diversity of music in the service; an appreciation for the closing hymn; the desire to focus Passing of the Peace

# Stanley Dong, Historian

The following is a press release by the Publicity and Public Relations Committee of Our Church:

The Reverend Walter H. Staves Receives Honorary Degree - June 1956

Reverend Walter H. Staves, Minister of the Congregational Church of the Chimes in Van Nuys, has been called east to receive the honorary degree of *Doctor of Divinity* and to deliver the Baccalaureate Sermon on Sunday, June 10, 1956, at Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. As reported by Dr. Howell H. Brooks, President of Coe College, Reverend Staves is the youngest minister to have received this honor from this college.

After graduating from Coe College, cum laude in 1938, he entered theological training at Chicago University. Upon completion of his theological studies in 1943, he was elected Minister of Christian Education of the Congregational Conference of Southern California and the Southwest, with specific responsibility for the youth work in the churches of this area. Following three years in this position, he was called as Associate Minister of the Hollywood Congregational Church.

In 1950, he founded the Congregational Church of the Chimes which is recognized as the denomination's fastest growing church in the world. In six years the church has grown from a membership of 24 to a total parish of over 4000 members. Its beautiful five acre campus on the corner of Magnolia Blvd. and Hazeltine Ave. is the center of a vital spiritual program. In addition to triplicate worship services each Sunday more than 1,000 children attend its three Sunday schools. A wide and varied schedule of activities including Scouting units, youth groups, talent and interest workshops, and graded choirs are part of the church's weekly ministry.

The Reverend and Mrs. Walter Staves and their five children will leave for Cedar Rapids this Sunday, June 2nd, immediately following morning worship services. After participating in the commencement exercises and receiving the degree, the Minister will continue to Omaha, Nebraska to attend the bi-annual National meeting of the Congregational Christian Churches of the United States as an official delegate.

#### I Remember: Work Periods cont.

We first notched the tree, aiming it for the parking lot behind Fellowship Hall, but as we started to cut, it began leaning toward one of the houses! One of our crew got his four wheel drive truck and tried to pull it back, but it persistently leaned towards the house.

To be honest, I'm not sure how we finally got the tree down, as I was so scared it was all a blur. I think the truck helped, although the hubs broke in the process. It finally came down where we wanted it to, but left a <u>huge</u> dent in the asphalt.


Apparently this attracted some attention, because the next time that we were prepping a tree, Lindley Williamson showed up. A stranger to me, he was the Chairman of *The Board of Trustees*. As the only real adult there, he politely but firmly took charge, which my young male ego greatly resented.

After all, we were adults (almost) and been doing this work for months, so he seemed like an intruder. He told us that if we planned on felling any more trees to let him know, as he needed to be there to insure the safety.

At the time hard hats were not used much outside of building sites. However, Lindley had brought some, which he insisted that we wear. I put one on reluctantly, as I was 'tough' and thought that I didn't need it; after all, we weren't in a dangerous construction area ....

Immediately after donning it, I was holding a ladder for someone trimming branches fifteen feet above. Almost immediately he dropped his saw, which landed directly on my helmeted head! I hated that Lindley was right, but was thankful that I didn't have a dented skull.

There were several outcomes resulting from that day. We didn't fell any more trees; it began my friendship with Lindley Williamson, for whom I developed a great respect; and I became a great believer in hard hats!

#### **Work Periods**

Work periods were begun out of necessity at the Church's birth, due to the church's limited finances. Utilizing the members' individual skills, they were held every Saturday from 1950, well into the 1960's.

Rather than being something to avoid, I look back on those Saturdays as some of the most enjoyable times of my life. Although the work was generally backbreaking, it didn't seem to matter, because there was such a sense of accomplishment.

It was a real social event as well. What better way to get to know your fellow members, than by working alongside them? There was no shortage of role models for me; I was surrounded by multiple parent and grandparent figures demonstrating life lessons. The bonds that I formed then have lasted a lifetime.

At the time, there was generally less interaction between adults and children, as compared to present day society. At work periods however, with all ages toiling side by side, a friendly camaraderie developed between adults, teens and children.

As I matured, I went from being tolerated as an in-the-way seven year old, to being an integral part of the work force; from being the ballast on a leveler towed behind a tractor preparing the front lawn for grass seed, to working alongside the men in a variety of tasks.

Over the years, I learned a lot; wiring, plumbing, framing, concrete work, landscaping and general repair; along with a reinforcement of the work ethic, first learned from my Mom and Dad. Being young and strong, my main job however, was as a laborer; ditch digging, lifting, moving, demolition (picks and sledge hammers – exhausting!), anything that the men couldn't, or wouldn't do.

In 1960, as the work periods became less frequent, several of the young men of the church and I decided that we would start felling the numerous eucalyptus trees which formed a bridle path ringing the perimeter of the property. We didn't have authorization from anyone, but then, nobody said that we couldn't!

The trees were messy and in the way, but stood at least seventy-five feet tall. In spite of their height and our complete inexperience, we boldly began.

I'm not sure how many we felled, certainly not more than five, but one stands out in my memory. It took all the fun out of my perceived heroic lumberjack persona. The tree in question was close to the border of the Horace Height Houses, at the back of the church property. Since none of us knew how to use tree climbing equipment, we couldn't cut it down in sections. We had to fell it in one piece..
